Among the lines in Saskatchewan for which the Canadian National Railways are applying to Parliament for authority construct, is one-from Aberdeen to Melfort and one from Ridgedale north-easterly to a point on the Hudson Bay Railway near The Pas. The construction of these lines will bring Saskatoon and all the territory south-west of that city at large Calgary, 52 miles nearer to Fert Churchill than by any existing route.

At the same time adequate railway facilities will be provided for the people in the district between Aberdeen and Mellon while the line from R'de dale to The Pas will traverse the heart of the new agricultural area which will be formed by reclamation project of the government between the Carrot River and The Pas.

This distressing malady is very prevalent at this time of the year, and as a rule is a symptom of a deeper trouble such as affections of the eyes liver, kidneys, stomach, etc. It may be also due to the after effects of influenza.
