## Lloyd George Wields Big Stick for First Time Since Election to Warn Labor Against Socialism

LONDON, June 13. — Liberalism and not Socialism must be the keynote of the new Labor Government's policy or its career will come to a summary conclusion, declared Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, in outlining this afternoon the policy the Liberal party would pursue in the coming Parliamentary session.

"Before the meeting of the Liberal Parliamentary Party, we shall await with interest the forthcoming declaration of ministerial policy," said Mr. Lloyd George. "But we must declare that as far as lies in our power the mandate of the Government ends when it fails to pursue the Liberal policy. At the very hour the ministry decides to become a Socialist administration its career ends, for it has no authority from the nation to embark upon Socialistic experiments. It could then be kept in power only by Tory votes or Tory indulgence."

The Liberal leader said the Liberals represented 5,300,000 of their fellow countrymen and women and that neither insults nor grumbles could detract from that striking fact. "We must not use the power given to us by the electors in a paltry, fractious or pernickity spirit. This government was not called into being by the verdict of the nation but by Mr. Baldwin's midwifery," said Lloyd George.

Lloyd George was unanimously elected chairman and leader of the Liberal party in Parliament. The meeting was at the National Liberal Club.

## PREMIERS SEND FELICITATIONS

Macdonald despatches Message to Mackenzie King and Latter Replies in Kind

## CO-OPERATION URGED

Renewal of Former Pleasant Associations Anticipated by Both Prime Ministers

OTTAWA, June 13.—Rt. Hon. Ramsay Macdonald, prime minister of Great Britain, has cabled the following message to Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier of Canada:

"As one of my first acts in again taking up the office of prime minister, I should like to say how much I am looking forward to co-operating with you. I feel sure we can do great things together in promoting the interests of the British Commonwealth and of the world as a whole. It will be my earnest hope to continue the happy relations which existed between you and my predecessor."

Premier King replied: "May I express my warmest appreciation for your message. I, too, look forward with much pleasure to a renewal of our co-operation in Imperial and international matters of common interest. I very cordially share your hope that aims and ideals which we cherish in common may thereby be materially furthered."

## AMATEUR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

John Dawson Only Surviving American In English Play; Fifth Round Is Completed

SANDWICH, June 12.—Philip Perkins, defending champion, was eliminated from the British amateur golf championships today by a single hole by Andrew McNair of Glasgow in the fourth round.

Cyril Tolley, former champion, defeated Robert H. Baugh Jr. of Birmingham, Alabama, and Oxford student three and two in the fifth round. John Dawson of Chicago also entered the sixth round, being the last American to get that far, by defeating S. L. McKinlay of Glasgow two and one. This afternoon A. J. Evans, London lawyer, defeated Andrew McNair.

## DR. McLEAN'S SALARY

OTTAWA, June 13.—The salary of the chief of the Farm Loan Board has been fixed at \$8,000 per year. The position is held by Dr. J. D. McLean, former British Columbia premier.

## JUST FINDING THIS OUT NOW

House of Commons learns That Halibut Fisheries on This Coast Are Becoming Depleted

OTTAWA, June 13.—Discussion of fisheries department appropriations by the House of Commons today brought the statement from Hon. J. P. A. Gardin, minister of marine and fisheries that it was a fact that the halibut banks of Hecate Straits were being overfished and that the halibut fisheries of the Pacific Coast were not making any appreciable progress toward rehabilitation.

## PAYMENTS DUE TO MANITOBA

Large Sum Said by Commission to Be Owing to That Province by Dominion

OTTAWA, June 13. — The report of the Royal Commission on the transfer of the natural resources to the province of Manitoba tabled in the House of Commons last night by Premier Mackenzie King recommends: A payment in cash by the Dominion to Manitoba of \$4,584,212 as the balance due to that province for past arrears.

The payment to Manitoba of \$562,000 annually from now until the population of the province reaches 800,000. An increase in this annual payment to \$750,000 when the population reaches 800,000. Finally when the population attains the figure of 1,200,000 an increase in this annual payment to Manitoba to \$1,125,000, this amount to remain unchanged thereafter.

## STATEMENT OF NORMAN WATT

He Suggests Publication of Letter and Manner of Securing It

The following letter was received from Norman Watt this morning:

As my dismissal from the service of the Provincial Government becomes effective tomorrow, I feel that I owe it to both the public and myself to make a public statement.

As you know, I have been dismissed on the grounds of political activity. This charge I absolutely deny. I did, however, write a personal letter to T. D. Pattullo prior to the last general election in this letter I made certain specific recommendations which I considered to be in the interests of the service, and for which I assume full responsibility. The point I wish to make, however, is that the letter in question was a personal one, and would appear to form the entire basis of my dismissal. I understand this letter is in possession of the Honorable Mr. Shelly. Mr. Shelly has my approval of the publication of the letter and to explain, if he so desires, the particular manner in which it came into his possession.

Unless this personal letter to Mr. Pattullo can be construed as evidence of political activity, then I challenge Mr. Shelly to substantiate that I have by word or deed, shown the slightest political activity during the five years I have occupied the position of government agent at this point. I understand considerable protest has been filed with Victoria regarding my dismissal. I wish to make it plain that I am not in any way responsible for the filing of such protest.

NEW FLOATS HERE READY THIS FALL It is expected that tenders will be called within the next month for the new fishermen's floats which are to be built here just east of the dry dock, it was stated yesterday by J. P. Forde, district engineer for the federal department of public works, who was in the city en route to the Yukon Territory. Within two months after the letting of the contract, it is expected that the floats will have been completed and ready for use. Plans and specifications have now been forwarded to Ottawa for final approval.

## TERRACE HEARS ENGINEER TELL OF ROAD PLANS

Sum of \$60,000 to Be Spent on Main Highway and Smaller Sums on Others

TERRACE, June 13.—Five thousand dollars is to be spent on the Kalam Lake highway, \$3,500 on the Lakelse trail and \$4,000 on the roads in the vicinity of town, according to W. K. Gwyer, district engineer of Prince Rupert, who accompanied by W. H. Cotton, assistant engineer of Smithers met the Board of Trade at their monthly meeting yesterday. He also stated that \$60,000 would be spent on the provincial highway between Copper City and Skeena Crossing. He planned to go over the Remo road and would make an allotment for it.

Mr. Gwyer assured the meeting that the roads would be built to standard condition. It was the policy of his department to have the work laid out properly first and then carried through as quickly as funds would permit, either by contract or otherwise. He was already formulating a program to submit to the department for next year's work in this district.

Assurance of cooperation in working for the best interests of the district was extended. Appreciation of the engineers' attendance and the address was voiced, it being stated that the policy and method he outlined in regard to public works activity was the best and most encouraging program formulated here in some time.

On being asked, Mr. Gwyer stated that no work would be done on the road between the head of Lakelse Lake and the hot springs this year, it being too expensive a job for what funds were available.

## LARGE PACK AT CLAM CANNERY

Langara Fishing & Packing Co. Has Big Production at Tow Hill Plant, Near Massett

The Langara Fishing & Packing Co. has put up a large pack of clams at the cannery at Tow Hill, near Massett, this spring. Up to the end of May some ten thousand cases had been shipped and packing operations are still in progress. Later in the summer the staff at the Tow Hill clam cannery will be transferred to the company's salmon cannery at New Massett.

## APPOINTMENTS GREAT BRITAIN

Labor Men to Be Connected With Royal Household and Other Positions

LONDON, June 13.—The remaining Government appointments are expected to be made by Premier Ramsay Macdonald without delay. They include several offices connected with the Royal household, holders of which must be approved by His Majesty.

J. H. Hays, Labor member for Edgely, Liverpool, for ten years sergeant in the metropolitan police force, is cited to become vice-chamberlain of the household, and Tom Henderson, who formerly worked on the Clyde as ship carpenter, to be comptroller of the Royal household. B. T. Smith, member for that very workaday district of London called Rotherhithe, will be treasurer of the household.

Sir Henry Slosson has been appointed lord justice of appeal to succeed Sir John Sankey, the new lord chamberlain. The appointment creates a vacancy in southeast Leeds, which Sir Henry has represented since 1924.

## FLEET ROBERTSON DIED AT EVERETT EN ROUTE ENGLAND

VICTORIA, June 13.—William Fleet Robertson, 73 years provincial mineralogist, died yesterday at Everett, Washington, where he was taken ill while en route to England via the Panama canal from Victoria.

Mr. Robertson was born at Montreal in 1859 and retired from active work in 1925.

## Terrace to be Represented in Full Force at Convention with New Province Resolution

TERRACE, June 13.—Terrace will be represented at the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade with a full complement of delegates and they will bring with them a resolution for submission to the gathering asking that a committee be appointed to inquire into the whole subject of the feasibility and desirability of forming a new province. Several other resolutions will be brought forward, but this was the outstanding one and was adopted following a discussion on the subject.

The delegates chosen consisted of E. T. Kenney, W. A. Kirkpatrick, W. H. Burnett and W. Chapman, representing the Terrace district, and J. Willman, representing Usk. Alternates were C. R. Gilbert, O. T. Sundal, N. Sherwood, H. Halliwell and A. A. McDonald, the latter being from Usk. J. K. Gordon as past president and chairman of the municipal council, is also eligible to take part in the convention.

## Nationalists Win South African Polls--Hertzog is Sustained

CAPETOWN, June 13.—It is now certain that the Nationalist-Labor Pact Government will have a majority in the new House Assembly. Whether or not Premier Hertzog will have a working majority is still doubtful.

CAPETOWN, June 13.—Figures so far in yesterday's South African election are favorable to General Jan Christian Smuts, leader of the South African party, and indicate the possibility of his receiving a majority and the government under Premier Hertzog being defeated. So far the sensation of the election has been the defeat of Hon. Thomas Boydell, minister of labor, in Greyville, Durban, where he was believed firmly entrenched. A split of the labor vote is believed to have defeated him.

With ninety-six out of 148 seats reported, the standing of parties at 8 o'clock tonight was as follows:

South African party (opposition), 50. Nationalists (government supporters), 38. Craswell Laborites (government supporters), 5. National Council Laborites, 3. Early returns from urban constituencies were, as expected, predominantly in favor of the South African party. Here also most of the labor strength was situated. Practically all the early gains of the South African party were from Laborites.

## ATLANTIC CROSSING

French Plane Winging Way to Paris; United States Machine Wrecked

OLD ORCHARD, Maine, June 13.—The huge French monoplane Yellow Bird, manned by Armona Lotti Jr., sponsor of the flight and copilot; Jean Assolant, pilot; and Rene Lefevre, navigator, took off from here this morning for a flight to Paris.

The United States plane Green Flash, manned by Lewis A. Yancey and Roger Q. Williams, nosed over when attempting to take off from Rome. Neither of the men were injured.

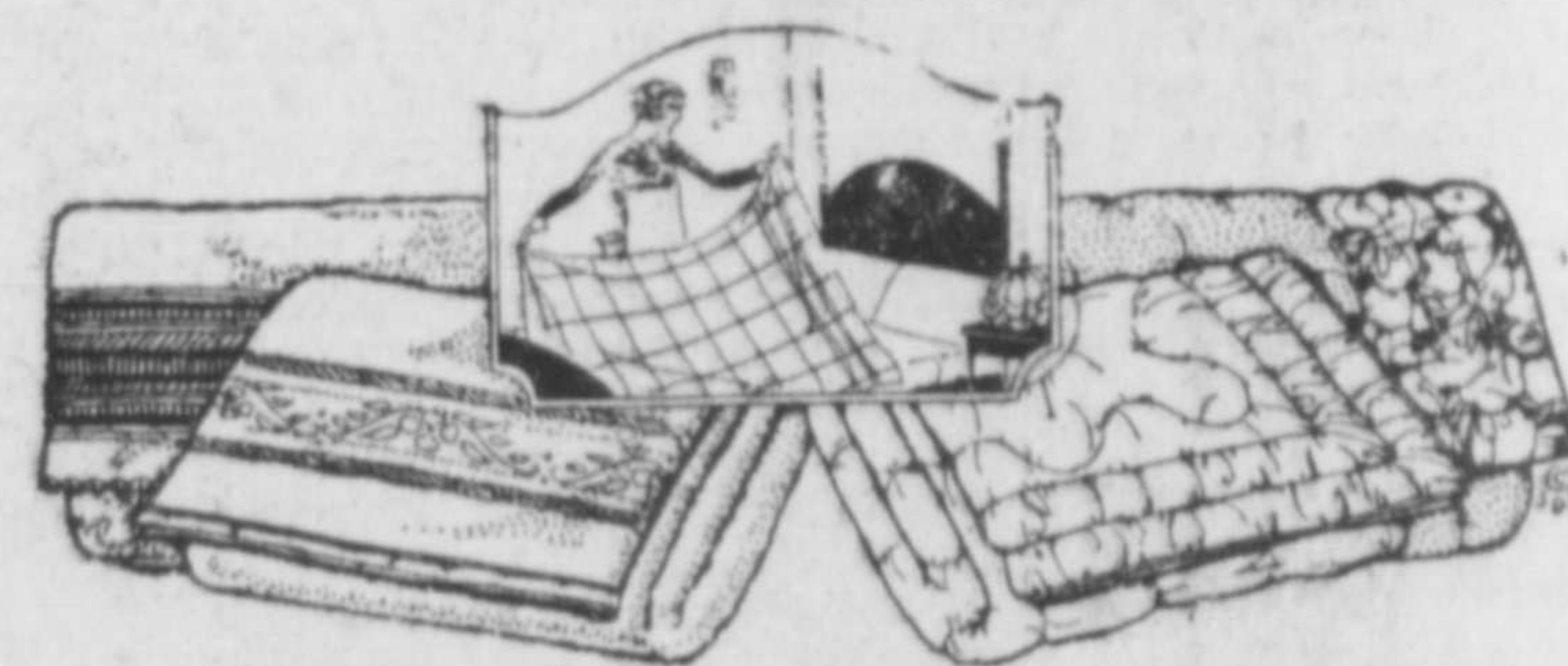

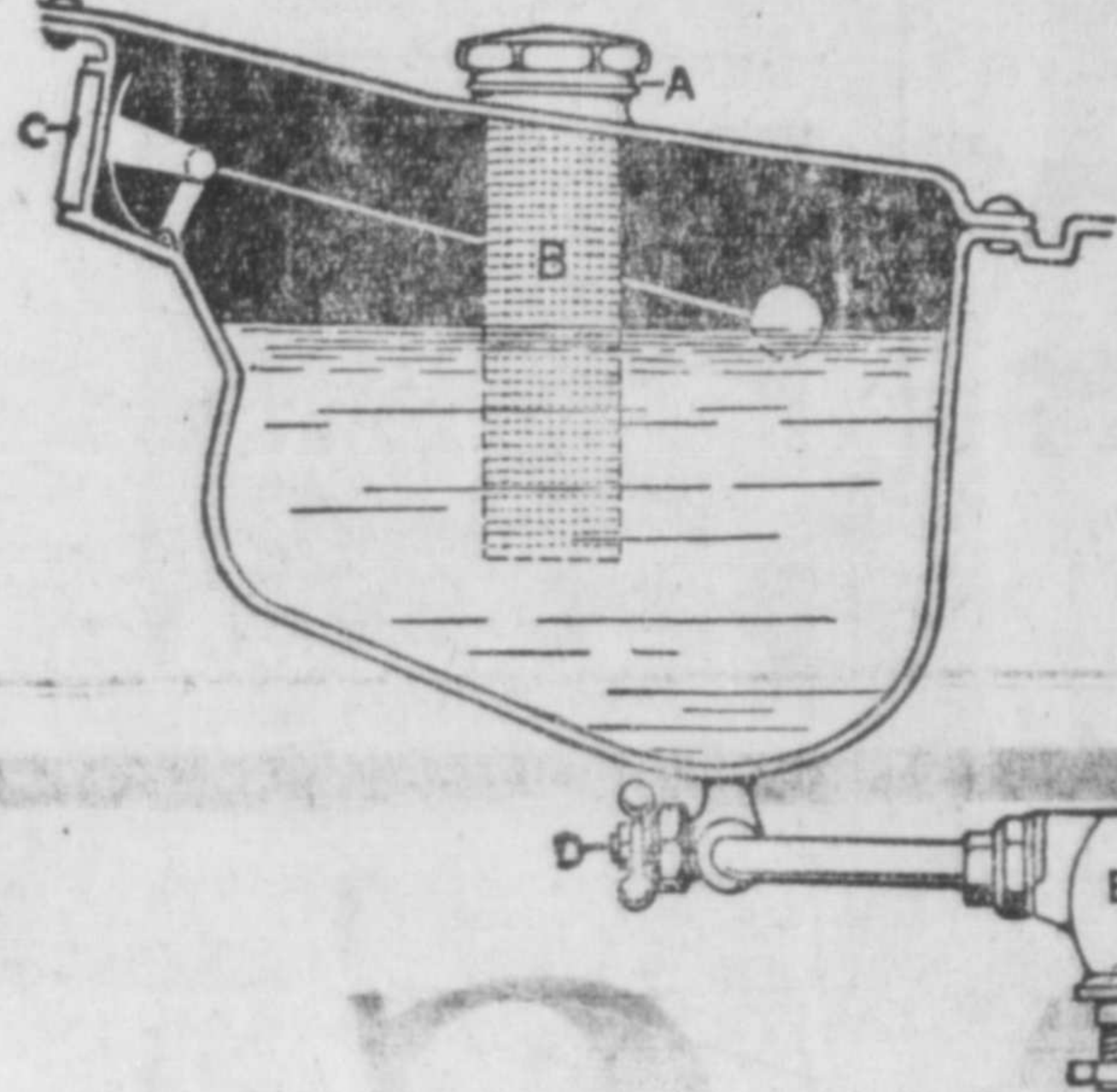

**LONDON SCENES AT THE CAPITOL**

Interiors of "Three Passions" Made in Studio at Nice and Faithful to Originals

Because of the action of "The Three Passions" is placed chiefly in London, while the interiors were made in the Nice studio where Ingram has worked these four years past, there was a big call on the skill of designer and constructor. English visitors have, however, expressed themselves as amazed at the absolute fidelity of these scenes.

No finer set, experts declare, has been erected in any country, than that representing the "Wrexham shipyards" in "The Three Passions." Though by no means so large as many previously used by Ingram, the detail work involved in getting an absolute "match" with scenes taken earlier in the great Armstrong works at Newcastle-on-Tyne was most exacting.

As completed, the shipyard set in "The Three Passions" includes a range of huge furnaces, fed by grimy, half-naked men from huge piles of coal renewed from traveling trucks. A shunting engine, specially imported from England, puffs noisily to and fro. Great steel hammers thud, throwing out showers of sparks from masses of white-hot steel. In the distance, through the smoke-laden atmosphere typical of an industrial town pigmy-like men can be seen perched amid revolving wheels and oscillating pistons. The film was seen here last night and will be repeated tonight.

**HEALTH GOOD OF PUPILS IN PRINCE RUPERT**

Dr. Carson Gives Interesting Report of Result of His Medical Inspection

CO-OPERATION NEEDED Japanese Almost Perfect, According to Recognized Health Standards

While the health of Prince Rupert children is good, it might be improved, according to the report of Dr. Carson, medical inspector of schools, made last night to the school board at their regular meeting, Trustee McMeekin presiding. As a result of a detailed examination, it was found that some of

the pupils were overweight and some under. The most perfect average weight was found at Seal Cove. Booth school pupils were overweight and Borden Street considerably under. High school was rather under, owing to the tendency of some of the girls to try to look slim. The most perfect children were the Japanese, who seemed as if the chart was made for them.

Seal Cove—Average, 1.3 pounds over; 14 per cent under weight, 17.5 per cent over, and 68.5 per cent normal.

High school—Average, 1.6 pounds under; 42 per cent under, 32 per cent over, and 25 per cent normal.

Telling of the examination for tonsil trouble, the report had not been very well received. While a good many acted on advice, others had not. He believed tonsils were quite a factor in school work. An abscessed tonsil had a similar effect to an abscessed tooth.

Dr. Carson spoke of the help he had received from Miss Peto, who is acting as school nurse. He made a plea for co-operation among parents and others, in order to improve the condition of the children and make them as near perfect as possible.

The doctor explained the system of examination. The eyes were tested, weights were taken by the nurse, and measurements recorded. A chart was used similar to that adopted in the American schools, where standard ages, sizes and weights were noted. Any child more than three pounds over or under the chart record was considered abnormal. Advice was given as to how the light pupils might pick up weight and others reduce. The advice had proved effective in a good many instances. In one particular case seven lbs. had been gained in six weeks. Following is the record for the city schools, with the exception of Westview, where the record is not yet complete:

Booth—Average, 1.13 pounds over weight; 29 per cent of the pupils are under weight, 27 per cent over, and 44 per cent normal.

Borden Street—Average, 1.2 pounds under weight; 36 per cent
