It typifies the casting off of the soiled garments of the past and the adoption of the spiritually new. Darkness is behind. Sunlight is ahead. "Awaken thou that sleepest, arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light."







Then came the unhappy adventure into the Ruhr and the realization that there was a limit to the amount of reparations which the debtor nation could pay, and, what was more important still, a limit to the amount the creditor nations could afford to collect. It dawned upon the experts that if they had obliged Germany to pay the original bill, the whole of Europe would have been plunged into economic chaos. The collecting nations would have been choked in an in an industrial sense with German goods.
