At the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada, which was held recently in Ottawa, with John Dybhavn, Prince Rupert director of the board, and D. B. Finn, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, both in attendance, it was decided to proceed immediately with the construction

of a new two-storey with basement addition to the present station at Prince Rupert. The new building will be located on the hill overlooking the existing station and will be designed particularly for the purpose of carrying on refrigeration experiments. Plans and specifications, which were almost completed last year, are to be drawn up at once by the engineering department of the Biological Board with certain additions and improvements. Calling for tenders for constructon will then follow and the expectation is to have the structure completed and ready for operation before the end of the year.
