## Labor Troubles at Liverpool Continue; Bayonets are Used

Several Soldiers Beaten when Troops Charge Crowd Outside St. George's Hall; Railwaymen Refuse to Strike in Sympathy.

Liverpool, August 7.—Riots are continuing here. The troops at midnight charged with fixed bayonets and dispersed the crowd outside St. George's Hall. In the scuffle which took place several soldiers were beaten. At the same time firing was heard in the

## C.P.R. LOSES BY THE CITY APPEAL BEFORE PRIVY COUNCIL

Compensation Board Has Right to Pay Dependents of Sophia Sailors.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, August 7 .- The Privy Council of Great Britain, to whom an appeal was taken, has decided that the dependents of sailors lost on the Princess Sophia which foundered in American waters, are protected by the British Columbia Workmen's Compensation Act.

A week before the treaty was Lot 18, block 26, M. M. Stephens signed several chaplains through a misunderstanding informed the soldiers that marriages were permissible as soon as the Germans accepted the peace terms. Officers say marriages took place before this belief was corrected by a special order calling the attention of officers and men to the fact that until the United States ratified the treaty Germany and America technically were at war.

At headquarters it is said that even after the United States ratifies the treaty marriages with COME UP TOMORROW German girls will be prohibited by an army order.

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption now confined to sur-

veyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making

claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres. before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not

less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applisant makes improvements to extent of and per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements record same will operate as foreiture. Title cannot be obtained in ess than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on imber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920




