Fresh Vegetables also Plentiful; **Tendency of Meats to Sell** at Lower Prices

On the local market this week there is a marked influx of fresh fruits and vegetables. Specially good is it to see the fine up-river strawberries which always delight those who try them. They are not arriving in very large quantities so far but by the beginning of the week larger shipments are expected. The greens arriving from the south are in good condition, but the fruit is hardly cheap enough yet for preserving.

Apples are off the market for the present but the new ones are expected in soon. The new potatoes although a little high in price are rapidly being bought up by the consumers. There are no great changes in price along the more staple line of goods. On the whole the meat prices are falling which may encourage a return to beef, as fish still remains at the same level.
