## WHY BLOCK THE DEAL

(Edmonton Journal)

There seems to be a feeling in some quarters that the senate may block the proposal that the Canadian National take a half interest with the C.P.R. in the railways in northern Alberta. Just why the senate should do anything so essentially foolish is neither explained nor apparent. Only obstinacy, an antagonism to the interests of Alberta, or hostility to the National system itself, could account for such a course. Nor would friendliness to the C.P.R. explain the folly.

It is fairly plain that if the National were prevented entering into the partnership arrangement an agitation would immediately develop for the extension of National lines into the Peace River area, and probably through that ary to the Pacific. Sooner or later this would result, under pressure of political and economic conditions. That would mean the duplication of railways on a large scale in a new area, something that could upon no consideration be advantageous to the National, the C.P.R., or the country. The senate can hardly be supposed to want to knock all parties concerned.

During the first four months of the year some concentrates were shipped to Tacoma for treatment, but since May, all concentrates produced at Anyox were treated at the local smelter. The smelter operated 365 days during the year and the concentrator 364 days. To take care of the increased demand for electric power necessitated by operations at the Bonanza mine and additions to the concentrating mill, a new 100 k.w. unit is being installed at the hydro-electric plant. Although 1928 was the most successful year experienced by the Granby Co. in many years, the present year promises to surpass it. During 1928 the average price obtained for copper was 14c per pound, but at the commencement of this year 16c has been received. The price is still rising and should be steady or higher for a considerable period. The company has now reached a state of development at the Bonanza mine whereby it is possible to commence shipping of ore to the concentrating mill. Ore will be brought to the mill bun-


