## Big Free List is Adopted By the Liberal Convention Oliver Amendment is Lost

### Premier of British Columbia Asks that all Necessaries of Life, Together with Tools, Implements and Machinery Necessary for Development of Natural Resources be Admitted Free.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Ottawa, August 7.—The Liberal convention has been very active since its opening session. The tariff resolution, which was passed, includes the placing on the free list of wheat, flour and other products of wheat, the principle articles of food, farm implements, mining, flour and saw mill machinery, rough and partly dressed lumber, fuel oils, nets, net tins and fishermen's equipments, cement and fertilizers. It further provides for a reduction of at least fifty per cent off duties on wearing apparel and footwear. Included in the provision is also an increase in the British preference to fifty per cent of the general tariff.

Premier Oliver of British Columbia moved an amendment which would strike out the paragraphs of the resolution designating certain articles of production which should be placed on the free list and recommending in its place a revision of the tariff on wearing apparel, boots, shoes, etc. No objection was taken by Mr. Oliver to the proposal to increase the British preference to fifty per cent of the general tariff.

Mr. Oliver's objection to the free list was that it should be wider in its application. He suggested that all necessaries of life together with all tools, implements and machinery for the development of the natural resources of the country be made free of customs duties.

The Premier of this province declared the resolution as defined to be class legislation and not a square deal. His amendment was submitted and declared lost.

## STATES WILL SUE PACKERS

### In Attempt to Reduce Cost of Living Action Will be Brought Against Big Firms.

 Washington, August 7.—The United States Government is about to make an attempt to reduce the cost of living by bringing anti-trust suits against the big meat packing firms. This is one of the first moves in a general campaign and is the first announcement of action that is likely to be taken.

## SALMON RIVER ROAD OPEN NINE MILES

### Wagons Went Over it That Far Last Week—Freighting Will Be Easy Soon.

Wagons got up Salmon River as far as Nine Mile for the first time last Wednesday, says Stewart's newspaper. The Premier road is now completed through to that distance and except for some places the ore highway is in good shape. A distance of nine miles from the beach over which they can freight with wagons is important to the mining companies in getting supplies. Heretofore it has been necessary to use pack horses altogether.

This road will be in good shape by the time the Premier company is prepared to ship more ore. The road will be first class when snow is on it and will make comparatively easy the work of getting in the heavy machinery this winter.

When the Provincial Government has continued the Premier road up the valley as a temporary sleigh road this winter, the cost of obtaining supplies at such mines as the Jeter, Forty-Nine and Big Missouri will be considerably reduced. Expenses of opening up the Salmon River section have been unusually heavy by reason of the lack of transportation facilities. But the operators have held courageously to their work and the ore bodies disclosed prove they were justified. Several properties may make trial shipments this winter.

The replanking of Eighth ave. is proceeding apace, with a gang working at each end of the street. This has been a sore need, as some of the old planks had been replaced by new ones and the whole was very uneven. The re-decking will make it safe for both vehicles and foot passengers.

Mrs. S. Pederson who has been visiting in the city for the past few days returned to her home on Nakel Inlet by launch this morning. The boat has just unloaded a large shipment of salmon cases.

Advices state that the Roumanian forces have crossed the Danube into the Budapest section and are seizing supplies and preparing to ship them to Roumania.

## DECORATION FOR PREMIER OF ENGLAND

### David Lloyd George Accepts Order of Merit from King in Reward for Services.

 London, Aug. 7.—King George yesterday conferred upon Premier David Lloyd George the order of merit as an appreciation of his services in connection with the war.

It is understood that the Premier could have had practically any title in the gift of the Crown. A peerage was suggested but was refused before it was offered. The Welsh commoner would have none of them. The simple order of merit was the only insignia that appealed to him and that has been conferred.

## PRINCESS ENA STRUCK ROCK

### C. P. R. Freighter Coming Here is Injured and Returns to Drydock.

 Vancouver, Aug. 7.—The steamship Princess Ena northbound struck on Ripple Rock, a submerged reef in Seymour Narrows. She put about and returned to Plumper's Bay where she is anchored and reported to be in danger.

The Ena was bringing cargo to a number of northern ports, including Prince Rupert. The local office was notified of her having struck and that she had returned to drydock.

## HUGH MARTIN WAS DROWNED IN BEAR

### Fell into Stream Above Stewart and Was Lost—Companions Unable to Save Him.

Hugh Macpherson Martin who came to Stewart in 1910 and who lived here continuously ever since, was drowned in Bear river Monday afternoon while he was repairing a temporary bridge which had been in use since the old structure became unsafe, says the Portland Canal News. Bert Olson and Dan Woodmore were assisting with the work and tried to save Martin. Olson plunged into the water but it would have been fatal to him also had he got in the current. Woodmore ran down stream and saw the body disappear under a heap of driftwood. Martin is believed to have been injured when the long boom stick he was putting in place knocked him off his feet. A brother at Swamp Point has been sent for.

Martin owned considerable property in Stewart and his residence is one of the best buildings in the camp. During the past two years he had put in much of his time looking after the road-bed of the Canadian Northeastern Railway. He had improvised some rolling stock and rigged a push car with a gasoline engine and with this strange railroad equipment he hauled passengers and freight up the valley. Martin was quiet and industrious and the community lost a solid citizen when he met his death.

## Labor Troubles at Liverpool Continue; Bayonets are Used

### Several Soldiers Beaten when Troops Charge Crowd Outside St. George's Hall; Railwaymen Refuse to Strike in Sympathy.

 Liverpool, August 7.—Riots are continuing here. The troops at midnight charged with fixed bayonets and dispersed the crowd outside St. George's Hall. In the scuffle which took place several soldiers were beaten. At the same time firing was heard in the Scotland Road district.

London, August 7.—The labor situation throughout the country remains disquieting but is relieved to some extent by the decision of the Railway Union against a strike in support of the Policemen's Union. The bill before parliament making it illegal for policemen to strike under any circumstances and which caused the general strike of policemen to be organized is still worrying the labor organizations and causing much of the disquiet.

## C.P.R. LOSES APPEAL BEFORE PRIVY COUNCIL

### Compensation Board Has Right to Pay Dependents of Sophia Sailors.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Vancouver, August 7.—The Privy Council of Great Britain, to whom an appeal was taken, has decided that the dependents of sailors lost on the Princess Sophia which foundered in American waters, are protected by the British Columbia Workmen's Compensation Act.

When the British Columbia Compensation Board proceeded to pay compensation to the dependents under the regulations, the C. P. R. protested that the accident occurred outside the jurisdiction and proceeded to bring an injunction to stop payment being made. The case was carried from court to court until it eventually has been decided in favor of the workmen in the highest court of the land.

## AMERICAN SOLDIERS MARRYING GERMANS

Coblentz, August 7.—Reports of marriages between American soldiers and German girls have been received at headquarters from various parts of the occupied area within the last few days, but as yet no charges have been filed against any of the men, as it is believed most of the marriages were due to misunderstandings regarding the anti-fraternization regulations.

A week before the treaty was signed several chaplains through a misunderstanding informed the soldiers that marriages were permissible as soon as the Germans accepted the peace terms. Officers say marriages took place before this belief was corrected by a special order calling the attention of officers and men to the fact that until the United States ratified the treaty Germany and America technically were at war.

At headquarters it is said that even after the United States ratifies the treaty marriages with German girls will be prohibited by an army order.

## FRUIT VENDORS TO COME UP TOMORROW

## BUILDING FOR PAST MONTH

Permits for New Work to Value of \$29,800 Were Issued by City Engineer.

### MANY FINE STORES ARE BEING COMPLETED

With Settlement of Shipbuilding Dispute Many More New Dwellings and Stores Will be Commenced.

Although last month's building permits have come down somewhat, caused by the slump at the time of the general strike, nevertheless a number of new buildings have been started and others are rapidly nearing completion. Considerable activity has been noticed in the outside sections and many small cottages and bungalows have been erected during the past few weeks. Residents have been building on their lots and a number of houses are being erected to accommodate the people who are arriving here. No large apartment houses have been started although there has been considerable talk along this line.

**Finishing Touches.** The large concrete building of James Killas' ought to be finished by the end of this month. The front will be very attractive with the large plate glass windows set in faced brick. The arch on the top storey is a decidedly outstanding architectural feature. The finishing of the front is being completed on the new block built by George Frizzell and already one storey has been taken over by the Overwaita Company. The addition to the Court House has been completed and the government forestry department offices have been moved to the new addition. The present quarters are larger and better lighted than was the main building. Both stores belonging to R. L. McIntosh have been completed and occupied by tenants, the Prince Rupert Drug Company occupying one and Pattinson & Ling the other.

Two other large structures have been started, namely the stores for E. C. Cotes on Third Avenue and First Street and the block for Mrs. Beveridge on Third Avenue and Eighth Street. A large addition will also be made to the Mochida House on Fraser Street and James Krievsky is building two houses on the corner of Eighth Avenue and Tatlow. With the probability that the shipyards will reopen within the next few days many other prospective buildings are expected to go ahead.

The total permits for the month of July is \$29,800 and is very favorable in comparison with that of the same month last year, which was \$3,900.

## ALASKA SALMON PACK IS LIGHT

Juneau, Aug. 5.—Word brought to Juneau by H. L. Simonds, manager of the Hoonah Packing Co., and his guests, who have just made a tour of the traps of his company on lower Chatham Strait and some of the canneries in that section, is that fish have been running better the last few days than previously. The Gambier Bay, Washington Bay and other canneries were working. Similar word was brought from the lower Chatham Strait.

However, the salmon pack of this section of Alaska is only about 50 per cent of the average that has obtained by this time for the last several years. None of the canneries are getting a full pack. Word from Ketchikan, the Alaska peninsula, and Bristol Bay districts is also disappointing as to the packs. It is said the Yakutat Bay pack is good.

## PECK MENTIONED AS FEDERAL MINISTER

Appointment Would Be Popular But Stevens Thought to Have Better Chance.

For a time Hon. Martin Burrell will remain in the government, but when he does retire a British Columbian will take his place in the government, says a Vancouver Sun special correspondent. It has been rumored that Col. Cy Peck, V. C., of Skeena, would be brought into the government to replace Sir James Lougheed as minister of civil re-establishment. No doubt Col. Peck's appointment to that position would be popular. But he is a Liberal-Unionist and so is Dr. Tolmie, and it is very improbable that the government will appoint two men of that political stripe from one province. In fact, the choice is almost certain to fall upon H. H. Stevens, of Centre Vancouver. Mr. Stevens is one of the ablest members in the house, is an excellent speaker and an assiduous worker. He particularly distinguished himself in connection with the cost of living inquiry last session. His appointment would meet with very general approval.

## MAJOR RATTALLACK BACK FROM RUPERT

Major Rattallack, public utilities commissioner, has returned from Prince Rupert, where he heard a petition from the city for permission to take certain steps in reference to issuing debentures for improved electric light and telephone service, says the Vancouver Province. Decision was not given, but nobody appeared to oppose the request. On Wednesday, Aug. 6, the commissioner will give his decision in reference to the scope of the evidence which may be admitted at the Vancouver application for a five-cent fare on British Columbia Electric city car lines. On Thursday there will be another hearing in reference to several south Vancouver applications.
