Both Sides Appear at Final Session of Fish Trap Inquiry

Fishermen Oppose Traps but Canners Make Plea for Their Use Throughout as Necessary to Their Interests

VANCOUVER, April 25.—The fishermen and salmon canners were still in dispute over the establishment of salmon traps in Northern British Columbia waters contingent to the Alaskan boundary when Commissioner Judge Ellis yesterday concluded the public enquiry as to whether such traps are in the public interest.

In the final statement, W. E. Maiden, secretary of the British Columbia Fishermen's Association, said that fishamon everywhere were in opposition to the views of Henry Bell Irving and A. L. Hager, representing the Canadian Fishing Company and the cannerymen's opinion. They sought to show that these traps not only were necessary for the protection of their business interests, but also their final effort would be detrimental to the industry.

Woman Who was Married to Another Woman gets Nine Months in Prison

Mrs. Irma Valeria Arkell Smith Posed as a Man About **Town and Military Officer**

LONDON, April 25. — Mrs. Irma Valeria Arkell Smith, London's woman masquerador, who for many months passed as a "man about town" under the name of Colonel Barker, was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment with hard labor at the Old Bailey today, on a charge of perjury in causing a false statement to be entered on the register of her marriage with another woman.

The woman pleaded guilty to the charge resterday, but not guilty to the second charge of perjury in falsely representing herself as a retired colonel in the British army.

In sentencing the woman masquerador, the recorder said she had "profaned the house of God, outraged the decencies of nature and broken the law of man." He said that so grave a defiance of the law carried a maximum of seven years servitude.
