Paris, July 17.-Four definite measures intended to reduce # he cost of living were decided upon today at a meeting of the cabinet. The four plans were:

1. The "Clemenceau" or "Vilgrain" food selling booths in Paris will be doubled in number and offers will be made to open them in other centres of population.

2. Cheap restaurants to supply meats at fixed prices will be started in Paris and the provinces under control of the ministry of Supplies.

3. All war stocks of foodstuffs will be sold the public, chiefly through the co-operative stores.

Create New Spirit Before Real Change.

"Soldier-citizens know that to be true from a personal experience, more convincing than has fallen to the lot of any other single class in the community. But, also, they will remember that under Socialism or any other communistic organization of society, representative institutions must continue, and may become even more general than they are at present.

"The question therefore arises, what chance is there that these institutions, which work badly now, will work better-the people remaining as they are-in a Socialistic state? The answer thirty days after the first appearance of is, None!

"The only chance of improvement, under any circumstances, lies in the creation of a new spirit in the community. A spirit that is less selfish, and more understanding. That produces a greater sense of honor, and of responsibility, alike in the separate individuals of the people, and their representative men.

"You cannot change the psychology of a people by a mere stroke of the pen. It takes time. It requires a long and continuous IN THE MATTER OF THE ESTATE OF process of education, and of moral and spiritual culture to effect the necessary changes. When these are made representative institutions will work to the satisfaction of all. Then Socialism in its fullest expression may have the right to appear.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on preemptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
