BIG MUNITIONS DUMP EXPLODES NEAR TO PARIS

Many Persons Killed and Injured
Yesterday Afternoon When
Concussion Brings
Down Buildings.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, July 18.—A large number of persons were killed or injured this afternoon when a large munitions dump was blown up at Le Bourget, some seven miles northeast of Paris. Several buildings were destroyed by the concussion, which was felt severely throughout Paris, and minor damage was done to very many more.

A shed on the aviation field was levelled and took fire, causing severe injuries to a large number of soldiers and civilian employees and not a building escaped within a large radius of the dump.

RUMORS ABOUT NEW MINISTERS

Mr Henry S. Drayton, Chairman
of Railway Board Mentioned
As in Line for Job.

Ottawa, July 18.—When it was learned tonight that Sir Robert Borden has as one of his companions on a trip to St. Lawrence Sir Henry S. Drayton, Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, the rumor that the latter may possibly become a member of the reconstructed cabinet suddenly assumed full stature.

Opinion varies much as to which portfolio he might be asked by the Premier to take; some thinking it would be Railways and Canals, and others disarding the favorite theory that Arthur Meighen will be the next Finance Minister to succeed Sir Thomas White in that difficult position. It is believed that when Sir Robert does make his announcement of the reconstruction of the cabinet, that the changes will not prove to be so drastic as might be supposed.

MENNONITES PROSECUTED

Case Under School Attendance
Act Before Courts in
Manitoba.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Winnipeg, July 17.—Evidence was taken yesterday morning and afternoon before Magistrate C. C. Milne of Morden, Man., in the law courts in the case of John Hildebrand, Mennonite, charged under the School Attendance Act, passed at the legislative session of 1916 with unlawfully neglecting to cause his daughter, Maggie Hildebrand, to attend school or make satisfactory provision for her education.

The defence was practically completed at the afternoon session when the court was adjourned until 10 a.m. today.

The charge is a blanket one preferred against several other Mennonites in Houston School District near Morden and leading up to the present action. It covers a long period of time.

The Manitoba government is represented by H. W. Symington, K.C., and Archie Campbell. The defence is being conducted by F. A. E. Hoskins and J. T. Haig.

While the case is in its preliminary stage it is understood that it will be made a test case and will be carried by the Mennonites to the highest jurisdiction in the Empire.

Found Guilty.
Winnipeg, July 18.—Judgment has been given in the case of eleven Mennonites charged with unlawfully neglecting to send their children to school. All were found guilty and fined \$5 and costs. The charges were laid by the Province of Manitoba and constitutes a test case of whether Mennonites are immune from Acts of Provincial Government, so far as education is concerned. An appeal will be made, the Mennonites being determined to take their appeal to the Privy Council if necessary.

CANADIAN CLUB HEARS OF BLIND

J. Evelyn Cowen Tells of Work
at St. Dunstan's Hostel
Where Men are
Trained.

At the Canadian Club luncheon this afternoon, Judge Young presiding, J. Evelyn Cowen of the National Institute for the Blind gave some interesting information in regard to the wonderful work done in teaching the blind soldiers and others at St. Dunstan's Hostel. He explained how with the loss of the sense of sight the other senses were developed, and especially the sense of touch. The work is directly under Sir Arthur Pearson, the publisher, who is himself a blind man. In 1915 there were but 16 men in the institution, but before the end of last year there were over 1,500. Men who but for this institution would have drifted through life under a burden of regrets and bitterness have learned a new way of life and found happiness in it. Mr. Cowen will give an address at the Westholme Theatre on Sunday on the same subject.

UNITED STATES PROHIBITS ANY WHEAT IMPORTS

Sets Price to be Paid Growers in
Some Districts at \$2.30
— A Bushel.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, July 17.—President Wilson today signed an executive order increasing the guarantee of the 1919 wheat crop to \$2.30 a bushel at Galveston and New Orleans. At the same time a presidential proclamation was issued declaring that in order "to protect the United States against undue enhancement of its liability" under the law increasing wheat prices, that on and after July 31 no wheat will be allowed to be imported into or exported from the United States within the limits prescribed by the Wheat Administration.

EXTENSIVE FOREST FIRES IN MONTANA

Flames Now Beyond Control and
Towns on all Sides are Being
Threatened.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Missoula, Montana, July 18.—Two western Montana towns, Albert and St. Regis are threatened with destruction by forest fires, which have flamed beyond control. The fires are spreading rapidly and already have covered a wide area, menacing many towns on all sides.

THE GOATS TO BE SEPARATED

Outside Fold of Trades and Labor
Congress, Winnipeg's Local
Unions Favoring O. B. U.
Must Leave Council.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, July 18.—Dividing the sheep from the goats in the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council now becomes the task of R. A. Rigg, the special representative of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. Instructions have been sent him to proceed at once with the reorganization of the Council.

By a majority vote the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council recently decided for affiliation with the One Big Union. The effect of this action would be practically to make the minority present on that occasion the Trades and Labor Council now. The majority who carried the vote will be compelled to leave the Council and organize another body in connection with the One Big Union if they so desire. The charter of any local Union automatically is cancelled upon their voting for affiliation with the One Big Union and thus the credentials of their delegates to the Trades and Labor Council are made worthless.

WHISKEY CASE IS ADJOURNED

Evidence of Raid by the Police on
Savoy Bar and of Defence
is Given.

In the resumed police court case against Walter Scrimgeour before Magistrate McMordie this morning Police Constable Adams and Leek gave evidence of having raided the Savoy bar armed with a search warrant and found a whiskey jug and a bottle with liquor in it. The liquor was seized and produced in court this morning.

M. Strasslund, a logger, gave evidence for the defence that he had taken a bottle of whiskey to the Savoy bar on the night of the search and had left it there in the care of Walter Scrimgeour whilst he went for a walk about the town. On his return the place was closed, as he had forgotten that the bar was shut at midnight and was entirely unaware of the raid until the following morning when Scrimgeour, then out on bail, asked him to appear in court.

Mr. Robinson, partner in the business, testified that in the early part of the evening the jug which was brought to court as having held liquor was in its customary place. He only relieved Scrimgeour whilst the latter went to get a light lunch.

The accused, in giving his evidence, corroborated the details as stated by Strasslund, saying that he had got the bottle to have a couple of drinks and while cleaning up had set it on the back of the shelf near some other bottles. He accounted for the liquor in the jug by the statement of Strasslund that he had told him to put away a couple of shots for himself.

W. O. Fulton appeared for the accused while W. E. Williams was for the prosecution. The latter pointed out that the whole story did not hang well together and that there were several flaws in the case against human nature as given in the evidence.

The case has been adjourned until Monday at ten o'clock.

NINE CARS OF HALIBUT HERE

Twenty-four Boats Tied up at
Wharf This Morning With
Good Catches.

A fleet of twenty-four halibut boats have arrived in port with something like nine car loads of fish, all of which was sold this morning on the exchange bringing an average of something like 10c. for American and 11c. for Canadian fish. There was a good deal of excitement at the fish auction. All the buyers and many fishermen were present and competition was keen. Most of the boats were small and the fish of good quality.

As soon as the sales had been made the fish packers got busy and loading into the railway cars went on apace.

The trawler G. E. Foster arrived yesterday with 90,000 lbs. of flat fish which was at once taken care of at the cold storage plant.

The arrivals were Dolphin, 15,000; Viking, 15,000; North Star, 14,000; Eidsvold, 18,000; Brothers, 32,000; Norma, 6,000; B. Point, 7,000; Maud, 5,000; Viola, 7,000; Murneac, 10,000; Alliance, 14,000; Tide, 2,500; Agnes B., 11,000; Ingrid H., 12,000; Sadie, 1,000; Baker, 14,000; Minnie V., 10,000; Marguerite, 6,000; Wanderer, 15,000; Clara N., 8,000; D. C. F. No. 4, 16,000.

The only salmon boat in port before noon was the Ethelyn with 3,500 lbs.

COMMITTEE TO ARRANGE FOR EARLY CLOSING

Retail Merchants Pass Important
Resolutions at Meeting in
Council Chamber.

Two important motions were passed by the Retail Merchants at their meeting in the council chamber last evening. One was a resolution asking the Retail Clerks' Association to appoint a committee of three to meet a similar committee from the merchants with a view to discussing the question of shorter hours. Later a committee consisting of Messrs. O'Reilly, Munro and Tabrum was appointed to represent the merchants.

The second resolution was one calling on the Police Commission to enforce the law in regard to the closing of fruit stores. It seems that there is a city bylaw under which fruit stores are supposed to close at 6:30. This bylaw has never been enforced. Recently the Rupert Table Supply has put in a fruit stand which keeps open evenings and holidays and other grocers are proposing to follow suit. They stated at the meeting that in order to meet competition they must either put in fruit stands or have the law enforced, making all close.

If the Police Commissioners decide to enforce the bylaw it will mean that the ice cream stands and other places will not be allowed to sell fruit after hours.

SIR DONALD MANN TO LIVE IN PROVINCE

Provision for Fishing Industry.

The fishing industry is the best asset Prince Rupert has, not only the best but the most easily developed. Very few citizens of Prince Rupert realize that in 1914 there were only about two score fishing boats operating from this port, whereas at present there are over 600 registered here. This fact alone is sufficient to show that Prince Rupert is fast becoming the greatest fishing port on the North Pacific.

Prince Rupert people are vitally interested in the development of the fishing industry here and all their efforts should tend towards the accomplishment of such an important aim. More boats are bound to make Prince Rupert their port of attack and facilities should be provided for them, not after they come but in order to get them here.

The independent fishermen and fish buyers especially need some kind of facilities which will guarantee them the best price for their fish, or allow them to ship it themselves on the eastern market if they so wish. The present cold storage even enlarged will be too small in a very short time to cater to all the business that will come this way.

We also have to consider the situation which has arisen in the past through lack of bait and ice in this port when the G. T. P. Railway had to sell their own ice to the fishermen, and the most serious situation of the present year when, owing to the strike so many fishermen had to dispose of their fish at Butedale, Ketchikan, Vancouver and Seattle, getting a very small price for it and a very poor return for their labor.

Shortage of cars is always likely to occur and therefore the fishermen ought to be assured that he can always land his fish and store it here whatever happens.

When the fishermen feel that they can locate here safely as far as selling fish is concerned, they will come in increasing numbers both to the benefit of the fishermen themselves and of the merchants and all the community, because this is the only natural place for them.

Good Market For the Product.

There is no industry with a better market outlook than the fishing industry at present and for years to come. Europe will provide a good market and meat is going to be high in price for many years. In the Allied countries in Europe, out of ninety-eight million head of cattle eighteen millions have been destroyed during the war, or one-fifth of the entire stock. In Roumania there are no horses nor cattle left, and out of sixty-nine millions of pigs thirty millions have been sacrificed.

Fish is the natural diet to take the place of meat in Europe, where the population cannot afford to buy meat at high prices. Any kind of fish will find an outlet in Europe, especially in the southern countries like Italy and the Balkans. Italy took all the American pack of salmon for 1918.

It is an undeniable fact that any undertaking which is the means of increasing the food production is bound to be a financial success. The market is always eager for good fish of any kind and all the fish that can be caught can be sent into eastern Canada and the United States and fetch good prices.

Japan is a good market for fish and the United States has already started a good trade there. South America at present also is a good field. So is Mexico, where the Japanese are selling smoked and dried fish, Barbadoes, Jamaica and all the West Indies are equally good markets, and since the opening of the Panama Canal, products from this part of British Columbia ought to be landed quickly and cheaply at any port of the Atlantic.

Present Cold Storage Is Good Institution.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage plant has done an immense lot for Prince Rupert and its usefulness has only commenced. With its increasing capacity it is bound to do more business and be a profitable undertaking. That is as it should be. If there were an independent cold storage here, however, many more fishermen would come to the port as any suggestion of monopoly would be taken away. The present institution would not do less business but the port would do more.

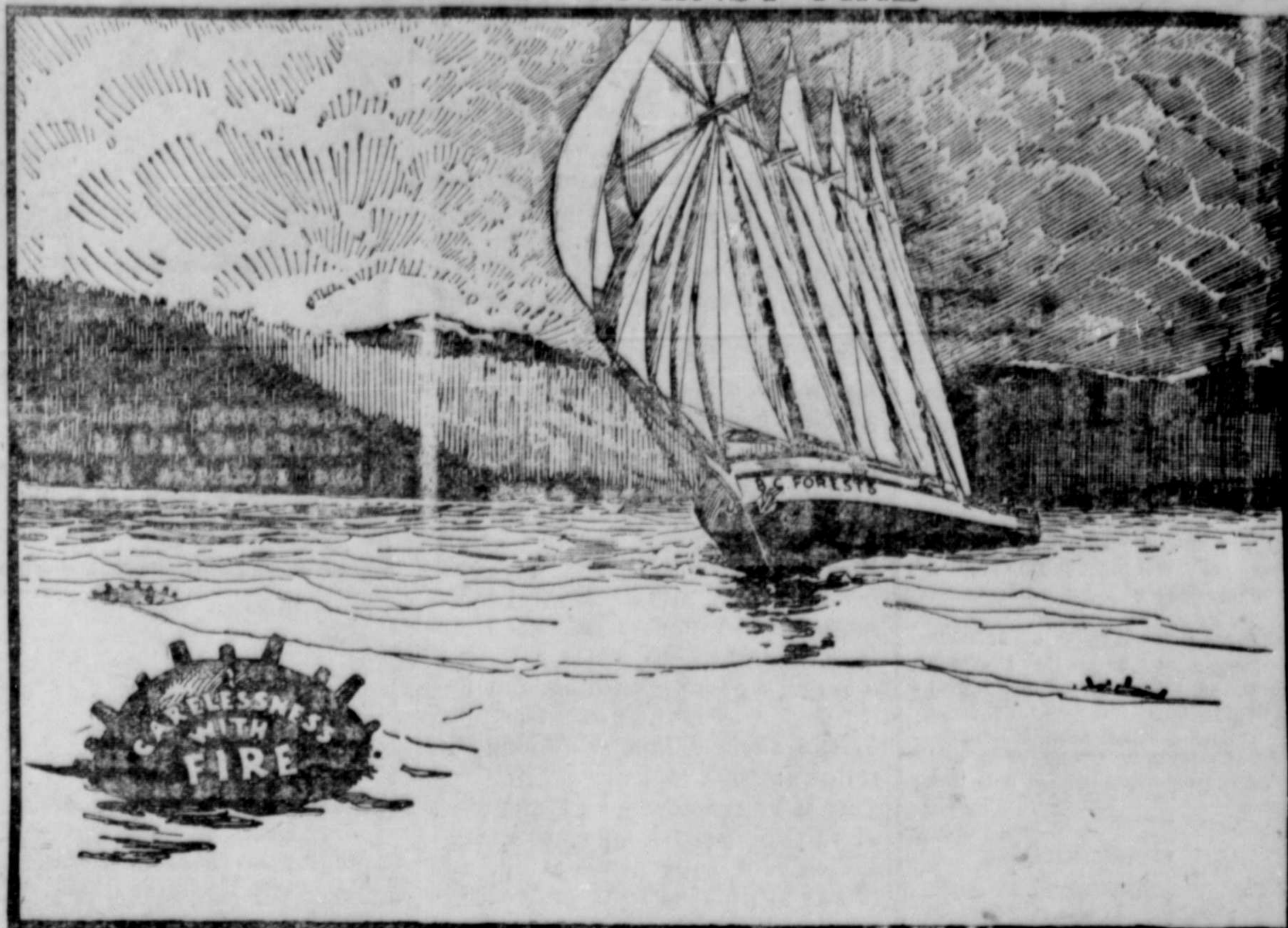

ONE TENDER ON FEDERAL BLOCK

Owners Explain Position in Reply to Resolution Passed at Meeting.

A resolution was passed recently by the veterans protesting against the letting of a contract by the owners of the Federal Block to Fred Schulze. The following letter has been sent them in reply:

"Since tenders were asked for through the press for the shingling and painting of the above building and the work awarded it has come to our notice that there is dissatisfaction among certain members of your association and we desire to make clear the facts of the case, which are briefly as follows:

(a) The officers and members of the company hold in the highest esteem your association, and it was stipulated in the advertisement calling for tenders that the lowest or any tender was not necessarily accepted.

"(b) That there was but one tender for the painting of the building, therefore the only alternative was to allow the building to go unpainted or award the contract accordingly.

"(c) That the successful tenderer is a British Subject.

"(d) That the said tenderer, on being informed that his tender was accepted, at once ordered the paint for the work.

A New Offer.

"In deference to the wishes of your association, we have arranged with Fred Schulze, who was the successful tenderer, to suspend the awarding of the contract provided the paint is taken off his hands at cost, in view of which we are now in a position and are pleased to make you the following offer, notwithstanding the fact that no member of your association tendered on any portion of the work:

"That you, as an association, or any member of your association, may until 5 o'clock p. m. Monday, July 21, next, elect to contract for this work upon the same terms and under the same conditions as those under which the contract was awarded, plus ten per cent (10%), you to take over the paint already purchased for the work at its cost to the successful tenderer. All work, of course, to be done in workmanlike manner, by competent workmen and to the entire satisfaction of the company.

Act at Once.

"On account of the advanced season and the necessity for having the work performed during favorable weather we must respectfully ask that you elect to accept this offer before the time specified, otherwise the company will feel at perfect liberty to award the work as it seems best in the interests of the shareholders.

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year for the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchases, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for acquisition owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or paid, time free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

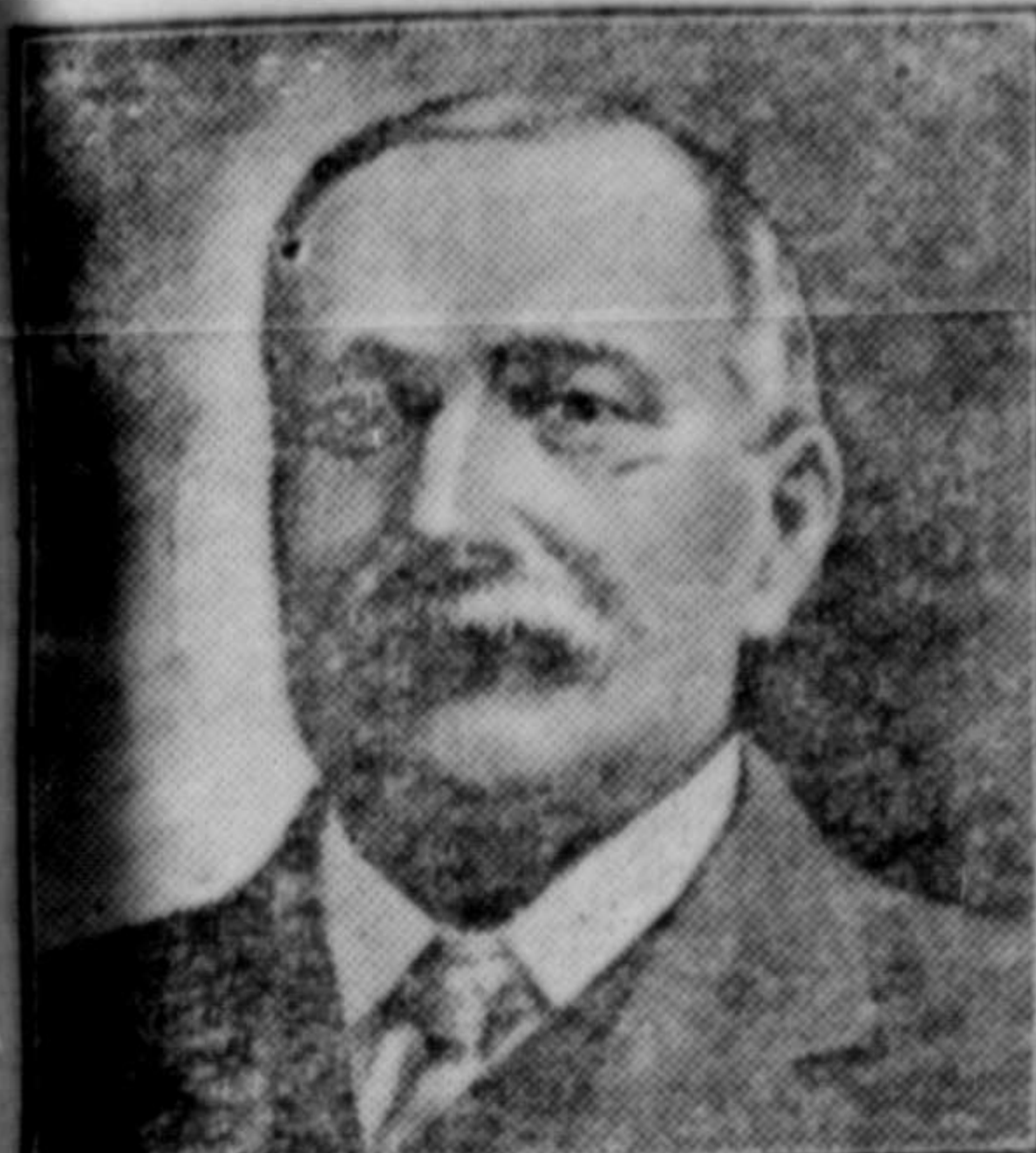

News of the Mines

Much interest is being taken in the statement made by Sir Donald Mann to the effect that he is intending to live in this province and look after his mining interests here. Before he left Stewart he told the editor of the Casiar News that he would return soon and spend the rest of the summer at Stewart.

The miners of the Portland Canal district have decided to send a mineral exhibit to the Prince Rupert Fall Fair, the same to be used later as a permanent exhibit by the Free Miners' League of this city.

The bonding of property at Alice Arm and Stewart continues. Every boat brings mining men from the south to look over properties in which they are interested or to examine claims with a view to purchase.

The Alaska Bureau of Mines is testing out a method of extracting the gold from black sand in order to save the large loss which has occurred in the past. On a recent test near Fairbanks 99 per cent of the gold was taken out.

Reports from the Kaslo district indicate that there is a great revival of mining in the Kootenay Lake vicinity.

Reports of the mining activity at Usk have caused considerable interest here, and a number of local men are proposing to go out there to investigate.

Oscar Lachmund has been appointed general manager of the United Copper Mining Co. at Chewelah. He succeeds Conrad Wolfe who still retains the presidency of the company. He was formerly in charge of the Greenwood smelter.

E. E. Campbell, mine superintendent at Anxox, has been examining the Azurite property at Stewart.

The Joker claim in the Stewart district is said to be showing high grade native and ruby silver ore. The lead is from twelve to eighteen feet wide.
