Canada Formally Joins World Court by Signing the Optional Clause With Small Reservation

Will Not Apply To Other Members of British Commonwealth and Will Be Subject to Ratification by Parliament

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Canada has signed the optional clause in the statute for a permanent court of international justice with reservations that it does not apply to disputes on matters of domestic jurisdiction or disputes in regard to which an agreement had been made or is made for recourse to some other pacific method of settle-

The result of the reservation is that the court does not apply to disputes with other members of the British commonwealth of nations which are members of the League

The signature of Canada is subject to ratification by parliament, the department of external affairs announced today.

This discovery is a new one and in no way connected with the discovery reported last year by Cesaro. The above two men were accompanied by I. DeCaire. They got back to Terrace from their trip in time to place several good sized samples of the ore in the exhibition. They were very fine looking samples, and if the ledge they report is only a quarter as wide as they claim, they have got a really big thing. Besides the 82 feet of copper, gold and silver ore another ledge, seven feet wide showing a large quantity of steel galena was also located.

ADVANTAGE TO UNITED STATES

While there is so much talk of Canadianism and doing our part in the British Empire, there is still an advantage given to the American route over the Canadian by Canadian railroads. Grain can be shipped to U.S. Atlantic ports at a less rate per mile than to British Columbia ports and the result is that last year the United States ports handled no less than 46 per cent of the Canadian crop, whereas Vancouver and Prince Rupert combined handled only 28 per cent.

This is not a criticism of any particular railway. The rates are set by the railway board and they discriminate against Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

When on the prairies recently some inquiries were made in regard to why grain went east instead of west. It was shown that better prices could be secured by the eastern than the western route. Part at least of-this was the result of the discriminatory railway rates against the west. Through the efforts of the late John Oliver and others, a great part of the differential against B.C. ports was removed, but there is still a difference sufficient to turn the flow of grain eastward instead of westward. A movement is on foot now to secure the removal of this differential and until it is removed the western ports will not be satisfied.

It is particularly galling to see grain going out by the United States seaboard when Pacific ports are idle, largely because of the fact that the railway board still refuses to recognize the justice of the claims of the west over the east.

During the visit of Prince Rupert delegates to the town of Peace River a conference was held with a number of friends of this port. This was left in abeyance, it being thought by some that close co-operation with frequent inter-communication would bring about the desired result.
