## France Deals with Cost of Living in Specific Manner By Four Definite Measures

State to Sell all War Supplies and also Will Retain Food at Reasonable Prices in Order to Curb Illicit Profits; Bill to Be Passed Against Speculation.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, July 17.—Four definite measures intended to reduce the cost of living were decided upon today at a meeting of the cabinet. The four plans were:

1. The "Clemenceau" or "Vilgrain" food selling booths in Paris will be doubled in number and offers will be made to open them in other centres of population.

2. Cheap restaurants to supply meats at fixed prices will be started in Paris and the provinces under control of the ministry of Supplies.

3. All war stocks of foodstuffs will be sold the public, chiefly through the co-operative stores.

4. The special service already organized by the Ministry of Supplies will sell in order to curb all illicit profits in foodstuffs.

A bill pending in parliament contains provisions supplementing the present exacting laws against speculation with increased penalties.

## REPARATION FROM GERMANY

Regret Expressed at Death of Sergeant Major of Dragoons in Berlin.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, July 17.—The French Government will demand reparation from Germany for the death of a sergeant major of dragoons at the hands of the Prussians in Berlin. The incident occurred at the French embassy where the French officer was on guard.

A dispatch received here from Berlin states that Dr. von Haimhausen has called on the Spanish ambassador in charge of French interests in Germany expressing regret for the incident and adding that the person guilty of the French soldier's death will be punished.

## GENERAL STRIKE AT POMERANIA'S CAPITAL

Movement is Designed to Secure Abolition of Martial Law in That Province.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Copenhagen, July 17.—A general strike accompanied by rioting has started at Stettin, the capital of the province of Pomerania, Prussia, according to advices received from German sources.

The strike includes all trades including harbor transport, gas, water and electrical power workers. The object of the strike is to secure the abolition of martial law in Pomerania and to settle other political questions.

## INDEPENDENT COLD STORAGE COMPANY HERE

New Local Concern Incorporated For \$300,000 With Well Known Men as Promoters.

Prince Rupert is to have another cold storage. The Independent Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd., has been formed here by a group of enterprising business men of this town and Theo Collart, the consul for Belgium, is temporary secretary of the new concern. The new company is incorporated at present in Victoria and will have a capital of \$300,000 divided into \$10 shares. There is no promotion stock, so that all the money will be used to develop the new concern and it is the intention of the provisional board of directors to enter the fish business field as soon as possible.

The promoters of the company are Theo Collart, consul for Belgium; Peter Black, Jack Donnelly, C. H. Thomas, G. A. Woodland, and C. E. Bainter.

Theo Collart has been appointed financial agent to dispose of the shares for the company, and he expects considerable backing from capitalists in Brussels as soon as export of capital will be allowed from Belgium.

It is intended to make this company a Prince Rupert concern as far as possible and it is expected that the fishermen and business men of this city will give it hearty support both financial and moral.

The fishing industry is the best asset Prince Rupert has, and every means to develop it to its utmost capacity should be welcomed by the people here.

Men expert in the fishing and cold storage business will be employed in the management of the new company and the new cold storage will also cater to the business of the retail and wholesale merchants of this city. Independent fishermen will be able to store their fish and ship it to the eastern market themselves if they so wish.

The new cold storage will undoubtedly be a good stimulant to the fishing business here and will warrant the fishermen coming in with their catches of certitude of selling it and of finding also the ice and bait which so often runs short here when it is most urgently needed.

## GREAT RUN OF SOCKEYES ON SKEENA RIVER

Biggest Salmon Run in Years Reported to be Passing Up Just Now.

"The biggest run of sockeye salmon in years," is the verdict of those who have seen what is going forward on the Skeena just now. Fish are going up the river at a great rate and J. T. C. Williams, inspector of fisheries for this district, has received reports to the effect that 300 fish to the boat is quite common. It is also said that as high as 600 were secured by one boat in the 24 hours.

Fisheries Overseer Murray has gone to the river to investigate and further reports should be received as to the phenomenal run soon.

### FAVOR BIG UNION

Winnipeg, July 16.—The Trades and Labor Council last night passed a motion favoring the One Big Union although many of the delegates had been instructed by their unions to refrain from voting. R. A. Rigg appeared before the committee and spoke strongly against the movement.

## RELIEF FOR DRY AREAS OF PRAIRIE PROVINCES FROM DOMINION AND MANITOBA

GOVERNMENT AT WINNIPEG PROPOSES TO PURCHASE STOCK FROM STRICKEN DISTRICTS AND THE DOMINION TO HELP PROVIDE FODDER

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, July 17.—With a view to aiding the farmers of Southern Alberta and at the same time getting stock for the farmers of Manitoba at more reasonable prices than they could be purchased in the stockyards, the government, it was announced by the minister of agriculture, would purchase between twenty-five and thirty thousand head.

The transaction, which is a sequel to the total failure of the hay and coarse fodder crop in a large section of the western provinces, will entail an expenditure of \$1,000,000.

### Dominion Proposal.

Ottawa, July 17.—To relieve stock raisers in the dry area of Alberta and Saskatchewan, whose herds are threatened with scarcity of fodder, the government has submitted two proposals to the provincial governments interested.

If possible hay will be cut on the Dominion lands in the north, baled and shipped south to feed the cattle, or they will send the cattle from the south to the hay lands of the north where the moisture has been adequate and grass abundant.

To carry out either one or both of these proposals the Dominion government has proposed to the provincial authorities that the cost of securing hay and moving the hay or cattle be borne equally by the Dominion and provincial governments, railway companies and stock owners.

## WEST COAST SALMON ARE RUNNING WELL

Although this is not a special day for selling fish at the exchange, there are a few boats in waiting to get their catches discharged. The Dolphin has 15,000 lbs.; Viking, 15,000, and the Tide 5,000 lbs. The Alliance is also back in port with a large catch from the banks.

The salmon are now running very well on the west coast and many fish are being brought to town. All the trollers report very favorable indications for a big haul during the next week. The Bravo is back with 3,000 salmon and the Dip has also 3,000.

## TRADE WITH ORIENT QUITE PRACTICABLE

E. C. Cotes Tells What People  
Need on Other Side of  
Pacific Ocean.

SHOULD SELL LUMBER  
AND FISH IN INDIA

Many Products Might be Imported  
To Make Return Cargoes to  
This Continent.

"The Orient undoubtedly has need of what Prince Rupert has to offer and Prince Rupert has need of what the Orient has to give in return." That was the opening sentence of the interesting address given by E. C. Cotes, head of the Press Association of India, in an address to the local Board of Trade. He continued: "This is a state of things very apt to result in business, once the two parties to a deal can be got together which is what now has to be done."

"Sitting down and hoping won't attract direct steamers from Calcutta and Hongkong, which is what is wanted. We have to get the men who are behind these steamers into Rupert and interest them here. If we can do this we may find the possibility of Rupert being made a trans-oceanic port of call much less remote than it seems at present. There are plenty of vessels lying in the ports of Calcutta, Bombay, Rangoon, Colombo, Singapore, Shanghai and Yokohama today that might quite profitably look into the fine harbor of Prince Rupert and pick up lumber and fish as they pass on their rounds. Tramp steamers have a way of making trade that results in the establishment of regular liners."

Millions of Possible Customers.

"As everybody knows there are three hundred million people in India, four hundred millions in China, and forty millions in Japan, all of them largely fish eaters. I don't for a moment compare these seven hundred and forty millions of brown and yellow folk either with the one hundred millions of the United States or the eight millions of Canada. They are a big proposition all the same, witness the large trade in dried fish that goes on in Arab boats between the Persian Gulf, where the fish are caught and cured, and the coasts of India, Burma, China and Japan where they are paid for and eaten."

"Because Rupert fish has never been sold in Oriental markets in the past in any large quantities, it by no means follows that such trade is impracticable. I can remember a time when the tea merchants of India despaired of selling Indian tea in Russia, a tea drinking country which at that time insisted upon getting its supply exclusively from China. In the past ten years the attraction of Russian buyers to the Calcutta market combined with the introduction of certain minor changes in the Indian methods of packing, have resulted in many millions of pounds of the Indian article being disposed of profitably. A very similar thing has happened in the case of tobacco."

Lumber Possibilities.

"Lumber is another Rupert article for which there is a vast field in the Orient. Wood is very scarce in India over thousands of square miles. Many thousands of railway ties and much other timber are imported into India annually from Australia and there is no reason why some of this profitable traffic should not go to Prince Rupert. India has over thirty thousand miles of railway line to keep up besides any number of factories, plantations and dwelling houses, all in need of lumber."

"Return freights might be in the form of such articles as wheat bags for the prairies. These wheat bags are made in Calcutta which exports them to the value of \$150,000,000 annually, the entire world being supplied exclusively from this source. Practically all the sand bags used by the Allied troops during the war were made in Calcutta. Canada, as a grain growing country, requires them in very large numbers."

"Other imports might be tea, iron ingots, cotton, silk, rice, spices, coffee, and curios and many minor articles."

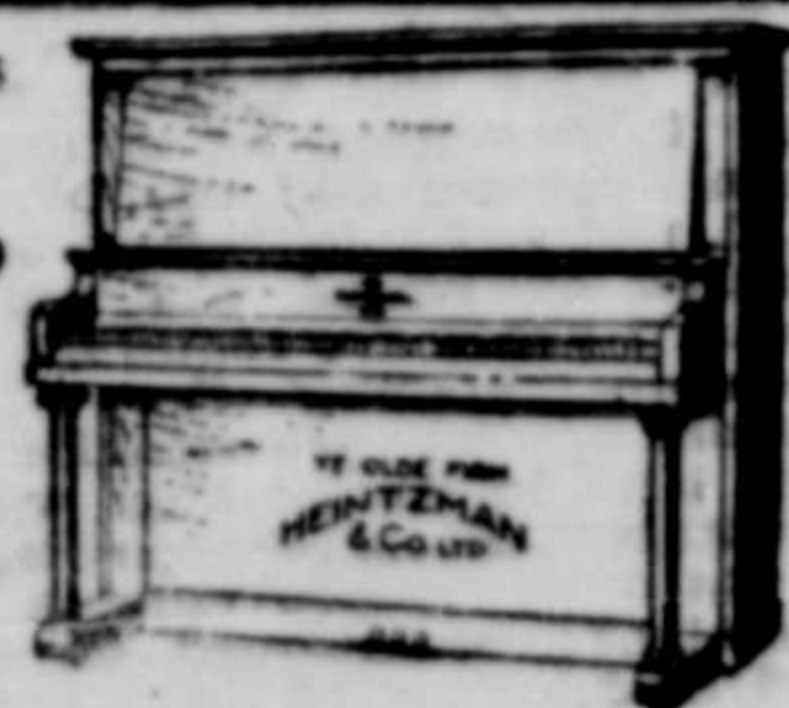

## NO DAMAGE SUITS AGAINST CUNARD

Claims by Survivors of Lusitania,  
Aggregating Over Five  
Millions Dismissed.

New York, July 15.—A final decree dismissing all damage suits against the Cunard Steamship Co. as a result of the torpedoing of the Lusitania and barring any similar suits which may be brought in the future, was signed today by the United States district court.

There was a total of 64 claims aggregating between five and six million dollars which had been brought against the company.

## Synopsis of

## Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company, on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

## PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers or pre-emptors recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

## SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

## GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits to be issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

## LORD FRENCH ON HARD LUCK OF THE BLIND

Men Fought Splendidly and Now  
Are Learning New Work.

In Prince Rupert this week is a visitor who comes on a mission of more than ordinary importance. He is W. E. Cowen, representative of the National Institute for the Blind, who comes to present to Prince Rupert people the appeal which the Institute is making all over the Empire for funds. "You and I," said Lord French to the men at St. Dunstan's Hostel, which was established by the National Institute, "fought together, and I cannot tell you how sorry I am at your hard luck. But you fought magnificently for your country—no soldiers ever fought better—and that should be some consolation to you. Nor can I tell you how pleased I am to see you looking so well and cheerful, and to see how splendidly you are getting on with your new work."

### Deserve Well of Country.

Men who have fought so magnificently for their country deserve well of it, and especially men who have suffered the horrible affliction of blindness deserve all the special training they can be given. St. Dunstan's gives them a training which makes them into useful citizens, and lightens the burden of life to them in a manner which a few years ago would have been thought impossible. Men who leave St. Dunstan's go forth into the world fully equipped to be self-supporting, with a new outlook and a new purpose in life.

It is not necessary to enlarge upon the necessity that this training should be made available to blind war heroes. What is perhaps necessary to emphasize is that Prince Rupert should be generous in contributing to the support of the institution. This city has been thoroughly canvassed for support for various patriotic purposes within the past few years, but the appeal for the Institute is a special appeal not likely to be made again. The National Institute for the Blind is doing this wonderful work for soldiers from every part of the Empire.

### Blind Newspaperman.

The Institute, at the head of which is Sir Arthur Pearson, the famous blind newspaperman and publisher, has carried on the work unaided up to the present time, but now it is felt that with the vastly increased expenditure, the whole Empire should have the opportunity of showing its appreciation of the work of the Institute, and its sympathy for the gallant men who have been so sorely afflicted by the dread scourge of war. Prince Rupert will have this opportunity next week, and surely Prince Rupert people who have been so generous in so many good causes since the war began, will not allow this opportunity to pass by.

Mr. Cowen also represents the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Toronto, which established Pearson Hall and is providing industrial education for the civilian adult blind of Canada, one half the proceeds of the appeal will be devoted to this work.

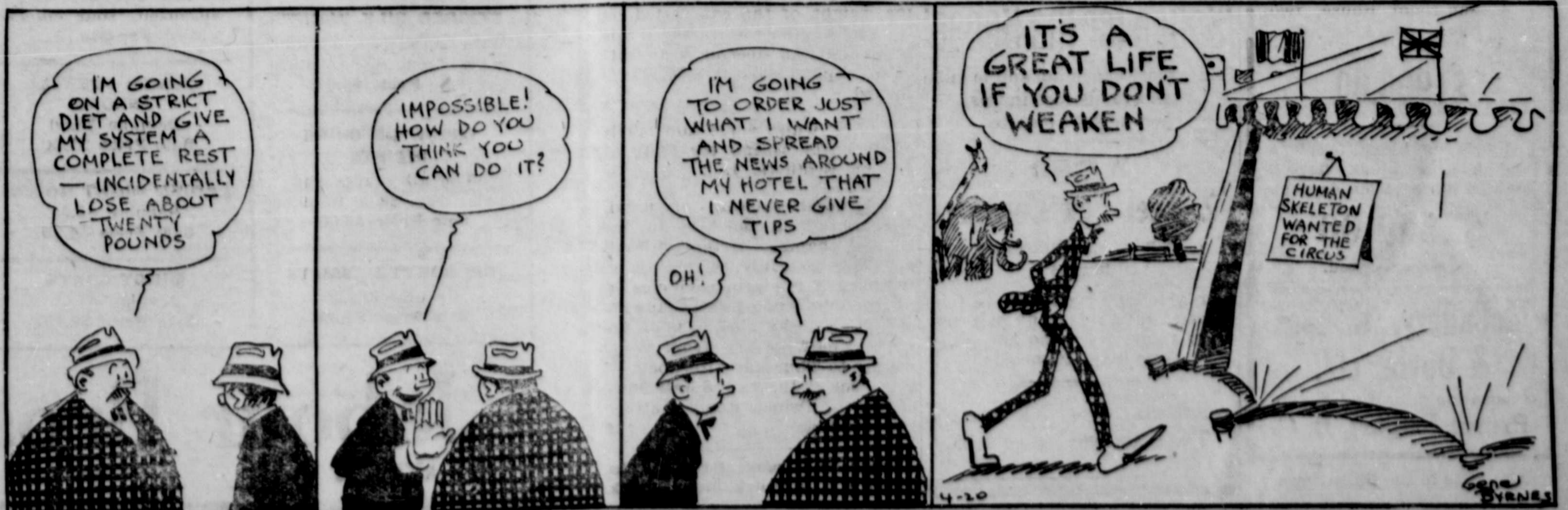

### SHIP STRIKE IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne and Sidney Tied Up and Coal Shortage Already Being Felt.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Melbourne, Australia, July 15.—Virtually all the shipping in the harbor of Melbourne and Sydney is tied up in consequence of a seamen's strike which began several months ago. The resultant shortage of coal will be the most disastrous feature and the cessation of inter-state trade is already being felt in Queensland. The supply of wheat and flour has been cut off.

### "QUARANTINE LAND" SHOULD BE SETTLED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Regina, July 17.—Mr. Bergfield of the Grain Growers Association has recommended that the Government should throw open for soldier settlement two townships near the United States border in what is known as "Quarantine Land." He says that 80 per cent of the area is good land and if settled by squatters would accommodate 232 soldier farmers. A well tilled farm of 160 acres should at least be worth \$4,000.
