WINNIPEG, March 26.—Vancouver and Prince Rupert are unable to handle all the grain hauled to those ports by railways during the rush season, stated A. Rosevear, general freight agent of the Canadian National Railways, in defending the permit system for shipments of grain over the western route before the royal commission today.

Is the last day for filing Returns of Income earned during the Calendar Year 1928

Returns are required to be filed with the provincial assessor, Prince Rupert, from whom the necessary forms and full information may be obtained.

Those required to make returns are as follows:

1. Every corporation or joint stock company (use Form No. 7). 2. Every partnership, and every person engaged in business of any kind,

or practicing any profession (use Form No. 7B). 3. Every other person in receipt of income from salary, wages, commission, fees, bonus, perquisites, interest, dividends, rent, or other income from any source whatsoever, in excess of

(a) In the case of a married person, \$1800.

(b) In the case of a single person, \$1200.

(Use Form No. 7A)

Individuals whose total income from all sources is less than the amount specified need not file a return unless requested by the assessor to do so.

In the case of provincial returns the amount of the tax is not payable until 60 days after the date upon which the assessor mails a notice of assessment.

The public are earnestly requested to obtain the necessary forms and file returns promptly in order to avoid penalties. Assistance in the making up of returns will be gladly rendered where necessary by the staff of the assessor's





The 5000 feet of tunnel work which it was recently announced would be undertaken this season by the Lorraine-Copper Silver Mines Ltd. on the Victoria group in the Babines is designed to open up at a depth of about 500 feet the rich ore shoots which have been exposed by surface cuts, shafts and tuunels nearer the surface. Some very high assays have been obtained from strong bodies of ore on the Victoria group which is the nucleus of the holdings of the Lorraine company. It is expected that high grade
