Solidly Behind Fraser River Sockeye Treaty

VICTORIA, Nov. 16.—"British Columbia stands solidly behind the sockeye salmon treaty and will not vary its position the slightest unless it is shown that the present treaty can be improved," Premier S. F. Tolmie said today in reference to Premier King's statement at Vancouver last night that the Provincial Government would have to show that it was ready to take the responsibility if the treaty were endorsed.

"If we don't get the treaty or some other arrangement to conserve the *sockeye, the industry will be gone forever," Dr. Tolmie said.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Canadian trade officials here were astonished at the statements credited to Dr. ra Cotnam, member of the Canadian Parliament for Renfrew North, after his return to the Dominion from a visit to Great Britain. He is quoted as saying that Canadian products are practically unknown in the United Kingdom and that Canada was not securing the publicity accorded the other dominions. They say that Canadian products have been displayed at 23 exhibitions in various British centres this year. Special displays featured the largest London departmental stores in rotation. A highly successful "Canada Week" was held at Glasgow. Canadians participated with products and advertising in 125 prominent agricultural shows.

on the coast to show an increase in landings over 1928, Seattle and Ketchikan, the two other principal landing points showing decreases. This indicates that the fishing boat operators, particularly the Americans, took advantage to a greater extent than ever before of Prince Rupert's strategical position for the handling and shipping of their Ketchikan, lacking a transcontinental railway, and Seattle, located too far away from the fishing grounds, both lost ground in any aspirations they might have to supremacy as halibut shipping ports. This has been in spite of more or less sporadic campaigns that have been made by either port to elmininate Prince Rupert from competition. Handicaps that have been set up notwithstanding, Prince Rupert has now been established beyond any question as the supreme halibut port of the Pacific coast.

Landings for the present season accounted for up to yesterday, and not including what fish may come in during the coming week, amounted to a total of 27,165,250 pounds, which figure itself is ahead of the final total of 27,036,000 pounds for the entire 1928 season With the finanl week to go last year, the total stood at 26,091,700 pounds. American landings up to yesterday this year totalled 19,821, 500 pounds, as compared with last year's 18,709,200 pounds at a similar date, while the Canadian total for this year was 7,343,750 pounds, as against last year's 7,382,500

Durling the week (Saturday to Friday, inclusive) landings totalled 658,300 pounds, of which 154,600 pounds was Canadian fish and 503,-700 pounds American.
