Liner Fort Victoria Sank when Struck at Entrance of New York Harbor in Fog---All Aboard Safe of the death a few days ago in Seat-

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 .- Rammed by another vessel at the fog-blanketed entrance to New York harbor, a liner sank last night, but not before all the passengers and members of the crew had been taken off without loss of life.

With 82 passengers aboard, the Furness Bermuda liner Fort Victoria was struck a blow by the Galveston-bound liner Algonquin with 189 passengers aboard.

An SOS brought immediate help and several hours after the crash when all aboard had been removed, the Fort Victoria sank.

The Algonquin was slightly damaged.

DIED FROM EXPOSURE

Aged Woman in Forest Grove District Perished For Lack of Fuel

WILLIAMS LAKE, Dec. 19 .- Mrs. Sarah J. Page, 92 years of age, died at the hospital here, a victim of exposure. She and her daughter. Mrs. J. Sugden, suffered when left alone in their cabin in the Forest Grove district. The two women, the daughter convalescing from broken thigh bone, were found Sunday almost frozen. The daughter is recovering.

On Thursday the young woman who helped them for a few days left for Vancouver. The last of their scanty fuel supply was burned on Friday afternoon. Half an hour after the fire was out, everything in the cabin was frozen solid.

Mrs. Sugden, unable to gather wood, kept rubbing her mother's hands, begging her to keep moving to prevent freezing A neighbor found them Sunday.

The conference is the outcome of *---approaches made to United States following the failure of a previous conference conducted by the Bald-win Government, when Great Britain, United States and Japan tried to decide on a policy of restricting the building of war vessels. At that time Britain and United States could not agree, each blaming the other for holding out.
