VANCOUVER, Dec. 12.—Four money bylaws calling for the expenditure of \$2,800,000 for a new bridge over False Creek at Burrard Street, a \$300,000 airport development, \$350,000 for fire and police alarm headquarters, and \$750,000 for sewers, making a total of \$4,200,000, were endorsed by the ratepayers yesterday by large majorities.

Planning Tunnel Europe to Africa

MADRID, Spain, Dec. 12.—A beginning has been made on the exploration shaft of the scheme for tunnelling under the Straits of Gibraltar, the boring having been begun on the Spanish coast near Tarifa, about 15 miles west of the Rock of Gibraltar. In a short time a similar shaft will be sunk in Morocco, and all sorts of experiments will be made in the hope of discovering what the soil between the narrow intercontinental stretch of sea is like and whether it is suitable for a tunnel.

Floods Increase in South and West of England When Rivers Overflow Banks and Cover Route

LONDON, Dec. 12.—South and west Britain's flooded rivers continued to rise today, inundating considerable sections of farm land and urban districts and threatening vast further damage. The Thames valley, Somersetshire and parts of the western midland counties are particularly hard hit. Fed by their small tributaries, now swollen to torrents, the Severn, Wye, Usk, Tone and Parrett Rivers in the west and the Thames in the south poured millions of tons of water over miles of country. In some cases the water was two to five feet deep over the thoroughfares. Many towns could not be approached from various directions.

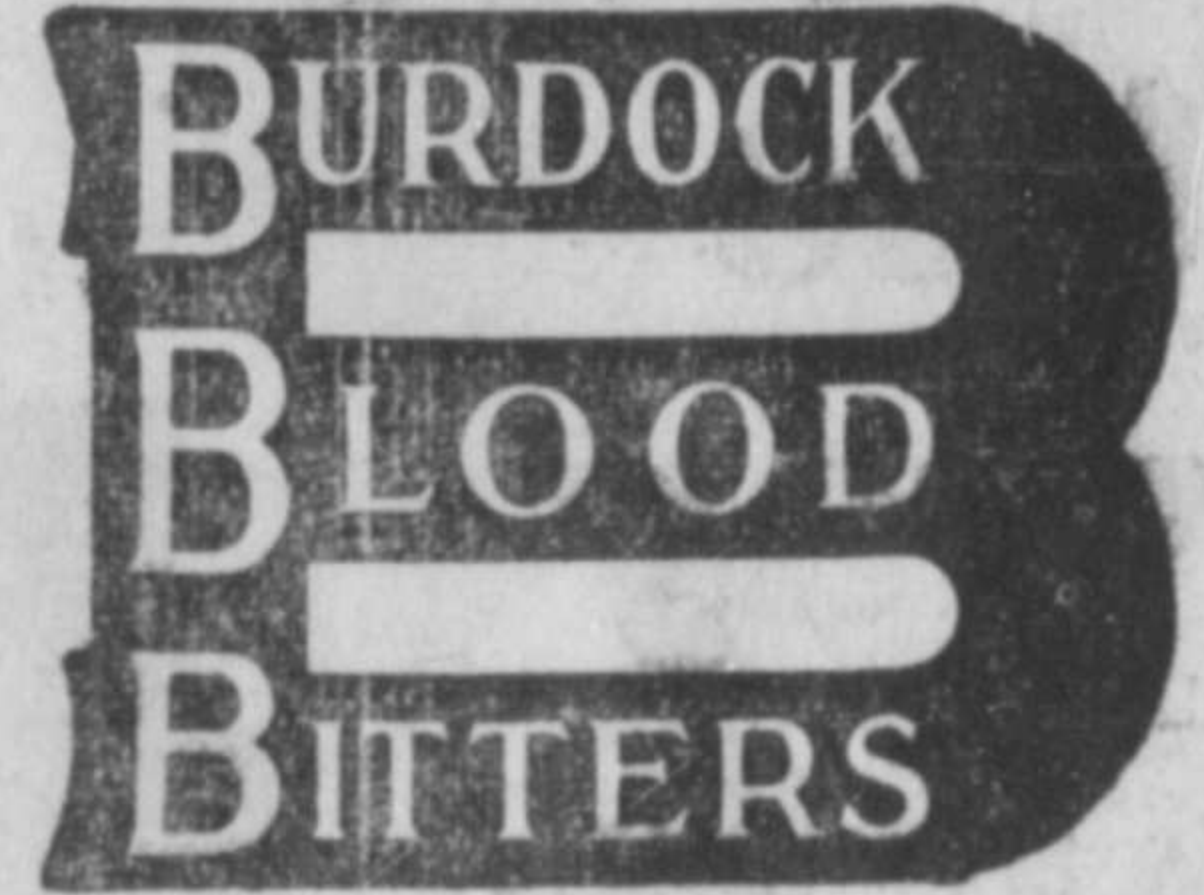

### Alberta Priest Dies In Victoria

VICTORIA, Dec. 12.—Rev. Father Joseph Nolan of Big Valley, Alta., who came here last Friday to recuperate from a lengthy illness, died last night.

Chairman Thomas McMeekin reported at last night's school board meeting on a conversation he had had with J. C. Brady M.P. who requested that bus service be accorded larger as well as smaller pupils going from Westview to Borden Street School. After some discussion, the board decided to stand by its original plan of riding to school only Grade 4, 5 and 6 pupils. The older ones may also ride if there is room for them but they will be required to pay themselves for the service.

### ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOLS

Measles Still Has Deterrent Effect In Some Parts of City

Reports of principals presented to the school board at its regular monthly meeting last night showed a total attendance of 1072 pupils in the public schools of the city, 529 being boys and 543 girls. The attendance per school in November was as follows:

The average attendance for King Edward High School was 97.27%—grade 12 being 100%. There were a few cases of measles still among the pupils and colds had kept some from school. D. H. Hartness, principal of the High School, was given permission by the board to use the auditorium of Booth School for the annual school dance, the affair to be at-

tended exclusively by High School pupils. Eighty cases of measles had developed during the month in Borden Street School, bringing the total number of cases for the school to 103, Miss S. A. Mills, the principal, reported. Receipt of a number of wall maps was acknowledged. The average attendance for Booth School was 85.19%, attendance being now more normal after the measles epidemic, Miss E. A. Mercer, the principal, reported. School savings for the month amounted to \$111.14. Miss O. E. McArthur, principal of Seal Cove School, reported an

average attendance of 78.4%. The measles epidemic had diminished and practically all pupils had returned to school. School savings amounted to \$7.30. At Westview, Miss Jessie Moffatt reported, measles were still prevalent and attendance was at a rather low ebb. The savings for the month in the west-end school totalled \$9.30.

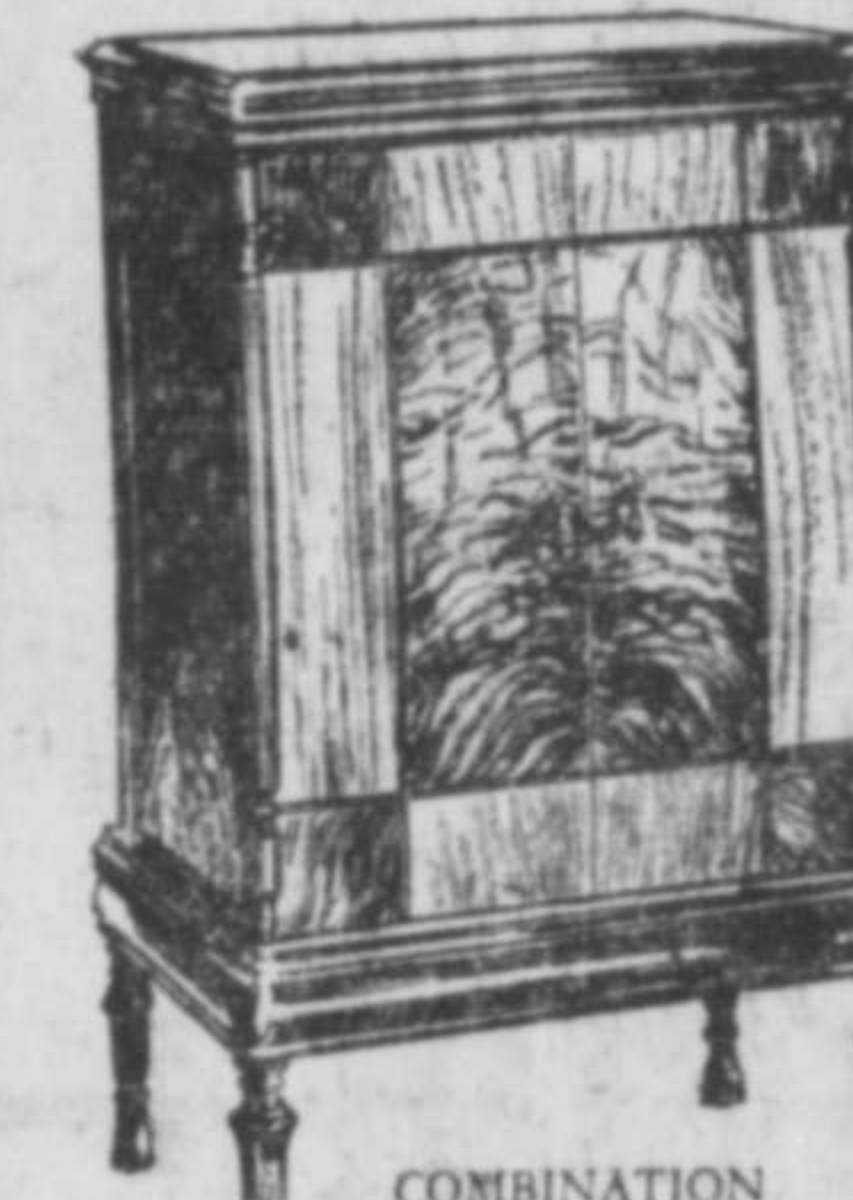

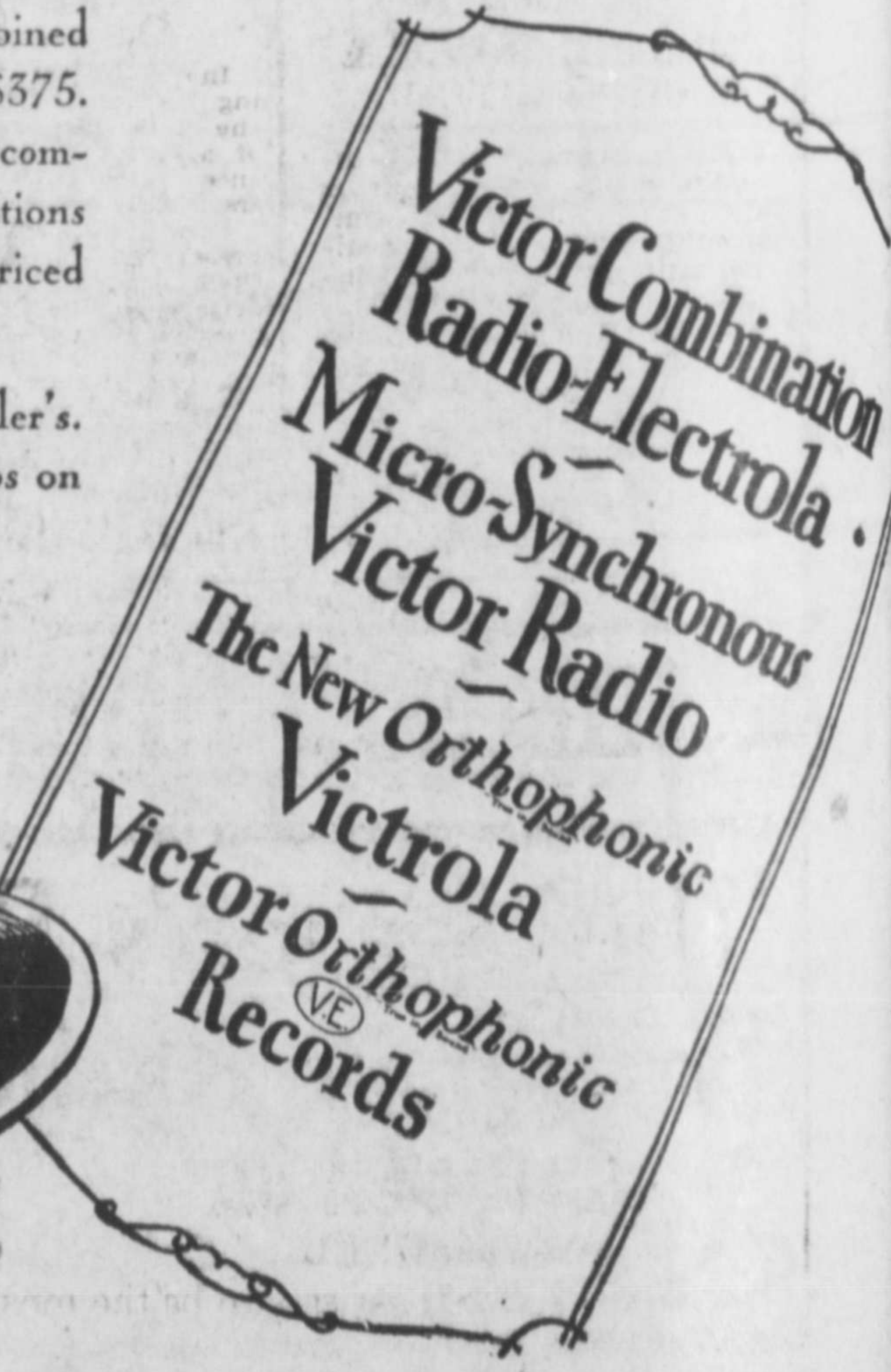

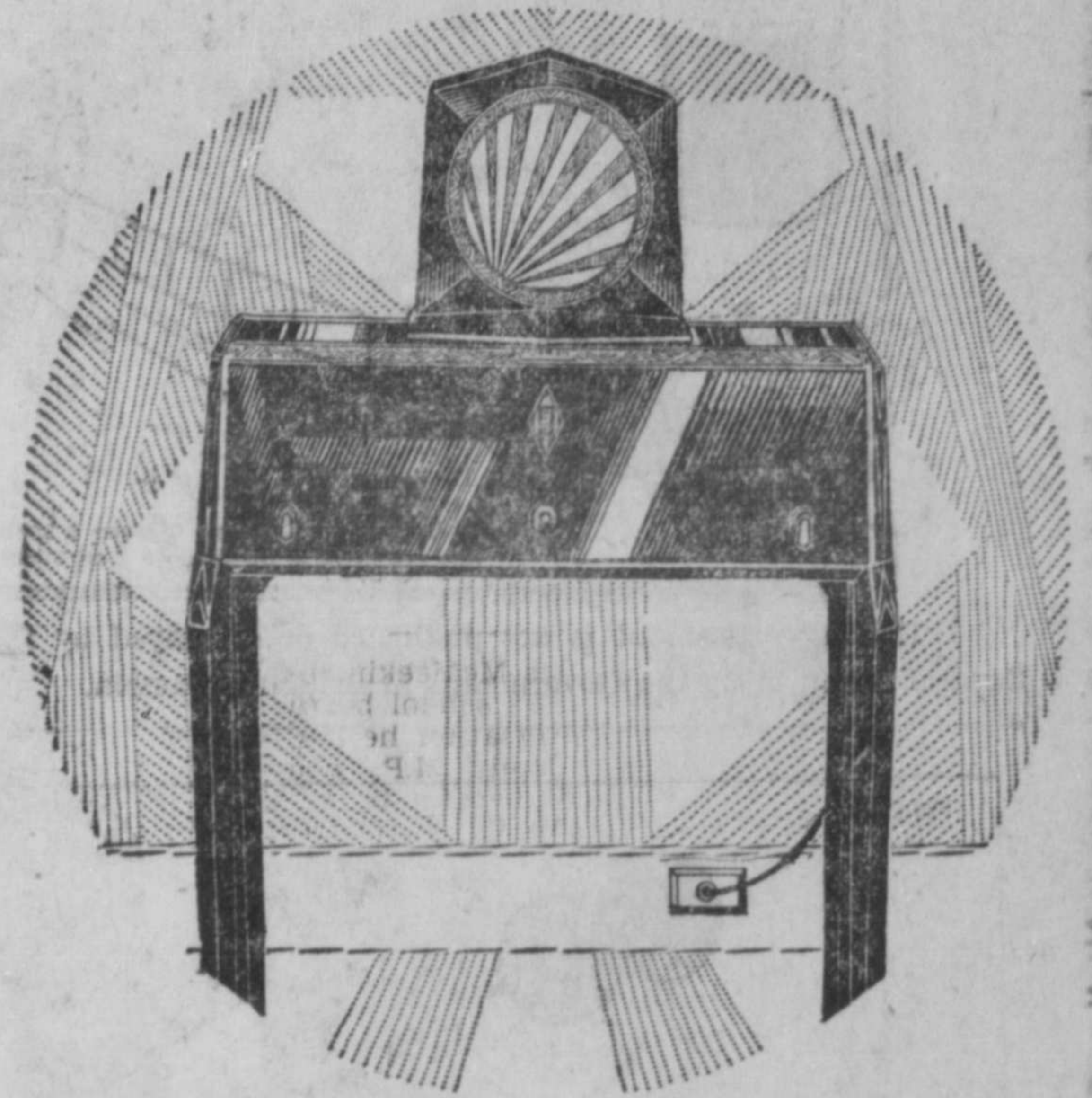
