Growth in Most Sections

WINNIPEG, July 8 .- Reports + of sunlight. A puzzling wind + covering the western Canadian & developed, however, keeping . average crop prospects are to be maintained, according to the tenth weekly crop report of the Canadian National Railways. Scattered rains varying in intensity have occurred chiefly in northern Alberta and Saskatchewan, and heavy showers on June 6 have further improved conditions in northeastern Alberta and northern Saskatchewan. All subdivisions in central and southern Saskatchewan except Corning and Carlisle and all subdivisions in Manitoba except Roseburn nequire rain immediately. Many points in central and southern sections both in Manitoba and Saskatchewan were not endeavoring to estimate the extent of the drought. The figures in this respect ranging from 20 per cent to 40 per cent loss. Frequent reports of plowing down crops on fall plowing or stubble have also come from these areas High winds centering on July 2 evaporated moisture.

Northern Saskatchewan con tinues to report a favorable out look. Porter, Tisdale, Brooksby St. Brieux, Duck Lake and other divisions in that area report plentiful moisture supply with crops short. Scattered hail damage has been noticed.




