

## CAPTAIN KINGSFORD SMITH AND HIS COMPANIONS FOUND

## Terrific Rain in Ontario Wrecks 2 Locomotives and Causes Floods in Many Parts of that Province

Even Streets of Toronto Made Impassable by Deluge; Rivers Swollen to Overflowing; States South of Lakes Affected

TORONTO, April 6.—Reports trickling in from outlying sections today showed a toll from a wild rainstorm last night as five known dead, one missing and unconfirmed reports indicating that as many as eight persons lost their lives. Miss Helen Wright of Peterboro and either Walter Northrop of Peterboro or his son, Harry, were drowned when their automobile went through the bridge at Harmony Creek, Ontario.

Engineer Milne of the Canadian National train No. 20 from Toronto to Montreal reported a missing locomotive believed to have overturned a mile east of Bowmanville with the engineer underneath.

J. Kennedy, engineer of the Canadian Pacific freight train, was killed when he was pinned underneath a locomotive when it left the rails two miles east of Bowmanville.

John Miller, aged 40, of Ormerod, Ontario, lost his life when his truck plunged through the bridge over Rouge River, east of here, and Oran Cook, aged 13, was drowned in flood waters near Painswick. A rumor that two were drowned in floods near Brantford is being investigated.

The streets in Toronto are impassable and washed out in places.



## Cost of Loading Ships With Grain at Rupert Less Than Vancouver

Board of Trade Hears Report From the Grain Committee Showing Where Recently Published Figures Were Wrong

That the cost of loading ships at Prince Rupert is considerably less than at Vancouver was the information conveyed to the Board of Trade last night at its dinner meeting by J. H. Pillsbury, on behalf of the grain committee of the board. He went into the matter in detail, with particular reference to an article recently published in the Vancouver Province which purported to show that the cost was less at Vancouver. There was one item, that of cargo rate of six cents a ton not
