## Calgary Labor Convention Was Packed with "Reds" and Simultaneous Riots Proposed

### Evidence Given in Trial of Men Charged with Seditious Conspiracy at Winnipeg; Charter of the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council Revoked by Federation of Labor and Trades Congress

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, August 1.—There was some damaging evidence given here yesterday at the preliminary trial of the labor leaders who were arrested at the time of the big strike and charged with "seditious conspiracy."

A number of letters were read in court which had been seized by the Royal North West Mounted Police in Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary and Winnipeg. From these it was shown that the Calgary Labor Convention, which was held last March, was packed with "Reds." One suggestion made was to organize riots which were to start simultaneously in every town and city in Canada with the definite object of taking over the reins of government.

In connection with the seditious movement it was shown that a flood of propaganda literature was arranged, including the distribution of banned literature dealing with socialism and bolshevism to be distributed by the socialist party of Canada.

Winnipeg, August 1.—(noon) The charters of the Trades and Labor Council here from the American Federation of Labor and the Dominion Trades Congress was revoked at a meeting this morning by A. Farmiloe, organizer, representing the two executive bodies. This followed the actions of the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council on Tuesday voting to join the One Big Union and to turn over their correspondence to that body.

## TRY CAILLAUX FOR TREASON

Attorney-General of France Recommends that Case Come Before High Court.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, August 1.—Joseph Caillaux, former premier of France, is to be tried for treason. That is recommended by the Attorney-General and it is probable that he will be brought before the High Court in the near future.

Caillaux was arrested a year and a half ago on a charge of treason at the same time that Bolo Pasha was convicted and shot.

## VICTORY OVER BOLSHEVIKS

General Denikine Captures Town of Kamishin—Planes Bomb Kronstadt.

London, August 1.—General Denikine has gained an important victory over the Bolsheviks. He captured the town of Kamishin on the Volga and 5,000 Bolsheviks and nine guns and quantities of ammunition have been captured. Helsingfors, August 1.—Eight British airplanes from the cruisers in the Baltic Sea bombed Kronstadt.

## LONDON DAILY NEWS HAS TO APOLOGIZE

Says Imputations Against British Statesmen Which it Published Were Baseless.

London, August 1.—The Daily News has taken back its statement regarding Chamberlain, Long, and Geddes in which it said they had purchased mining shares in Russian concerns since the armistice was signed and, therefore, with a hostile country.

The London paper prints an apology in which it says that on investigation the imputations have been proven baseless.

## CHAUTAUQUA FESTIVAL IS NEXT MONTH

Committee Formed Last Night to Make Complete Arrangements For Important Musical Event.

FIVE PROGRAMS ARE TO BE GIVEN HERE

At the City Hall last night there was a gathering of citizens interested in the organization of a Chautauqua festival here this year. Miss Mason, the advance agent of the organization, explained the plan and as a result it was decided to hold a festival here this year early in September, giving five full programs of music and lectures.

The local committee chose Stanley Parker as president; Seymour Wright, secretary, and Harry McLeod, treasurer.

Advertising committee—J. G. Steen, W. E. Williams, and H. E. Ross.

Ticket committee—Messrs. McLeod, Matheson, Darton and King. Arrangement committee presided over by Mr. Pitman.

The Chautauqua party this year is made up of wholly new artists. There are two lectures, one given by a novelty lecturer and the other by an orator. Two orchestras are coming and there will also be all sorts of vocalists and dramatic interpreters and artists of various kinds. ## SHIPS COVER EVACUATION

British to Send Naval Force to Archangel to Protect Withdrawing Troops.

London, August 1.—The British Government is sending a naval force to cover the evacuation of Archangel and district and to protect the British and American forces that have been operating in that neighborhood.

## LIVING COSTS TO BE REDUCED

Conference to be Held at Washington With That End in View—Shoes Dearest.

Washington, Aug. 1.—Attorney General Palmer has summoned the heads of the important Government departments to confer immediately on the high cost of living and to consider measures to reduce prices to the average citizen.

Wage demands covering 85 per cent of the increase in the cost of living have been presented to the railway administration by representatives of the railway conductors, brakemen and shopmen.

Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 1.—That the price of footwear within the next few months would advance four dollars a pair, was a statement made by W. S. Duffield of John McPherson Shoe Co. The fault lies with the Chicago packers who have a monopoly on the leather. Sixty-five dollars is asked for a cowhide.

## HALIBUT BOATS BRING IN FISH

Canadians Sell for 11.20, Americans at 10.20—Cohoos Reach 70 Cents Each.

OVER TWENTY BOATS SOLD CATCHES TODAY

Friday is always a good market day for the fishermen and consequently a large number of boats are tied up at the dock waiting to discharge their catches. The new arrivals are: Tahoma, 10,000 lbs.; Laueing, 13,000; North Star, 18,000; C. Spencer, 14,000; Restitution, 27,000; Viking, 14,000; Dolphin, 11,000; Progress, 7,000; S. and S., 8,000; Livingstone, 29,400; Pioneer, 58,000; Emblem, 8,000; Grayling, 17,000; Agnes B., 8,000; Maud, 9,500; Wanderer, 7,000; Minnie V., 10,000, and C. F. No. 1, 10,000 pounds.

The American boats sold for about 10.20 per pound and the Canadians in the neighborhood of 11.20 per pound.

There were also a considerable number of salmon sold at the fish exchange early this morning. The Dip with 400 cohoes and 500 lbs. of springs, and the Bravo also with 400 cohoes and 500 lbs. of springs, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company at 14.20 per pound for the red salmon and 67 cents each for cohoes.

The Markwell with 2,000 lbs. of red salmon and 230 cohoes was bought by the Royal Fish Company at 14.50 a pound for red and the cohoes at 70 cents each.

## GENERAL UNREST IN GREAT BRITAIN REACHES POINT AT WHICH COMMERCE MENACED

### UPHEAVAL MAY MEAN DOWNFALL OF LLOYD GEORGE GOVERNMENT—LONDON POLICE DECIDE AGAIN TO GO ON STRIKE AS PROTEST AGAINST LEGISLATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, August 1.—The general industrial unrest in Great Britain, which has been seething ever since the armistice, seems to have reached a point which menaces the commerce of the country with at least temporary disaster. It is considered likely that it may mean the downfall of the Lloyd George Government.

The strikes of the past month have been serious enough, but merely symptomatic of the general dissatisfaction that prevails throughout the ranks of organized labor. Half a million Lancashire cotton operatives have been idle more than three weeks; two hundred thousand Yorkshire miners have been on strike since July 30; the Liverpool dockers have paralyzed shipping for three weeks; the bakers have decided to strike on Saturday, and now the London police are about to go on a second strike. The worst movement, however, is the threat of "direct action" by the tripe alliance of railwaymen, miners and transport workers. London Police Strike.

London, August 1.—An immediate strike of the London police was decided upon at a mass meeting here. The grievance is a bill before parliament providing for the organization of a policemen's union but prohibiting affiliation with labor unions. It also prohibits policemen going on strike under any circumstances, with heavy penalties for any infraction.

## MONTREAL TO HONOR CURRIE

City Planning to Have Parade and Reception for Canadian General.

Montreal, August 1.—General Currie is to be given a great reception on his arrival here. Plans are being made for a parade and reception to be followed by a public dinner at which the general will be the guest of honor, in appreciation of his services to the Empire. This will be the first of a series of similar events to celebrate his triumphal return.

## ADD LADIES TO HOSPITAL BOARD

Mrs. J. H. McLeod and Mrs. James M. Carmichael Took Seats Last Night for First Time.

Mrs. Jarvis H. McLeod and Mrs. James M. Carmichael took their seats on the hospital board for the first time last night as representatives of the Ladies' Auxiliary. They were appointed to committees, Mrs. Carmichael being added to the House Committee and Mrs. McLeod to the Finance Committee.

The matter of increasing the rates for private rooms was discussed and left in the hands of the Finance Committee for report. Tenders will be asked for 200 tons of coal and the question of painting the building was discussed.

## Ignorance Regarding Great Naas Valley

Rev. J. B. McCullagh  
Tells of the Country and its Possibilities.

Rev. J. B. McCullagh of Aiyansh on the Naas River, one of the pioneer missionaries of British Columbia, writes to tell of the wonders of the Naas Valley and of its possibilities in providing for returned soldiers. He tells of the rich soil, extending along the valley between Mill Bay and the Ground Hog mountains. He says that fully half a million people could find room to settle there.

All kinds of crops can be raised there, including cereals. Potatoes and tomatoes are a great crop, and all berries thrive well. There is plenty of fish in the river although salmon are being depleted to some extent. To quote from Mr. McCullagh's article:—

### Game.

In this country there is no paucity of game either large or small. First, we have no deer here, but caribou are plentiful. The grizzly bear is here in fine shape, and a small brown species. Black bears abound, also wolves, coyotes, lynx and all other smaller fur-bearing animals. The Indian is not a great hunter, having given himself up entirely to fishing for the canneries. The mountains are grand and very accessible. Once up you are in a new world, and if you want sport it is there in the shape of mountain goat and groundhog, both excellent meat. The great blue grouse and little ptarmigan abound there also. A fortnight on the mountains in September gives the dust to every other geegee that one may mount in this life.

There is no loneliness in the Aiyansh valley. Life and color, sight and sound alternate and weave together. There is no still night, music and pealing bells seem to make the welkin hum, and one lies under one's camp-tire listening in wonder at night. Birds are many, beautiful and just a wee bit warbly. The hummingbird abounds in summer, and there are always a few ringdoves about Aiyansh, and an occasional magpie for luck—or is it the other way? For the lover of flowers there is a continual feast and many surprises.

### The Climate.

A word about the climate, especially our winter climate, is necessary. The snow begins to fall about the middle of November. At first it comes and goes, and finally it stays and reaches a depth of 3 or 4 feet during the winter till end of March when it evaporates. Thirty degrees below zero is about our limit on the down grade, and over 100 degrees in the shade sometimes in summer is our upward limit. We have little or no rain during the winter and in zero weather the atmosphere and the skies are radiant, while the aurora enlivens the night. Life does not cloy at all. Spring sunshine begins to make itself pleasant about the middle of February, and in March the butterflies are simply gay and giddy as they come and go. We may have definite rain spells in the spring and autumn. Now and then a bad year is thrown in just to let us know. On the whole the climate of the Aiyansh valley is all that one can desire. At any rate there are no complaints to be heard here.

### Geographical Ignorance.

Geographical ignorance is the bane of this province. People do not know what is in their own backyard. How many business men in Rupert know anything about this grand potential vegetable garden of theirs? Hardly one! If this be so "up north," what are we to expect "down south"? A friend in Vancouver was asked to have 2,000 feet of lumber shipped from there to Arandale at the mouth of the Naas for us—a transaction requiring about six days. He telegraphed to enquire "whether we could not more conveniently get it from Port Essington or Hazelton?"—in each case of which it would take two or three months to see the order completed. Again, one would suppose that the great mail order houses of Vancouver would know better than anybody else the geographical conditions and climatic contingencies obtaining in the various parts of the province covered by their business. But, no; their circle of accurate information seems to be small: For example, last fall an order for winter provisions was sent to one of these houses which included 50 lbs. of bacon. The goods arrived minus the bacon by the last boat of the season, and a letter

asking us to say if another kind of bacon would suit? If so, would we kindly reply and they would send it on! When and how? The following year? Meanwhile an entire family had to go without its Sunday rasher for the whole winter in consequence! We once knew a Dublin "bobby" who, the Jackeens said, had never seen his feet, and British Columbia is like that man in its way, and for the same reason, a plethora of corporation in one place. Does not Vancouver say, "I am it?" and Victoria imagines the same.

### River Not Waterway.

Many things are problematical, but in the Aiyansh Valley one is surely certain, it is this: In seeking to promote the development of this valley we must cut the river out of our calculations. We have been credited with the river as with an asset, whereas it is a liability pure and simple which we can never hope to clear off. Speak no more of our "magnificent waterway"—it is a fraud, a white elephant, a handicap of the deepest dye. For six months of the year it is out of business. (Continued on Page 5.)

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Parties of adjacent pre-emptors with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptors are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

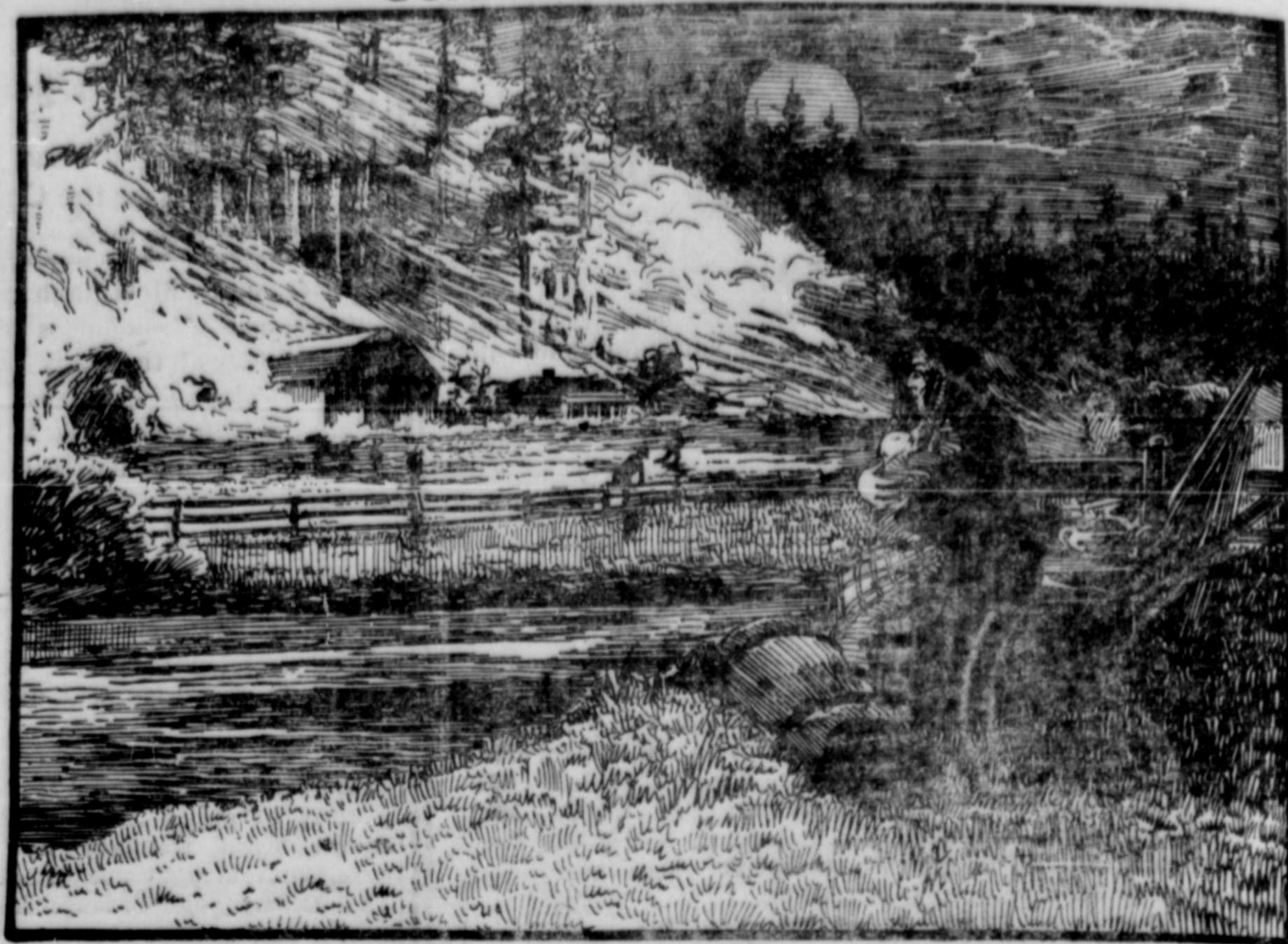

IGNORANCE REGARDING  
GREAT NAAS VALLEY

(Continued from Page 3.)

What though it be covered with ice, where can you get to with your sled and dogs? You have to leave them in the end and take across the mountain or launch a borrowed boat on the spume-crested waters of the estuary even to get to Mill Bay. Even when the river is running in summer she is extremely difficult and uncertain. No; we have nothing to expect from the river.

## Road to Terrace.

What we want is a road or a branch line of railway coming into the Naas Valley from Terrace. Already I am told there are 26 miles of road roughly completed from Terrace to the end of Kalum lake. This is one third the whole distance from Terrace to Aiyansh. Why not "continue the motion" and bring the road along into the Aiyansh Valley? If this road were completed so as to afford facilities for transportation at reasonable rates, what an impetus it would give to the development of the country! Freightage need not exceed three quarters of a cent per pound by motor lorry, and no truck need return empty to Terrace. In view of such a possibility the river vanishes away. A good deal of trail, bridge and road work has been already done in the valley, and all unconsciously in the line of the old trails leading from Terrace to the Grease trail, and so on to Hazelton. Therefore, in projecting such a road we are following the line of least resistance and the fingerpost of nature.

## Will Not Melt.

It is now up to the Government of the province to take hold of this road seriously. It should be made part of a wise scheme for planting the country with good men and true. Hitherto we have been planting traitors and aliens, whose mentality is no more capable of mixing with ours than oil is with water. The melting pot is all rubbish, they won't melt. So let us concentrate now upon what we know to be reliable material. Let the government buy back the purchased lands without compensation, and open them up to the soldiers. Also let the government send up a party to travel through all these valleys I have mentioned, and see if we have not got the plum of the province here as indicated.

Furthermore and first of all let this large district be properly organized and controlled. People fight shy of coming into an unorganized district especially if it be an Indian country. The Indians of this area are a fine people and good mixers. But the fact that they have grievance unredressed makes it all the more important that intending settlers should see law and order well represented in the land. The Indians are perfectly friendly to the white settlers, and that friendship should be appreciated by the authorities, and every possible occasion of friction carefully guarded against.

## GERMANS AROUSED PROTEST OF CROWD BY SHOUTING 'HOCH'

(Special via U.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, July 31.—The judge advocate who investigated the street demonstration against the German peace delegates at Versailles finds no case. It was established that the Germans aroused the protest of the crowd by sticking out their tongues at the spectators and shouting "hoch."

The charges that stones were thrown rest upon the unsupported testimony of Dr. Theodor Melchoire, one of the German financial delegates.

Fire Chief McDonald, City Engineer Clements and Water Foreman Walker are out with the men this morning taking notes of the amount of pressure.

The Tillamook arrived in port this morning with a large shipment of fish which will be sent by rail east. There was on board 6 car lots of pickled herring and 4,000 cases of salmon. This shipment is among the first of a number which will pass through the city in the next few months.
