





Was Used Recently in Convocation of Canterbury at St. Paul's Cathedral

LONDON, Sept. 11-It may surprise some good Anglicans to learn that at least one of the Occasional Forms of Service of the Church of England is still conducted in Latin.

This was used the other day at the opening of the Convocation of Convocation of Canterbury. The \$1.35 service was held at St. Paul's Cathedral and followed the order 30c which is always used at the opening of Convocation immediately following a general election.

The processional psalms, the Litany, Anthem and Benediction were 15c any, Anthem and Benediction were all sung or said in Latin, and the Dean of St. Paul's delivered his 250 sermon in the same tongue. The holding of this service goes back 100 to the earliest days of parliamentary history.




