LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

Corp. Cameron R.C.M.P. returned to the city on the Princess Louise yesterday afternoon following a brief trip to Skagway.

Rev. W. H. Pierce, United Church clergyman at Port Essington, is paying a brief visit to the city, having come in on yesterday afternoon's train.

Mrs. Jones, wife of the watchman at Shannon Bay cannery, Massett Inlet, and child arrived in the city on the Prince Charles this morning from the islands.

The case of John McKay, charged with vagrancy, was further adjourned for eight days on coming up before Magistrate McClymont in city police court this morning.

Provincial Constable Andrew Grant of Massett arrived in the city from the islands on the Prince Charles this morning and will be in town for the next few days.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Smedley of Vanderhoof, who have been visiting in Massett, arrived in the city on the Prince Charles this morning from the islands and will be here for a day or so before returning to the interior.

G. W. Taylor, chief clerk to the local auditor, Canadian National Railways, Vancouver, arrived in the city on the Prince Charles this morning after having made the round trip to Stewart, Anyox and Massett Inlet and will proceed south on the Prince Rupert tonight.

Robert Baird, inspector of municipalities, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon in the course of an inspection trip north and, after spending the day here, proceeded by train this morning to visit Terrace, Burns Lake and other interior municipalities.

B. F. Messner, well known Smithers mining man, arrived in the city from the interior on this afternoon's train and will sail tonight on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver.

Neil McLean, arrived in port at 8 o'clock this morning from Stewart, Anyox and Massett Inlet and will be here until Saturday night at 10 o'clock when she will sail for Vancouver via all Queen Charlotte Island points, relieving the Prince John on that route.

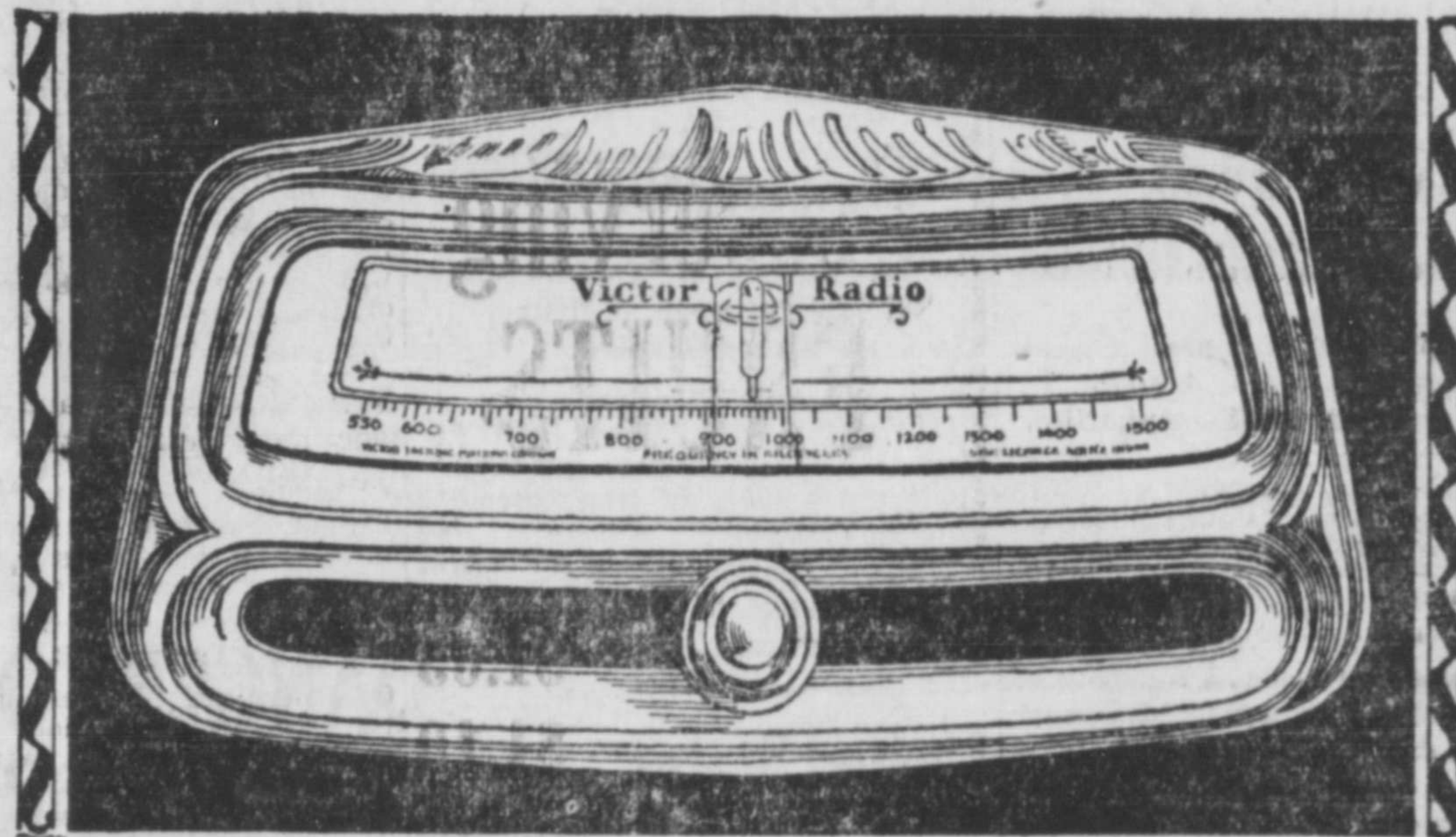

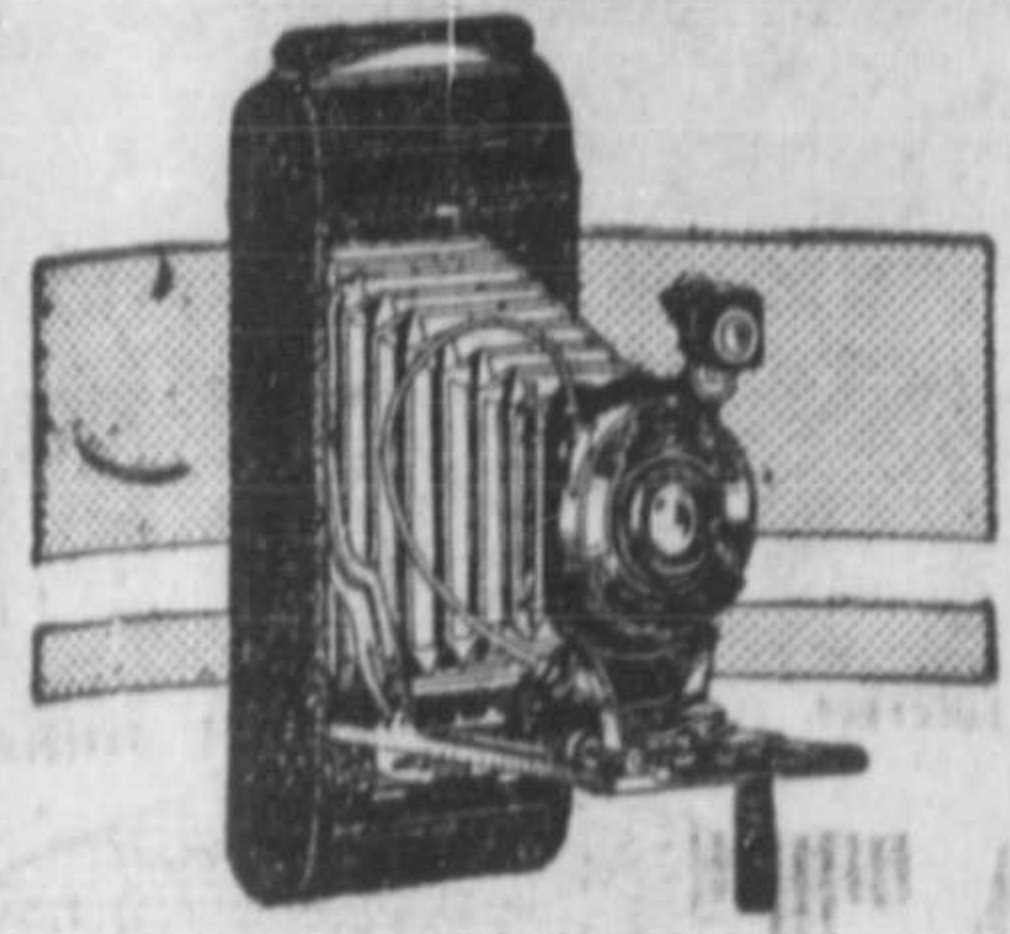

"Yes," said Axelsson, "but you wouldn't notice the green stain unless you looked at them carefully. An ordinary bright light hurts his eyes."

CITY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Principals Made Reports to Board at Monthly Meeting Last Night

There are a total of 1073 pupils in attendance at the high and public schools of the city according to reports presented to the school board at its meeting last night by the various principals. The attendance per school is as follows:

High School	208
Booth	468
Borden	316
Seal Cove	59
Westview	22

Miss E. A. Mercer, principal of Booth Memorial School, stated that the attendance there was a single one child less than at the beginning of the term last year. The attendance at the other schools is reported, however, to be slightly higher than last year.

High School
D. H. Hartness, principal of the high school, complained at the fact that a number of pupils were anywhere from a few days to a few weeks late in coming to school after the opening of the term. This might adversely affect the success of their studies during the year, particularly the more backward pupils, who peculiarly enough, were the worst offenders. Of the total of 208 enrolled in high school, there was the over proportionate number of 51 in the commercial class which was crowded and where there was a shortage of typewriters. There were but seven pupils enrolled in the senior matriculation class.

Mr. Hartness referred to plans that were being laid for the year's work. There had been a few minor difficulties at the commencement of the term but it was anticipated these would soon be overcome.

The lack of an assembly place capable of containing all the pupils was being felt in the high school. The chemical laboratory was in a deplorable state with much equipment and materials destroyed.

Sports such as football, softball, basketball, etc. were being organized in the high school but the Cadet Corps did not seem to be popular, only 29 being enrolled. Mr. Hartness stated it was hoped later to give some attention to the social side of school life.

Booth School
Owing to the uneven numbers in the classes, there were some difficulties in grading, Miss Mercer, principal of Booth School, reported. Classes were averaging from 38 to 63 pupils. Miss Mercer said she was more than pleased with the splendid condition she had found the school in at the commencement of the term. This had proven very encouraging.

Borden School
Miss Mills, principal of Borden Street School, stated that her school was in much better shape as a result of repairs that had been made during the holidays. She informed the board that Miss Rivett, Miss McKay, Miss Shiel, Mr. O'Neill and her self of Borden Street staff had attended summer school.

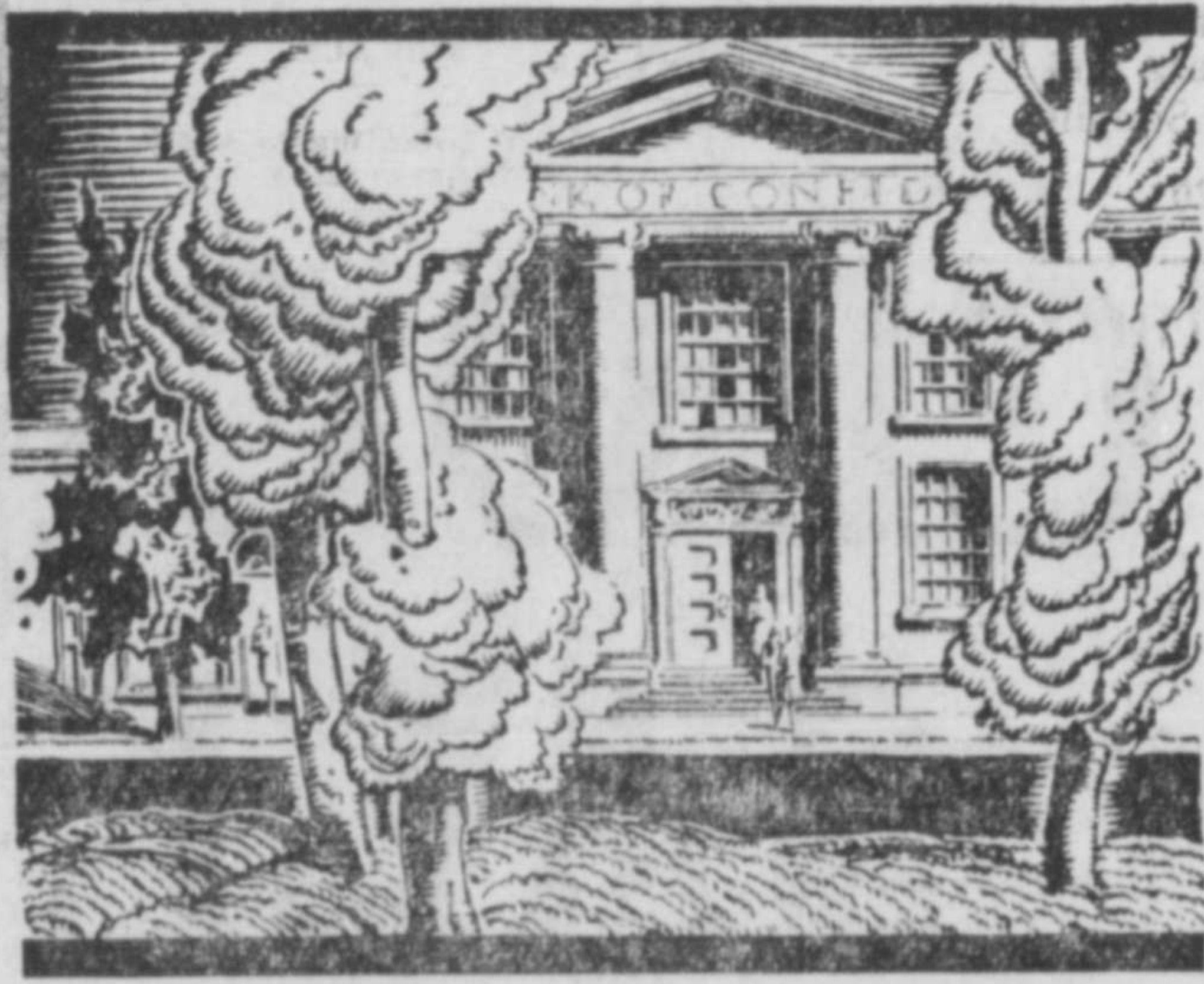

PRINCE RUPERT PARTY THRILLED WITH VISIT INTO PEACE DISTRICT

EDMONTON, Aug 9.—The whole delegation has been thrilled by the visit to the Peace River country, and especially by their little dip into the British Columbia section of that huge district. There were fairly good crops everywhere, but the crops around Rolla in the B. C. block seemed to us to be heavier than elsewhere. So enthused were the seven men of our party that it has proved difficult to keep some of them away from the land recorder's office.

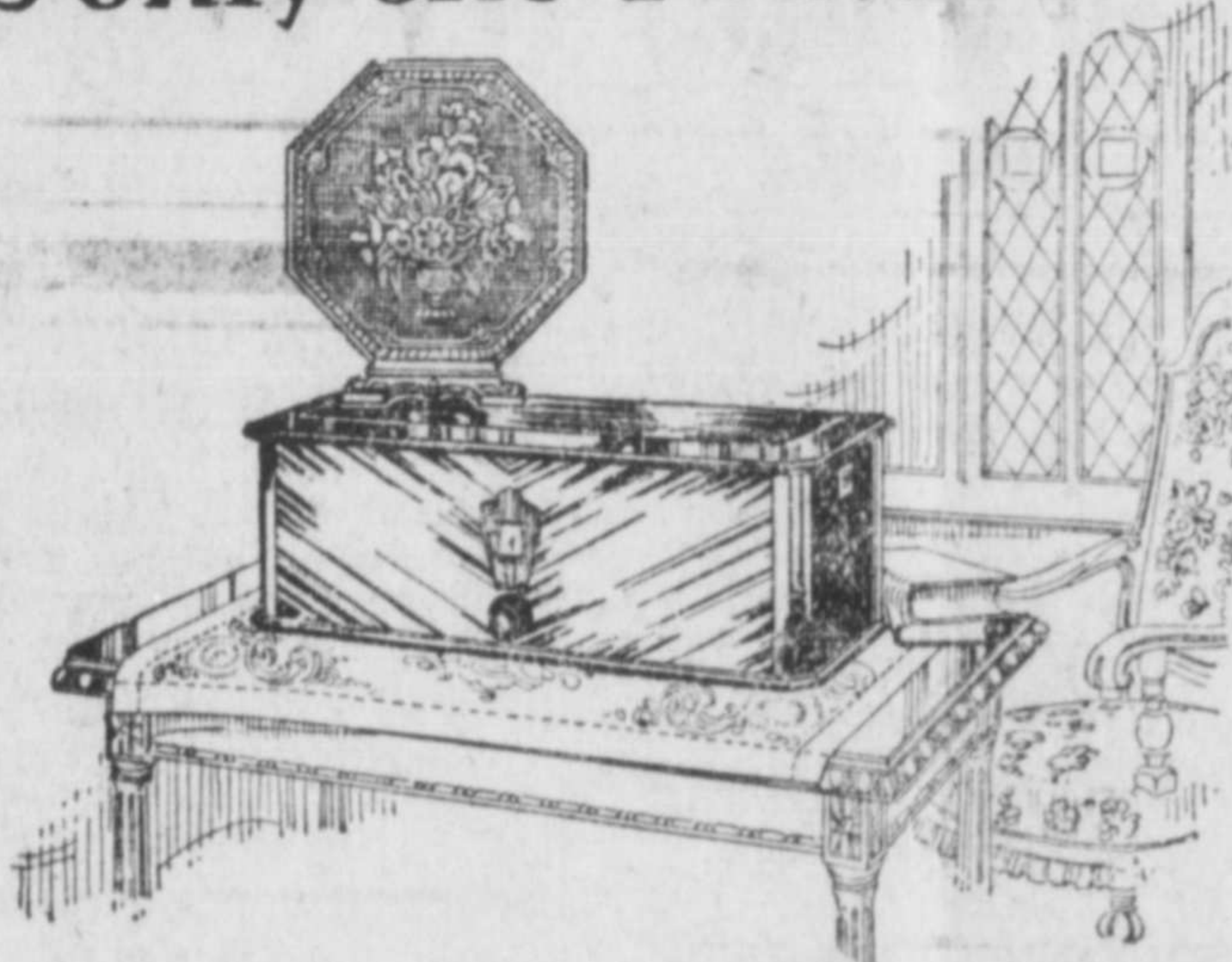
So far as we were able to see, the British Columbia block is the choicest part of the Peace River district. Also we got reports from those who had visited the more distant parts of the block and all agree that it is a wonderful country and demands immediate transportation facilities. The British Columbia section will thresh a million bushels this year and next year the residents say they will have three million, so rapid is the growth of population there. Settlers are pushing on into the west and north and there seems no limit to the distance they may go. Wheat lands are everywhere. This year grain will be hauled over one hundred miles to rail head and next year it will be worse.

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swaths and then picked up by the same machine and threshed. This particular machine had the previous day cut with the swather 52 acres in seven hours 52 minutes and this will be threshed by the same machine this week if the weather is fine.

Mr. Vandewater has a field of wheat that will thresh fifty bushels to the acre. Other seasons he has had even more than that. The whole Peace country will average, it is said, 25 bushels to the acre. Much of the land in the Peace is covered with light poplar or willow, which is easily cleared. Everywhere we went there were large fields of newly-cleared and broken land, some of them 160 acres in extent. These will all be cropped next year. Farther away from the railway, the amount of new land is said to be even greater than where we went.

The whole route of the visitors was carefully planned. At Sexsmith the party divided, some going into B. C. and others remaining in Alberta, and giving more time to the experimental farm and other features. We were at the experimental farm only a few minutes and there we were greeted by Miss Olga Kolosoff, formerly an employee of McRae Bros., in their art department. She rode with us as far as Grande Prairie and returned with her employer, Mr. Albright, director of the farm. We regretted being unable to stop long at the farm, but evening was falling and we had to be in Grand Prairie for a meeting.

Land of Opportunity
Mr. Albright seemed a very capable man. He gave an address at the evening meeting in which he showed that he had a clear grasp of Alberta conditions and the vastness of the country and its possibilities.

While still as confident as ever of the future of Prince Rupert and of the opportunities that exist there, I also feel sure that anyone who likes grain growing and can stand a cold winter would make no mistake in going to the Peace River. It is a land of opportunity. They have excellent roads, schools and other facilities. Before long these will improve. The Prince Rupert delegation was more convinced than ever before that the Peace River country is one to which Prince Rupert should link her fortunes. Our interests are identical and we took every occasion to tell them so.
