Collective Purchasing to Prevent Undue Speculation And the Raising of Prices

International Action Proposed by Supreme Economic Council with View to Co-Operation Between Europe and America; Unwarranted Boosting of Prices made Action Necessary.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

London, August 2.—Steps toward the international collective purchasing of foodstuffs to check profiteering and speculation were taken at a meeting of the Supreme Economic Council.

A return to the system in vogue during the war was proposed by British, French and Italian representatives. The proposal was referred to a committee which will co-ordinate the plans and present a recommendation to the United States Government with an invitation for co-operation.

Owing to shortage of food and other supplies following the opening of business with Germany there has been great activity toward unwarranted price raising during the past thirty days. So marked has this become that the condition has become alarming.

LIBERALS ARE LOOKING FOR A NEW LEADER

Martin of Saskatchewan Being Looted by Western Representatives Fielding and McKenzie.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—The western delegates to the Liberal Convention are starting a movement to secure the leadership of the party for Premier Martin of Saskatchewan. Martin has already stated that he does not want the position but if it is formally offered it is thought he will accept.

The eastern delegates to the convention seem to be divided between W. S. Fielding and D. D. McKenzie. Fielding is a Liberal Unionist but he was very open in his criticisms of the Union Government. His choice would mean the healing of the breach between the stand-pat Liberals and the Liberal Unionists. McKenzie who was chosen as temporary leader is supported by the anti-unionist element in Quebec.

PEACE LOAN OF \$250,000,000

Five and a Half per cent Interest But Subject to Income Tax on Fifteen Year Bonds.

Ottawa, August 2.—Preparations are being made for the floating of the first Peace Loan, following the great victory. The sum to be raised is set at not less than \$250,000,000 and the interest to be paid will be 5½ per cent on fifteen year bonds.

The great difference between the new issue and the last is that these bonds will be taxable, whereas the last issue was free from income tax.

WALTER DRINNAN MEETS VETERANS

At the general meeting of the Great War Veterans last evening Walter Drinnan, the provincial secretary, addressed the gathering and gave some very useful information as to what the association in other parts of the province are doing. He told too of the recent convention and all that it meant to the members.

LESS SPEED FOR VESSELS IN HARBOR

Harbor Committee Recommends That Restrictions Be Placed For the Protection of Small Craft.

The harbor committee reported to the Board of Trade at its meeting last night recommending that speed regulations should be enforced as follows: Between Pillsbury Point and the cold storage, 8 knots; when passing Charles Point slow down to 8 knots, and when passing a tug with scow attached slow down to 4 knots.

The report which was signed by J. H. Pillsbury, R. Beaumont and T. Arneil was adopted and will be forwarded as a recommendation of the board to the proper authorities.

DR. S. F. TOLMIE THE NEW MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE IN THE UNION GOVERNMENT

MEMBER FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA'S CAPITAL JOINS BORDEN'S CABINET—WAS FORMERLY LIVE STOCK COMMISSIONER AND IS PRACTICAL FARMER

Ottawa, August 2.—The swearing in of the new Dominion cabinet ministers has, it is understood, been fixed for noon tomorrow. No official statement will be published until afterwards.

The generally accepted appointments are Henry Drayton as Minister of Finance and Dr. S. F. Tolmie of Victoria, B.C., as Minister of Agriculture.

Ottawa, August 2—(noon)—Dr. S. F. Tolmie of Victoria has accepted the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture giving British Columbia two ministers in the government. It is reported that Martin Burrell will resign and be given some appointment in British Columbia.

It is expected that Sir Henry will be appointed Minister of Finance today, and will probably be succeeded by F. B. Carvell, minister of Public Works. Mr. Car-

well will be succeeded by Sir Douglas Hazen.

Dr. S. F. Tolmie, the new Minister of Agriculture in the Borden cabinet, is a veterinary surgeon and farmer with a farm close to Victoria. He was for a number of years Live Stock Commissioner under the Dominion Department of Agriculture and is an authority on live stock and farming. He usually took a prominent part in the organizing of agricultural fairs and in judging cattle.

At the time of the movement to form a union government Dr. Tolmie was chosen as a candidate because he had taken no part in politics in the past and he stood high in the esteem of the people. He was elected over Stuart Henderson by an overwhelming majority and received the support of both the Victoria daily papers.

KING ASSENTS TO TREATIES

Peace Treaty and Anglo French Treaty Passed by Parliament and are Approved.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, August 2.—News dispatches from England stating that the King has given his assent to the Peace Treaty are arousing much concern. Just what the despatch means is uncertain. There were two bills before the British Parliament, one expressed approval of the German Peace Treaty and the other of the Anglo-French treaty.

Under the bills the King "may do everything necessary" for the carrying out of the treaties. It is assumed here that the despatches mean that the King has given his assent to the two bills.

PROVINCIAL CHARTER MAY BE CANCELLED

Declaration of Status of Labor Body is Asked by International Representatives at Vancouver.

Vancouver, August 2.—After having taken away the charter of the Trades and Labor Council, the international representatives are asking for a declaration of status from the British Columbia Federation of Labor.

If the provincial federation declares in favor of the One Big Union the Federation of Labor charter will be withdrawn from it.

Calgary, August 2.—Ed. Brown, secretary for the Trades District, No. 18 of the United Mine Workers refused to turn anything over to the international union as authorized.

Chautauqua Becomes
Popular Institution.

For fifty years the Chautauqua has been a more or less popular institution in the United States, growing in favor every year. For only three years have circuits been established in Canada, but already 300 towns are included in the circuits, whereas the first year there were but 42. The idea is largely educational, but amusement also enters into the programs.

The Chautauqua was originated by the Indians, it being an annual festival at which oratory and song were combined. The late Bishop Vincent conceived the idea of adapting the idea of the Chautauqua Indians so he established a summer school which gradually developed into the present institution. Already it has spread to New Zealand and Australia, and has been taken up with enthusiasm in the former country. Prince Rupert will hold her second Chautauqua Festival next month.

Much Good Land
Along G. T. P.

One of the speakers at the banquet at Prince George given to the members of the visiting Boards of Trade stated that less than ten per cent of the land in this province was agricultural land and that more than half of it was along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. If that is true, and there is no reason to doubt it, the future of the country between here and Prince George seems very bright. It takes time to develop an agricultural community, but, where the clearing is light, as it is in those districts, it is not many years before an energetic people are getting results.

Britain Has Back
To Land Policy.

Great Britain has a "back to the land" policy, especially with a view to caring for the returned soldiers. She proposes to make available certain tracts of farm land and the Board of Agriculture has been empowered to spend \$100,000,000 in settling returned soldiers. The Board has authority to purchase 60,000 acres in England and 20,000 acres in Scotland. Four small colonies totalling 6,000 acres have been established. The settlement is following largely the plan of colonies divided into small farms with a central demonstration farm which will supply instructors for the settlers in the colony and where implements for working the land will be available.

An educational qualification is exacted. The British scheme is designed to settle all ranks providing they are of suitable educational promise.

Allowances amounting to \$725 a year are provided for residential training with experienced farmers. A man who has been a life long agriculturist is required to put in at least one season in this way on probation before the Board will settle him in a colony. A longer period for less experienced farmers is provided.

The plan does not contemplate extensive credit to the occupiers of land in soldier colonies. A co-operative credit bank is to be established in partnership with the State and will extend credit for the purchase of stock and equipment.

Time to Think
About the Winter.

The autumn will be here very soon and it is time the people of this city were considering whether they are going to drift through without making any provision for winter sports. Last autumn the influenza came and upset all our plans. This year it is to be hoped that there will be no such visitation.

The city is fairly well provided for summer sports, but there is nothing to do in the winter. A strong amateur organization is required that will make provision for the physical development of the young people, men and women. Whatever is done there will have to be a manager or paid secretary who will give whole time to the work. Now is the time to begin thinking about it. We hope to have more to say on the subject later.

EXCEPTION TO NEGLECT BY SCRIBBLERS

Resolution Passed by Board of Trade Asks Members to Look Out for Publicity Features.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last evening the following resolution was passed on motion of G. W. Nickerson:

"It is with regret that our Board learned that a body of 225 editors of the National Editorial Association of the United States, now touring Western Canada under the auspices of the Dominion Government, will not be given an opportunity of making a trip to Prince Rupert and obtaining first-hand information as to the valuable industries and resources of northern and Central British Columbia. In wording this resolution we are not solely prompted from a residential point of view but more particularly through national sentiment in order that our fair Dominion as a whole may benefit by the exploitation of our undeveloped natural resources. No portion of Canada can compare favorably with this section of the country in this respect and what will help us will help our country in general."

"Be it resolved that this, the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, petition the Hon. John Oliver, Premier of the province, to assign to the head of this industry a man sufficiently interested to justify its existence, or abolish the department, and

"Be it resolved that in our opinion the work of this department is practically confined to the collecting of data, from year to year, said data as published being largely a repetition of previous reports, the only real changes being in figures, and

"Be it resolved that the provincial Government take steps to compile data to lay before the Hon. Mr. Ballantyne, on his proposed visit to this city in September, in an effort to convince him of the abuses that exist in the fishing industry of this province."

"This data should be compiled independently of the present fisheries staff."

"We would recommend that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Hon. T. D. Pattullo."

A RESOLUTION IN REGARD TO THE FISHERIES

Board of Trade Takes Exception to Neglect of Fishing Industry By Minister.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade held last evening in the council chamber the following resolution, moved by G. W. Nickerson and seconded by Jas. McTae, was passed:

"It is with regret that our Board learned that a body of 225 editors of the National Editorial Association of the United States, now touring Western Canada under the auspices of the Dominion Government, will not be given an opportunity of making a trip to Prince Rupert and obtaining first-hand information as to the valuable industries and resources of northern and Central British Columbia. In wording this resolution we are not solely prompted from a residential point of view but more particularly through national sentiment in order that our fair Dominion as a whole may benefit by the exploitation of our undeveloped natural resources. No portion of Canada can compare favorably with this section of the country in this respect and what will help us will help our country in general."

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"We would recommend that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Hon. T. D. Pattullo."

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$5.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but articles of not more than 50 acres may arrange for adjustment pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records of timber rights permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided necessary improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased; but not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Retitle of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys advanced, or been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirectly, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on failure to make payment, or to make payment, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on number ranged; priority for established or registered stockmen may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.







Berries Will Be Gone Soon, But Other Fruits are Arriving.

Now is the time to buy fresh fruits for preserving. The market for strawberries is rapidly on the wane and local merchants are not sure from one train to another as to the possibility of getting a further supply. The up river berries which have been in such fine condition so far are now becoming less firm although still fairly plentiful. Apricots are now arriving in twenty pound crates which is a very convenient quantity for preserving.

There is very slight fluctuation in the prices in the more staple line of goods. Dry onions are down to ten cents per pound otherwise the vegetables remain the same. Meat prices have been falling steadily for the past few weeks and veal and mutton are now at a considerably lower value. Cooked ham has climbed the scale to 75 cents per pound.
