"I love Canada. I was born in the country and my father was born in it. I love it and my aim in life is to make a better and a happier Canada." Those were the closing words of Dr. H. R. Grant, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Fort William and formerly of Prince Rupert, who addressed the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday.

AWAIT TRIAL OKALLA JAIL

Man Accused of Murder Arrived Yesterday Afternoon and Goes South

WILL BE TRIED HERE

Victim Buried at Hazelton Following Coroner's Jury Verdict of Murder

Committed for trial by Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hoskins at Hazelton on a charge of murder, Steve Doljkovac, swarthy and shifty-eyed Czech-Slovakian, possibly forty years old and quite probably older, was brought to the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train and will be taken tomorrow evening by the steamer Prince George to Okalla, where he will be incarcerated pending trial for his life at the fall assizes here. Doljkovac, who is alleged to have knifed to death a fellow countryman, Metri Smiledich, at Dorreen station last Sunday morning, was brought to the city in charge of Inspector William Spiller and Constable William Harrison, provincial constables. Managed to Constable Harrison, he was moved from the train into the police car and driven by Staff Sergeant Alex McNeill to the local lock-up. He seemingly took a dismal, listless interest in the crowd that assembled around on the platform to catch a glimpse of the man who is charged with homicide. He is thin and angular and wore a wrinkled blue serge suit with shirt of lighter blue. The victim of the attack was buried at Hazelton after a coroner's jury had returned a verdict that his death had been as a result of premeditated murder at the hands of the accused. The prisoner will be taken on to Okalla tomorrow evening by Constable Harrison.

HALF OF TOURING PARTY COMES HERE EACH DIRECTION

WINNIPEG, July 19.—The first of a series of annual tours conducted by Pitman's Tours Limited of Montreal, numbering about 70 persons, which is in Winnipeg today, will split up at Jasper, part going direct to Vancouver and taking the Alaska steamer from there, the other part going through to Prince Rupert and south on the steamer to Vancouver.

BANK ROBBER IS CAPTURED

Man Who is Alleged to Have Staged Hold-Up at Smithers Taken in Custody at Prince George

Word was received at provincial police headquarters here yesterday afternoon that the bandit who is alleged to have robbed the Royal Bank of Canada at Smithers on Wednesday morning had been captured by the police at Prince George. He will be brought back to Smithers today to take his preliminary trial before Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hoskins.

ROSS HOYT IS ON WAY NOME, ALASKA

Left Edmonton This Morning En Route to White Horse and Due at Nome About Midnight

MINNEAPOLIS, July 19.—Captain Ross Hoyt, New York to Nome flyer, arrived here last evening and took off for Edmonton. He covered 1070 miles in seven hours 22 minutes.

EDMONTON, July 19.—Captain Hoyt arrived here at 5:40 this morning, covering the 1100 miles from Minneapolis in eight hours. After an hour's stop he hopped off for Whitehorse, where he expects to land this afternoon at 4 o'clock, and he plans to reach Nome shortly after midnight. Returning after a brief rest, Captain Hoyt expects to reach New York Sunday on the return flight.

SCIENTISTS TO MEET AFRICA

British Association Will Gather in Cape Town on July 22; To Include Canadians

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, July 19.—When the British Association for the Advancement of Science opens its annual meeting in Cape Town on July 22, it will be the second time for this noted body to meet in this country. The association's last visit to South Africa was in 1905. Canada has been the meeting place four times, and Australia twice. The association's first meeting in Australia in 1914 practically coincided with the outbreak of the war. Despite its 98 years of existence this conclave of scientists has never met in London.

NEW ORLEANS, July 19.—Seven bandits today held up an armored truck of the Hibernal Bank, threw the armed guards off, and escaped with the truck carrying \$42,000.

FIRE WIPES OUT CITY OF ANGORA

Prairie Crop Situation Not At All Bad is Opinion of the Newspapermen Across Mountains

That the prairie outlook is not anything like as bad as it may seem on the surface is the impression gained by George Wilson, business manager of The Daily News, from his attendance at the convention of advertising managers of western newspapers at Jasper. He says that the men he met from the prairies are enthusiastic over business conditions. They say that the crop situation is not at all bad. While the amount of grain thrashed will be much less than last year, the price will be high and the cost of harvesting and thrashing will be much less. The result will be that the average farmer will be almost as well off as if he had a large straw crop, such as that of last season.

A drive around the city as well as a boat ride and visit to the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. are planned. Last night after the concluding session of the convention, delegates were taken for a drive around the city which was followed by a theatre party and an entertainment by the Elks in the home.

STOCK ISSUE FOR ROYALITE

ON TO THE PEACE

"On to the Peace." That should be the slogan of Prince Rupert today. The great wheat fields of the practically virgin country are looking for an outlet to the Pacific coast and Prince Rupert will have to put up a struggle for that outlet if she is to get it. Whatever point becomes the terminal for the outlet will be wonderfully benefited from every point of view. The thing is to secure the outlet.

Early in September the Canadian Chamber of Commerce convention is being held at Edmonton and Calgary and an excursion will be made into Peace River district. This convention comprises the most influential businessmen from all over Canada. The opinion they form as to the outlet will be a great factor in determining the result. Prince Rupert may get it or she may not, much depending upon whether the advantages of Prince Rupert are placed before this convention and the delegates individually.

A half a hundred delegates will go from Vancouver to this important gathering, as they fully realize the benefits likely to be derived from being strongly represented.

What will Prince Rupert do? The Board of Trade is planning to send five delegates, but that should not be enough. There should be at least another five go from the city. A total delegation of ten is all too small considering the importance of the occasion. We are not suggesting how they should be sent, but it does seem important that they go. Ten emissaries from here would be a factor in keeping before the visitors the importance of opening up northern British Columbia and securing a northern Pacific outlet. If we allow such opportunities as this to pass we can expect little consideration.

There are three kinds of greatness. There is the greatness which consists in giving birth to an idea; there is the greatness which consists in making effective the idea already born; and there is the greatness which refuses to be drawn aside by false ideas and ideals.

THE HYBRID MOOSE

Considerable interest seems to have been taken in the story published yesterday in regard to an animal which is evidently a cross between a Jersey cow and a moose. Some readers fancied it was a pipe dream and several suggested it was probably the beginning of the fiction story promised for Monday. George Wilson of The Daily News staff, the writer of the story, has seen the animal and vouches for it. It is a curious freak and possibly may develop into a new species.

Full bred moose have not hitherto been a success in captivity. The change of food seems to disagree with them and they die. Perhaps this hybrid may live and thrive. At any rate, it will be interesting to note its career.

STEAMER ANNOUNCEMENT

The announcement that all three new Canadian National steamers will be ready for business next year is the best news we have had recently. Doubtless the vessels are needed as a means of inducing travel over the Canadian National lines. That the number of tourists coming to Prince Rupert will be greatly increased as a result of the addition to the fleet seems quite certain.

With the National providing three fine steamers for the Alaska trade and a fine little boat for local business, Prince Rupert people will begin to feel that the C. N. is making good, as far as this city is concerned. Let them add a tourist hotel and we shall have little to kick about.

FIFTY NATIONS  
WILL JOIN IN  
WAR ON CROOK

LONDON, July 19.—Scotland Yard is to lead the police of at least fifty other countries in a world-wide war on organized crime. There is to be a Police League of Nations.

At the head of the world police alliance will be the "Big Five"—Great Britain, France, Germany, Austria and America. In London today are three of the "Big Five"—Lord Byng, the metropolitan police chief, Monsieur Jean Chapppe, the Paris prefect of the Surete (the French Scotland Yard), and Herr Zorgebel, head of the Berlin police force.

The last two are in London ostensibly to study the traffic problems, and to "admire the scenery." But their real purpose is to seek, with Lord Byng, the best means of securing closer cooperation and coordination of the police forces of the world.

It is a fact acknowledged by other nations that Great Britain leads the world in crime detection and prevention. That is one reason why the German and French police chiefs are now in London.

Scotland Yard is to be the headquarters from which the world war on crime will be directed, and is even now being directed.

The aims of the Police League of Nations were finely summed up recently by Richard E. Enright, president of the International Police Conference, and for seven years commissioner of the New York police. Enright says:

"The police forces of the world must bring all their ideas together, and pool their resources, to checkmate that highly-skilled, globe-trotting crook who recognizes no frontiers—the international criminal.

"This world-wide police crusade is to be staged against criminals in general and in particular against:

"White slaves and drug traffickers.  
"International forgers and mail robbers.

"Jewel thieves.  
"Confidence tricksters.  
"Gangsters.

Police methods of the larger nations are being reviewed by the "Big Five," and the results will be laid before a conference in November, at which at least fifty nations will be represented.

ILLNESS FORCES  
ESKIMO RETURN

Boys Sent To Secure Education  
Unable to Stand Climate and  
Habits of White Men

TORONTO, July 19.—When the Hudson Bay Company's ice-breaker "Nascopie" sailed from Montreal, on July 16, for the great Arctic wastes, her passenger list included the names of "Ben" and "Sam," two Eskimo boys who are returning home, for their own good, against their will. The return of the two lads will write another failure in the book of attempts to transfer the Eskimo from his native land to the abode of the white man.

Two years ago an Eskimo chieftain far up in the silent Arctic, asked the head of the missionaries to send his son to the unknown lands to the south, to learn the ways of the white man.

"My people haven't a chance unless they are able to meet the white man on his own ground," he said.

And so, last fall, nine-year-old Ben, son of Chief John Ell, head of the Southampton Island Eskimos, accompanied by his friend of the same age, Sam Pudlutt, of Lake Harbor, Baffin Island, were handed over to the headmaster of the Lakefield preparatory school, near Peterboro, Ont. They had been brought down from the north by Rev. F. H. Gibbs, a returning missionary.

"It is of the utmost importance that these boys should not be spoiled and that they should be considered in every way upon the basis of white men," were the instructions of Ven. A. L. Fleming, archdeacon of the Arctic.

Unique Experiment  
It was a unique experiment. Ben and Sam knew no English, but they were good natured, good sports, and intelligent. In a short time they were unanimously acclaimed as general favorites by their new white playmates.

Shortly before Christmas Ben and Sam were forced to relinquish their studies to face an ordeal of sickness, from which they barely escaped with their lives. Hardy, and foreign to sickness in their own land, the two little visitors were soon attacked by contagious diseases, common among the white men. After influenza they "took" pneumonia, measles, tonsillitis and underwent operations for mastoids and adenoids.

Ben and Sam at least will go

back to their isolated homes better able to brave the elements of the Arctic than when they came away, according to Dr. N. D. Buchanan, of Peterboro, who attended them. "I think they will be better for having got all these things out of their systems," the doctor said.

Prior to sailing for their lonely homes, Ben and Sam were placed on a farm near Pickering, Ont., where they both showed remarkable improvement after their long

winter illnesses. The boys were accompanied on their journey by missionaries returning to their northern outposts.

Not Inferior

"This experiment has been thoroughly satisfactory from one point of view," declared Archdeacon Fleming, who bore the responsibility and expense of the trip. "It has shown that the Eskimo is in no way inferior to the white man. They are an intelli-

gent race, and I wish white men could learn the Eskimo language as quickly as Ben and Sam 'picked up' English." He said he wanted to have them stay with missionaries at Lake Harbor, Baffin Land, and attend school there. There was no school near Ben's home on Southampton Island, and it was about 400 miles from Baffin Land.

In only one case has an Eskimo been known to survive away from his native haunts, the archdeacon

said. "When Peary brought down nine Eskimos, including a nine-year-old boy, 'Minnie,' they all died but the boy. He lived in New York for nine years and then returned to Greenland."

Both boys were greatly impressed with the treatment received at the hands of the white man, and were very sad at the thought of returning to the great Arctic wastes. When asked why he did not want to return home, Ben replied "Too code. . . . ver" code.


