On his sick-bed in Buckingham Palace King George signed an order appointing six counsellors to carry on the work of the British Crown during his illness. The six selected to sign documents on his behalf, to summon his privy Council and to fulfil most of the other duties of the head of the British Empire, are: Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor and the Prime Minister. 
