Explorers Leaving This Week For The South Pacific Regions Saking Sea Snakes and Fishes

BOSTON, October 11.—Rare specimens of land and sea life will be sought by an expedition to the Pacific south seas which is preparing to leave here within a few days. The party is headed by Cornelius Crane of Chicago and will travel in Mr. Crane's own yacht Illyria through the Panama Canal to the East Indies where from New guinea to Java the principal work of the expedition will be done.

Airman, Who Had Accident Near Butedale During Summer, Wrecks Plane at Vancou-

Pilot Edward Luke, who crashed with a fisheries patrol plane near Butedale, down the coast from here, during the past summer, his mechanic dying from injuries sustained at the time, wrecked another plane at Lulu Island, Vancouver, last Saturday afternoon and is again in hospital as a result. He crashed this time more than 200 feet into the irrigation ditch of a farm with a two-seater biplane, belonging to the B.C. Airways, and almost completely wrecked the machine, suffering scratches and bruises himself. The plane had just taken off from the city airport near the Lansdowne track and was banking to turn after rising into the wind when the pilot evidently lost control of the craft which went into a spin and crashed.
