## 10 IN. SNOW EASTERN U.S.

### HYDRO-ELECTRIC ENGINEERS ARE HERE TO MAKE FIRST PRELIMINARY SURVEY

#### East Coast Strewn with Wreckage Result of Storm Accompanied by Snow

NEW YORK, April 17.—The Atlantic coast from Maine to Virginia is strewn with wreckage today, piled up under the battering of a northeast storm, while wind and waves sunk small craft, demoralized shipping and damaged shore structures. The storm swept inland, carrying rain and snow as far as western New York and Pennsylvania. Ten inches of snow fell in places, disrupting traffic.

In New York the harbor tug and two barges were sunk. The crew of 18 was rescued from the tug. One of the barges had a cargo of a quarter of million dollars of whale oil pumped out of the whaler Sir James Clark Ross, recently arrived from the Antarctic.

Frank Marcey, factory worker at Stamford, Conn., was killed when he was struck by a section of a fence.

#### Montreal Men Will Decide Where First Installation Will be Made Several Powers to Choose From

To make the necessary examinations which will lead to the selection of a water power site for the hydro-electric development which will be taking over the local franchise, G. H. Kohl of Montreal, one of the consulting engineers for the company, arrived in the city this morning from the south aboard the steamer Prince George. He was accompanied by G. R. Henderson of Montreal, who will be in charge of field parties during the preliminary reconnaissance, as well as during construction work.

Mr. Kohl, in an interview with The Daily News soon after his arrival this morning, stated that the first thing to do will be to carry out a general reconnaissance to determine where the work shall commence. He is making arrangements to get the reconnaissance started as soon as possible. Thulme river, on the north arm of Warke Canal; Union Bay, a tributary of the Warke Canal to the north near its mouth; Khtada, a tributary of the Skeena River; and Big Falls River, draining into the Ecstall River, will be examined and one of them will probably be selected. It will be several weeks before anything definite can be decided upon.

Surveys are also to be made by Mr. Kohl or Mr. Henderson of the Stewart power development.

#### SIR CLIFFORD SIFTON DIES

Capitalist, Politician and Newspaper Owner Passes Away From Heart Trouble

NEW YORK, April 17.—Sir Clifford Sifton, long prominent in Canadian political and business affairs, dropped dead this morning in Roosevelt Hospital. He had come from his winter home in Florida to consult a heart specialist, Dr. Evan Evans. Death was due to heart disease, from which Sir Clifford suffered for the past two years.

Sir Clifford was born in Middlesex County, Ont., in 1862. He was a man of great wealth with wide, varied interests. During his political career in Manitoba, he acquired the ownership of the Manitoba Free Press and more recently with his sons he purchased a group of Saskatchewan daily newspapers, the Regina Leader and Post and the Saskatoon Star and Phoenix.

Lady Sifton died four years ago.

#### UNIFORMITY IN ELECTIONS IS DESIRABLE

OTTAWA, April 17.—By establishing uniformity in Municipal, Provincial and Federal polling divisions of a permanent nature with a revision of polls once in fifteen years the cost of elections would be reduced at least one third, thus affecting a saving of many millions to the nation, declared John Hunt, clerk of the executive council of Alberta, and chief electoral officer of that province when addressing a special committee in the House of Commons in reviewing the Dominion Elections Act.

Mr. Neill, independent of Comox-Alberni, had several suggestions which would allow loggers and fishermen of B. C. a better opportunity to cast their ballots. He advocated a half holiday on election day.

#### PLANE HERE TODAY FROM SEATTLE, WASH.

Amphibian Plans Several Stops on Way to Juneau

The Gorst Air Transport's biplane reached Prince Rupert at 2:40 this afternoon, tying up at the Union Oil Co.'s station for fuel after circling over the harbor. It is possible that the ship will proceed to Ketchikan immediately after she has been refuelled.

SEATTLE, April 17.—On a survey of a route for operation of an air passenger service between Seattle and southeastern Alaska, a Gorst air transport eight-passenger amphibian plane took off from Lake Union early today. She is flown by Clayton L. Scott with Verne C. Grosz, head of the transport company, as the company pilot. Gordon Graham, mechanic, and A. C. Iverson, passenger, are also in the plane. Stops are scheduled for Alert Bay, Prince Rupert, Ketchikan, Petersburg and Juneau. The plane will fly back to Seattle within the next 10 days.

#### Finances of Stewart Railway is Shown in Report Filed Today

VICTORIA, April 17.—Nothing to confirm the current supposition that the Canadian Pacific Railway is behind the Canadian Northeastern promotion, chartered at the late session of the legislature to build from Stewart eastward to Fort Graham, is disclosed in the first annual report of the company filed in accordance with legal requirements with the registrar of companies today. This report is to April 15 instant. By it, it appears that the normal share capital is ten millions in one hundred dollar shares, of which 10,000 have been issued as fully paid up, apparently in connection with the original Portland Canal short line incorporated in 1909, as the report notes that the new company has no information of record showing what proportion of these shares was issued for cash and what for other considerations.

It also is noted that the new company has not yet appointed an auditor and the balance sheet and financial statement are signed by W. H. Stevens, as secretary of the Canadian Northeastern Company. These show a mortgage indebtedness of \$472,500.

A subsequent order had been to merely patch the vessel up temporarily so she could be taken to Seattle. The job of repairing the Doric will run into \$9,000 or \$10,000, it is estimated.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The order which was recently issued by Speaker Lemieux for policing the upper floors of the house of commons and prohibiting government messengers from carrying liquor for members from the liquor stores, it is understood, was approved at a session of the house held in camera yesterday.

#### CARD OF THANKS

OTTAWA, April 17.—The first attempt of the government at the present session to consider the departmental estimates met with a check in the house of commons yesterday. The motion of Hon. W. R. Robb, minister of finance, for the house to go into committee on supply met with an amendment by High Guthrie, Conservative, calling for increased remuneration for the rural mail carriers. Mr. Guthrie informed the house that as an amendment in supply the motion implied want of confidence in the government. The house divided on the amendment and it was defeated by 36 votes, 106 against and 70 for.

#### Air Mail Route Across Canada is Planned by Postmaster General

OTTAWA, April 17.—Postmaster-General Veniot outlined an ambitious program for a trans-Canada air mail route last night in the house of commons when considering the outside postal service. The vote of the post office department service includes all airmail routes of the Dominion, the total vote including salaries and airway costs being a little less than \$34,000,000.

Progress was reported, he said, on the airmail service to the Pacific coast, but it is not contemplated for the present year, because surveys of the air mail routes have not yet been completed. As soon as these have been completed the feasibility of the far western link in the trans-Canada service will be reported upon, if it can be determined when and how a complete service could be given.

#### TEN KILLED IN TRAIN ACCIDENT BELGIUM TODAY

HAL, Belgium, April 17.—Ten were killed and a score seriously injured when the Paris-Amsterdam express collided with a freight train near here this morning.

#### C. P. R. ISSUES MORE STOCK TO SHAREHOLDERS

Employees Get Chance to Purchase On Instalment Plan

MONTREAL, April 17.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is offering to shareholders of its ordinary capital stock, on record May 2, 1929, the right to subscribe to \$30,000,000 additional ordinary capital stock, comprising 300,000 shares, at par value of \$100 each in proportion of one share of the new for each 10 shares held at the time of record at the price of \$170, payable in four instalments. The right to subscribe expires on June 17.

The company will also offer its officers and employees the right to subscribe to an additional \$5,000,000, ordinary capital stock at \$170 per share on the monthly instalment plan in pursuance of the policy inaugurated in 1927.



### BILL MITCHELL WINS BILLIARDS

Takes City Junior Individual Title in Close Finish With Angus Macdonald

William Mitchell won the city individual junior billiard championship last night in an exciting finish with Angus Macdonald, the score being 500 to 496. Mitchell started on the short end of a 251 to 240 score following the first block the evening previous but played an uphill game which was ding dong right to the end. It was one of the most interesting billiard exhibitions seen here in a long time. In addition to winning the title, Mitchell had the distinction of recording the highest break for the series. This was a run of 42 in the first round.

Tonight the final of the senior championship series will be commenced between Charles Balagno and Fred Pyle. There will be a 500 point block tonight and similar final session tomorrow evening.

### Sport Chat

Old Jack Quinn, one of the last of the fast disappearing race of spit-ball pitchers, is beginning his fifth year with the Philadelphia Athletics and his twentieth in the majors. Somewhere in his forties Quinn is in good shape. He attributes his success to hard work. He was a breaker boy in the coal mines near Pottsville, Pa., before he took up baseball, and a strong physique has carried him through many years on the ball field.

Eager for the season to begin Quinn declares he will continue to pitch "until they take my uniform away." "There's only a few of us still in the game," he said. "Red Faber of Chicago and myself, are the only two spit-ballers left in the American League. I believe Grimes of New York and Mitchell of the Cardinals are the only ones in the National League." "When the baseball powers ruled out the spit-ball seven years ago I think they had in mind to legislate only against trick pitching. I have always contended that few batters were ever hurt by spit-ball pitching. It was the curve ball hurlers with their freak pitches who did the damage. I see nothing mysterious about the spitter. Just take a baseball, moisten it a little on the side near the thumb and let the ball slip inward or away from you as you throw, depending on where you want it to go. That's all there is to it."

### PROMINENT FIGURES IN SPORT

JOHN A. HEYDLER, PRESIDENT OF NATIONAL LEAGUE

John Arnold Heydler, president of the National League, is another leading sportsman of the day who started his career as a newspaper writer. He got his start on the Washington Star and figured his way to an official position with the National League through a hobby of keeping baseball records. He became an umpire in the National League in 1898 and was later appointed private secretary to Harry C. Pulliam who was president of the National League from 1903 to 1909. Then followed the offices of secretary and treasurer of the league before Heydler was elected

to the presidency in 1918. He had been acting president on several occasions before that. With fine executive ability, Heydler has combined diplomacy and tact and has averted many factional quarrels and jealousies among club owners. During his presidency, the National League has obtained a stronger position from the administrative standpoint than it ever previously enjoyed. Heydler was born at Lafargeville, N. Y., July 10, 1869. His father was a clergyman and thought of a similar career for his son who, however, became a printer on the Rochester Union.

### Only Three Baseball Games are Played on Opening Day Owing to Bad Weather in the East

NEW YORK, April 17. — The Pirates, Cardinals, Indians and Browns turned back their position in baseball's opening battles yesterday, with the brightest picture unveiled at Chicago, where 70,000 fans stormed the Wrigley citadel for a peek at the most highly regarded Cubs since the days of Frank Chance. About 50,000 gained admittance.

The difference between victory and defeat for the Cubs was Rogers Hornsby's failure in two pinches and the generosity of Grimes toward the champion in other trying moments. Rajah collected three passes and two force-outs. Elwood English's fumble of Adam's grounder in the first inning gave the Pirates two unearned runs and another was honestly batted home at the expense of Charlie Root.

At Cincinnati, Grover Cleveland Alexander began his nineteenth National League campaign by turning back the Reds, 5 to 2. Chick Rafey, who hit a homer with one on in the sixth, drove in four of the five St. Louis runs.

The Indians rallied in late innings to win from the Tigers in 11 innings. The Browns defeated the White Sox, thanks to Sammy Gray's fine work in the box.

Other games were prevented owing to rain in the eastern section.

### ELKS LIKELY IN BASEBALL

Lodge Plans to Sponsor Team This Season and Committee Investigating

That the reconstruction work being done by Grand Organizer Miquelon of the Elks is a success was evidenced by largely attended and most enthusiastic meeting of the members held in their home last night. Sixteen new applicants were admitted to the fold with as many more slated for this Friday's meeting.

It was unanimously decided to hold nomination of officers on Friday and all members were urged to be present.

A committee was appointed to look into the baseball situation and it is almost certain that the Elks will sponsor a team this season.

The escort patrol drill exemplified after the meeting attracted great interest, as this is something new with the local lodge. There was music by Al Smail's orchestra and refreshments were served.

Mr. Miquelon will remain in Prince Rupert for another week to complete his work.

### GERMANY MAKES COUNTER OFFER OF SETTLEMENT

PARIS, April 17.—Germany's counter-plans for paying her world war reparations were presented to the allied experts by Dr. Schacht, chief of the German delegation, today. It is understood to offer about one billion marks less per year than the creditors demanded. Payment would continue 37 years, instead of 58 years as proposed by the allies. Germany offers invigaged annuities beginning at 1,100,000,000 marks and rising to 1,450,000,000 marks.

### ARE SEARCHING FOR FLYERS

Controversy Arises Over Conduct of "Southern Cross Fiasco"

SYDNEY, April 17.—Anxiety is growing as to the fate of Lt. Keith Anderson and Robert Hitchcock last seen over Alice Springs, Central Australia, while looking for the Southern Cross, ten days ago. Three additional airplanes have gone to Alice Springs to aid in the search for the two planes which is being carried out.

In the meantime, as Captain Kingsford Smith and his companions are still on the Glenelg mud-

flat waiting for gasoline, a hot controversy has arisen over the interrupted flight. Some newspapers have criticized the conduct of the flight and the Sydney Guardian has suggested that a Royal Commission be appointed to inquire into what it calls the Southern Cross fiasco.

### PLANE BOUND FOR ALASKA

Left Edmonton Yesterday Planning to Reach Prince George

EDMONTON, April 17.—Captain Parker Cramer and W. S. Gamble, American pilots, who are bound on a flight from Chi-

cago to Alaska, struck westward towards the Rocky mountains following the C. N. R. line for Prince George yesterday afternoon, expected to make their destination before dark.

Up to noon today the plane had not arrived at Prince George and no further information could be secured in regard to it. While it is expected the plane will come to Prince Rupert no one seems to know anything about it definitely.

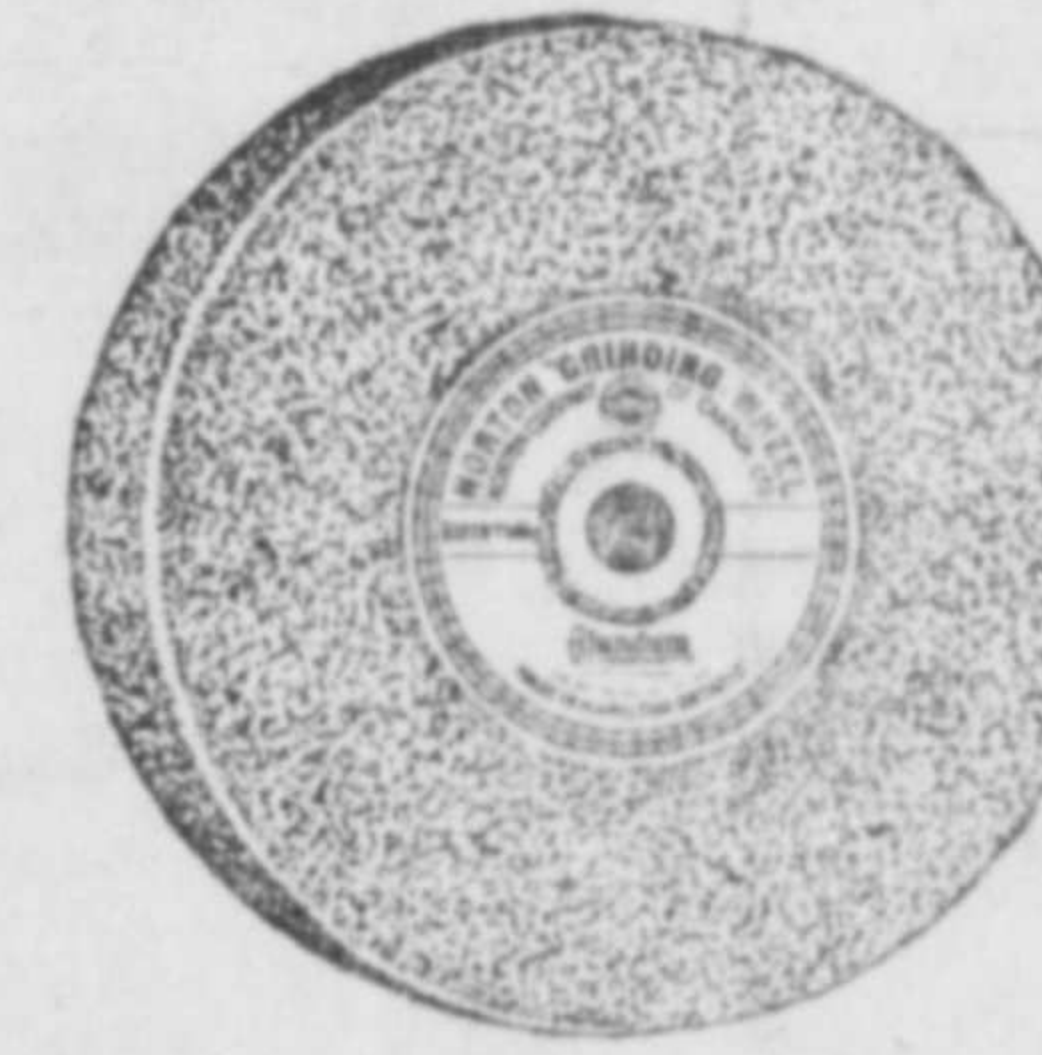

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

It's interesting to note that in the recent fisheries treaty for the protection of salmon of the Fraser river that Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg was empowered to make the treaty by President Hoover with His Majesty the King of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, through the Honorable Charles Vincent Massey, P.C., his envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary for Canada at Washington.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It looks as if there might be considerable delay in the matter of tariff revision or other matters before the special session of the U. S. Congress. Such may not be the case, but it seems as if the matter is likely to be referred to the tariff commission. The message of the president was delightfully vague, resembling somewhat the speech from the throne under the British constitution. Congress can take almost any action they wish and still be within the terms of the president's message. Where the president has it "all over" a British premier is that he is there for four years anyway unless he happens to be assassinated or worked to death and he has the power of veto without having to answer to anyone.

SPLENDID FLIGHT

The flight from Seattle to Juneau, very close to a thousand miles without a stop, was a splendid one. In these northern waters the weather is not always as good for flying as farther to the south, so that the trip was the more notable. While it does not compare with the big hop of Lindburg's, it was a good test of flying ability and mechanical reliability.

We hope to see airplanes come here regularly soon. We shall begin to feel that we are adopted by the rest of the continent if we have a semi-weekly air service to and from the centres of the south and also to and from Alaska.

PUBLIC SERVICE

(Edmonton Journal)

When a "private" institution accepts grants from the city and provincial treasuries, it becomes a "public" concern. Whether it be a hospital, a sporting venture or a co-operative commercial organization, it loses that complete privacy that might have been its had it refrained from seeking financial help from the public.

The role of a newspaper is peculiar. To serve the public faithfully it must record, at times, things that are not pleasant, things that might be described as a "knock," rather than a "boost." If it printed nothing but news that was handed out to it by the person or institution or organization concerned, it would never publish anything to which anyone could object. How blissful that would be for the newspaper! But how unfair to all its readers. When a paper prints something that is likely to arouse resentment in certain quarters, it is quite well aware that it will hear from the persons affected. It would be much easier to say: "Oh, just kill that story; it will only cause a fuss." But the easy way is not always the right way.

SEES ACTIVITY  
NEAR TERRACE

J. A. Michaud Holds Valuable Claims on Thornhill Mountain

J. A. Michaud, well known Lakelse valley rancher and pioneer of the Terrace district, who returned to the interior this morning after having spent several days in the city, his first visit to Prince Rupert in eight years, states that he expects to see a good deal of actual mining activity this year on Thornhill Mountain which lies about seven miles from Terrace near the Lakelse road. With his brother, Ed. Mr. Michaud owns by location the St. Paul group of five claims. This is a promising property which has values in gold, silver, lead, zinc, tungsten and molybdenum. Assays, Mr. Michaud says, have gone as high as \$502 in gold per ton with total value of \$1200 including considerable tungsten. Scouts of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. examined the property last year and are understood to have made a favorable report. Mr. Michaud expects to make a deal this year. The group lies about a mile and a half from the Lakelse road at an elevation of 4,000 feet from the road and could be served with a tram. Surface stripping and open cuts indicate a large ore body.

The St. Paul is not the only promising property on Thornhill Mountain. There are also groups owned by Dan Mason and Vernon Roy of Copper City as well as single claims owned by Charles Giggey and T. J. Kirkpatrick.

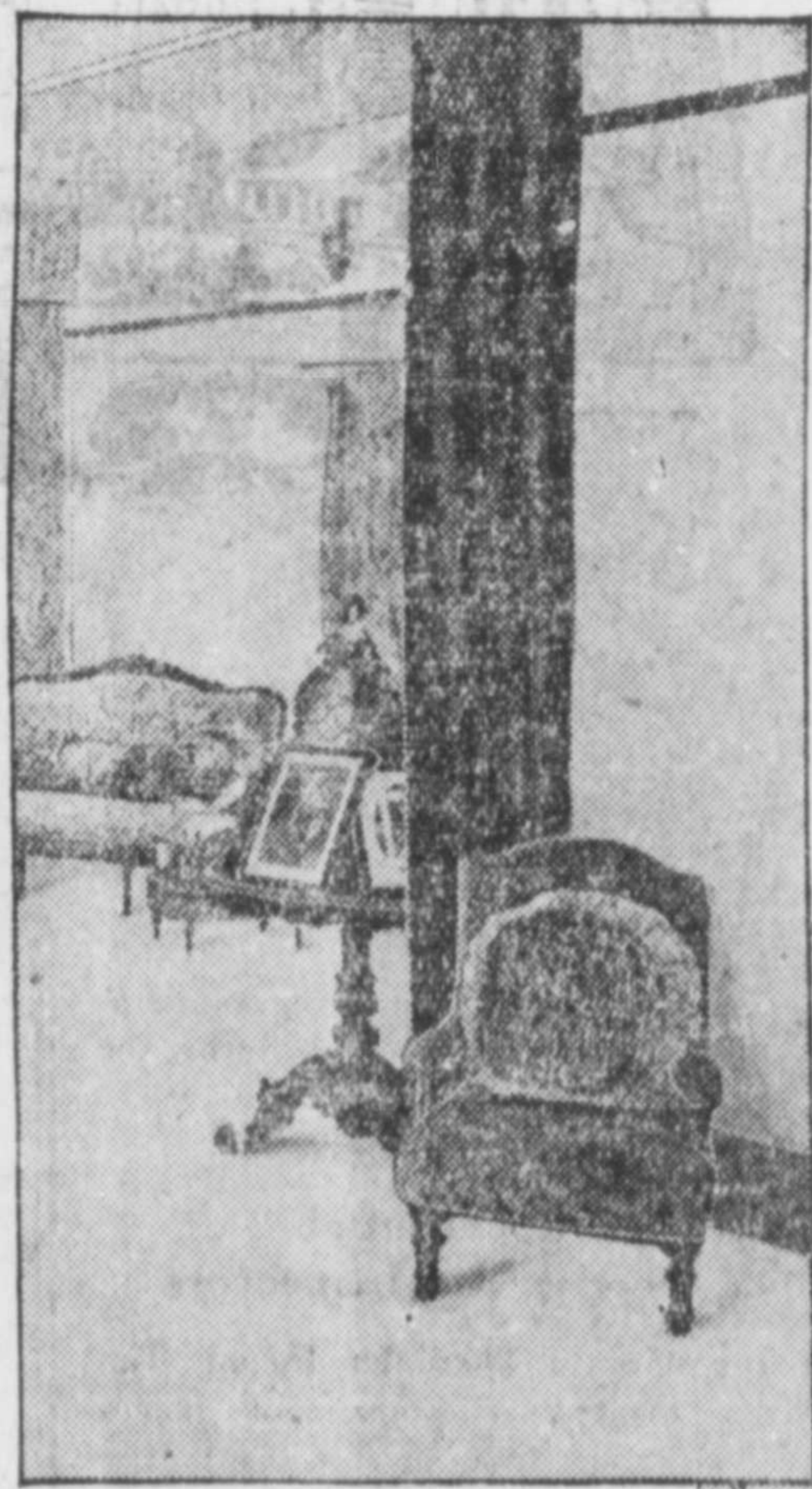

### NEW UNDENOMINATIONAL CHURCH AT USK DEDICATED THIS WEEK AND SOCIAL AND BUSINESS MEETING TOOK PLACE SATURDAY

USK, April 17.—The dedication services of the Marsh Memorial Community Church at Usk were held on Sunday morning, April 14, and were of a very impressive nature and will not soon be forgotten. Rev. A. W. Robinson was in charge of the proceedings and Rev. W. Allan officiated at the organ and offered prayer. Canon T. J. Marsh, in whose honor the church is named, gave a splendid sermon on "The Famine in Israel."

The dedication part of the service was especially impressive. Captain Willman, on behalf of the trustees, made a request for dedication. Rev. W. Allan read the declaration of dedication and Rev. W. Allan offered the dedicatory prayer. Following the service, Rev. W. Allan and Rev. A. W. Robinson sang a duet.

The service, which commenced at 10:45 a.m., was largely attended, practically the whole community being present. The proceedings were concluded about 10:50 in order that the ministers might catch the train back to Terrace.

The church is a very attractive one, both inside and out, and the tower enhances its beauty. A well fitted up room is provided for the accommodation of the ministers. The work of construction was begun by William Farr of Terrace and completed by Irwin Lougheed of Usk. Captain

Willman constructed the ornamentation adorning the tower and also donated the property on which the church is situated. The building has been erected and practically all paid for by general subscription throughout the community and by the good work of the Women's Auxiliary to the church. It is undenominational.

This marks an epoch in the history of the growth of Usk and is a monument to the untiring efforts of Canon T. J. Marsh, who has done such splendid work ever since the old construction days.

## Dominion of Canada Income Tax Returns are due

# APRIL 30

### Avoid the penalties the law imposes for delay



Every person liable to pay Dominion Income Tax should obtain three copies of the official form, either from his Postmaster or from the Inspector of Income Tax in his district. These forms are:

- Form T 1 —For all individuals, other than farmers or ranchers.
- Form T 1A—For farmers or ranchers.
- Form T 2 —For corporations and joint stock companies.

Note carefully the instructions on the form. Fill in all details accurately and answer all questions. Make up the amount of your tax. You can do this with the help of the accompanying table. Mail two copies, properly filled in and signed, to the Income Tax Inspector for your district, together with an accepted bank cheque or money order for the full amount of your tax, or for the first instalment. Keep the third copy for your own reference. Be sure to have these returns mailed before April 30.

#### Personal Exemptions

Personal exemptions should be noted carefully. They may be summarized as follows:

- (a) \$3,000 in the case of a married person or householder, or any other person who has dependent upon him any of the following persons:

1. A parent or grand-parent.
2. A daughter or sister.
3. A son or brother under 21 years of age; or incapable of self-support on account of mental or physical infirmity.

Note—Where husband and wife each have a separate income in excess of \$1,500, then each shall receive not \$3,000 exemption, but \$1,500 exemption.

- (b) \$1,500 in the case of unmarried persons.
- (c) \$500 for each child under 21 years of age who is dependent upon the taxpayer for support, or if 21 years of age or over is incapable of self-support on account of mental or physical infirmity.

#### Send only Accepted Cheques or Money Orders

Dominion Income Tax may be paid in a lump sum on or before April 30, or the taxpayer may pay one-quarter of the estimated tax due on or before April 30, and the balance in three equal, bi-monthly payments together with interest at 6 per centum per annum. If the taxpayer adopts the instalment plan of payment and fails to pay instalments as they fall due, additional penalty interest will be added.

A cheque marked accepted by the bank on which it is drawn or money order for either the full amount, or the amount of the first instalment, must accompany the official forms. Cheques must be made payable to "The Receiver-General of Canada." Do not send cash.

Mail forms together with cheque to the Inspector of Dominion Income Tax for your district.

#### No Extension of Time

If you delay making Income Tax Returns for any reason, the penalties must be imposed. In cases of absence from home, or inability to sign the return for any other cause, your accountant, or your solicitor, or your partner, or your agent may sign for you and save you the penalty. No extension of time will be granted.

#### Public Co-operation Asked

The Department's Inspectors will be glad to advise any taxpayer in preparing returns.

The Department desires the co-operation of the public in administering the Income War Tax Act.

# News of the Mines

**AROUND PRINCE RUPERT**  
**Large Body of High-Grade Ore Encountered at Cronin Mine; Road Improvements on Hudson Bay Mountain Beneficial to Mines**

Workmen on the contact tunnel to the crosscut from No. 1 tunnel on the Cronin mine in the Babines which is being developed by eastern interests recently broke into a large body of the highest grade ore ever opened up in such strength on that property. Samples of this ore have reached Smithers during the past week and show a steel galena of very fine grain. By actual measurement the vein of clean ore is 57 inches wide. This ore was located much earlier than was expected. Though large bodies of ore were known to exist in the area where the contact tunnel would connect with the cross-cut from No. 1 tunnel, preparations had been made to extend the tunnel a considerable distance beyond the point where the rich ore was actually encountered. Work is continuing to test the extent of the zone. Heavy snowfall of late has made transportation difficult between Smithers and the mine, but it is expected the snow will soon disappear.

The Smithers Board of Trade, with the co-operation of the Omineca branch of the British Columbia Chamber of Mines, is getting out a special mining booklet dealing with all the well known mines and prospects in that district. The body of the book is composed of brief descriptions of 80 district properties, giving history, ownership, location, development, ore values and nature of ore. A feature of the publication will be a large scale map of the district showing the location of all the properties dealt with. Later developments on the better known properties of the district will be depicted in illustrations. The booklet is to be ready for distribution by the end of April.

The provincial department of mines has made an appropriation of \$1750 for improvements to the Silver Lakes trail on Hudson Bay mountain, near Smithers. A new bridge will be built at Toboggan creek to replace one which was washed out by high water last summer. Construction of this bridge will be the first item on a program which also calls for new approaches and for turning the present trail into a road as far as this new bridge. Improvements will also be made on the way up to the summit of Silver Lakes pass. The result of the work planned will be to bring all of the mining properties on the northern end of Hudson Bay mountain practically two and a half miles closer to Smithers. These include the important Schufer property, the holdings of the Mount Evelyn Mines Ltd. (Philip J. Job's company), the Reco-Aspen group, the Joe Matus claims on Toboggan creek glacier, the Trade Dollar group, on which Angus Chisholm made a sensational galena discovery last season, the Silver Lake group, adjoining this, and the Last Chance group, belonging to Olof Hanson and associates, as well as other claims of lesser importance. It is expected that development will be in progress on the most of these properties during the coming season. The improvements will be of benefit for tourist purposes as well as for miners and prospectors.

The new ore body which was recently encountered on the Topley-Richfield mine is reported to be five feet wide with values assaying \$5 in gold and 151 ounces in

silver. The new ore was opened up by a short cross-cut from the main north drift and work is continuing to establish the extent of the zone. This ore body is considered to be the most spectacular and important development in the long program of work at the Topley-Richfield. It was in this hole that diamond drill cores last year showed such high gold and silver values as to lead consulting engineers to predict that during the present year the company would be in a position to commence shipments of high grade ore. Work now proceeding has this object in view. The ore came in at a point 140 feet north of the shaft and it has been decided to break down the ore and run a raise to No. 1 level, being a distance of approximately 120 feet and with a total overhead of 225 feet. As the work proceeds the ore will be stored for shipment. Meantime, the drift is being extended to connect up other drill holes, all of which showed good ore. In the south drift some fine ore has also been disclosed and with each foot of headway extensive ore reserves are being built up from the knowledge of conditions at higher levels on the property.

## CANADIAN CLUB MISSED HEARING ABOUT COUNTRY

Major McKeand Who was to Have Spoken Here Tells Edmonton About Last Unspoiled Land

### WHERE BUFFALO ROAM

Plans Laid to Drive Herds of Reindeer From Alaska to Barren Lands of North

Major D. L. McKeand, who was to have addressed the Women's Canadian Club of Prince Rupert telling them about the attractions and wonders of the Northwest Territories where Buffalo roam, caribou, moose and other animals hold revel and where it is now proposed to place herds of reindeer for the use of the native Indians and Eskimos, was the speaker at the joint meeting of Canadian Clubs at Edmonton on Saturday. He could not stop off in Prince Rupert owing to there being no daily train service. Telling about the north country in Edmonton, the Major said:

The first movement of Alaska reindeer into the so-called "Barren Lands" of the Northwest Territories will commence this year.

The first appropriation for the purpose, a sum of \$50,000, is now going through, and the necessary equipment for the two Porsild brothers, who will have charge of the movement, is being assembled.

Creation of a new meat supply for the Eskimo and Indian, and the populating of the great spaces of the territories from Great Bear Lake to Hudson Bay, with reindeer herds, was decided upon following an intensive survey and report made by the two Porsilds during the past two or three years.

The brothers, who are experts in reindeer farming, were engaged by the department to cover the entire proposed line of travel from Nome, Alaska, to Great Bear Lake, and so report on the available pasturage, water supply, speed of the movement, size of the herds, etc.

### Movement Feasible

Their report, made public last year, stated that the proposed movement was entirely feasible; that the overland route could be

followed with success, if undertaken in a leisurely manner, and that in the so-called "Barren Lands," there was pasturage ample for enormous herds, in addition to the already vast herds of caribou which roam the northern tundra.

The movement, therefore, will be commenced this year, and will extend over several years. The proportions which it may ultimately attain, cannot be estimated, but the plan marks a new economic era for the native population of the Territories.

The Eskimo, as Major McKeand points out, is a free and independent citizen of Canada, unlike the Indian, who is a ward of Canada. To retain this economic independence, he must be assured of a permanent meat supply, and the reindeer herds to be transplanted from Alaska, will form the nucleus of this supply.

As for the Indian, his wants to a large extent will in the future be taken care of by the meat supply from the growing buffalo herds now in the wood buffalo preserve.

No more buffalo will be moved from Wainwright, at least, for a year or two, Major McKeand states.

A total of some 6,700 have been taken north since the movement commenced four years ago. These animals have settled down to a natural life in their new domain. They are inter-breeding with the larger wood buffalo, and a new and sturdy race of animals is being built up as a result.

Speaking generally of the developments going on in the Territories, Major McKeand foresees an increased growth in mineral development, both from the Hudson Bay side, and from the interior. The Great Slave Lake de-

velopment in lead and zinc, the recent gold exploration of the Nahanni country, and similar movements, are all indicative of this.

### Unspoiled Country

"But let us not forget the romantic possibilities of the Northwest Territories," Major McKeand urges. "This vast land stands today as the last unspoiled country for the tourist and out-of-doors man. Here is big game in abundance, fur-bearing animals of all kinds, with vast herds of buffalo, caribou and musk-ox. These things are and fill increasingly become, a lure to visitors from the four corners of the earth. As transportation into the territories improves, more and more people will seek this vast land for recreation purposes. It is an asset, we must not for a moment forget."

Incidentally, the question of granting permits for hunters to shoot buffalo in the Wood Buffalo preserve is still under consideration by the department.

American and Canadian sportsmen long for the thrill of a shot at a buffalo, and there is a possibility that in the future some time, permits to kill one animal each, may be issued to sportsmen.

### Displacing the Rifle

The motion picture camera, however, is displacing the rifle as a means of "shooting" wild game. The sportsman of today almost prefers a record of imperishable celluloid strip, to a mouldering, moth-eaten head or pelt that loses its value with the passing of the years.

A. T. Harrer, well known Smithers mining man, arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver and proceeded to the interior by train.

Dealing with fish conservation: Fish traps will catch all fish, big or small, and have had the reputation in the past of being responsible for the biggest wholesale slaughter and complete depletion of creeks, streams and rivers, in all parts of the coast where they have been in operation.

I could supply names of a number of old-time fishermen, who have been in direct contact with traps, and they are willing to testify that wherever fish traps have been used and operated for any length of time, salmon never again appeared in these same waters.
