CHICAGO TERRORIZED BY RACE CONFLICT CALLS IN MILITARY TO SAVE LIVES

STREETS BEING PATROLLED AND WEAPONS CONFISCATED; TOTAL DEATHS NOW REACH THIRTY—STREET BARRIERS ESTABLISHED BETWEEN NEGROES AND WHITES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Chicago, July 31.—The streets of this city were tonight patrolled by soldiers called out by Governor Lowden at the request of Mayor Thompson for the protection of life and property, which was threatened by the race war which for five days has terrorized the city.

The troops established a barrier across the streets between the white and the negro quarters, most of the colored residents living on the south side.

The military then proceeded to search every person for weapons and many guns were confiscated by them.

The official death list for four days showed thirty, seventeen of them being negroes and thirteen whites.

FINED \$100 FOR HAVING LIQUOR

Edward Hardy Smuggled \$900 Worth of Whiskey From Steamer Yesterday.

SUITCASES AND GRIP FILLED WITH BOTTLES

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMordie, Edward Hardy was fined \$100.00 or four months in default of payment for having liquor in possession other than in a private dwelling. The maximum amount for the first offense was imposed owing to the nature of the circumstances under which the liquor was found.

All yesterday the police officials had been watching the water front for booze which might be brought ashore from the big boat. They had an inkling that it was being done by bringing smaller craft alongside during the night and then taking it to one of the more remote floats and getting it ashore early in the evening P.C. Bailey noticed a man approach the Prince George in a rowboat and unload something from the side into the boat.

From the distance the officer could not make out what was the nature of the package but when the man started across the bay with his load Bailey thought it time to act. He chartered a launch and after a brief chase caught up to the rowboat and placed the man under arrest after searching the grips which were in the boat. There were in all seven suit cases and one hand grip and all were filled with imperial quarts of whiskey. The seizure was worth about \$900. The boat was confiscated and the prisoner brought to the station.

In the court this morning W. E. Williams for the city pointed out that Hardy was acting for what he thought was a whiskey ring. There were bigger men behind him and for this reason the boat ought to be confiscated.

The man stated that the rowboat was not his own and he did not know the name of the party from whom he had got it. The magistrate thought that seizing the boat would be an imposition and the rowboat will be returned to its owner.

GERMANY WILL INQUIRE WHO CAUSED WAR

Responsibility to be Fixed, According to Announcement Made in Berlin.

Berlin, July 31.—A state tribunal is to inquire into and fix the responsibility for the war, according to an official announcement made here today. This follows along the same line as the suggestion that came over the wire yesterday to the effect that the ex-Kaiser might be brought to trial. If he was the responsible party, an effort may be made to have him brought home and tried. If it is decided that the responsibility lies elsewhere, then the culprit will probably be punished.

KING HONORS MARSHAL FOCH

Famous French Leader is Now Field Marshall of the British Army.

London, July 31.—King George received Marshal Foch at Buckingham Palace yesterday and conferred upon him the rank of Field Marshal of the British Army. The Field Marshal got a great reception in London where he is the hero of the hour.

NEW TEACHERS

Two Appointments Made By the School Board and Third Being Negotiated.

Two appointments have been made for school teachers for the coming term to fill vacancies caused by the departure of three of last year's staff. Still another appointment must be made as one of the ladies who had accepted a position will not come. Miss Annie O'Hearn of Fernie has accepted a position on the staff here and Miss Mary Gladwell of East Burnaby will also come north to teach school for the ensuing term. The probably third teacher is Miss Dorothy Peck of Vancouver.

U.S. GOVERNMENT TO RELEASE TELEGRAPHS AND THE TELEPHONES

Washington, July 31.—The Government control of telegraphs and telephones will end at midnight Thursday.

The Government has had direct supervision of the systems since the beginning of the war.

STATESMEN SUE PAPER FOR SAYING THEY PURCHASED RUSSIAN MINING STOCK

AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN, WALTER HUME LONG, SIR ERIC GEDDES AND SIR AUKLAND GEDDES ALLEGE LIBEL AGAINST LONDON DAILY NEWS

London, July 31.—Writs have been issued against the London Daily News on behalf of J. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Walter Hume Long, First Lord of the Admiralty, Sir Eric Geddes, Minister without Portfolio, and Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister for National Service and Reconstruction, for alleged libel.

The statement to which they take exception is one published by the paper to the effect that these statesmen possessed shares in various Russian mining and development companies which had been purchased since the armistice was signed and, therefore, while Great Britain was hostile to Russia.

ARMENIANS ARE THREATENED WITH TOTAL EXTINCTION

Paris, July 31.—It looks as if the Armenian question would not be settled until the Armenians are wiped out entirely. The Turks and Tartars are moving on the Armenians from three sides and are threatening them with extermination. They have cut off the United States relief supply and the situation there is very grave.

NEW AMERICAN MARK IS SET BY U.S. AVIATOR

Roland Ropfle Reaches Height of 31,600 Feet With Thermometer at 25 Below Zero.

Mineola, July 31.—Roland Ropfle, civilian aviator flying the Wasp biplane, set a new American mark when on official flight from the Roosevelt field he reached a height of 30,700 feet. The world record is 33,136 feet.

At the height to which the plane rose the temperature at Roosevelt field was 25 degrees below zero and the aviator was forced to cut off the water leading to the radiator to prevent the engine freezing.

In descending Ropfle found the gasoline and oxygen exhausted so he volplaned the entire distance to the ground.

TENNIS CHAMPIONS PLAY AT VICTORIA

Winnipeg Wins Tennis Championship Beating Crack Players of Coast.

Victoria, July 31.—McGill and Verley, two Winnipeg Tennis players won the doubles in the tennis championship series, beating Smith and King of Victoria in straight sets.

McGill and Miss Cotsworth of Victoria and Verley and Mrs. Sweeney of Vancouver were successful in the mixed doubles.

REGINALD M'KENNA GIVES UP POLITICS

London, July 31.—Reginald McKenna has been elected chairman of the London City and Midland Bank. This is one of the important English banks and in order to take the position Mr. McKenna has had to retire from politics altogether.

GOVERNMENT TO PURCHASE WHOLE OF WHEAT CROP AND PAY GROWER FULL VALUE

SUGGESTED THAT BOTH PRODUCER AND CONSUMER WILL BENEFIT FROM PREVENTION OF SPECULATION IN PEOPLE'S FOOD SUPPLY

Ottawa, July 31.—The Government has finally determined upon a policy in regard to this year's wheat crop. The main features of the plan are to appoint a board which will buy and market the crop.

A cash payment is to be made the farmer on account at the time he sells his wheat, the board to dispose of it at current prices and the surplus proceeds, after expenses of selling and handling have been deducted, will be distributed to the original sellers in proportion to the grade and quality.

No speculation on exchange or profiteering by the handlers is to be allowed to the disadvantage of either the producer or the consumer.

TWO MILLION POUNDS COPPER PRODUCED AT ANYOX IN JUNE

The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company produced approximately 2,000,000 pounds of copper at its Anyox smelter in June, according to an unofficial report. This is comparable with 1,267,688 pounds in May, 707,301 in April and 90,682 pounds in March, according to New York reports. The production in July is expected to attain the 3,000,000 mark, according to a report from Anyox. This increase is made possible by the use of the full equipment of four furnaces instead of two, and sometimes three, in recent months. The operation of the smelter at capacity is facilitated by insurance of a sufficient quantity of coke.

After more than two years' work in preparation the coke ovens of the Granby at Anyox has begun to produce coke and by-products and the big plant, the only one of its kind on the Pacific coast, is in full operation, says the report. Continued operation is expected and the grade of coke being produced is said to be excellent. Thirty-two ovens are in operation. Coal for the ovens is supplied from the Granby's properties at Cassidy, Vancouver Island, from which steady shipments have been made to the smelter town for several weeks past.

Visitors from Victoria tell of an invasion of Victoria harbor by pilchards, apparently driven in by salmon. A number of workmen going to the shipyards and arriving ahead of time were attracted by the breaking of the water in the harbor by salmon. The pilchards, in their efforts to escape were driven close to shore and captured by the men who were waiting for the whistle to blow. Telling of the invasion the Victoria Colonist says:

"The pilchards were driven into shore, and when the tide went out hundreds were imprisoned inside of lumber booms, which settled upon the mud and prevented their escape. Men coming to work in the shipyards set to work with sticks and missiles and after killing many they pulled them out of the water and carried them off. One ardent fisherman had a shovel with which he went after the pilchards. He found, however, that he must kill them by cutting them to pieces before they would remain passive upon his unique fishing appliance.

"Finding that his pilchard was getting away from him a gentleman went into the water up to his knees and managed to recapture it.

"Pilchards were stuck in all available pockets, several in each, and it is estimated that each man had an average of ten or twelve fish. The men went to work for their eight hours and then took the free food home for supper. 'It smelt like an Indian village,' was the way one man described the Foundation yards yesterday."

ICE FLOES CAUSE SHIPPING DANGERS

Newfoundland and Labrador Coast Trading Vessels Tied Up Until Seas Clear.

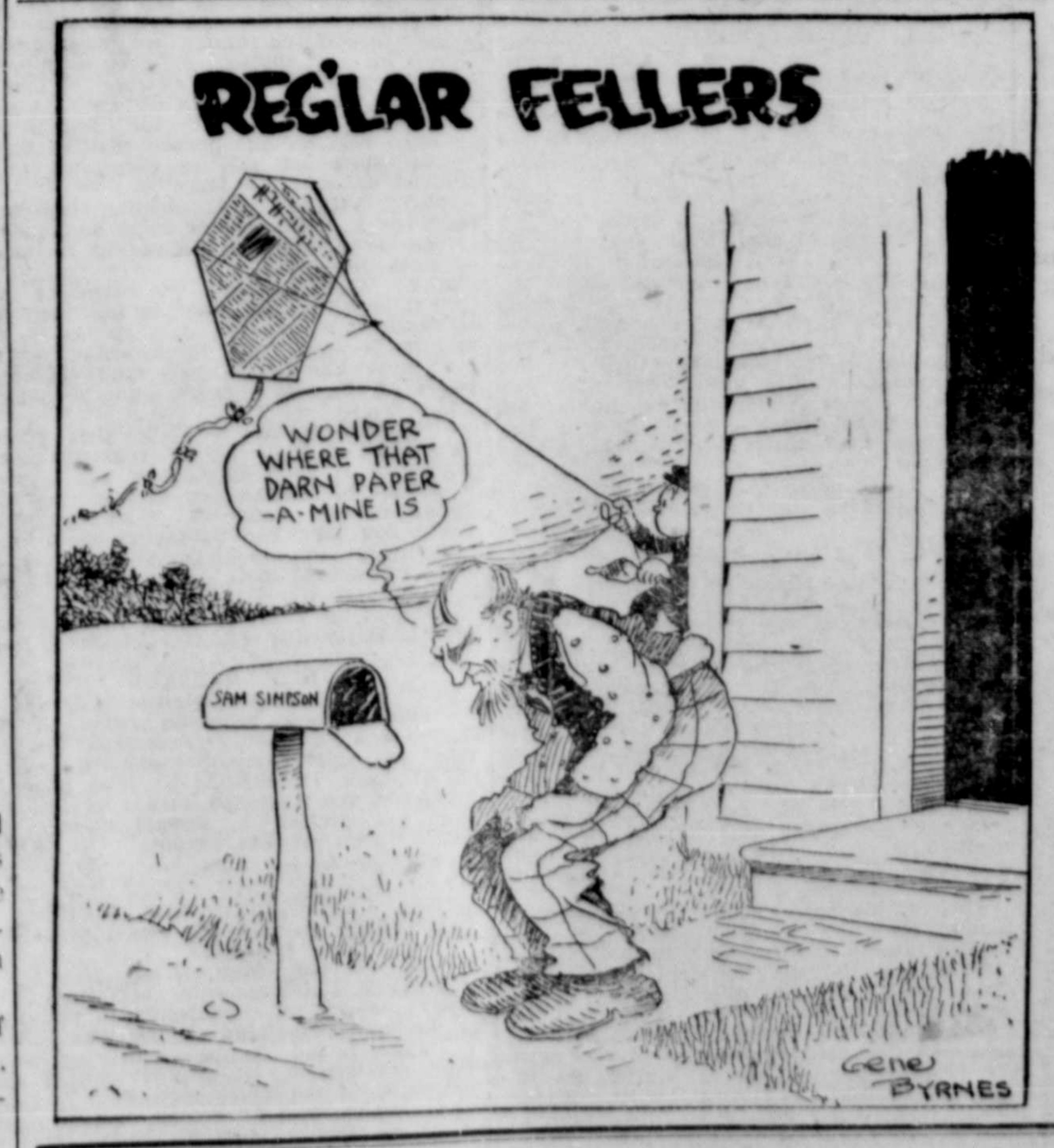

St. John, Nfld., July 30.—Vast fields of moving ice, extending for many miles, are interfering greatly with the movements of the coastal shipping traffic to and from Newfoundland and the Labrador coast. Many vessels have been compelled to put back to harbor after vainly endeavoring to force their way through the ice fields.

The late season in North Eastern Canada is responsible for the tardy break up of winter conditions.

Many vessels are reported to be caught fast among the floes and are unable to extricate themselves.

Fair Promises Great Success.

It is satisfactory to note that the fall fair promises to make a record this year, judging by the interest taken in it by people outside the city and by the promises of support and the exhibits that are being prepared for it.

President Perry and his associates seem to be doing excellent work and it is hoped that there will be no slackening until the end. In the meantime the co-operation of everyone is asked in order that all previous records may be smashed and an exhibit worthy of the city and district staged.

Liberal Leadership Being Discussed.

Everyone seems to be at sea as to who will be chosen to lead the Liberal party. The choice will be made in a few days and an announcement in regard to it will be awaited with interest both by Liberals and Conservatives.

The name of Hon. John Oliver has been mentioned, and apparently John is quite willing to take the job if it is wished upon him. In the meantime he has his own work to do here.

The only objection to Mr. Oliver is that he is getting on in years and the leadership of the big party is a young man's job. Nothing would please the people of the west better than to have their premier chosen for so important a position, but it seems hardly to be expected that so great an honor could come to British Columbia.

President to Entertain Rulers.

The King and Queen of Belgium and the Prince of Wales are to visit the United States and will be entertained by President Wilson. This is a return visit as the president was the guest of most of the friendly rulers of Europe during his stay over there.

It was a courteous thing to do to invite the heads of the allied governments to visit the country and doubtless they will be given a splendid reception. At the same time it is doubtful if it is good election tactics. The visit of a president, a premier, or any person elected by popular vote would perhaps have made a stronger appeal to the working people of the United States and especially to that section of the democracy that reads the Hearst journals.

Peace Proposals, Were They Made?

Undoubtedly there was a movement to bring about peace in 1917, but whether any British leaders were a party to it is not clear. It might have been that some of the prominent men in the country, not in responsible positions, might have made overtures through the Pope. It is well known that there were many of the big landowners and others in that country who feared just what has come about, the rise of the people in many countries of Europe, and who thought that it was better to make peace with Germany than to run the risk of losing their own power in the country, the power of wealth.

Control Prices of Food Supplies.

The report of the Federal Trade Commission at Washington stated that the big meat packers not only could but did control the prices of livestock. In that way they could manipulate the market to their own advantage and could discriminate against independent buyers.

The condition is one that needs very grave consideration and decisive action. It is an unthinkable condition for the food of the nation to be manipulated in that way.

We do not believe in "trust busting." That is only camouflage. It does not get us anywhere. State control of the big industries is the only possible solution. Just how that control is to be brought about is the thing to consider. Many of the methods are simply blinds with which to hoodwink the public. We do not want a pretended control but something substantial.

In Canada we have no say in what they do in the United States, but it has been shown that the food supply here is controlled in a similar manner to that of the United States.

IRISH BOY BEATS WAY TO VICTORIA

Taken in Charge by Immigration Authorities and May be Deported.

Victoria, July 31.—Befriended by a party of returning Canadian soldiers with whom he became associated at Seaford military camp in England, James Simpson, a sixteen-year-old Irish lad, managed to make his way all the distance to Victoria only to be picked up by the immigration authorities here who are now considering his case. It is probable that he will be deported to the Old Country. Young Simpson spent the night at police headquarters.

A sturdy, attractive lad with the sunny disposition of the native of the Emerald Isle, Simpson proved a favorite with the men with whom he came to this part of the world. His association with the Canadians at Seaford Camp imbued him with a strong desire to come to this country. He traveled with a party of homeward-bound soldiers from the camp to Liverpool, and there the soldiers said good-bye to him. But the lad made up his mind to get to Canada. He stowed away on board the Aquitania, on which the party of Canadians returned to Canada. A day out from Liverpool the lad was discovered and was forced to work his passage in the stokehold. At Halifax he was due to be handed over to the immigration authorities, but he eluded them, doubtless his way being made easier for him by his soldier friends, who took him among them on the train and smuggled him across the continent until this coast was reached.

But the search for him had been prosecuted, and it was not long before his presence here was known to the authorities, and he was taken in charge.

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-amber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per acre, and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 3 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
