Great Coal Miners' Strike is Continuing in England with Little Abatement in Sight

Men Return to Save Mines from Destruction But Yorkshire Remains Out; Military Intervention is much Discussed and Publication of Secret Circular makes Sensation.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 24.—The fourth day of the great coal miners' strike brought no sign of a settlement. Almost 25,000 men have laid down their tools. There are 10,000 out at Nottingham and Derby, while 10,000 in Monmouth and 7,500 of Lancashire workers went back to save the mines from destruction.

Premier Lloyd George and several members of the cabinet conferred with the miners yesterday and the premier will probably meet the officers of the Miners' Federation today.

The triple alliance of labor, composed of railwaymen, transportation workers and miners, met in London behind closed doors and registered a vote of 217 to 11 against conscription participation campaigns and the intervention of the military force in Trades Union disputes.

The most important news of the day is that soldiers are to be used to protect the sailors working at the mines. The use of military force for any purpose connected with the strikes is a policy which the unions bitterly oppose, and have made their opposition the chief planks in their platform.

The disclosure of a labor paper recently of a secret circular which the War Office sent to officers stating what would be the attitude of soldiers in the event of their being called upon for strike breaking has produced a sensation.

The pumping and engine men of three southern Yorkshire collieries apparently on their own initiative have offered to resume work. Ten thousand men on strike besides, have offered operatives to return to keep the works open to prevent floods.

SERIOUS CIVIL DISTURBANCES IN OLD COUNTRY

Police Have to Take Strenuous Measures to Prevent Injury to Life and Property.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 24.—Civilian disturbances have been as destructive as anything committed by the military. At Swindon gangs of youths and discharged Imperial soldiers looted twenty business houses. At Luton, where the town hall was burned, the disturbances were quelled by the police. At Coventry many shops were attacked and forty persons injured, some dangerously, and police assistance was sought from Birmingham. At Bilston the mob tore down a wall and used the bricks as missiles against the police.

\$100,000 DAMAGES FIRE IN KENTUCKY

Louisville, July 23.—The business section of Marion, Ky., has been wiped out by fire. The damage is estimated at \$100,000. The whole town is threatened with destruction.

Montreal, July 24.—President Craig Campbell of the Dominion Football Association has received a wire from Con Jones who is at Calgary stating that British Columbia and Alberta could be counted out of the Connaught Cup competition this year owing to shortage of time to make the necessary arrangements.

MANY FINED FOR ILLEGAL FISHING

Yesterday afternoon in the Provincial Police Court before Magistrate McMullin a number of cases came up for trial of men who had been fishing contrary to law.

Robert Nelson, an Indian, was fined ten dollars for fishing at the mouth of Shawatlans Creek. F. Inougi, B. Hamade, T. Wanade, S. Ksachi, all Japanese, and H. Evans and S. Martinson, white men, were each fined ten dollars for fishing during the weekly close season.

T. Konish and J. Jingoro, both Japanese, and Olaf Hammer, a white man, were each fined ten dollars for fishing with a net over 200 fathoms long.

In each case the boat and gear was confiscated.

STRIKE IN ITALY PROVES FAILURE

Rome, July 23.—Official reports from all parts of Italy show that the proposed strike was a complete failure. Calm prevails everywhere and the public services are in normal operation.

MANY VISITORS HERE SATURDAY

Board of Trade Members From Vancouver and Victoria Are Expected.

Word has been received by the Board of Trade Commissioner that at least sixty members of the Vancouver and Victoria Boards of Trade will arrive here on Saturday morning. On their arrival they will be met by President McCaffery and a local delegation and will be driven around the city in automobiles. Returning to the boat for lunch they will then be taken around the harbor on the Crosby and other launches and at 8 p.m. will be entertained at a Prince Rupert fish dinner in the Central Hotel. Short addresses will be given here and the party will leave for Granby at midnight where they will be entertained.

On Sunday night at 10:30 a special train will bear the visitors east to Smithers and Telkwa from which point they will see the valley in motor cars. Vanderhoof will be another stopping point and Prince George will be reached on Tuesday night.

Any local people wishing to take the round trip to Prince George can arrange to do so, arriving home on the train Thursday evening.

PRINCE WILL VISIT STATES

After his visit to Canada, the Prince of Wales will go to Washington and later make a brief visit to New York.

TITLES MUCH DISCUSSED IN GREAT BRITAIN WHERE CROFT CHARGES SCANDAL

POLITICIANS AND OTHERS OF NOTORIOUS CHARACTER SECURE RECOGNITION FROM CROWN—NEW NATIONALIST PARTY TAKES MATTER UP

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 24.—The tender spot in British political life is the dispensation of titles. The new Nationalist party has taken up the question.

Page Croft charges that a member of Parliament was created a peer after the beginning of the war and subscribed shortly after a large sum of money to a newspaper that supports the peerage.

He further says that titles were granted to a politician of so notorious a character as to be unfit to be a candidate for parliament, to another politician regarded as unscrupulous and to a third man previously involved in a notorious social scandal.

Page Croft offered to prove all the charges he made.

MACKENZIE KING WANTS CANADIAN BATTLE SCENES

Ottawa, July 24.—The Government of Canada should take immediate action to obtain adequate stretches of land on sites of the most famous battles in which the Canadians were concerned in France and Belgium," said W. L. Mackenzie King on his return from England.

McLearty, sister of Mrs. Frank Moore of this city, succeeded in getting the required number of marks with a total of 722.

FISH ARRIVALS IN PORT THIS MORNING

This morning the White Star is in port with 15,000 lbs. of halibut, the Maghnel, 6,000; Haysport No. 2, 20,000; Mary M. Christopher, 8,000 lbs. The catches will not be sold until tomorrow morning. The Lillian S. arrived in from the grounds with 600 lbs. of red salmon and 300 cohoes. The catch was sold to Oceanic Cannery at 60 cents for cohoes and the red salmon at 13.20.

Run of Sockeyes Continues and Humpbacks Coming in Large Numbers.

The salmon run in the Skeena continues unabated. The sockeyes are coming in large numbers and humpbacks are also running. This means that every fisherman is making good money and the canneries are getting practically all the fish they want.

Reports received today says that the average per boat is 70 outside the river and 100 inside. Some very large catches have been reported, the record for the season being 700 in 24 hours.

There are conflicting reports from the Queen Charlottes. This season has been pretty good so far on the whole, there having been a good catch of spring salmon.

Lenine Proves To Be Clever Man. Czar Lenine, head of the Russian Bolshevik Soviet government, is a very clever man. He has all the qualifications for leadership under the conditions which exist in his country today. He has adopted all the old time deplomacy and absolutism against which the Russians fought. Yesterday news came that he had offered terms of peace to the Roumanians on condition that he secure their support against the Ukrainians and troops of Kolchak. It was a good diplomatic move and one that may prove successful. The difficulty in regard to Russia is getting reliable news. Those who sympathize with the Bolsheviks will not believe anything bad about them and those opposed will not believe anything good. The probability is that Lenine means to govern well, but he is forced by stress of circumstances to adopt old time methods. From the most reliable news that comes through, Lenine is an autocrat, just as autocratic as Czar Nicholas was, only of a different type and more diplomatic.

What is Future Of Unionism? What is to be the future of Unionism? That is a question which many people are asking themselves today. When the Empire was in danger Canada set herself to help and gave up all side issues to centre on the one big job. Now the job is completed and it remains to be seen whether the men with diametrically opposed views will stay together or if there will be a general break up and a setting back into the old groups. It goes without saying that there will be some disintegration, but just how much no one knows. The Liberal party is to have a big convention in August at which a policy will be adopted which will be more or less of a compromise between the advanced section and those who believe in moving not too fast. Policies are always evolved as a result of compromise. Delegates will meet from every part of the country and as a result of the discussions that will take place the thought of the Liberals of the country will be crystallized into something definite for which the party as a whole will work. It is confidently expected and much to be desired that a considerable number of Liberal Unionists will take part in that convention.

Government Failure To Control Prices. It was announced recently that government control of food prices had ceased. With government control we all know what happened. Prices have soared higher and higher until the limit has been reached. People have been charged all they could stand without bringing about actual rebellion. It would be interesting to speculate as to what the condition might have been had the Dominion Government taken no hand in the matter of prices. As a matter of fact government control was only a joke. The profiteers charged just what they wished and all unholy hands were warned off. The government fell down badly on the matter of control of prices. They proved themselves to be anything but strong and as a result the country suffered. It was a difficult situation, all must admit that, but the government did not rise to the occasion. Even its strongest supporters will admit it. They were ready to take the line of least resistance and that they did. The food controller never controlled to any extent, and the control of excess profits was a big joke except to the one who paid the bill, which was the consumer.

HIGH-GRADE ORE ON BIG MISSOURI

Rich Samples of Native Silver are Taken into Stewart by William Noble.

Word of a strike of very high grade ore on the E Pluribus claim of the Big Missouri group was brought down from the property yesterday by William Noble, says the Stewart paper. He also brought samples of the highgrade which appears to be of the same character of ore as is found in the Premier. The ore is thick with native silver and argentite.

Mr. Noble also brought a piece of the highgrade which had landed in the blacksmith's forge following the shot which disclosed it. The heat of the fire drew beads of silver to the surface, making a very pretty sample which with other samples has been sent to Sir Donald Mann, head of the Pacific Exploration Co. which has the property under bond.

The ore was found in the new open cut started this summer 300 feet north of the cook tent on the Silver Creek side. The highgrade is exposed by a crosscut open cut six feet deep and 25 feet long with no footwall yet. This is the best open cut developed thus far. It was only during the past week that the cut was deepened and in course of this work the highgrade was struck.

There are 25 open cuts on the E Pluribus claim, all in good ore which has returned high assays. Development is under direction of Charles F. Sturtevant, a well known engineer who arrived here a few weeks ago.

How Everyone Can Help

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and farming supervision.

They can lend him an extra horse or plough, give him a day's help at seeding or harvest time, and extend to him that friendly, neighborly, respectful spirit which he deserves.

In this way Canada is performing a double duty. It is discharging, as far as possible, the debt we owe to our soldiers; and it is adding to the country's chief industry a body of competent, willing producers.

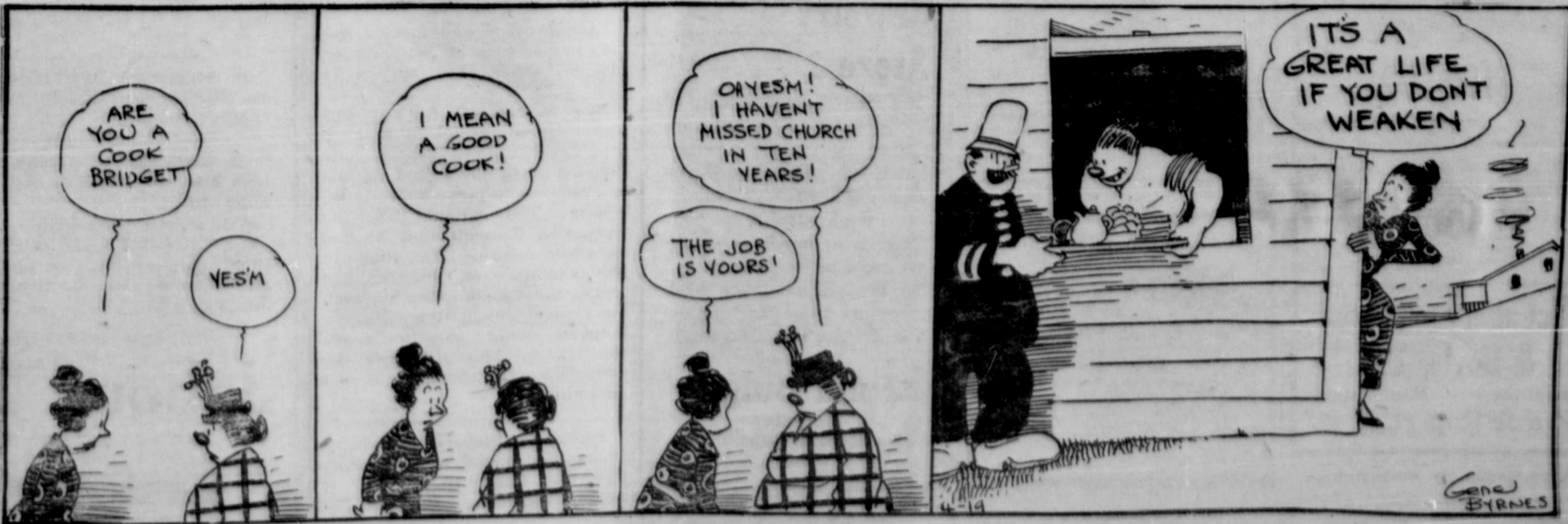
