## BRITISH GOVERNMENT WILL NOT BRING EX-KAISER TO TRIAL SAYS BUCKMASTER

### GRAVE REASONS WHY GOVERNMENT SHOULD NOT PURSUE PROJECT—PEACE TREATY PASSES AFTER ILLUMINATING DISCUSSION IN HOUSE OF LORDS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 25.—The House of Lords passed the peace treaty and Anglo-French treaty yesterday.

Viscount Bryce said he expected there would have been included in the treaty a clause providing for the trial of the former German Emperor.

Baron Buckmaster said there were grave reasons why the Government ought not to pursue any project for trying the German War Lord. It was unfitting to ask an English judge to sit on a tribunal to administer a law he did not know and in a court he did not control.

Earl Curzon expressed the opinion that the Kaiser in exile was in no way comparable with Charles I. or Napoleon. He was unable to think that a man who ignominiously fled from his country could be turned into a martyr or hero by a trial, while his continued presence near the German border might be politically dangerous.

## HON. W. J. SLOAN VISITS MINES NEAR STEWART

### Transportation Must be Solved in That District Says Minister On His Return.

When Hon. W. J. Sloan represented this constituency in the Dominion Parliament he told the members at Ottawa that Prince Rupert was destined to become a great city and the largest fishing port in Canada. He was here again yesterday as Minister of Mines in the Provincial Government and he is still as optimistic as ever. He has just visited Stewart and he is now up the line with A. M. Manson, M. P. P., making some calls at the mining centres in the Omineca district. Speaking of his visit to Stewart Mr. Sloan said that good progress was being made on the Provincial Government road connecting Stewart with Hyder. It would be finished in about five or six weeks and should be a great convenience to those living or operating in the district.

### Visited Properties.

Mr. Sloan went up the Salmon river and visited the principal properties. The Government is spending some money in opening up that district and he is anxious to see that the money was being well spent. He visited the Mineral Hill, Joker, Big Missouri, Pleuribus and Unum, and the Premier. At the last mentioned he found extensive showings at the 500 foot level and at the 200 foot level they were also in ore. The Premier would undoubtedly be a big shipper.

At the Big Missouri there were good surface showings and the Joker looked well. There was a good deal of snow in the country and the short season was a handicap. The difficulties of transportation would have to be overcome. Already there was a sleigh road to the Premier mine and work was proceeding to convert it into a wagon road.

On Cascade Creek they hoped to have a sleigh road before winter in order that machinery and supplies might be taken in.

### Prospects Bright.

Mr. Sloan said that reports from all over British Columbia showed that the prospects were never brighter than at present. He visited the coking plant at Anyox, the coal for which came from the Cassidy mine on Vancouver Island and he was pleased to see that it was a good coke.

Mr. Sloan expects to return here on Sunday evening and go south on the Prince Rupert.

## JESS WILLARD BUYS BIG FARM IN KANSAS

Topeka, Kansas, July 25.—Jess Willard, the former heavyweight champion boxer, has purchased a seven hundred acre farm near Lawrence for which he paid \$100,000 cash, which was his share of the profits from the recent big fight in which he was knocked out by Dempsey.

## BIG LINERS TO CROSS OCEAN IN FOUR DAYS

### United States Shipping Board to Build Vessels 1,000 feet Long, Speed 30 Knots.

Washington, July 25.—The United States Shipping Board proposes building two gigantic liners which will be able to cross the Atlantic in four days. They will be 1,000 feet long and will have a speed of thirty knots an hour and in event of war will be used as commerce destroyers.

## STRIKERS MAY BE VICTIMS ON LINE

### Portuguese Minister of War Takes Novel Method of Protecting Trains.

Lisbon, July 25.—A car filled with strikers will be placed at the head of all railway trains traveling over Portuguese railroads to guarantee safe passage. This action was taken by the Minister of War after a section of the track was torn up by strikers in an attempt to wreck a train.

## LIBERALS CAPTURE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BY LARGE MAJORITY OF TWENTY-TWO

### CONSERVATIVE LANDSLIDE IN ISLAND PROVINCE IN WHICH ONLY FOUR OF PARTY ARE SAVED FROM POLITICAL EXTINCTION

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 25.—Complete election returns from Prince Edward Island show that 26 Liberals and four Conservatives are returned. This is a complete turnover and is thought to indicate the way the country will go when it gets an opportunity. At the last election the Conservatives won out by a majority of eleven, headed by Mr. Matheson, now Chief Justice Matheson.

Among those elected was Premier Arsenault and Bell, the leader of the opposition who now will become the premier.

Only two members of the executive weathered the landslide in addition to the Premier. These were McNeill, commissioner of Public Works, and Kennedy, without portfolio. K. N. Stewart is the fourth Conservative elected.

## FIGHTING IN EGYPT CAUSES MANY DEATHS

### Native Casualties Number 2, and 1,000 Sentenced to Imprisonment for Taking Part.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 25.—Eight hundred natives were killed and 1,600 wounded during recent disturbances in Egypt, according to dispatches from General Allenby. The death sentence was imposed on 39 natives, detention for life, 26, and upwards of one thousand were sentenced to imprisonment.

## MINERS WILL SETTLE BUT ON OWN TERMS

### Lloyd George and Executive of Coal Miners Met and Discussed Situation.

London, July 25.—The executive of the Miners' Federation met Premier Lloyd George and other members of the Government yesterday morning in an effort to settle the dispute in the Yorkshire coal fields.

A representative of the miners said: "Of course we are ready for a settlement but not on the Government's own terms."

## SUNDAY BASEBALL IS LEGAL IF NO ADMISSION CHARGE, SAYS THE CITY SOLICITOR

### MATTER DISCUSSED AT LENGTH BY POLICE COMMISSION YESTERDAY—MAYOR WILL TRY TO STOP GAME IF PERMISSION GIVEN BY ATTORNEY-GENERAL

It is perfectly legal to play baseball or any other game on Sunday as long as there is no charge for admission direct or indirect. Even if an admission fee is charged there can be no prosecutions without the consent of the Attorney-General. Prince Rupert people have a perfect right to play games on the Athletic grounds at any time but no charge can be made without securing a concession from the City council. If patrons of the game like to put up so much each in order to bring players here and the game is open to everyone that would not be considered as a charge for admission to the game either direct or indirect. There were some of the solutions to knotty questions that came up at the meeting of the police commission yesterday afternoon. W. E. Williams, acting city solicitor, was present in an advisory capacity.

### Not Consent.

The matter was brought up by Commissioner Macdonald who spoke in favor of allowing the ball game on Sunday next. He personally would not consent to the prosecution of those who played. He was, opposed making Sunday an open day, but there was no more harm in a game of baseball than in going to the Salt Lakes or in shooting or fishing. He thought it would be discrimination to prevent the game.

Commissioner Hill expressed the opinion that the park was public and anyone could go there. He took a similar view to Commissioner Macdonald. He favored allowing anyone to play on Sunday at any time but there must be no charge for admission.

Mr. Williams in answer to a question said that the Supreme Court of Alberta had decided that taking a collection on the ground was not a charge for admission either direct or indirect. The British Columbia courts might, however, take a different view.

### Ninety per cent in Favor.

Mr. Macdonald said that he had tried to get the opinion of the people on Sunday baseball and he found about ninety per cent favored it. In fact he had met only one person who was against it. The people here wanted something to do. The team were all local boys. In the west they should take a broad view of the question. It was also illegal to hire a boat or to sell anything. He would oppose any step to stop the game.

The mayor told of Ben Self coming to him and asking for his views on Sunday games, saying that unless they could play on Sunday they could not finance the games. He told Mr. Self he was against it. Sunday sport he considered was not a British institution. He advised him to wire the teams not to come.

### Open Defiance.

"Ben Self, knowing my views and my having been elected by the people as their representative, went to work and pulled off the game," said the Mayor. "I told him he need not come to me any more. He had ignored me and I did not want any dealings with him."

"Have you not been hunting on Sunday?" inquired Commissioner Macdonald.

"No you never saw me out on Sunday."

"Didn't I see you carrying a deer home on Sunday?"

"No, not on Sunday."

### Ill Advised.

Mr. Macdonald said that Ben Self was undoubtedly ill advised in the way he had acted. Ben had put up a lot of money for sport, however, and he had gone in the hole over baseball.

The mayor intimated that if he received the sanction of the attorney general there would be no game on Sunday, but if that was not forthcoming no action could be taken.

## BLOCKADE IS KEPT AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI

### Warships Prevent Raids on Baltic States and to Interfere With Food Distribution.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 25.—In the House of Commons the Right Hon. Walter Hume Long, First Lord of the Admiralty, stated that the British warships kept the blockade in order to prevent unprovoked Bolshevik raids on the Baltic states and Finland and interference with the feeding of the population and the spread of Bolshevik militarism.

Mr. Long said that the British naval force had been operating in the Caspian Sea since August, 1918, against many Bolshevik armed merchantmen destroyers and submarines.

## GOVERNMENT TO PROTECT PEOPLE

London, July 25.—The whole force of the British Government will be exerted to protect the people from undue pressure, Andrew Bonar Law told the House of Commons when asked what was being done regarding the confusion and disorder resulting from the dock workers and miners strike.

### MEN QUIT WORK

Moosejaw, July 25.—The street railwaymen's union quit work yesterday morning. The Merchants' Association had been paying them a bonus in addition to their wages but this has been stopped, hence the strike.

However, the local boys are still very confident that they can put up as good ball as their southern rivals and on home grounds are going to make a good showing. They will miss their sure centre fielder and their steady hitter, who very seldom falls down when he comes up to bat.

This one was to do special honor to five of the men who had returned since the last reception. The members were W. M. Brown, W. Matheson, R. Robertson, R. Wiggins, and Ben Ferguson. They were very gladly received back in the ranks of the society and especially to the new rooms which have been fixed up since they had left for overseas. The president called upon Dr. Grant, the chaplain, to give a short address.

Dr. Grant very ably expressed the feeling of all present in a concise speech of welcome. In silence he passed over those who would never return from the fields of Flanders. A tear might be shed upon their graves but that was all that could be done for those who paid the supreme sacrifice. But here were other boys back and he was especially glad to see them as many had been known to him for a long time before their departure for overseas.

Church Not Failed.

Dr. Grant in speaking of the Church said that it was wrong to say that it had failed as it had been instrumental in bringing about much good to the human race. Many Sabbath Schools and community settlements and other benevolent and educational institutions had been established by the Church during the past few years. In conclusion Dr. Grant stated that in every way possible it would be his policy to help those who had so nobly fought for their king and country.

**FRUIT STORES MUST CLOSE AT HALF PAST SIX**

Police Commission Decides to Enforce Bylaw Commencing On August 1.

The fruit vendors of the city must close their shops at 6:30 every evening, except Saturday, commencing on the first day of August. That is the fiat of the Police Commission as set forth by resolution at the meeting of the Commission yesterday.

A delegation of fruit sellers waited on the Commission and, headed by J. C. Gavigan of the Rupert Table Supply, made a protest against being forced to close. Mr. Gavigan said he believed the bylaw was illegal because only one fruit vendor signed the petition at the time fruit stores were included and there were two in town. Fifty per cent in favor was not enough. They had to have seventy-five per cent in favor. Had it not been for him the groceries would have been still open evenings as his signature was needed to secure the requisite number for early closing.

The Commissioners explained that they had nothing to do with the legality or illegality of the bylaw. They were there to enforce the law as they found it. It would be for the fruit sellers to go to the City Council and failing that to the courts in order to get redress.

**STOLEN BY INDIANS AND SINGS FOR GOLD**

Stolen by a band of Carabobo Indians, who worship her voice, Nina Girard, prima donna with the Alcazar Opera Company, is taken to their village in the mountains back of Macuto, South America, and held a prisoner, being forced to sing the Jewel Song from Faust nightly, while they shower her with gold dust.

As they reached the lower levels, she became more human and lovable and Johnny wanted to keep her there forever, but they kept on until at sea level again she became the Nina of old, and two hours after reaching the hotel in Macuto was the centre of a group of plutocrats and sports, with no special smile even for Johnny, her savior.

# WILL SUPPRESS ALL GAMBLING

### Mayor Reports to Police Commission and Gets Legal Advice As to Powers.

#### PAYING FOR DRINKS ILLEGAL AT CARL

At the meeting of the Police Commission yesterday afternoon Mayor McClymont stated that he had been instructed by the City Council by resolution to stop gambling in the city. He was reporting officially to the Police Commission before setting to work.

Commissioner Hill favored revoking any arrangement that had been made hitherto and would make no concessions whatever to anyone but was preparing to enforce the law.

On the city solicitor being asked what was considered illegal in gambling, the opinion was given that blackjack was always illegal but that there was nothing illegal about a friendly game of poker. If drinks were sold in connection with the game that was considered to be a rakeoff. They must not take chips out of the pot in order to pay for the drinks.

The question of church raffles then came up for discussion and it was decided to stop lotteries, sweepstakes, church gambling, and raffles by soldiers' associations. They could not draw any line. The mayor, seemed to crystallize the opinion of the Commission when he said: "The thing to do is to stop it all."

W. E. Williams advised that was the duty of the police to enforce the law without being instructed by the police commission.

This location will provide convenient cold storage and rail facilities and will also serve as a central landing place for fish brought in by the members.

#### Branch Here.

"The present plans include the establishment of branches in Prince Rupert, B. C., Ketchikan, Alaska, and various other northern points. A. G. Moen, vice-president of the company, left for Alaska July 2 to establish northern branches and to complete the organization with fishermen now operating in Alaska waters. According to a number of letters received by Secretary Robert Moen the Alaska members of the Fishing Vessel Owners' Association are heartily in favor of joining the new organization but it will be sometime before all of them can be reached.

## GEORGE COPPER PROPERTIES ARE BONDED

American Smelting and Refining Co. to Pay Over \$100,000 If It Takes Mine.

A deal of unusual importance to the Bear River section is the bonding of the George copper properties to the American Smelting and Refining Co., says the Cassiar News. The consideration has not been made public but the amount of the bond is reported to be well over \$100,000.

**WILL RAISE VESSELS SOPHIA AND ISLANDER**

Equipment Being Assembled at Juneau for Work of Salvaging Steamers.

Bringing word that the Deep Sea Salvage Company had completed plans for the raising of the Princess Sophia, as well as the treasure ship Islander, wrecked in 1901, opposite Douglas Island by hitting an iceberg during the night. C. B. Dawson, Jr., treasurer of the company, arrived in Juneau Sunday with his brother, A. J. Dawson, who has charge of this end of the work, says the Alaska Empire.

Mr. Dawson also brought the information that the company had disposed of the services of Robert Smith the diver, under whose name the work was being done. His place as diver will be taken by Selmer Jacobsen, Juneau diver.

Six barges, three tugs and general equipment necessary to raise the Princess Sophia will arrive in Juneau for the Deep Sea Salvage Company during this month. "After the work is begun, I believe it will take about thirty days to finish the job," Mr. Dawson said. "It is our intention to patch her up here, then take her to Seattle to be repaired."

**To Raise Islander.**

"We intend to do more salvage work in Alaska, the next probably the Islander. We have in our outfit a submarine dredging device with which to work in deep water, and I believe we will be able to raise the boat. Both Prof. Eastwood, mechanical engineer of the University of Washington, and R. H. Thompson, formerly city engineer of Seattle, have judged it thoroughly practical. "If we attempt this work this season, I will return to Juneau this summer."

**POOR FISHING NEAR VANCOUVER ISLAND**

Rough Weather and Scarcity of Fish Reported on Swiftsure and Other Banks to South.

Victoria, July 24.—The fishing season on the West coast of Vancouver Island has been a failure so far. Rough weather has been prevalent and on the few fine days hardly any fish has been caught.

The prices paid for spring salmon this year are the highest ever known, but a living cannot be procured by the greater number of the men. A peculiar phase of the fishing on the West Coast this season is said to be that, although Springs have never before been more plentiful, the advent of pilchards into these waters has made the procuring of good food so easy for the salmon that they will not take a trolling spoon. Fishing is beginning on the banks from 10 to 31 miles off the coast, but from the experience of the Americans on the Swiftsure Banks this year there is little hope of a good catch of Springs.

Halibut and ground fish are very scarce on the West Coast this season. Ling cod and red snapper are plentiful, and the market cannot absorb half of the fish offering.

The returned men taking up fishing for the first time are unfortunate in running up against a bad season, and many have got disgusted and quit. It is said that if the fishing industry on the West Coast is to flourish there must be free trade in engines, boats and fishing gear, and also free access to markets.
