RESIGNATION OF TREASURER

Committee Appointed to Prepare Suitable Testimonial to Worth of E. D. Johnson.

MANY NICE THINGS SAID OF OFFICIAL

The following is the formal letter of resignation from E. D. Johnson, treasurer and collector, read to the City Council at their meeting last night:

"I herewith beg to tender my resignation as treasurer and collector and acting city clerk of the city of Prince Rupert, to be effective August 14th, 1919, having accepted a position with the provincial government.

"It is with great reluctance that I take this course, but feel in duty bound to do so for the benefit of my wife's health.

"I wish to take this opportunity of thanking the Council and the citizens for their kind consideration during my term of office, and trust it will not be presumption on my part to ask that if in any way I can further the interests of the city while away, I may be allowed to do so. My optimism never has, and never will lag—with watchful care and co-operation Prince Rupert is destined to become the model city of the west.

"The city's power of recuperation has been amply demonstrated during the period of war, from which it has emerged financially sound. By carefully studying alike those who pay to and those from whom the city borrows money, the future will be assured and will be a guarantee of low taxation and an inducement for industries to come and do business in the metropolis of central British Columbia."

Accepted With Regret.

Alderman Casey moved that the resignation be accepted with regret and that a committee composed of the mayor and two aldermen should prepare a suitable testimonial to Mr. Johnson for his efficient services.

Alderman Rochester spoke of the loss the city had sustained. They would be a long time getting anyone else as faithful. While they were sorry to lose him they were glad he was getting something better.

The mayor remarked that our loss was the province's gain. Mr. Johnson had placed the financial status of the city on a good standing and would do the same for the province.

Alderman McRae said there was no doubt Mr. Johnson's heart was in his work. He always did what he thought was right and in the interests of the city.

Alderman Perry endorsed what the others had said. He thought the extra services which he had given the city recently should be rewarded.

Mr. Johnson thanked the Council for the kind expressions and said that he had done only his duty.

ALEX M'RAE BACK HOME FROM OVERSEAS

Another of Prince Rupert's returned soldiers arrived by the Princess Mary from Vancouver yesterday afternoon. Alex McRae left this city early in '17 and went to Vancouver where he joined up with the Canadian Field Artillery with which unit he remained throughout all his fighting.

Before leaving for overseas Alex was very well known in the city, having worked for a long time with the firm of Stalker & Wells. When this firm was bought out by E. Cavenaile who is now ranching in Terrace, Alex went to Anyox but returned a short time after and left for Vancouver to join the forces. His brother John McRae returned home a few days ago. The boys had seen each other while on leave in the old country.

TWO BYLAWS TO BE VOTED ON AUGUST 27

Ratepayers to be Asked to Approve Raising of \$750,000 Loan for New School.

The schools bylaw for the raising of \$150,000 for the erection of a new school building on Acropolis Hill will be voted on by the ratepayers on August 27 with E. A. Woods as returning officer. A letter has been received from W. P. Hinton stating that the G. T. P. would have no objection to the property being used for school purposes.

Another bylaw to come before the ratepayers at the same time is the resurfacing bylaw, to raise a short loan for the pavement of some of the streets.

KLEANZA CO. IS INCORPORATED

Usk Mining Concern is Incorporated and Given Wide Powers.

One of the new companies incorporated this week is the Kleanza Company, Ltd., with headquarters at Usk. This is one of the concerns recently described in the News by Harry Hanson who is visiting there now.

The new company is given wide powers. It has the right to engage in any of the enterprises connected with mining, smelting, milling, refining, and also with the conduct of sawmills, tramways, boats, power plants or any other business connected directly or indirectly with mining.

The operations of the new concern will be chiefly at Usk on the Kleanza river where a good deal of money has already been spent and work is now going on.

In connection with tenders for wire cable invited by the City it was explained last night that the water main was being put together on the shore of Shawatlans Passage and would be hauled across with a donkey engine. The two-inch wire rope was threaded through the main and used for hauling it. The tenders were referred to the Utilities Committee with power to act.

TABLE SUPPLY WILL BE OPEN

J. C. Gavigan Interprets Advice of W. E. Williams to Council as Right to Continue Business.

J. C. Gavigan this morning announced to the Daily News that he would keep open his confectionery and ice cream business this evening after 6:30. He interpreted the advice given to the City Council last night by acting city solicitor, W. E. Williams, as allowing it, in that there was no bylaw defining what line a confectionery and ice cream store might handle. As he considered the public demanded that they should be able to secure fruit in the evening he would sell it as a side line for their accommodation.

A party of Royal North West Mounted Police passed through the city on the Princess Mary yesterday. They presented a very impressive sight when they strolled up the streets in their bright red tunics. Their destination is Dawson City.

The City Council last night appointed E. A. Woods as auctioneer to sell the city lots tomorrow evening. The sale will take place at 7 o'clock in the city hall and some lively bidding is anticipated.

On the recommendation of the Finance Committee it was decided to withdraw from the city lot sale lots 11 and 12, Block 18, Section 1, at the corner of 2nd Ave. and McBride St.

At the city council meeting last night George A. Woodland of the Imperial Oil Co. was requested by resolution to re-employ an engineer on the steam plant at the oil tanks.

Yesterday afternoon a short time after two o'clock the C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary arrived in port from the south with a large tourist passenger list for Alaskan points.

The tender of Mr. Hill, a returned soldier, for the purchase of lot 12, block 6, section 2, for \$355.19 was accepted by the City Council at its meeting last night.

ROWERS TRY A SPIN IN SHELL

After Five Years of Inactivity, Lapstreak Boat at Rowing Club is Taken Out.

After hanging idly to the roof of the rowing club house for the last five years, the light coxwainless four boat was taken out for a trial spin last night. A number of local oarsmen have had designs on the lapstreak racing shell for some time past but it remained for the "big four" to make a break yesterday. They were: how, E. Unwin; No. 2, Steve King; No. 3, A. W. Cameron; stroke, J. Myhill-Jones.

It was not an easy matter getting the shell out of its resting place. It is forty feet long and in order to allow it to clear the posts had to be stripped of the outrigger.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

After extensive alterations, the White Lunch on Third Avenue will reopen for business tomorrow morning.

A. M. Kipp of Port Essington is a visitor in the city, having arrived from up river by boat yesterday afternoon.

The other duties of the official will be to collect the road tax and license fees. The appointment will be made on Friday.

The tug Commodore which arrived from the south a few days ago sailed for the Queen Charlotte Islands yesterday.

The Grand Trunk Prince John is expected from the south today, calling at the southern Queen Charlotte Island points on the way.

The Grand Trunk steamships have sailings to Stewart every alternate Saturday and Friday for the rest of the summer months. This week's sailing is on Friday.

A large scow load of cables has arrived from the Queen Charlotte Islands and is tied up at the Grand Trunk dock. The cables have been used in tying the Davis rafts together.

The American Government has a number of wooden steamers for sale. These were built during war time and particulars have been sent to the local American Consulate to which anyone interested may apply.

The power schooner Tillamook is in port today discharging 10,000 cases of salmon which will be shipped to the east. The salmon was packed in Moira Channel, Alaska. As fast as the ship is unloaded a train is being made up of previous shipments.

The H. R. McMillan Export Co., Ltd., has been incorporated to carry on a general timber and export business and to manufacture lumber and to do all such things as are subsidiary thereto, according to a notice appearing in the current number of the B. C. Gazette.

At the City Council last night the city clerk was instructed to forward a letter of condolence to Mrs. Peters on the death of her late husband, the city solicitor. The mayor stated that a telegram had been received from the Government of Prince Edward Island asking that the mayor convey to Mrs. Peters their sympathy.

Among those passing through the city on the Princess Mary yesterday were Messrs. Sterret and Eckman of the Canadian Fishing Company of Vancouver. They are on their way to Ketchikan and will return by the next boat. While here the men had the opportunity of seeing the local plants in operation. They were shown around by Jas. L. Lee the manager of the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., of this city.

FISH IS SOLD ON EXCHANGE

About Ten Cents Paid for First Class Halibut—Good Catch of Ground Fish.

On account of the scarcity of cars and ice, very few boats of the large number in yesterday were sold at the Fish Exchange. The cold storage bought the Onah at 9 and 5 cents; the Murneac at 10.1 and 5 cents and the Tide at 10.4 and 5 cents per pound. The Caygeon was sold to the Royal Fish Company at 10.3 and 5 cts. The San Juan Company bought the Atlin and the Teton at 10.1 and 5 cents. The Roald, Kouyasu, Nuba, Ingrid H. were bought by the Atlin Fisheries for 10 and 5 cents per pound.

There were 130,000 lbs. of American fish which was not sold at all yesterday but it is expected that they will get the fish out today or tomorrow as six cars are reported to be arriving by the train from the east tonight.

The G. E. Foster arrived in port yesterday with 100,000 lbs. of ground fish for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

The following boats have arrived in from the banks today: Convention, 25,000 lbs.; Tramp and the Clara N., 3,000 lbs.

NEW BUILDINGS ARE ABOUT TO BE BUILT

Addition to Rooming House and Two Cottages are Latest Building Permits.

The latest building permits issued by the city engineer are to H. Mochida and James Krikevsky. The former is putting a three-storey addition to his rooming house on Fraser Street at an estimated cost of \$4,000. This will be quite a large addition to the already good sized building. The work is being done by Mitchell & Currie.

James Krikevsky is going to build two cottages on 8th Avenue and Tatlow Street. One will face on the street and the other on Eighth Avenue. The cost is estimated at \$3,600.

BUILDING INSPECTOR

New Official to be Appointed by City at Salary of \$160 a Month.

On the recommendation of the Housing Committee, the City Council last night decided to advertise for a building inspector at a salary of \$160 a month.

The duties of the new official will be to inspect the buildings going up in the city and to see that they conform in every way to the building regulations and especially the buildings on which the city has guaranteed the loans under the Dominion housing scheme.

SALMON RUNNING UP SHAWATLANS STREAM

Visitors at Shawatlans over the week end report that a most picturesque sight was witnessed at the entrance to the passage while they were returning home late in the evening. Salmon were crowding in to get up the creeks and packed close together in the narrow channels. As they darted to and fro they left a long streak of phosphorescence behind them that lasted for a considerable time. When they jumped from the water it appeared as though a streak of lightning passed across the surface of the water.

ARGENTINE AND GREAT BRITAIN ARE AT OUTS

Strained Relations Between Two Countries Over Purchase of German Steamships.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Buenos Ayres, August 5.—Diplomatic relations between Great Britain and the Argentine are strained and the respective ministers are reported to have been withdrawn as the result of the purchase by the Argentine Government of the German Steamship Bahia Blanca.

An Argentine newspaper says that the real cause of the Argentine Government's hostility to Britain is due to British capitalists in Argentine.

Sir Reginald Tower, the British minister, denies the rumors relative to his return to London. He states that he is returning home for rest.

Soviet of Hungary Thing of the Past.

The people of Hungary or their leaders thought to evade their obligations under the peace treaty by throwing off their former government and forming a soviet. This did not work. They have at last discovered their mistake and have been forced to resign.

Hungary was a party to the war and she would have been only too glad to share the indemnity if they had won. She has lost and must pay her share, soviet or no soviet. As a matter of fact the people of Hungary were already tired of Bela Kun and his crowd, especially when they found that they would not escape their indemnity by their soviet allegiance.

Tugwell Island is Splendid Resort.

Few places have a summer resort at their doors such as Prince Rupert people have in Tugwell Island. There is a big bar of sand and gravel on which the sun shines when the tide is out and where the water is warmed and pleasant to bathe in. There is good anchorage for launches and a protected passage all the way from here.

This beach will undoubtedly be used a good deal in the years to come. It will become fashionable to go to Tugwell and then all the city will be there. It is rather far away to go back and forth every day except for those who work short hours. A small launch takes over an hour to make the run. For camping purposes however there are few places to equal it.

Will Be Rush To This District.

The Vancouver Sun says: "Central and Northern British Columbia have been developed much more rapidly during the past few years than the southern part of the province has suspected. The business men of Vancouver who are making a tour of that section are filled with surprise and gratification as they learn the facts regarding present and prospective expansion.

"British Columbia has vast potentialities, not only in its minerals and its fisheries and its forests, but also in its farming lands. Next year there is going to be a rush of settlers to the territory along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific. This prediction may be made with the utmost confidence.

"Vancouver wants its share of the trade with this northern and central country. There is no sense in letting Edmonton have it all. The only way to get the trade is to establish adequate transportation facilities.

"The people up there have grasped this fact clearly and are doing their utmost to impress it upon their visitors from here. Railway communication with Prince George should be opened up at the earliest possible moment."

Nothing But Bark Of Local Street Dog.

Under the title, "Patronize Home Industry," the Western Committee of the Canadian Reconstruction Association has issued the following appeal for support of the home market:—

"In patronizing home industry, we help the laboring man and protect the home capital that is invested. A thing that keeps any town backward, is the man who wakes up at the alarm of a clock made in New England States and buttons his New York pants to a pair of Buffalo suspenders; puts on a cowhide tanned pair of shoes made in St. Louis, shaves with a Connecticut safety and dries on a cotton towel made in Pennsylvania; sits down to a Grand Rapids table on a chair made in Chicago, and butters his bread with Australian butter with a Boston-made knife and eats Kansas City bacon and Minnesota grits fried in American lard, cooked on a Detroit stove, and has a dessert of California fruit seasoned with spice made in St. Paul, after which he slips into a New York raincoat and claps on a wool hat made in Philadelphia, and goes down in an Ohio automobile and finds the office boy dusting his office furniture, made in Illinois. He fills his Rhode Island pipe with tobacco put up in Georgia. He starts to business and wonders why local trade is quiet; goes home at night and gets into a foreign-made bed, and the only thing local he gets is the bark of the street dog, after which he confuses that the town is not a good place to live in and do business in."

ARMY AND NAVY VETERANS PASS RESOLUTIONS

Ask for Bonuses From War Indemnity—Grants Asked for Fishermen as Well as Farmers.

Constable Logan who was in Montreal recently to attend a meeting of the Army and Navy Veterans and who is now home, tells of the work accomplished at the gathering. A number of resolutions were passed including one asking the Dominion Government to provide special bonuses for fighting men up to \$2,500 to be paid out of Canada's share of the war indemnity. Other resolutions were:

Cost of Living.

"Resolved, that the Dominion Government be requested to take up in a practical way the question of the present high cost of living and the curse of profiteering, with a view to the reduction of the former and the elimination of the latter."

"Resolved, that this convention of Army and Navy Veterans, representing many thousands of ex-service men, who were away at the time the war measure was passed restricting the sale of intoxicants, which measure is now in force in the Dominion. Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the Provincial Governments be asked to take a referendum in each province as to whether beer and light wines may be sold in the respective provinces."

Indignation was expressed at the inequality of clothing allowances now prevalent, and in this regard the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that clothing allowances be made retroactive, so that the volunteers of 1914-15-16-17 may be placed on an equality with men who joined under the Military Service Act."

Grants to Fishermen.

A resolution submitted by the Halifax unit was adopted in the following form: "Resolved, that the Federal Government be urged to grant to seamen, fishermen, and all those who were engaged or wish to engage in business other than farming, a loan equal to that granted under the Land Settlement Act, in order to become re-established into civil life."

Sport

It has been announced that Peter Herman, champion bantamweight boxer, and Jack Sharkey of New York have agreed to meet in a Milwaukee ring, August 15, in a ten-round no decision bout.

In writing to his parents in Pasadena, California, Chas. Paddock told of how he had been knighted by the King of Montenegro following his victories on the cinder track. Paddock who was the star sprinter at the recent inter-allied meet held in Paris explains that he has been given the right to the same rank in the Montenegrin army as lieutenant in the American army.

A few days ago "Cannonball" Baker completed a motorcycle run of 1,714 miles from Blaine on the Washington-Canadian border to Tia Jauna in Mexico in the short time of 65 hours and 53 minutes. He made the trip in a motorcycle with side car attachment and Olin Ross was his passenger. It was the first time that a record had been set for the course for the type of machine which Baker used. The course record for a single seat machine is 53 hours and 28 minutes, made by Wells Bennett a few weeks ago. Baker who once held the record for a one-man machine, announced that in a few days he will attempt to lower the mark.

Fanny Duraek and Mina Wylie will likely be in Victoria this week or next to compete in a gala to be held under the auspices of the Victoria and Island Athletic Association. They are champion swimmers of Australia and have been touring the American continent.

Jack Dempsey has signed a theatrical contract for fifteen weeks' work at \$15,000 a week. He will have his own company and show and will appear in all the leading cities, opening in Chicago



or in St. Louis. The contract is worded so that the champion can double the length of his contract at will. This was a wise clause inserted in the agreement by his manager, Jack Kearns. This really makes it a \$450,000 document.

By defeating Miss Marguerite Davis, St. Paul, Miss Corinne Gould, St. Louis, won the women's singles tennis western championship in Kansas City a few days ago. This is her third championship this year.

Cricket is becoming quite popular in the southern cities. On Saturday the Victoria cricketers went to Vancouver and played against the Mainland team at Brockton point. It was the second game of the series for the Flummerfelt Cup. The Mainland team won the match on the island on Dominion Day and now matters have been evened up.

Synopsis of Land-Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$100 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for granting of rights and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners; this Act extends form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

TO CLASSIFY BUSINESSES OF THE CITY

Preparatory Step to Taking Vote On Opening of Fruit Stores Evenings and Sundays.

CITY COUNCIL TAKES ADVICE FROM COUNSEL

On the advice of the city solicitor the City Council last night decided to pass a bylaw classifying the various retail businesses in order that they may be in a position to deal with the fruit stores, which for the past few days have been closed and which, presumably, will remain closed after 6:30 until the bylaw governing them is repealed or amended. The resolution making it effective was moved by Alderman Perry and seconded by Alderman Casey that the Mayor and two aldermen should draft a bylaw classifying the various businesses.

W. E. Williams who was present in an official capacity as acting city solicitor, explained that any bylaw passed on a petition could be repealed only on a counter petition signed by half the members of that class. As there were at present no classes set down in a bylaw it was impossible to know whether a grocery included fruit and farm produce vendors. The first thing they had to do was to define the classes. If fruit was put in a class by itself then those businesses would have to close.

Proper Procedure.

Asked by Alderman Casey what would be the proper steps to take in order to open the fruit stores in the evenings, Mr. Williams said that the first thing to do would be to define fruit as a separate class and then the vendors could petition and if the petition was signed by fifty per cent of the vendors the bylaw could be repealed.

Two delegations, one from the fruit stores and the other from the retail stores were given the privilege of speaking. J. C. Gavigan on behalf of the fruit stores suggested that those stores that voted for the closing should also vote for the repeal of the bylaw.

Retail Clerks.

J. S. Pudney representing the retail clerks said that their organization went on record as being opposed to the repeal of the bylaw. They had been working toward the shortening of hours of labor. If this section were repealed it was understood that a move would be made to repeal the early closing bylaw in its entirety. He drew this particularly to the attention of the labor representatives on the Council.

Alderman Casey said that the early closing bylaw was being enforced to such a point as to be injurious to the public by preventing the sale of fruit. It was originally intended to omit places like Killas. He was absolutely opposed to the prohibition against selling fruit. He thought it was an outrage. The prime motive in enforcing it was a spirit of jealousy on the part of the dealers. They also had the big public to serve, however. He was never elected to perpetuate any spiteful scheme of one trader against another. He did not intend to keep silence until the people would have the privilege of procuring a bag of grapes or other fruit after hours or on Sunday.

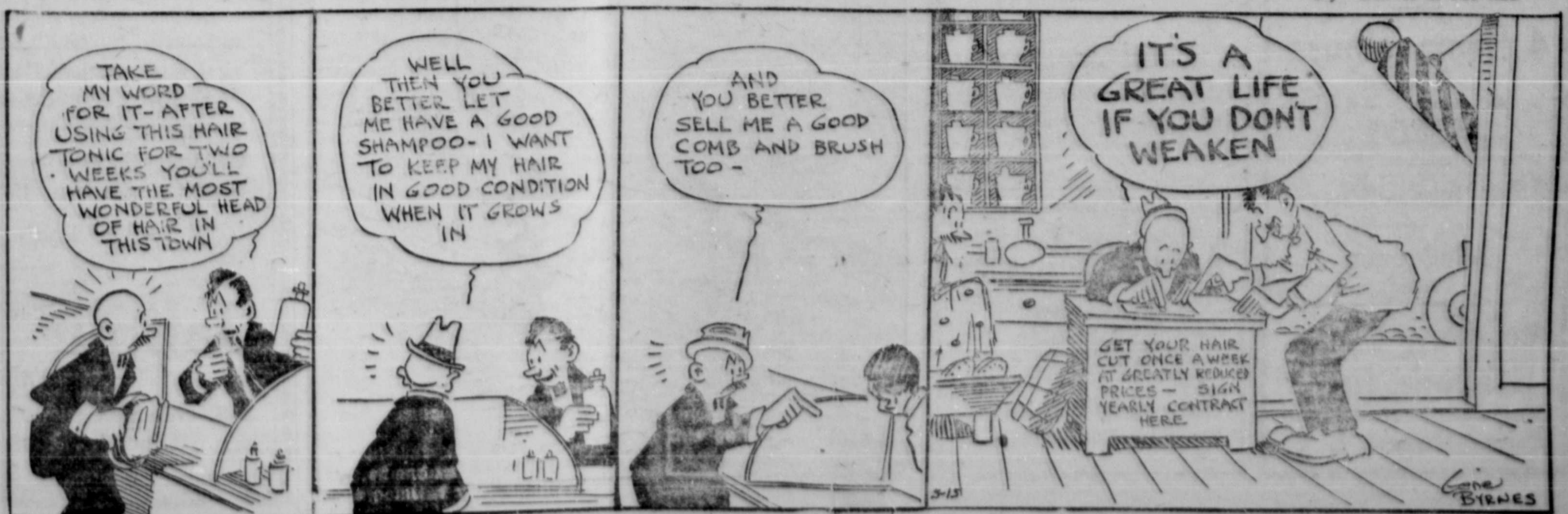
