## TEMPORARY SHUTDOWN AT LOCAL SHIPYARDS WHILE OWNERS ARRANGE MATTERS

EXPECTATION THAT SETTLEMENT WILL BE ARRIVED AT  
IN NEAR FUTURE AND WORK RESUMED;  
PRACTICALLY ALL STEEL FOR TWO  
VESSELS SHIPPED

There is a temporary shutdown at the shipyards while the partners of the concern settle their differences. Very little can be learned as to the real cause of the trouble, the only thing that is clear is that the work has stopped and the works will remain closed until a settlement is arrived at.

It is understood that a quarter of a million dollars worth of work has been done already at the yards. The excavation of the slips is nearly completed, big buildings have been erected, including steel fabricating and furnace buildings, offices, a large boarding house, and other minor work has been done.

The steel for the two vessels has been practically all shipped, twenty car loads have been unloaded at the works and there is a good deal more here. In all 120 car loads of steel has been shipped.

The Mullen Construction Company seems to have taken charge of the yard and the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. has moved its offices temporarily to 217 Second Avenue where Vice-President Shellenburg is in charge.

The opinion seems to prevail that the Dominion Government and the railway company will take a hand in the settlement and that some announcement will be made soon.

## OFFICIAL REASON FOR SHUT-DOWN OF THE SHIPYARDS

J. L. Mullen, president of  
the Mullen Construction Co.  
and also of the Prince Ru-  
pert Drydock and Engineer-  
ing Co., Ltd., has issued the  
following statement:

"Owing to a disagreement between the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., Ltd., controlled by Newman Erb of New York, and the management of the Mullen Construction Company which holds the lease of the Drydock from the Railway Company, the Mullen Construction Company has taken over the entire drydock plant and will continue operations in its own name until further notice.

"This action will result in the suspension of the works of improvement at present being made at the plant in connection with shipbuilding operations until such time as the disagreement between the two companies is adjusted.

"In the mean time F. F. Shellenburg, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., Ltd., has taken an office for that company at 217 2nd Avenue in this city and will attend to the business of the company until some other arrangement is made."

## OLD TIMER IS GONE BEYOND

Old Tom Sylvester of Port Edward  
Who Has Joined the Great  
Majority was Well  
Known.

Thomas Sylvester, an old timer, who has lived in the neighborhood of the Skeena River for the past 35 years, died early this morning at the Prince Rupert Hospital. He was taken with a stroke on June 29 and since that time has been at the local institution.

"Old Tom," as he was familiarly known, was 88 years of age. He was born at Rio de Janeiro, his father being Scotch and his mother French. For a number of years he has lived at Port Edward.

## FULL PEACE CONDITIONS FOR AUSTRIA PRESENTED FROM THE ALLIED POWERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 21.—The full peace conditions of the Allied powers are now in the hands of the Austrians. The final sections were delivered without any ceremony.

The Austrians are granted fifteen days in which to make final observations, although they have already submitted a large number of notes on the terms previously submitted to them.

The new clauses providing for reparations are similar to those of the treaty with Germany. The financial terms provide that the Austrian pre-war debt shall be apportioned among the various parts of Austria and that Austrian coinage and war bonds circulating in separate territory shall be taken up by the new government and be redeemed.

The Austrian army is henceforth reduced to 30,000 men on a purely voluntary basis, including officers and depot troops. Within three months the forces shall be reduced to this number, universal military service abolished and voluntary enlistment established.

## CARPENTIER KNOCKS OUT DICK SMITH

English Champion Boxer Goes  
Down Before Frenchman in  
Eighth Round.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, July 21.—Georges Carpentier, the French champion, knocked out Dick Smith, the former English champion in the 8th round.

Announcement was made today by C. B. Cochran, fight promoter, that it is definitely decided to have Jack Dempsey meet the winner of the fight between Carpentier and Joe Beckett in London early next year.

## ELEVEN BOATS HAVE BEEN SEIZED FOR ILLEGAL FISHING

Eleven fishing boats have been seized on the Skeena River and vicinity so far this year for contravention of the law relating to the fisheries. Some of them were caught fishing during the close hours or using larger nets than the law allows. They will be tried on Wednesday and if convicted the boats and gear will probably be sold on Friday.

## BALL PLAYERS' NAMES TAKEN BY THE POLICE

Mayor Determined to Prosecute  
For Violation of the Lord's  
Day Act.

Yesterday afternoon the police, on the order of Mayor McClymont took the names of all those who played in the baseball game yesterday or who had anything to do with promoting it and the mayor has telegraphed to the attorney-general asking for permission to prosecute under the Lord's Day Act. This permission has to be secured before prosecutions can take place. It is understood that other telegrams have been sent asking that the government withhold their permission.

The mayor when seen this morning stated that Ben Self had come to him on Friday in regard to playing two Sunday games, one yesterday and the other next week. He told Mr. Self he would not stand for it. Commissioner Macdonald also saw him later and the mayor told him that it was all off.

The mayor said that he heard nothing further until he saw the crowds gathering on Sunday. He at once telephoned the police and had the names of the players taken and telegraphed the attorney general for permission to prosecute them.

## BRITAIN CELEBRATES THE SIGNING OF PEACE TREATY DUBLIN JOINS BY CHEERING

CORK BOARD OF GUARDIANS DECORATES WITH BLACK  
FLAGS AND DUNDALK PAINTS INSCRIPTIONS  
ON THE WALLS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 21.—The land, sea and air forces of the British Empire and the Allies marched in triumphal procession in the great victory parade to mark the return of peace. Several million persons watched the gorgeous spectacle.

London has not witnessed such a celebration since Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. Buckingham Palace was decorated on the exterior for the first time in history.

Dublin, July 21.—Viscount French, Lord Lieut. and Governor-General of Ireland took the salute at the Victory Parade here. College Green was filled with cheering crowds.

By order of the Cork Board of Guardians black flags were hung on the buildings of which the guardians have charge.

At Dundalk Sinn Fein inscriptions were painted on the walls for the peace celebration.

Shipbuilding Plant  
Temporarily Closed.

The sudden closing of the shipyards on Friday came like a bomb from the blue. It was so unexpected that people found it difficult to believe the news. It is thought however that a settlement will be effected within a few days and everything will be running smoothly again. There is too much at stake to allow of a long delay. Every day that the work is tied up makes a big loss in interest charges alone. Prince Rupert people may feel confident that the delay is not going to be a serious one, but that work will proceed and that within a few weeks the first keel will be laid.

Legal Aspect of  
Sunday Baseball.

There is a difference of opinion as to whether baseball should be allowed here on Sundays and as a preliminary step to settle the difference, the police were instructed to take the names of the players yesterday. Before prosecutions can follow, the permission of the attorney-general will have to be secured, according to the Lord's Day Act, and the attorney-general has stated on more than one occasion that he will authorize no prosecutions under the act unless recommended to do so by the Board of Police Commissioners who are elected by the people to advise on just such cases as this. That puts the authority just where it belongs. If the Police Commissioners recommend that prosecutions shall take place, the law in that respect will be enforced, it is to be presumed. There may be cases where through the pressure of public opinion or for other reasons the attorney-general may go contrary to the opinion of the Police Commissioners, but such a case has not yet arisen, so far as we know.

In Victoria the mayor ordered the police to take the names of the vendors of tobacco and soft drinks on Sundays. This was done and the chief of police forwarded the list of names to the attorney-general asking for permission to prosecute. The attorney-general replied that if the Board of Police Commissioners sent in a proper formal request for permission to prosecute, the permission would be granted, but not otherwise. This they refused to do, the mayor being the only one in favor.

Would Prosecution  
Be Discrimination?

It is claimed by those who like the game of baseball that to prosecute for playing it and to allow tennis, fishing, hunting, boating and picnic parties on Sunday would be gross discrimination. Baseball players make more noise perhaps, but there is really nothing unholy about rooting at a baseball game. It is recreation pure and simple and is a healthy tonic in a town like this where everybody has such a tendency to loaf on the streets and hang around the corners.

It is further claimed by those who favor the American game that it is the only possible way in which games can be arranged, with outside points. It is impossible to get teams to come here for one day only, with the strong possibility of that one day being a wet one. The local team is a purely local amateur aggregation and the gate money is expended in bringing the visitors to the city.

Judging from expressions of opinion heard around town, the people here are in favor of Sunday baseball, although it must be admitted there are others who feel very strongly that it is wrong. The people of Nanaimo and Cumberland have decided that those who wish to play ball on Sunday may do so and those who do not like the game shall keep away from it. That might be the best solution here. No one is being morally contaminated by watching the game and if a few happen to stray from the narrow way and visit Acropolis Hill in the afternoon the erring brothers may possibly be reclaimed. There are other places in town that are a danger to the youth of the community about which little is said. The agitation against this healthy sport seems like straining at a midge and swallowing a hornet.

## BLIND TAUGHT TO HELP SELVES

Mr. Cowen Tells of Practical Work Done by National Institute.

Both to the Canadian Club on Friday afternoon and at the Westholme Theatre on Sunday night J. E. Cowen, the blind representative of the National Institute for the blind, told of the wonderful work that is being done for the blind soldiers and sailors at St. Dunstan's.

"God never shuts the door but he opens the window," said the speaker at the Canadian Club luncheon. "Many of the blind men live fuller lives now than they ever lived before they lost their sight. The people at St. Dunstan's are not really blind men. They are simply men who do not see. All are better mentally than when they came in. We have yet to register one failure."

### Good Salary.

Mr. Cowen went on to tell of the work that the men did. Many engage in poultry raising. They build the poultry houses and everything connected therewith and they learn to dress the poultry and some have secured good appointments. One man is now instructor at Queph Agricultural College, getting \$125 a month which together with \$75 pension gives him a much better salary than he was getting before he went overseas.

Other trades taught are shoe making, mat making, basket making, carpentry, picture framing, massage, typewriting, telephone operating. The massageurs are even better than the sighted men for they learn to concentrate better. Pte. McDougall at Toronto is earning \$150 a month at the profession in addition to his pension. Pte. Turner at Shaughnessy gets \$100 a month.

Those learning typewriting take 100 words a minute and are from twenty to twenty-five per cent more efficient than a sighted typist.

### Amusements.

Speaking of amusements, Mr. Cowen told of the men playing push ball, cycling, swimming and rowing as well as playing cards and dominoes.

Some blind people who have been otherwise wounded or disabled it is impossible to train. These are taken care of at a convalescent home at Ilkley in Yorkshire where they may live as long as they wish among pleasant surroundings. Thirty-five blind men have permanent homes there and there is a house where their relatives may visit now and then.

### Start in Business.

The National Institute starts the men who are fit for it in business in any of the trades or industries and provides for them raw material at the lowest possible price and takes the finished product and sells it for them. There is no indiscriminate charity. Every man is taught to help himself.

Many Canadians are being helped, this department being under the Canadian National Institute at Toronto. Already two workshops are established and it is proposed to open several others in the central and western provinces.

## "PECK'S BAD GIRL" AT THE WESTHOLME

"Peck's Bad Girl" is one of those spirited comedy-dramas that have proved so popular with Prince Rupert movie fans. It is a story of how love came to a young girl, but it is full of humorous and picturesque phases that keep things lively throughout. A bank robbery that was stopped through the agency of the bad girl is an incident that is outstanding in the play.

## VAUDEVILLE AND MOVIES AT EMPRESS

There is to be another vaudeville night at the Empress Theatre and a film that is a first later. Nell Shipman in "Baree, Son of Kazan" is wonderful. A drama of the western woods, swift, stern and real, showing malamute dogs and all sorts of wonderful things are compressed into one picture story. Seldom has there been anything to equal it, according to the advance notices.

## Sport

There is considerable discussion in sport circles as to the possibility of arranging a baseball match in order to determine the championship for Western Canada. Arrangements are being made to stage the event in Calgary or Edmonton.

Last week there was a meeting of the St. Andrew's sports committee and several important steps were made for the fostering of further interest along the lines of outdoor exercise and games.

If it is possible there will be a revival in basket ball activities during the fall and winter. Before the war there were many local teams and competition was always very keen. A house league will be formed by the St. Andrew's Society.

A new and comparatively delightful outdoor exercise which has recently come into vogue is the photography of wild life in their native haunts. This is a most fascinating study but requires great patience and care in order to get the best results. Its advocates are rapidly increasing as the hobby becomes more and more before the public eye. Nearly every magazine has insects and cuts showing the results of hunting with a camera. This is especially noticeable in the case of moving picture concerns.

Should weather conditions prove favorable there will be a practice football match this evening between the married and single men of the St. Andrew's club.

A football league will very likely be formed for the fall months and clubs and societies interested will meet in the near future to consider how many teams are available. Such groups as the Sons of England, Great War Veterans' Drydocks, Retail Clerks and St. Andrew's ought to be able to field fairly good teams.

## In the Letter Box

### LAND THE SOLUTION

To the Editor—

As reasonable human beings, dependent on our individual labor for a livelihood, let us look upon the world's unrest of the present day in a fair and sensible manner. We may talk our heads off; bring chaos and suffering to those who have had enough of it; agitate and riot, until we bring about the same state of affairs we view in Europe nowadays and will not accomplish the emancipation of the workingman from profiteering and injustice, until we regulate things by the only means that ever will be used now or hereafter—that is by manhood and womanhood suffrage.

The city worker, manufacturer, dealer, profiteer and employer may arrive at some conclusion with respect to grievances, but they cannot make any arrangement for the middle-man and the farmer. The soil and the sea produce the means of livelihood and all this agitation is of some use if it drives to the land and sea the millions of men and women who cannot obtain employment or food, through the large number of drones subsisting on the over-production of the real producer.

### Land Hungers for Men.

This world was never intended for the hiving of millions of non-producers, while the land hungers for those who may earn a good living, free from the turmoil caused by men and women seeking to obtain a commodity that is not digestible—such as gold, silver and paper money. Importing food, when we can raise it on our vast fields and water courses seems ridiculous. Imagine the farmer eating "King Oscar" brand of sardines from Norway with fish galore rotting in our rivers! Think of eating Swift's and Armour's hams and bacon because we do not raise pigs at home. Canned beef and vegetable soups from other countries, while grazing fields and open land can be found at our doors; exporting hides and paying ten dollars a pair for shoes; sending out minerals and importing the manufactured articles, from the same copper, iron, gold and silver—did Germany do this before the war?

### Value of Farms.

If employer and employee would only think for a minute of the opportunities before their very eyes, and would understand that it is not a question of hours of labor, they would take up occupations serviceable to themselves and other men and women. Why are the farms so valuable at this time? Because when men had the opportunity to purchase cleared land at a dollar an acre, they could not be induced to purchase and till the land. The farmer does not consider the question of hours and returns. Some years he has a plentiful crop; other years he meets with reverses, but he sticks to his farm and does not complain when things happen over which he has no control.

Until the masses are educated to think and act for themselves they will be led by agitators and grafting speculators, tin-pot politicians and men of that calibre fomenting trouble. Let the thinking, sensible, well-meaning men and women think for themselves and cast votes for the honest men in their communities.

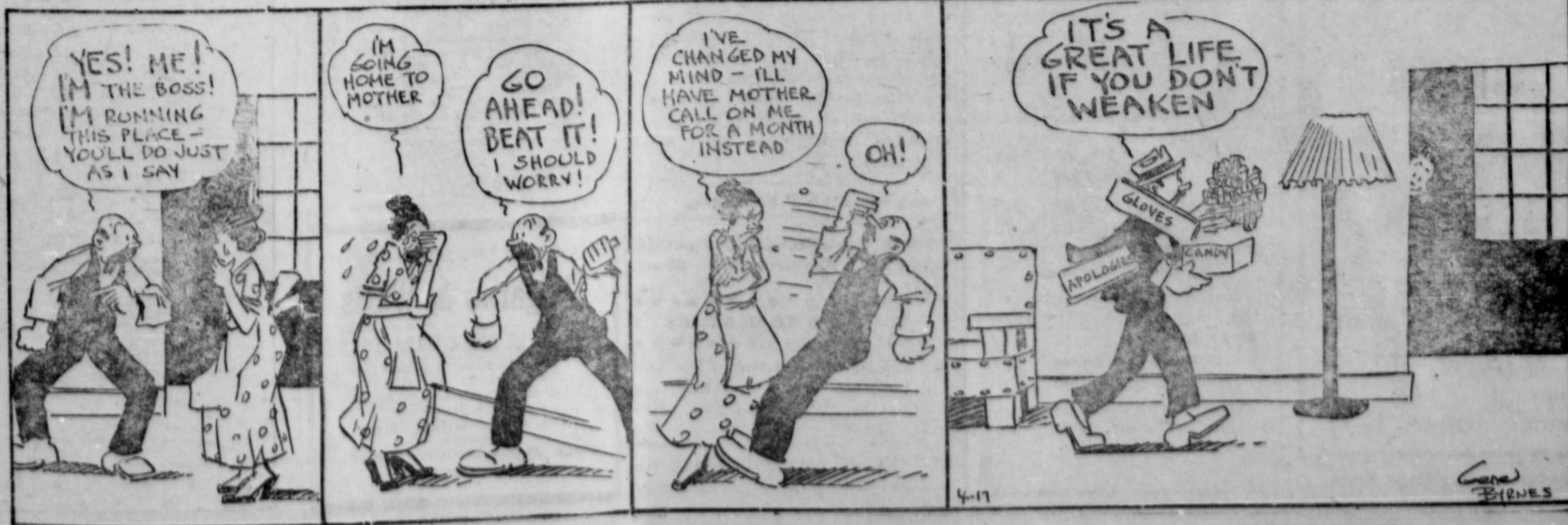
