

COST OF RUNNING CITY THIS YEAR \$248,951.50 ACCORDING TO ESTIMATES

SALE OF CITY LOTS AND PAYMENT OF TAXES BY PROVINCE WILL LIGHTEN BURDEN LATER—TAX RATE OF 14 MILLS NECESSARY

In order to meet the increasing liabilities of the city a tax rate of fourteen mills on the dollar will be necessary this year according to a report of the City Treasurer at the meeting of the City Council last night.

If there is a good sale of city lots and the provincial government cheque comes through, the burden will be lightened very considerably, but in the meantime it is necessary to strike the rate and collect the taxes for this year.

The budget for the year is apportioned as follows: General Administration, \$42,555; Fire Department, 14,512; Health Department, 16,955; Police, 11,985; Engineer and Assessor, 5,125; Public Works, 25,800; Capital, 37,000; Schools, 48,411; Debenture Redemption, 46,608.

MAY REFUSE TO SURRENDER THE FORMER KAISER

Geneva, July 21.—It is reported from Berne that the Dutch Prince Consort has declared that Holland will formally refuse to surrender the former German Emperor if asked. Holland, however, would not hinder him from voluntarily appearing before a tribunal or returning to Germany as, according to Dutch laws, the former monarch is considered a political exile.

RESUME TRADE IN WHEAT FUTURES

Winnipeg, July 22.—Trading in wheat futures has been resumed on the grain exchange after nearly two years of government control. October wheat opened at \$2.26, a drop of 4 1/2 per cent from the guaranteed government price of \$2.24 1/2. The market immediately bobbed up again to \$2.25.

MUCH HALIBUT HERE FROM THE BANKS

The halibut boats are bringing in large catches from the banks for shipment through this port. Yesterday there were a large number in that sold their catches at between 10 and 11 cents. There are a few more here today waiting to sell. The following have come in since yesterday: Atlas, 34,000 pounds; Lincoln, 12,000; Success, 8,000; Helena, 12,000; Cora, 7,000; Valid, 7,000; Teton, 14,000; Trump, 12,000; N. & S., 7,000, and the Nuba, 17,000 pounds.

SOLDIERS WILL RECEIVE LOANS IMMEDIATELY

Twenty-three Have Been Passed By the City Council Already and Others to Follow.

Twenty-three loans of \$2,500 each have now been passed by the City Council for returned soldiers from the Dominion housing grant. Last night seventeen were granted permission to go ahead. They were Walter Stewart, Wilfrid C. Macdonald, E. H. Maynard, Ernest Love, Alex. Holmberg, H. R. Hill, J. F. Hutchinson, W. M. Brown, Alfred J. Galland, A. M. Davis, H. Ward, J. T. Collart, T. C. Chalmers, J. M. Campbell, T. W. Silverides, C. L. Youngman and W. G. Hughes.

The finance committee reported that the tenders of the following returned men has been accepted for lots in Section 2: A. J. Galland, \$340; S. Pringle (2), \$326; J. D. Allen, \$350; G. F. Delgarno, \$275; H. O. Crewe (2), \$710; Theo. Collart (2), \$1,300; J. E. Hutchinson, \$155; George Lee, \$400; Wilfrid Macdonald, \$500.

Serious exception was taken to a recent editorial article in the Empire. Alderman Perry said that it was resented by everyone. No compulsion was being brought to bear on the soldiers, who could build in any part of the city if they wished. The article was a serious and grave reflection on the Council and he personally did not like it. The soldiers had said that the person who wrote the article had got hold of the wrong end of the story.

There are still seven loans to allot, but these will be held back until the men have all returned, in order that they may have an opportunity to participate. The sum of \$50,000 has already been received by the Council and work on the houses will commence immediately.

VICTORIA CROSS MAN ARRESTED

Filip Korowal is Charged With Murder of Austrian Named Artick at Ottawa.

Ottawa, July 21.—Bill Artick, an Austrian living at Hull, was killed by a knife wound by Corporal Filip Korowal, V.C., of the 77th Battalion, the man who led the peace parade. Korowal was arrested and charged with the murder. According to the story of the defendant the blow was struck in self defence.

Korowal is said to be of Russian birth and Artick is reported to be a countryman.

SEVERAL CASES IN LOCAL POLICE COURT

Proprietor of Palace Cafe Fined \$50 for Having Liquor in Possession.

In the police court this morning Dan Devoy, who was charged with being a loose, idle and disorderly fellow, was fined \$15 and costs, or thirty days in default of payment. The man had been drinking lemon extract and was occupying the whole corner at Third Avenue and Sixth Street until the arrival of Constable McGlinchey who had been summoned to the scene and then he started to fight, which caused a great disturbance in front of the Prince Rupert Pool Room whither all the people flocked. Finally after considerable fighting and struggling he was forced into the car and brought to the station.

Lee Tuey a Chinaman who is proprietor of the Palace Cafe was fined \$50 for having liquor in possession other than a private place. The two flasks which were still unbroken were found in a baking powder tin in the back kitchen. The seals were broken in court and the contents tested. It was pronounced to be rye whiskey. Officers Adams and Leek made the raid.

Yesterday morning Police Constable Bailey hurriedly left on the train for one of the canneries up the line. Here he arrested a Chinaman Joe You who had in his possession seven pairs of shoes which it is alleged formerly reposed on the shelves of McArthur's shoe store. The store was broken into a few weeks ago and fourteen pairs were stolen. The case will come up before the local court in a few days.

AMERICAN SHIPS FOR THE PACIFIC

Fleet Divided for First Time as Big Armada Moves Westward.

Old Point Comfort, July 22.—The vanguard of the United States Pacific fleet has sailed for the west coast via the Panama Canal. Six super-dreadnaughts, 30 destroyers and tenders left for the west yesterday afternoon bound west yesterday afternoon bound for Pacific waters. For the first time the fleet has been divided with the exception of an assignment to guard the western coast. The strategic value of the canal is to be fully realized when Admiral Humpredman moves the armada through to the Pacific waters.

ANGLO-FRENCH TREATY PASSED

London, July 22.—The House of Commons unanimously passed the Anglo-French treaty in all its stages yesterday.

VANCOUVER-CALGARY FLIGHT FOR E. O. HALL

Vancouver, July 22.—In an attempt to fly from Vancouver to Calgary Lieut. Ernie Hall plans to leave in a machine provided for the Chilliwack, Kamloops, Princeton flight. He will continue from Princeton to Calgary without a stop.

MARTIAL LAW NECESSARY IN WASHINGTON FOLLOWING TROUBLE WITH NEGROES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, July 22.—A proclamation of martial law may be necessary to end the rioting here. Several days of disorders have followed a wave of attacks on white women, robberies and assaults by negroes.

Following two nights of fighting between whites and negroes, five negroes dashed past the naval hospital in automobiles and fired several shots at the sailors on the grounds. Autos were commandeered and citizens pursued the negroes who escaped.

AMIR'S TROOPS GET CONVOY

Afghans Attack at Various Points in the Khyber Region.

Simla, July 22.—The Afghans resumed attacks at various points in the Khyber region on July 16. It is estimated that 4,000 attacked the British convoy from Lakabanda. The Afghans captured the convoy and two guns. Four British officers were killed and two wounded and there were about 100 casualties in all.

FOREST FIRES IN NELSON DISTRICT

Nelson, B. C., July 22.—At least fifteen square miles of merchantable timber has been burned over in this district from forest fires last week. Several fires are still burning in various sections of British Columbia. The falling barometer indicates coming storms.

RUSSIAN WORKERS ARRESTED BY POLICE

Vancouver, July 22.—Fourteen members of the "Russian Workers" were arrested by the Royal North West Mounted Police on the charge of being members of an organization which is inimical to organized government.

BOLSHEVIKS REFUSE TO RELEASE SWEDES

Stockholm, July 22.—The Bolshevik Government at Petrograd refuses to release five members of the Swedish legation recently arrested. It is believed that representatives of other nations at Petrograd will be arrested.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The Yacht Langara of the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. was in harbor yesterday, having come north on a brief trip from Swanson Bay.

At the City Council meeting last night official notification was received of the appointment of Stewart Percival McMordie as police magistrate at a monthly salary of \$100 to be paid by the city.

There was no football game last evening as enough players did not show up in time. Many of the young fellows were over to the Salt Lake last evening as the fine warm evening made it very attractive for the swimmers.

Yesterday the fish packing boat Zofra put out to sea under the command of Captain McKay who now assumes responsibility since the transfer of Capt. Poole to the Kitgora. Both boats are operating for the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd.

The singing of little Mary Evans, daughter of Dr. Evans, at the Empress Theatre last night was one of the attractive features of the program. She was loudly applauded and recalled again and again. This was just one of the vaudeville stunts.

GAMBLING IS AGAIN SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION

Resolution Passed by City Council Asks the Mayor to Take Steps to Suppress the Evil.

"That the mayor take the necessary steps to suppress gambling in the city forthwith," was the text of a resolution passed by the City Council last night.

The question of the right of the City Council to deal with the matter and the powers of the mayor as apart from his position of chairman of the Police Commission were discussed and it was decided that as mayor he had the right to give orders to the police as the chief executive of the city. Alderman Perry referred to recent letters which he had written and intimated that he could go stronger yet if required to do so. It was well to understand where the City Council, the Mayor and the Police Commission stood. He thought the passing of the resolution might bring the matter to a speedy head.

Tolerated Robbery.

The question of what kind of gambling they wished to suppress brought from the mover of the resolution, Alderman Casey, the statement that everyone knew what a gambling house was. These were the houses that should be suppressed. When a house was operated for the purpose of gambling it was a tolerated method of robbery. It would be easy enough to suppress them if they wanted to do so. If there was not sufficient authority they could go to the provincial government. It was a funny kind of democracy if the clubs were above the law. They were in business for the skinning the workers. They were not run for the benefit of the workers, but for the purpose of fleecing them. In no sense were they beneficial to the workers.

Prove Rake-Off.

The mayor stated that it was necessary to prove a rake-off before action could be taken. "What we want is that you shall instruct Chief Vickers," said Alderman Perry.

There was a long discussion after which the motion was carried.

SWITZERLAND AND LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Geneva, July 22.—A committee of Swiss experts considering the League of Nations adopted a resolution favoring Switzerland's membership in the league by a vote of 24 to 2.

Healthy Outdoor Sport is Needed.

The one thing that Prince Rupert has needed for a long time past has been more healthy outdoor sport. To tell the people they must not gamble, they must not loaf, they must not do a hundred and one other things is useless unless a substitute is provided.

A group of local men get together and try to arrange for baseball. In order to insure the visit of outside teams it is necessary to play two games and one of these has been arranged for Sunday. Then the authorities step in and say they must not play the game on Sunday afternoon. It does not interfere with going to church, neither does it interfere with the peace of mind of anyone. It is far enough away from the houses for the cheering to be innocuous. No one can be contaminated.

The value of the games lies in the inspiration to young boys who are learning the game and who wish to become expert. There are at present many youngsters who are taking a keen interest in this form of sport. They have formed teams of their own and play matches and seem likely to redeem the city from its condition of apathy in regard to healthy sport.

With all due respect for authority there is grave doubt if anybody has power to interfere and it is a pity that they should have the will. We cannot all think alike. The vast majority seldom or never go to church and the church goer must realize it. There are hundreds in this city who think it more to the advantage of any person to watch a keen game on Sunday than to sit and listen to a sermon that sends them to sleep. They may not be right, but they have as much right to their opinion as the rest of us. As we said yesterday there are other things much more important than stopping a baseball match. If the match will get the boys away from some of their sordid surroundings for a time it is well worth playing. The churches have tried and have failed. Give the ball game a chance.

Section Two as Residential District.

The City Council last night made it clear that no attempt had been made either by the city or provincial authorities to make the returned soldiers build their houses in Section 2. The suggestion came from the returned men themselves who recognized that Section 2 was one of the finest parts of the city in which to live. This is proved by the fact that so many of them have already purchased lots there on which they intend to build.

The plans and specifications for the new bridge to Section 2 are still under consideration. There are a number of interests to consult. One of these is the G. T. P. which has a right of way beneath, and the other is the provincial government that is helping to build it. That takes time. As soon as the plans have been approved by everyone it is the general hope that work on the bridge will be pushed forward so that it may be erected before the bad weather sets in. With the building of the bridge Section 2 will be very desirable as a place of residence.

Great Harvest From the Sea.

There is a good run of sockeye salmon in progress and both fishermen and cannerymen are making good money. At Essington and other points everyone is working night and day to take care of this unusual harvest.

Halibut fishing has been unusually good this year. Unfortunately the strike came at the time when it was at its best and the harvest was lost. Weather conditions have been so good that fishermen have been able to get good results, much better than last year.

Compare this fruitful harvest here with the harvest on some parts of the prairies where the farmers will not reap enough wheat to provide seed for next year and we realize how lucky we are. It is our year.

Imagine a condition under which there is no income for a whole year and no grain with which to sow next year's crop and you have the condition of many prairie farmers this year in Alberta and Saskatchewan. In British Columbia the crops are good, whether it be hay, grain or fish. Surely we are the chosen people.

HUGE GROUND SHARK ATTRACTS ATTENTION

Ten Foot Monster of the Deep on Display in Front of Store. Many Other Varieties.

There was great interest shown down town last evening in front of Frizzell's meat shop where a large ground shark reposed on the sidewalk. It was quite dead but it was with some reluctance that some of the passersby stepped up and touched the flabby monster. It measured a full ten feet from tip of tail to snout. A large fleshy creature it was which quivered all over when touched. Its opened mouth showed two sets of teeth and when the jaws were spread a human being would have fitted very neatly between them. Sharks are not at all uncommon and the fishermen in hauling their skates often get one caught on a hook and in its struggle to get away it twists itself into the gear. Then they have to cut the fish clear of all the lines and it drops to the bottom dead.

In Frizzell's window there was a very interesting collection of smaller fish such as the dog fish, grey cod, rock cod, bass, etc. There was a particularly fine large skate which nearly covered the whole window. Funny creatures they all were from the brightly colored starfish and the ugly little rat fish to the large and lazy ground shark.

YACHT DOLAURA WAS IN PORT YESTERDAY

Was Formerly Owned by James Dunsmuir, Now Property of American Millionaire.

Early yesterday afternoon the palatial steam yacht Dolaura arrived in port, having called in here on the way north to Skagway. The yacht which was formerly owned by James Dunsmuir, the Vancouver Island coal baron, left Esquimalt a few days ago for Seattle and picked up her new owner, Arthur Meeker, a millionaire of Chicago. He brought his own complement of stewards from Chicago. All the members of the crew are very tidily attired with sweaters and caps marked "Victoria," which is the new name of the vessel under Canadian registry.

The Dolaura which is acknowledged to be one of the finest yachts on the Pacific coast, was fitted out with wireless in Seattle. It will take about a month to make the round trip and on her return south the party will disembark at Seattle, the boat going round to New York via the Panama Canal. Here she will be fitted out as an oil burner and it is the intention to sail to Europe next year. Captain Jacobsen who has spent many years aboard private yachts is in command, while Lieutenant Shepherd is first mate, and Capt. Hawes, a local mariner, is second mate. Chief Engineer A. W. Graves who came out with the ship from the old country, still reigns supreme in the engine room.

NELL SHIPMAN IN GREAT PRODUCTION

It was a stirring, swift-moving drama of the big woods that was shown last night at the Empress Theatre and will be repeated tonight. Especial interest centres in Barea, half wolf and half dog, protege, protector, and finally the avenger of Nepeese.

MILITARY RIOTS AT LUTON, ENGLAND

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Luton, England, July 22.—The military forces restored order after rioting on Saturday which culminated in the burning of the city hall. The trouble began when the demobilized soldiers protested during a local peace parade against the mayor's refusal to grant the use of the public park for a meeting in which pensions grievances were to be discussed. The demonstrators burned the town hall and wrecked several shops. Many persons were injured.
