### Freighter Laurel Broke in Two on Columbia Spit---One Life Lost

ASTORIA, June 17.—One sailor lost his life when the freighter Laurel piled up on the sandspit at the mouth of the Columbia River yesterday. Eighteen members of the crew were rescued by the life-saving crew, while the captain and seven men still remain aboard the ship today with the storm still raging.

The Laurel broke in two as she pounded on the spit. Two coastguard vessels are standing by in an effort to remove the remainder of the crew, who seemingly were in no great danger as the seas subsided.



The same paper in the same editorial has the following:

There is a very strong feeling existing that the new province idea is purely a plan to embarass the new Conservative government at Victoria, and as Hon. T. D. Pattullo, leader of the opposition, was going east for some weeks it was felt this question was as safe as any for his zealous henchmen to work on during his absence. But the leader of the opposition is again in Victoria, and if he is as wise a politician as most of us believe him to be, he will soon put the soft peddle on any new province scheme.

We would remind readers that the movement was loouver. started a number of years ago by Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., or, at any rate, given some impetus by him when speaking before the Board of Trade here. For a long time it simmered slowly, being mentioned now and then, and his mother, who is ill. and will then looked on only as a last resort against discrimination. Today the movement has been accentuated by the neglect of the Government at Victoria to continue work on the Skeena River highway, something which we are inclined to think even the writer of the article quoted would not support.

This paper has so far not committed itself to any line of action in connection with the movement, although we have given it such publicity as seemed warranted. If it becomes necessary we shall campaign in favor of it, but perhaps it may not become necessary. Much will depend on the manner in which the north is treated by the south.

There is today undoubtedly a growing feeling in favor of the formation of a new province for the north, the prevailing idea being that the north is being bled for the purpose of developing the south. If this is proved to be correct, then it is time for action. If it is shown to be incorrect, there is no more to be said. An inquiry will be beneficial in any case.

#### CHILDREN ON THE STREET

The danger of children playing in the middle of the street is often the subject of complaint, but what is more dangerous is the foolhardy actions of a great many children in trying to run across the road in front of a car, or in refusing to move out of the road when they hear a car coming. One of these days there will be another accident and then for a time at least the children will be warned and there will be a large margin of safety.

Driving in Prince Rupert is most difficult, for a great many children seem to have no sense of responsibility. Immediately a car driver goes at all fast or does anything wrong he is pulled up, but the chief cause of danger does not lie with the car drivers, but with careless people and especially children. One case is reported of a child that lay in the middle of the road and refused to get up, so known whitehorse mercantile that the car had to pull up in order to save his life. Pan ents would do well to caution their progeny. Often it is children from homes of the more well to do who are mos' careless.




The coreopsis is a calliopsis when is an annual and a coreopsis when it a perennial. Botanically both corcopsis with distinctive trade names. Both are beautiful and indispensable garden plants. The calliopsis is a brilliant annual noted for the velvety richness of its red and brown tones and for the brilliant contrast of a red center and yellow edging in some of the varieties as well as handsome marbled effects. Both are beautiful material for cutting.

The greater variety of color is found in the annual form. It is a plant that must be sown where it is to bloom as it does not stand transplanting well. There are dwarf sorts which make miniature bushes literally covered with bloom. They are for garden display. The taller types give fine long stems for cutting. The calliopsis are not particular as to soil and will flourish anywhere. Their one need is full sun.

The perennial coreopsis is one of the finest yellows for cut flowers in the garden with stems a foot or more in length. Recently hybridists have produced new perennial varieties which have the red centers of the annual types. They are just entering the seed trade and will be with us in another year or so.




