The Prince Rupert Board of Trade last night took the first step in the direction of the formation of a new province by deciding to submit to the Associated Boards of Trade at their annual convention here at the end of the month a resolution asking for the appointment of a committee to inquire into whether the northern part of British Columbia, north of the 52nd parallel, was getting a fair return in the matter of appropriations for the money

BLISS CARMAN DIED TODAY

Famous Canadian Poet Passed Away at New Canaan Suddenly at Noon

NEW CANAAN, Conn., June 8.—Bliss Carman, the Canadian poet, dropped dead here at noon today at the home of Dr. Thomas Tunney. He was 66 years of age.

Carman loved the springtime and some of his finest songs dealt with that period of the year. He adored Nature in every phase and all outdoor life inspired him. He was born in New Brunswick in 1861 of United Empire Loyalist stock and was also a descendant of Ralph Waldo Emerson. He was a cousin and close associate of Charles G. D. Roberts, who also sang of the Canadian outdoors. He was, in turn, a teacher, journalist and later in life lived in the United States in order to be in close touch with the market for his wares.

Carman published a number of books of poetry.

MINING ROAD AT STEWART

Expected at Victoria That Line Will Be Controlled by C. P. R. Soon

VICTORIA, June 7.—Following the recent announcement that the Canadian Northeastern Railway at Stewart had been granted a lease of the foreshore at the head of Portland Canal, it is said here that the line will undoubtedly be taken over by C. P. R. interests as part of their scheme for developing the mines of Northern British Columbia through the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co.

The understanding here is that the railway will be put in good shape up the Bear River as far as the George Copper and surveys will be carried out beyond that point. For the time being the railway will be used for mining purposes with the probability of extending it into the interior as the country develops. No official announcement has yet been made, but it is thought H. H. Stevens will be heard from very soon.

BOUNTIES ON GAME PESTS


Sum of \$40 Will Be Paid For Cougar, \$15 for Timber Wolves and 50c for Owls

VICTORIA, June 8.—One of the first regulations promulgated by the new game commissioner, A. Bryan Williams, deals with bounties. On cougar the bounty is to be \$40, on timber wolves \$15, and big horned owls 50c. The carcass of the cougar or timber wolf must be produced in order to collect the bounty and must not be less than a week old when killed.

CONVICTION IS QUASHED

Hazelton Man Wins Chamber Action Against Assizes; Injunction Against James Hunter

On certiorari application of Thomas Brown, Mr. Justice Alexander, in chambers at the Supreme Court assizes yesterday afternoon, quashed two convictions by William Grant, former justice of the peace at Hazelton, against Daleta Small for assault. Small fines and costs were ordered returned. His Lordship reserved his decision in the matter of costs.

On application of W. O. Fulton on behalf of the Workmen's Compensation Board, Mr. Justice Fisher granted an injunction restraining James Hunter from carrying on his business until Workmen's Compensation Act dues have been paid. The Workmen's Compensation Board has a judgment against Mr. Hunter.

Certiorari proceedings on behalf of Mrs. Osawa of Queen Charlotte City against a conviction and a fine of \$300 for selling liquor were dropped.

A second divorce case which was to have come up at the Assizes was also dropped.

CABINET IS SWORN IN BY KING GEORGE

LONDON, June 8.—The cabinet of Ramsay Macdonald was in full office today. The members journeyed to Windsor Castle this morning, paid their respects to the King, and returned to London bearing the seals of office.

"My colleagues and I were highly delighted to find the King looking so well and to see how magnificently he was able to go through the ceremony without any suggestion of strain," said Mr. Macdonald.

Former Red Army Leader Wishes to Survey Publication of Autobiography

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 8.—Leon Trotzky, former Red army leader, has applied to Premier Ramsay Macdonald for permission to visit England for "urgent medical treatment and scientific work."

Trotzky's son also asked the British consul for a visa on the grounds of the necessity for very urgent medical treatment and the desire to survey the publication of his autobiography in English.

TWO PEERAGES LABOR PARTY

LONDON, June 8.—In the course of a few days, it is expected, peerages will be bestowed on Sir John Sankey and Rt. Hon. Sidney Webb, two members of the Labor cabinet without seats in the House of Commons. They will represent the House of Lords in the administration.

NEGLECTED SADLY

We wish it were possible to commend the Government for its activity on the Skeena River highway. On that subject the Government seems to be silent and so do local supporters of the Government. That is the sad thing. The men who were so keen to get the road when the Oliver Government was in office have lost their enthusiasm now. Possibly they will speak at the right time. We are hoping for better things, anyway. We cannot expect to get action unless all are united in the effort to secure it.

PROPOSED MOVE IS GOOD ONE

The proposed move of the Provincial Government to market to settlers the rich agricultural lands held by them along the line between Smithers and Prince George is a good one. Too much attention has been paid to the P. G. E. country and not enough to the Bulkley and Nechaco Valleys. What is needed is to have that country settled up as intensively as possible. We have more than once objected to the attention given the other sections of the country to the neglect of Central British Columbia valleys.

One thing it is to be hoped will be insisted upon and that is that sales will be made only to bona fide settlers. We do not want a repetition of Rattenbury lands fiasco. If some middleman makes a profit out of the lands the settlers make less. It is surely enough to have to clear those lands without having to pay for the privilege. If the Tolmie Government carries out the policy of settling the vacant lands of the interior, we feel sure it will receive the united support of the whole of Northern and Central British Columbia in the enterprise.

MELBORNE AND PRINCE RUPERT

We have a communication from A. Tessier of Terrace enclosing a clipping in regard to high prices secured for real estate in the city of Melbourne. That city is 100 years old and Prince Rupert 20. He suggests that possibly Prince Rupert will be quite as wonderful a city as Melbourne in eighty years. He is right. It will be even more wonderful, for it will have had to overcome the inertia of citizens, the continual pounding of enemies, the snubs of friends and many natural handicaps. Yet, as he says, the city is wonderful already, for its age.

The Letter Box

FISH TRAPS

Editor, Daily News:—
In reference to the statement, given in your paper of yesterday's date to wit, that the commissioner, Judge J. N. Ellis, had given his finding in favor of traps, I would like to place before the public the following remarks:
It would appear that the commissioner favors traps to all and sundry, in the prescribed area for a limited time, to find out more conclusively in what direction the fish caught are travelling. This appears to me to be both foolish and dangerous, in the extreme. Why instal traps to find out the travelogue of salmon in these waters?

Fish can be caught, and tagging operations conducted on an extensive scale, which would provide the information desired, by already existent methods of fishing, i.e., either seining or trolling and as a fisherman, protest against this additional method of fishing, being granted to the canners under this guise.

If the reason is legitimate, then I consider, it is no kindness to the canners themselves, to allow them to spend considerable money for installation of traps, and then probably refuse them the following season.

One of the chief reasons submitted by the Canadian Fish Co. why traps should be granted to them, was because of the fact that they had run to considerable expense in 1925, and upon being refused these licenses in 1926 had lost heavily on their investment. I would call the attention of the public that right in the current issues of the Daily News there are nine trap sites being applied for, in this particular area, and this does not constitute any more than half of what will be placed there, as no mention is made of the B. C. Packers, who leave no grass growing under their feet in business competition.

PLEA FOR SUPPORT OF THE PRINCE RUPERT MUSEUM

Editor, Daily News:—
The fact that there is in Prince Rupert a museum seems not to be generally known. As chairman of the Museum Board, I should like to lay before not only the citizens of Prince Rupert, but the whole northern portion of this province, the necessity of interesting ourselves in the matter. Prince Rupert will, in the near future, be a great city, possibly the capital of a new province. It

it already the terminal city of the greatest railroad on the American continent. It is the See city of two great religious denominations and is the natural distributing point for the whole of this northern district whether by land or water and will ultimately be the outlet for the coal-fields and agricultural areas to the east of us.

It, too, is a central meeting place for the surrounding Indian tribes and will ever be the hub of the fishing industries of the North Pacific and will yearly be the objective of increasing thousands of tourists.

At the present time this district is rich in relics of a very ancient past—relics that represent an aboriginal civilization sufficient in itself for the natives were wholly self dependent. There are homes both native and white possessing such relics or

curios which in time will be lost if not properly cared for. The present owner may now appreciate, what a future one might deem rubbish and so destroy.

Why not present such articles to the museum where for all time they will bear your name. Few will ever see or care to see your tombstone, but hundreds of thousands in the ages to come will read that "you" presented "this" to the museum.

May I suggest that the canneries donate as complete outfit as possible of the old hand can-making and canning machinery with samples of cans and labels.

This North Pacific is a veritable treasure house of interesting and unique marine life that can easily be preserved by careful drying. Fishermen and others might well make gifts of Medusa's hairs Crabs, Polyyps (corals, etc.), Echinodermata (starfish,

etc.), and hunters' and trappers' rare specimens of birds and fur bearing animals.

May I urge too, the natives of the various reserves both on the islands and mainland to donate sections covering, as fully as possible, their own peculiar tribal life.

It is hoped that every citizen will use his influence to boost so worthy an enterprise and help out financially by purchasing a 1929-30 membership ticket for one dollar. The money thus secured will enable the board to purchase, when it thinks advisable, articles that cannot otherwise be obtained.

Be loyal, give the youngsters an objective education, interest and entertain the old folk. Give visitors something to see, something to remember, and something to write and talk about.







Waterfront Whiffs

Season's Work at Biological Station; Power Cruiser Marjorie Changes Hands; Halibut Landings

Following the return to the city this week of John Dybhavn, director from Prince Rupert of the Biological Board of Canada, and D. B. Finn, director of the local Fisheries Experimental Station, from Ottawa, where they attended the annual meeting of the Biological Board of Canada, the coming year's program of work at the local biological station is announced, as well as a number of new appointments to the staff.

In addition to the investigations into dogfish oil which have been carried on for the past year or so, the industry has also demanded that there be investigation into the possibilities of edible oils and fats from the pilchard fish. This will be undertaken as soon as a suitable mat can be found to take up the work.

Salmon tagging operations are also to be extended this year and will be carried on more intensively in the vicinity of Hippo, North and Dundas Islands. Taggers are already at work at Hippo Island. The following permanent appointments to the staff of the local station are announced:

O. Denstedt of the University of Manitoba to be assistant chemist.

O. Young of the University of Saskatchewan to be mechanical engineer.

R. H. Bedford of McGill University, bacteriologist.

Dr. F. C. Harrison of McGill University will be unable to come to Prince Rupert this summer to continue investigations into the discoloration of halibut, but it is hoped that Prof. Wilfrid Sadler of the University of British Columbia, who was associated with Dr. Harrison in this work last year, will again be here for a short time at least.

In addition to Peter Black of the University of British Columbia, who is already here, C. D. B. Duff of the University of Toronto has been appointed to the summer staff.

Dr. Denstedt and Mr. Duff are already here.

It is expected that steps will be taken this year to conduct biological surveys in connection with the condition of rivers and propagation of salmon on the Skeena and Naas Rivers, such as are now being carried out on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Marjorie Sold

The Chatham Straits Packing Co. has purchased from Dr. H. L. Alexander of Prince Rupert, and will use as a manager's scout boat in connection with its new cannery on Humpback Bay, Porcher Island, the well known speed cruiser Marjorie. The Marjorie is thirty-three feet long and is equipped with a 100 h.p. Kermath engine. The vessel was brought to Prince Rupert by Dr. Alexander from Ketchikan some two or three years ago. She is a very speedy craft.

S. E. Parker's garage at Prince Rupert reports the sale of a number of Ballantyne heavy duty and Ford Marine engines during the past few weeks.

A 25-35 h.p. Ballantyne engine was purchased by George Ringstad, manager of Port Edward cannery, for a new cannery runabout. A. W. Pilling went to Port Edward to supervise the installation.

A 14-16 Ballantyne engine was purchased by W. R. Sampson of Port Simpson for installation in a new trolling boat.

Four or five rebuilt Ford Marine engines which have been sold included one which will be installed in a 27 foot runabout for W. A. Clark of Anyox.

The Imperial Machine Works, Prince Rupert, has recently completed the installation of a 70 h.p. Atlas-Imperial full diesel engine in the fish packer Oden which is owned by J. W. Moorehouse and Capt. E. H. Simpson and operates out of the Langara Fishing & Packing Co.'s cannery at New Massett, Queen Charlotte Islands.

This was one of four or five smaller installations which have recently been carried out by the Imperial Machine Works.

K. T. Sumura, Japanese boat-builder in Cow Bay, Prince Rupert, has just laid the keel for a forty foot trolling boat. Before completion it is expected that a

The United Church mission boat Thomas Crosby arrived in port on Thursday afternoon from Vancouver, having on board Capt. William Oliver and Rev. R. C. Scott and the latter's wife. The vessel proceeded from here to Port Simpson and, returning yesterday, left today for the Queen Charlotte Islands to resume her marine mission work there. Mr. Scott, who has proven highly popular on the Islands during his stay of the past few years there, will pay his farewell visits on this occasion to his many friends as he is being transferred to the mainland, his place to be taken by Rev. S. V. A. Redman. The Thomas Crosby towed this far north a smaller boat which was bought recently in Vancouver and will be used in missionary work out of Anyox by Rev. James De-war.

On McLean Ways

Capt. Herman Helin's fish packer Ecstall has been on the McLean Ways at Seal Cove during the week. Hull work was carried out and the tailshaft drawn in order to make repairs.

George Roger, second in command at the Star Welding & Repair Works, was back on the job again this week after a month's holiday sojourn in the south during the course of which he attended to the important business of seeing that his sister was properly married. Altogether, it was a very pleasant trip, George says, and there were only three days rain all the time he was gone which is pretty good for that less favored part of the world. He spent most of the time in Vancouver but also slid over to Victoria for a couple of days to see if any repairs might be needed in the gears of the legislative mill and spent a brief time rusticiating at Cobble Hill in the Cowichan district. George behaved so well while away that his wife let him come home alone.

On Ward Ways

The halibut boat Volunteer, Capt. M. Johnson, has been on the Ward Ways the latter part of this week for minor overhaul work below the water line. Other boats on the same ways during the past week have included the Rupert Marine Products power tug Cumshewa, Capt. Alfred Swanson's cruiser Myfanwy and George Cook's halibut boat Mayflower.

Capt. Severed Olsen, formerly owner of the local boat Johanna and last here some two or three years ago with the Sadie K., was welcomed by many local friends this week when he came in for the first time with his American boat Summit to sell a catch on the Fish Exchange. He is a brother of Capt. Cris Olsen of the Selma. The Summit was built two years ago in Seattle and has been regularly landing her catches at that port, this having been her first visit here.

An 8 h.p. Vivian engine has been recently installed in the local trolling boat Stroller.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1929 season up to June 7 amounted to 10,894,250 pounds as compared with 10,402,400 pounds at a similar date last year, the present year maintaining its lead over last year in spite of the fact that there had been a distinct falling off in landings during the latter part of May and the early part of June. The American landings for the present season to date, totalling 7,781,700 pounds, are ahead of last year's 7,413,400 pounds, while Canadian aggregate fares, amounting to 3,112,550 pounds, are also in advance of last year's 2,898,000 pounds.

During the week of June 1-7 landings amounted to 641,400 pounds of which 252,100 pounds was from Canadian boats and 389,300 pounds from American. Prices during the week averaged well. The high price for Canadian fish was 15.1c and 7c which the Tramp received for 16,000 pounds while the top bid for American halibut was 17.5c and 8c which the Jack was paid for 3,500 pounds. Low prices of the week were 12c and 7c received by the Canadian Nuba for 5,500 pounds and 12.4c and 7c paid the American Brisk for 30,000 pounds.
