Visitors Welcomed by the City

Over Fifty Prominent Visitors Arrive this Morning and are Shown Industries of the Port

Mayor and President and Members of the Board of Trade at the Dock to Extend Greetings; On the Harbor This Afternoon and Banquet tonight.

Fifty-two members of the Vancouver and Victoria Boards of Trade arrived this morning on the G. T. P. boat Prince Rupert and were welcomed by a representative group of local men including Mayor McClymont, President McCaffery of the Board of Trade and a large number of citizens. There was the usual brand of weather, fine but slightly cloudy, and the harbor looked perfect.

After the boat tied up the local men went aboard and were introduced to the visitors on the quarter deck of the steamer, after which all were driven around the city in automobiles.

As the visitors looked over the drydock and shipbuilding plant, the big cold storage plant and the modern mill at Seal Cove and noted the general air of progress and prosperity there were many expressions of appreciation heard and prophecies as to the future of the city.

Interested in Industries.

Four newspapermen were in the party. Roy Brown of the Province, John Nelson and T. J. McClay of the World and M. G. Baber of the Vancouver Sun. They took careful note of everything and were much interested in the local industries and especially in the fishing business of which they had heard so much. Mr. Nelson is the managing director of the Vancouver World and a brother of O. H. Nelson of this city, former editor of the Journal. He found many changes in the city since his last visit.

Chris. Spencer is president of the Vancouver Board and all the visitors are prominent in their particular business and among the leading citizens of British Columbia's largest city.

After visiting the points of interest around the city the party returned to the boat where they lunched and this afternoon they are being taken around the harbor to Metlakatla and other points of interest on the Thomas Crosby.

NEW WHARF AT STEWART

Tenders Being Called by the Dominion Government for New Structure at the Mining Town.

The Dominion Government is calling for tenders for a new wharf at Stewart. The old wharf is falling to pieces and there is a notice on it warning people that it is dangerous.

The new structure will not be anything like as long as the old one. The latter was built out from the flats and necessarily had to extend a long distance to deep water. The Provincial Government is building a road along the foot of the mountain toward Salmon River which makes it possible for the Dominion to make a big saving on their wharf and it will also be of a more permanent character than the old one. Bids have to be in by August 30 and it is understood that work will be pushed forward at once after that date.

STRIKE SETTLEMENTS IN BRITAIN AND THE STATES

NO CLOSED SHOP FOR SAILORS—COAL EXPORT IN ENGLAND CONTINUES FOLLOWING RETURN OF MINERS TO WORK

New York, July 26.—Terms for the settlement of the seamen's strike which has tied up shipping from Portland, Maine, to Galveston have been agreed upon by representatives of the United States Shipping Board, the International Seamen's Union and the American Steamship Association.

The demand for the closed shop was waived by the union leaders. The demand for the three day watch system at sea was submitted to a sub-committee for further discussion.

London, July 26.—The order forbidding the export of coal from South Wales ports has been withdrawn following the settlement of the big coal miners' strike.

RECIPROCITY ABOUT TO BE REPEALED BY U.S. CONGRESS —REPUBLICANS IN CONTROL

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, July 26.—A Washington despatch to the New York World says: "The immediate repeal of the Canadian Reciprocity Act has been decided upon by the Ways and Means Committee today.

"The first tariff revision has been definitely agreed to by the Republicans since regaining control of Congress and is a step to warn the people against throwing off the high protective wall about American products.

"If possible the repeal of the measure will be rushed through before the summer session."

The Reciprocity Act was passed by the United States Congress in the year 1911. That was the time that Canada refused to do so and turned out the Liberal Government on that issue.

HAYSPORT NO. 1 ASHORE WITH HOLE IN SIDE

is Now High and Dry on Rose Spit and Crew Safe.

The Deep C. Fisheries schooner Haysport No. 1 is ashore high and dry on Rose Spit. The crew are safe on shore over there and the fish were taken off by Capt. Gillen of the Mollie G. who is expected in from the cannery this afternoon and will be able to give all the details and the possibilities of getting the boat off.

A big hole is stove in the side of the vessel where she hit and is now full of water and sand, having been lifted high up the beach and right over the bar by the tide. Passengers on the Prince John yesterday reported that the waves were breaking over her.

The company is holding out hopes that the boat can be floated off and the Haysport No. 1 is being manned to put out with supplies this afternoon. Twenty oil drums are being taken out to aid in the flotation of the vessel.

FOREST FIRES DESTROY MUCH GOOD TIMBER

Loss of Life.
 Olympia, July 26.—The extensive forest fires extend from Cedar Creek in Grays Harbor country to Mima Prairie, Thurston County. At least one logging camp has been burned and heavy loss of life was expected.

The fire east of Tolville is threatening the best stand of white pine in Stevens County.

Everett, July 26.—Telephone reports tell of the burning of Machies 120 miles northwest of here. Whether the town is completely destroyed could not be ascertained.

PRIVY COUNCIL HAS RESERVED DECISION IN THE SOPHIA CASE

Attorney-General Farris Returns Home Immediately Following Conclusion of Hearing.

London, July 26.—Attorney-General Farris of British Columbia is returning to Canada immediately. In an appeal of the C. P. R. against the British Columbia Workmen's Compensation Board asking for an injunction restraining the latter from paying compensation to relatives of the crew of the Princess Sophia lost in Alaskan waters, the Privy Council reserved its decision.

Visitors Welcome To Prince Rupert.

The Vancouver and Victoria visitors who are here today are heartily welcomed by the Daily News. We have everything to gain by knowing each other better. We all here know about Vancouver and Victoria, but the residents of those cities are, as a whole, woefully ignorant of this port and its possibilities. We should like to advise our visitors that Prince Rupert is the greatest fishing port on the Pacific Ocean; that the city is the terminal port of a railway that has the best grade of any railway crossing the continent; that it is the supply centre for the richest mining districts in Western Canada; that the lumber wealth of this region is so well known that it needs no demonstration since the "Aeroplane spruce drive" of last year; that as a scenic centre the place is second to no other on the continent; that there is good hunting and fishing everywhere; that the port is several hundred miles nearer the Orient than any other on the coast; that we have the finest drydock on the coast and good cold storage facilities, and last but not least the people of Prince Rupert are a virile, hardy, aggressive, and sociable lot who are always ready to welcome a newcomer, be he rival in business or not.

Other Important Points in District.

It is impossible to dilate upon the claims of all the districts for recognition. Granby's mine at Anyox and the huge smelter are established institutions which the visitors will see for themselves. They will also see the huge modern coke ovens at that place. What they will fail to see will be the immense ore body on the Estall River not far from Prince Rupert which bids fair to rival the Hidden Creek mine at Anyox and the exploration of which is now being completed.

There are the mines of Queen Charlotte Islands, of Hazelton and Usk and other points up the Skeena Valley, there are the canneries of Skeena, Naas, and the Queen Charlottes and the possibilities of the extension of the trawling industry. Surf Inlet gold mines are not far distant and the lumber mills and pulp and paper possibilities of the district are unrivalled.

Stewart a Coming Mining Centre.

A town that is almost a suburb of Prince Rupert is Stewart. It is a coming mining centre of importance. Today in this paper there will be a Dominion Government advertisement calling for tenders for a large wharf there, and the Provincial Government is building an expensive piece of road along the foot of a cliff to connect the town with Hyder and with the rich Salmon River mines. Roads and trails are being built to the mines and ore shipments which commenced last winter will be continued in the autumn. Just now a great many of the mines are being developed.

Alice Arm Another Centre.

Alice Arm, best known as the terminus of the Dolly Varden Railway and the shipping port of the Tolly Varden mine, is coming to the fore as a mining centre. A short article on another page tells of some of the developments which are taking place at some of the mining properties. With the shipments being made from several mines in the near future, there is no doubt but outsiders will be attracted to this camp in large numbers.

Much Building Being Planned.

Many new buildings are being planned to commence here very soon. There are thirty dwellings to be erected under the Dominion Housing scheme and local people are planning new houses and business blocks. Several stores are just being completed and one or two are just having their foundations laid. Over twenty new residences have already been built here this year, and a new cold storage building is planned and the company incorporated that is to operate it. A new machine shop has just been commenced on the waterfront and another firm is preparing to put in a marine ways at Shawallans Passage. All this spells progress. It means that people have faith in the town and look for a great future for it.

At the close of the evening the winner in the story telling contest put his cake up for auction and then he bought it back from the buyer and it was presented to Miss Pym.

This is a great day in the annals of the outdoor sport enthusiasts of the city because, for the first time in its history a baseball team has come all the way from the southern metropolis to play the local nine. They are very heartily welcomed and the city will be practically theirs for the day. Wallace's team has had a good record in the south and has won the proud distinction of taking first place in the Vancouver Commercial League. At the time of writing there is little possibility of judging as to the possible odds in favor of either team but it is the ardent hope of all the local promoters that the Rupert boys will show the visitors what a real baseball game means.

In the boat building shed at Cow Bay a forty foot boat of racing type is rapidly nearing completion. The hull is the usual speed model in which the bow rises from the water when running at full speed. IMPETUS TO MINING AT ALICE ARM

Much Development Done and Many Properties Ready to Ship High Grade Ore.

Alice Arm mining is receiving an impetus such as it has not had for many a day. The La Rose mine, being operated by Miles Donald, has started active operations and is now mining the same sort of high grade that they shipped to Granby and Trail smelters last year. The general average of the shipment to Trail was 350 ozs. of silver.

The Dolly Varden steel is now completed to the Dolly Varden mine and the aerial tram well under way. There will be steady shipments of ore in the next two weeks, work continuing day and night.

Early Shippers.

The North Star will also be one of the early shippers. It has a face of high grade and good tonnage on the dump.

The Vanguard group, under bond to the Tacoma Smelter people through Mr. Tonkin of Seattle, looks like real mining, and many other properties under bond are the making of early shippers.

The United Metals Co. up the Hulance River has opened up a full face of ore eighteen feet wide of lead and gray copper that assays over a thousand ounces. The Government will immediately expend \$5,000 on the trail and Mr. Hancock a like amount. There are fifty tons sacked ready to come out and eighty tons mined ready for sacking.

Joplin Claim.

The property on the Joplin claim is producing five tons each shift, of ore that will average better than 300 oz. silver. Up to July 1 seventeen ledges had been open cutted ready to produce tonnage. Two tunnels have been driven on the ore. The ore on hand has been obtained in exploiting the property to ascertain if the veins were fissures and remain with depth. In every instance the veins have widened with depth and showed richer ore. The property should produce a very fine tonnage of high grade this year under proper management.

WANT FISHING GET GOVERNMENT AID

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, July 25.—That stimulus should be given, not only to agriculture but to other food producing industries of Canada, notably stock raising and fishing, was the decision at the session of the Army and Navy Veterans Association convention.

The Halifax branch emphasized that too much stress was laid by the Government on the question of support for agriculture while support to other vocations was denied.
