### EDITORIAL

#### PROPOSED NEW PROVINCE

A correspondent asks what steps can be taken to secure the formation of a new province. If our correspondent is a member of the Board of Trade he should induce all members of the Board who favor the new province to attend the monthly meeting tomorrow night, when it is to be supposed delegates will be chosen to attend the convention of the Associated Boards of Central British Columbia. If the matter is to come up at that convention it is necessary to have delegates pledged to support it and also to see that the resolutions committee includes a resolution on the subject to come before the gathering.

Nothing can be done until there is a crystallized public opinion in favor of the movement.

#### IMPROVEMENTS TO SCHOOL ARE URGED

Grand Jury at Supreme Court Assizes Submits Recommendations to Mr. Justice Fisher

The Grand Jury of the Supreme Court Assizes made an inspection of King Edward High School yesterday afternoon and submitted a report recommending certain improvements and alterations to the premises. These recommendations will be submitted to the proper quarter by Mr. Justice Fisher, and in due course will come before the local school board.

After making its presentation, the Grand Jury, of which Charles E. Gilbert of Terrace was foreman, was excused from further attendance at the Assize.

The Grand Jury's report reads: "We find that the fire escape is in an unsafe condition and recommend that it be replaced with a new and substantial one. We further recommend that a fire underwriters' standard fire door leading from the furnace room in the main school building replace the present one. Otherwise we find the condition of the building to be excellent."

#### MORE FIRES

##### IN MANITOBA

Mining Town Lost 15 Residences and Stores on Hudson Bay Line

WINNIPEG, June 6.—The fire which threatened the destruction of the old townsite of Cranberry Portage, a northern Manitoba mining town, is reported to be under control.

THE PAS, June 6.—A prey to flames which are reported to have started in a private residence, 15 buildings, including stores and dwellings, were destroyed by fire in the little mining town of Mile Fifty-three on the Hudson Bay Railway. Telegraphic reports state that the fire is under control and that all the residents escaped injury, though many lost all their possessions.

THE PAS, June 6.—A sudden fall in the wind, combined with the battle of men against the roaring flames, has saved Cranberry Portage, a large part of which was destroyed by fire yesterday, from complete destruction. A change of wind might bring the danger back, however.

## New Labor Cabinet Is Completed and Will be Announced

Work On Unemployment Problem Already Commenced and Thomas Likely to Have It in Charge as Member of Cabinet

LONDON, June 6.—The new Labor cabinet has been completed, it is understood, and the list of ministers will be made public tomorrow night by Premier J. Ramsay Macdonald.

It is rumored that Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas may undertake the task of solving the unemployment problem which Mr. Macdonald intends to assign to a member of his cabinet. Mr. Thomas, it was stated today, has a plan for dealing with unemployment which involves railway reorganization, the development and revival of trade and the pensioning of aged workers.

In connection with the pensions scheme, Mr. Thomas, it is said, will provide men of 60 or 65 with an adequate state pension to enable them to retire and will replace them with young men at present unemployed.

Ramsay Macdonald announced today that work on the problem of unemployment had been already started.

### VOTING TODAY SASKATCHEWAN

Liberals Have Candidates in Every Riding and 75 Other Contestants

REGINA, June 6.—Two hundred thousand voters throughout Saskatchewan are casting their ballots today in the provincial general election. Each of the 61 seats in 58 ridings is being contested by candidates of the Liberal party. A total of 75 other contestants, Conservative, Progressive and other affiliations are seeking election. In all there are twelve three-cornered contests and a four-sided battle is listed at Redberry, where Conservative, Independent Liberal and an economic group Progressive oppose the Liberal nominee.

### MARINE AND FISHERIES ESTIMATES ARE PASSED

OTTAWA, June 6.—Estimates of the department of marine and fisheries adopted in the House of Commons last night in quick order. They contained \$45,000 for continuous subsidies for wrecking plants in Quebec and British Columbia.

### PRINCE DAVID COMING SOON URGE CHANGES IN GRAIN ACT

New C.N.R. Boat to Be Extensively Reconditioned at Local Dock

The steamer Prince David, formerly the Greek Aksion, which has been purchased by the Canadian National Coast Steamships, is due here next Monday direct from Halifax and will be given an extensive reconditioning in the local drydock before being placed in commission on service to neighboring points out of Prince Rupert. The vessel, it is expected, will be in dock about three months and will have extensive alterations made, including conversion from coal to oil burning and changes in passenger accommodation.

### REIGH COUNT LOOKS BETTER

Kentucky Derby Winner Won Coronation Cup Over Epsom Downs Course Today

EPSOM, England, June 6.—Reigh Count, owned by Mrs. John D. Hertz, last year's United States three-year-old champion and Kentucky Derby winner, who had been a disappointment on the English turf, won the Coronation Cup over the mile and a half Epsom Downs course today. Jockey Childs, who is the King's jockey, replaced the American jockey, Chick Lane, and robbed him of the victory. Athford, carrying the sails of Wildam Barnett, owner of Trigo, yesterday's Derby winner, was second, and Plantago third.

#### OPIUM SEIZED

VANCOUVER, June 6.—The seizure of 403 tins of opium valued at \$40,000 has been made by customs officers here and at Victoria since the arrival last Saturday of the steamer Empress of Asia from the Orient.

## Seaplane Passed by Here Last Evening Bound For Hyder

Pilot Eckman Flew Through Fog Over Shawatians Lake and Landed Safely in North

En route from Seattle to Hyder, which latter place it safely reached at 10 p.m., a Washington Airways seaplane passed near Prince Rupert about 9 o'clock last night, picking its way through a rather dense fog. As far as can be learned, the plane was not heard in the city, but Roif Walker of the city water department at Shawatians Lake reports that it passed over Shawatians Lake flying low at 9:05. Probably the plane flew to the rear of Kaien Island.

The plane left Seattle yesterday morning and called at

Vancouver en route and picked up Oren F. Hill, Hyder druggist, who flew north in it. The machine left Vancouver at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and stopped for an hour and a half at Smith's Inlet to refuel. Another passenger on board was C. P. McKinney of Seattle. Pilot Eckman was at the controls and there was also a mechanic. The plane is barnstorming today at Hyder and will leave this evening for Ketchikan to take up its regular schedule between that Point and Seattle.

### McMORDIE SUIT IS BEING HEARD

Mayor Only Witness This Morning and Still on Stand at Noon; Continuing This Afternoon

The suit of Mayor S. P. McMordie, who claims the sum of \$1736.41 from Cliff Ford of London, England, to cover alterations which he made last year to the Westmoore Theatre at the order of the provincial fire marshal, is occupying the attention of Mr. Justice Fisher in Supreme Court here today. J. Daviana of Vancouver and E. R. Jones of this city are conducting the case for the plaintiff, while Milton Gonzales is appearing for the defendant.

Mayor McMordie was the only witness this morning and was still on the stand when noon adjournment was taken. He described his lease of the theatre and negotiations with G. H. Arnold, Ford's agent, prior to the launching of the suit. Col. McMordie testified that he notified Mr. Arnold that, as he had failed to have the necessary alterations carried out, he (Col. McMordie) would have the work proceeded with himself and that he would expect to be reimbursed by the plaintiff for same. A good deal of correspondence and figures was presented in evidence by the mayor. He also described in detail the alterations that had been made.

Other witnesses to appear for the plaintiff will include Assistant Fire Marshal Oswald, following whose inspection alterations to the theatre were ordered, and John Mitchell, whose firm carried out the work.

G. H. Arnold will be chief witness for the defence. The case will occupy most of the day, it is expected.

**INQUIRIES ABOUT NEW PROVINCE**

Editor, Daily News:—

I have read with interest the many letters you have received as well as your editorial dictums regarding the proposed formation of a new province. I was indeed particularly struck with the letter recently published apropos the outrageous dismissal of Norman Watt, a pioneer of the north, by a Vancouver baker or pastry-

cook, meanwhile minister of the Crown.

We people of the north have realized bitterly what government from Victoria controlled by that hogtown Vancouver, really means, quite irrespective of the party in power. Our members say they cannot do any better. Doubtless they cannot. But if they are helpless in the matter of getting some development for the north, then why return them to Victoria at all?

But I would like you, Mr. Editor, or any of the many correspondents who are interested in the formation of a new province wherein the people of the north may govern themselves in a civilized manner, to indicate clearly how to set about getting this new province set up. What do we do first? Get that done and then we can take the next step. But what do we do first?

People who think for themselves in Prince Rupert, Terrace, Hazelton, Smithers and beyond that, as well as in Stewart, Anxox and Alice Arm, all seem to be of the one opinion that it would be better for the people of the north to cut loose from the control of Vancouver which gorges on the public revenues produced elsewhere, yet is never satisfied. And if it is better for us to cut loose, let us do it now, before we get worse off. For who doesn't want to be better off? So I ask again, what do we do first?

Went to Top Through Giants' Defeat of Cardinals; Yankees Coming Up Again

NEW YORK, June 6.—The New York Giants defeated St. Louis Cardinals yesterday and allowed the Pittsburgh Pirates to take first place in the National League, although the latter were idle through rain.

Chicago Cubs pushed over all their runs in the ninth to take a series opener from Brooklyn Robins. There is a close race between Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Chicago for first place, but a single game separating the three teams.

The lowly Cincinnati Reds won a swiftest from Philadelphia. Charlie Klein, the slugging Philadelphia outfielder, hit his fourteenth homer in the first inning with Red Lucas pitching and the bases empty, increasing his lead in the home run marathon.

A rally in the twelfth inning gave the New York Yankees the winning run over Cleveland Indians, enabling them to drop into second place above the St. Louis Browns. Waite Hoyt was batted from the box, but Freddy Heimach finished in fine style.

The Boston Red Sox hammered Thomas and Dugan to such an extent that Manager Lena Blackburn of the Chicago White Sox went in himself to pitch in the eighth. The Bostonians won.

The Philadelphia Athletics were back in the winning column by beating the St. Louis Browns and Washington Senators disposed of Detroit Tigers.

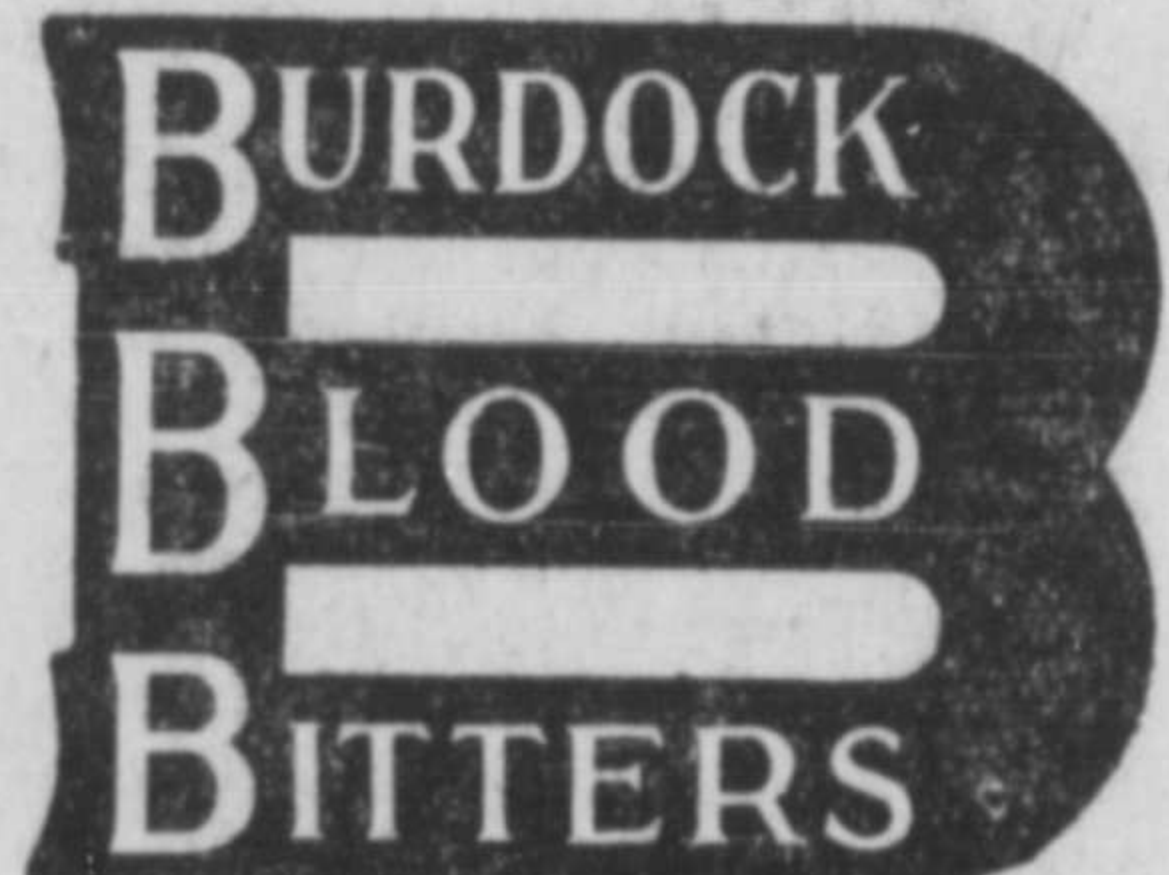

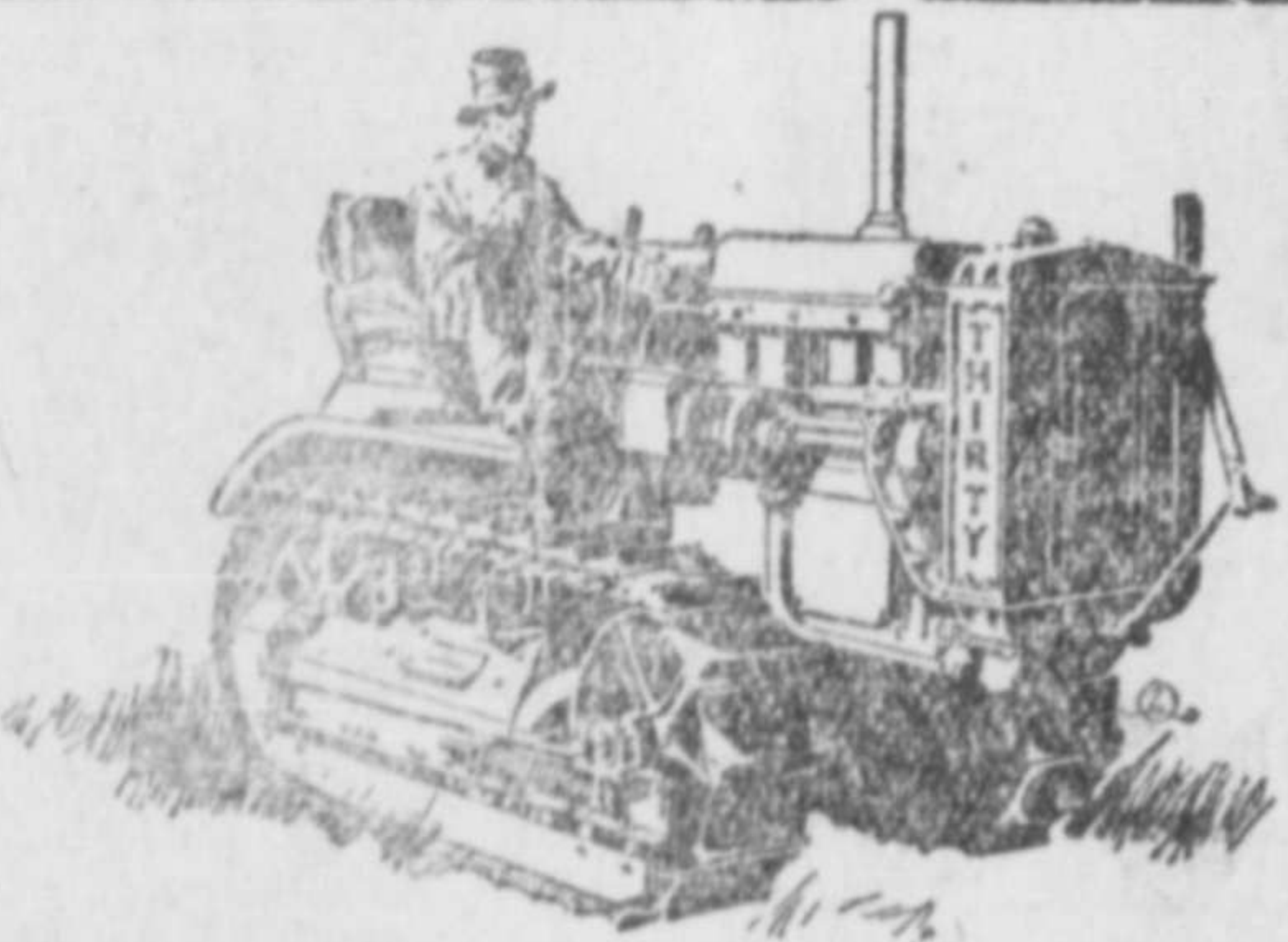

## LOCAL LIBRARY KEEPING BUSY

Board Hears Report of Librarian at Monthly Meeting Last Night

Merely routine matters came before the Library Board at its meeting last night, with Alderman Dibb presiding. The Librarian reported a total circulation during the month of May of 3985 volumes made up of 2468 books of fiction, 369 non-fiction, 931 juvenile and 217 under the duplicate pay system.

The library was open 22 days and the average circulation per day was 181.1.

New books were added during the month, 20 by gift and 68 by purchase. Forty volumes were discarded as no longer in fit condition to circulate, leaving a net addition to the collection of 48.

The total number now on the shelves or in circulation is 6754.

During the month 20 new borrowers registered and 24 cancelled, leaving a net gain of 6. There are now 2771 registered borrowers.

The board decided to close the library during the absence of the Librarian on holiday.

Resolves to the roof of the building were discussed and it was left with the chairman to make inquiries and report at the next meeting.

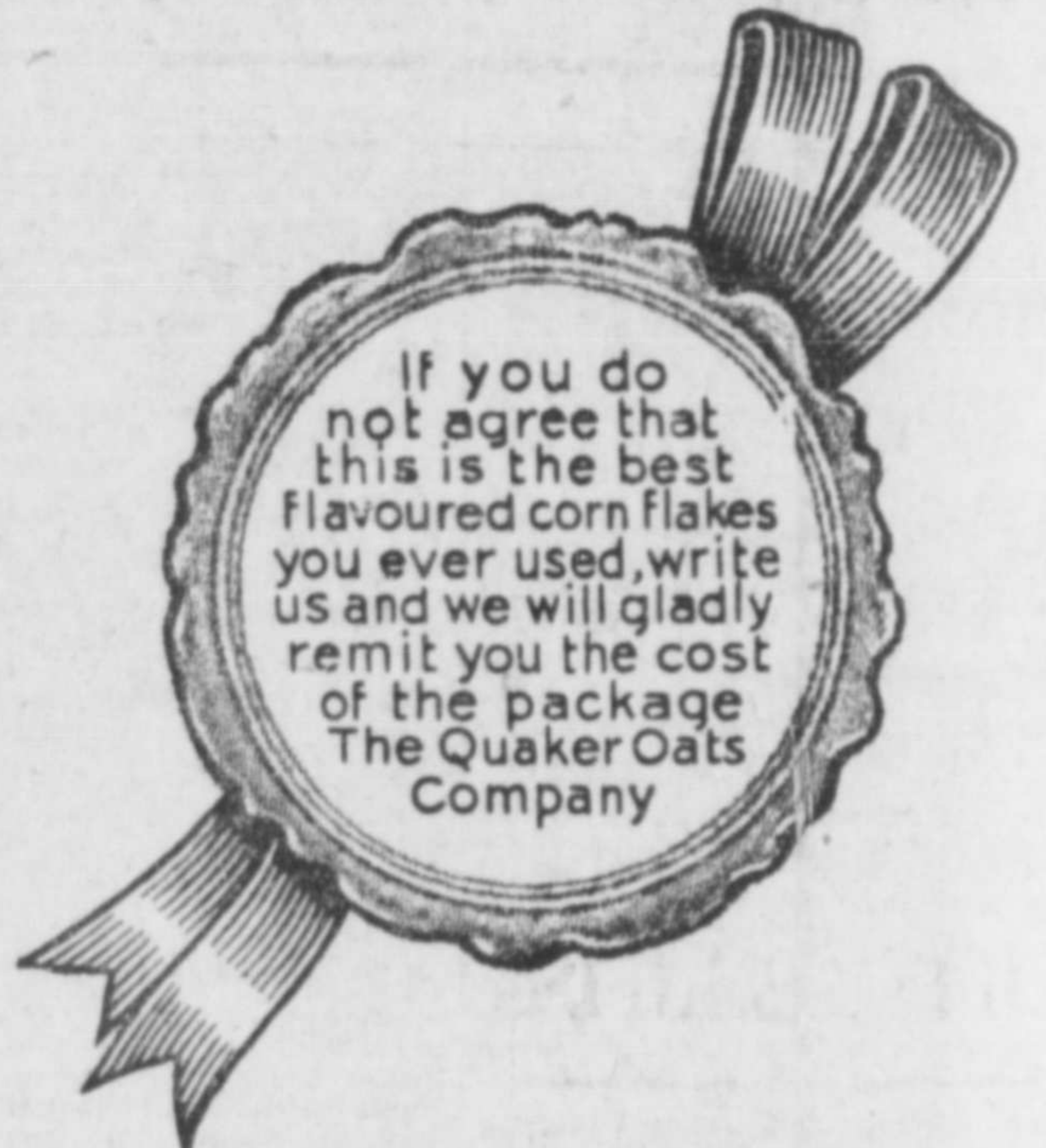
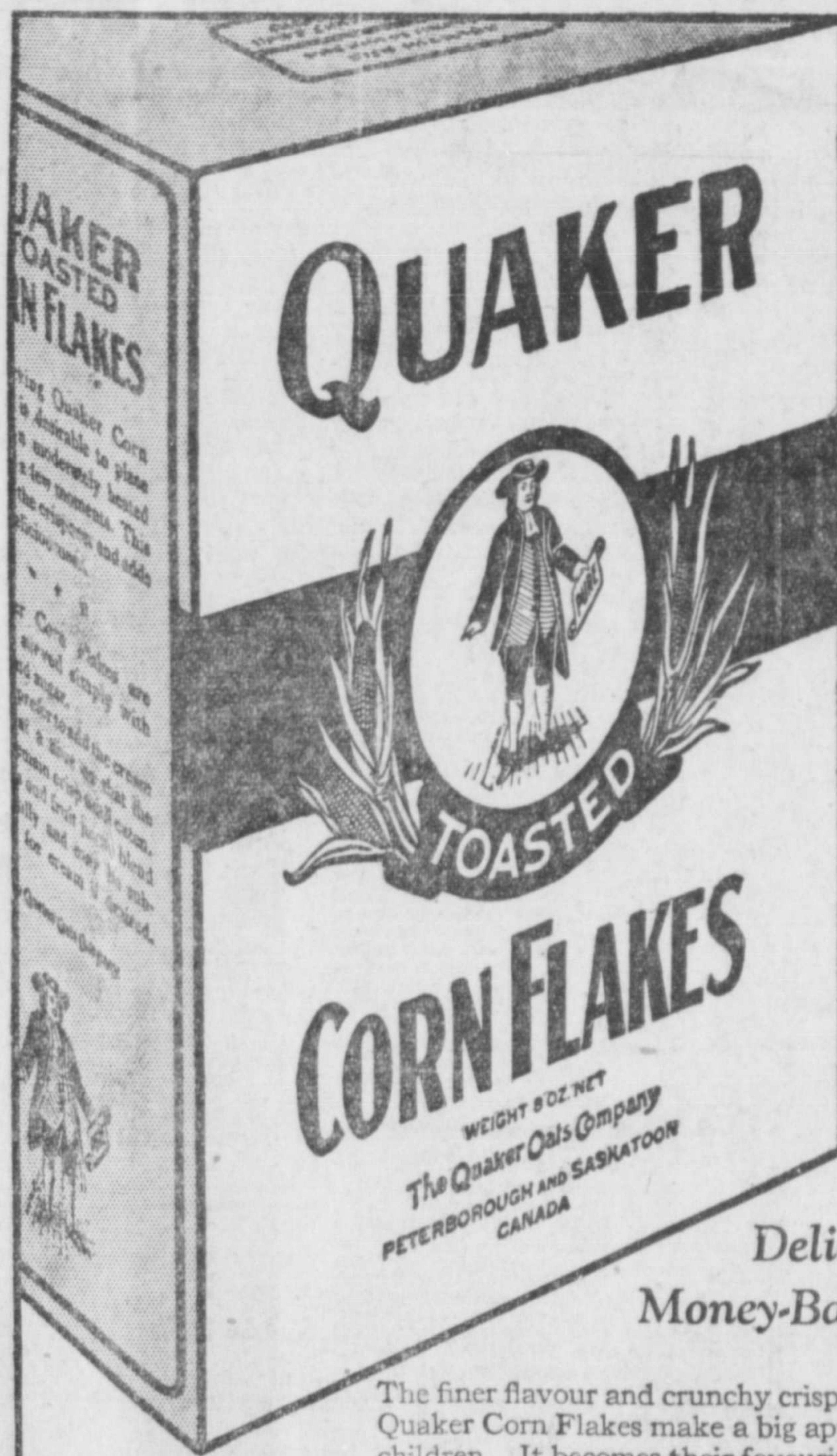
