

Amsterdam, July 29 .- The preliminary gathering of the nternational Trades Union Congress developed a series of acrusations by delegates from Belgium, United States, England and taxes by October 1, an additional France against German workers for their conduct during the war. There were sharp recriminations on both sides.

The meeting was held for the purpose of clearing up the affairs of the old trades union international and making preparaions for the new organization.

Carl Rudolph Legin, president of the German Federation of Trades Unions, defended the entire policy of the German trades unionists which he said had been absolutely correct, and declared their position prevented their protesting to the government. Moreover, all the time they were under the impression that they were fighting a defensive war.

Land Act Amendments





Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Fishing on the Coast of Japan Pre-emption now confined to sur-veyed lands only. and Scenes Along the Tagus As Well as Big

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clear-ing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, be-cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as for-feiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-dential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaecessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

## SCHOOL BYLAW

Measure to Provide for Raising \$150,000 for New Building Passed First Reading.

The schools bylaw providing for the raising of \$150,000 was introduced at the meeting of the City Council last night and read a first time.

The proposal is to erect a permanent school building on Acror olis Hill in order to relieve the present overcrowding and to make provision for the natural growth of the population.

The bylaw after it passed the City Council will have to be approved by the rate-payers before it becomes law.

\* The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serv-ing with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

#### GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
