

Sanitary in World and Milk Will Keep

LONDON, Aug. 13:-It has taken seven years of research and has cost over 120,000 pounds to produce the perfect milk bottle. But it has been done. Already the new bottle is being used by one big London dairy.

Milk delivery has long been the greatest problem of the conscientious dairyman. When it comes pure and free from the germs of infection as rigid inspection, perfect cleanliness and hygienic management can make it. It is in milking shed to kitchen that it so often becomes contaminated, with results that are seen in rapid souring, infantile diarrhoea and the like.

The present glass bottles are open to many objections. They are used over and over again, and although the best dairymen take every precaution to sterilize them before they are filled, the consumer has no guarantee that they are sufficiently well sterilized. 




