Washington, July 22.--- A proclamation of martial law may be necessary to end the rioting here. Several days of disorders have followed a wave of attacks on white women, robberies and assaults by negroes.

Following two nights of fighting between whites and negroes, five negroes dashed past the naval hospital in automobiles and fired several shots at the sailors on the grounds. Autos were commandeered and citizens pursued the negroes who escaped.
