## Again Subject of Dinner Addresses

Three of Delegates Who Went To Peace River Tell of Lessons Learned

The Peace River was the subject of discussion at the monthly dinner of the Prince Rupert Retail Merchants' Association in the Boston Cafe, three of the delegates who made the tour of the district recently on behalf of the Board of Trade being present, and telling of what they saw and of what the Peace River might mean to Prince

Rupert. Dan Jabour presided.

H. F. Pullen was the first speaker.

He told of the wonderful production of the country they had vis-ited and of its evident prosperity. Then he enlarged on the benefits that would be derived from having direct communication with the district and urged that all Prince Rupert business men be thoroughly acquainted with the situation and use their influence, political and otherwise, to secure the building of the outlet from east to west instead of from north to south.
