Aid of Vancouver Requested by Board of Trade in Securing the Building of Provincial Highway

On motion of C. H. Orme, seconded by Joe Scott, a resolution was passed by the Board of Trade at its meeting last night which read as follows:

"Whereas the progress of northern and central British Columbia is being greatly retarded through lack of a highway connecting it with the big business centres of the province, and,

"Whereas, Vancouver is already benefiting very materially by the development of the north and would benefit much more if the north were more prosperous and connected with it by a highway, and,

"Whereas, Prince Rupert's development and the development of the other towns and villages in the north is being sadly retarded through lack of highway connection with the rest of the continent, therefore

"Be it resolved that the Vancouver Board of Trade be urgently requested to use its influence to bring about the immediate completion of the trunk highway connecting Prince Rupert and other cities and towns with the cities and towns of southern British Columbia by way of Prince George."

It was also decided, on recommendation of the committee from which the original resolution emanated, that a letter should accompany the resolution asking for prompt and energetic action thereon and stating that although the city had been founded over 20 years the total amount of road construction by the provincial governments concerned amounted to five and one-half miles, which worked out at about 434 yards per annum for the whole period. During that same period the road system in the south had been extended until today it was a splendid highway system of which the southern part of the province was proud.

The letter will point out that Prince Rupert has at her own expense developed her own city road system; that Prince Rupert spends a great deal of money in Vancouver and would spend more if connected by road with that centre; that thousands of tourists come to British Columbia each year, and if the Skeena highway were constructed it would be the finest tourist drive in the province.

Finally, Vancouver Board of Trade will be reminded that they have often professed friendship for Prince Rupert and giving support to their highway would prove its sincerity.

SMITHERS MAN IS REMANDED

Trial of D. L. Jones on Manslaughter Case in Connection With Auto Fatality Adjourned

David Lewis Jones, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Isaac Carlson and Uno Ferner, who were killed last Saturday night when an automobile went over a bank on the Duthie mine road near Smithers, has been remanded at his preliminary trial before Stipendiary Magistrate S. H. Hopkins at Smithers. Meantime, burial has been made at Smithers of the bodies of the two victims.

Jones is a well known young man of Smithers, where he has been in the employ of the Canadian National Railways. His father is undertaker at the interior town.

PREPARATIONS FOR CONVENTION

Plans Being Laid For Entertainment of Visitors to Fisheries Association Meeting

At the Board of Trade meeting in the city council chamber last night Milton Gonzales presiding, it was decided to cooperate with the local branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association in properly entertaining the members of the convention here the first three days in August.

T. H. Johnson, vice-president of the association, reported having attended an executive meeting in Montreal when passing through and he said the members were enthusiastic over the visit to Prince Rupert. He expected there would be a large attendance.

As the visit of Hon. Herbert Marler is to be at the time of the convention, it was decided to instruct the entertainment committee to try to arrange for a joint banquet or luncheon which would be addressed by the new Canadian minister to Japan. The Women's Canadian Club is also collaborating with the Board of Trade in this event.

A meeting of the Fisheries Association with delegates from the Board of Trade and City Council will be held Monday evening when a program of entertainment for the visitors will be arranged. The Board of Trade appointed S. E. Parker, chairman of the fisheries committee to represent them at the meeting.

HON. J. A. ROBB IS OPTIMISTIC

WINNIPEG, July 6.—"Canadian prosperity is evident and within the years to come the Dominion as a whole will assume a still greater position in the world," stated Hon. J. A. Robb, minister of finance, in an interview here.

"The west has contributed wonderfully to this prosperity and will continue to contribute to a still greater degree to the development and prosperity of the Canadian agricultural, industrial and mineral wealth, and thus assure the Dominion a still greater position in the world," he said.

DIVIDEND FOR THE HOME OIL

VANCOUVER, July 6.—At a meeting of the directors of Home Oil yesterday it was decided to pay a twenty per cent dividend to shareholders of record as of July 27. The dividend will be for a period of May and June as of June 30.

DYNAMITE BOMB ON PACIFIC HIGHWAY

OLYMPIA, July 6.—A dynamite bomb containing ten sticks of dynamite was found beneath a bridge near here on the Pacific highway, but it was so placed as not likely to do any damage if it went off. The fuse was partly submerged in water and it had the appearance of having been thrown there to get rid of it rather than for the purpose of destroying the bridge.

JOE WRIGHT WAS BEATEN BY A YARD

Dutchman Wins Diamond Sculls at Henley Today From Toronto Man

LEANDER CUP WINNERS

Canadian Made Great Spurt at End and Just Failed to Make Win

HENLEY, England, July 6. L. Gunther of Holland today defeated Joe Wright of Toronto in the final diamond sculls by only one yard. His time was 8 minutes 42 seconds.

The Leander Club won the Great Challenge cup, defeating the Thomas Rowing Club by two lengths in seven minutes.

Gunther's time was eighteen seconds slower than the record held by F. S. Kelley of London. Gunther rowed a beautiful race, but rapidly tired near the finish when Wright was making a tremendous spurt, but Gunther managed to keep the nose of his shell a yard in front.

CONCILIATION BOARD NAMED

Railway Employees to Arbitrate Proposed Increase of Pay in West

OTTAWA, July 6.—Hon. Peter Heenan yesterday established a board of conciliation and investigation into the dispute between the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways and the conductors, trainmen and yard service men, members of the order of railway conductors and of the brotherhood of railroad trainmen on western lines, over a request for increases in pay. Some six thousand men are affected directly and ten thousand indirectly.

Isaac Pibblado K.C. will represent the employers and David Campbell K.C., the employees, both of Winnipeg. They will name a chairman.

GOOD TROLLING DUNDAS ISLAND

High Boat Was 195 Cohoes and Average Being Made of About 75 Per Boat

PRICES ARE HIGH

Trolling has been giving good returns to the fishermen at Dundas Island for the past two weeks, according to word received from there. The high boat Thursday was 195 cohoes and the average for the fleet was about 75 per boat. As these are now being sold at 45 cents each, it is plain to see that the men are making fairly good money.

Canneries seem to have been bidding against each other for the cohoes with the result that the prices have jumped from 30c to 45c. The cannery at Humpback Bay, north of Porcher Island, was getting most of the fish for a time, but yesterday Invenness was the highest bidder and a load was taken there.

SHEFFIELD, July 6.—Rt. Hon. A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, alluding in a speech last night to the naval disarmament discussion between Great Britain and United States, said the people need have no fear that the Labor Government would sacrifice security in their haste for disarmament. He affirmed that the Labor administration would work with might and main for stabilization of naval armaments at a given point and then reduction which would give Britain security without the present drain upon her economic resources.

Whatever armaments the admiralty might require in future must be efficient, Mr. Alexander declared. He said he was sure the government would improve the standards and not lower them.

GOVERNMENT TO AID OWEN LAKE

Timmins to Undertake Important Operations on Property Recently Purchased

VICTORIA, July 6.—In view of important operations in the development of the Owen Lake mines, south of Houston, under the new owner, Noah Timmins, the government is preparing to assist in the construction of a road to connect up with the main highway through the Bulkley Valley. The government has agreed to co-operate to the fullest possible extent with the company in aiding road work.

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NEW CANADIAN NOVEL

A great many people heard Robert Watson lecture here last year and they, as well as others, will be interested to know that he has published a new book, "High Hazard," which is just off the press and which certainly enhances the reputation of the author as a writer of interesting stories.

The tale deals with life in the Arctic following a rather thrilling experience in Vancouver and another at Prince Rupert. The characters are well drawn and are intensely human. They respond to the human emotions of love and hate.

In the story the coastal steamer Lady Rathlin goes north from Vancouver on a trading trip with a cargo of supplies for the posts in the north and with several tourists signed on as members of the crew. One of these is a rich girl with a lovely voice. The daughter of the captain of the ship also goes along and these girls are the two sides of an intensely interesting love triangle.

The ship gets caught in the ice pack and eventually only three people are left aboard and they are safely cast on an Arctic island, where they live for nearly two years.

A few features are introduced which seem very improbable, but which are not beyond the bounds of possibility. The island has an active volcano honeycombed with caverns and a visit to these brings adventures which it would spoil the story to tell.

The book is one that the reader wants to finish and it leaves no unpleasant flavor at the close. It is well written and interesting throughout, full of action, and a book not to be overlooked.

BROKE RECORD FOR MARATHON

Payne of Woodford Green, England, Won Amateur Athletic Championship

LONDON, July 6.—H. Payne of Woodford Green cut nearly two minutes from the world's record for the regular marathon distance of 26 miles 385 yards yesterday, winning the event in the British amateur athletic championship. He covered the distance in 2 hours 30 minutes 57 2-5 seconds, two minutes better than the record held by the great Finn, Hans Kohlemain, in the 1920 Olympic games.

A penalty against Dave Jack, a few minutes before the close, was successfully converted by Brick Skinner and that closed the scoring.

Sammy Currie, captain and centre half for the Empress Club, was the outstanding player on the field and it was largely because of his efforts, with able assistance from the backs, that the Thistles did not pile up an even higher count, Baptie being dangerous at all times.







Providing the weather man decides to be a little more agreeable than he has been of late, the fifth annual regatta tomorrow of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club should again be an outstanding event on the local waterfront. An interesting program of events has been arranged and some generous prizes are being offered to make the competition worth while, so many owners are planning on having their craft participate in the events. Alex Macdonald, who has supervised most of the regattas of the past in capable manner, is again chairman of this year's event with other officials as follows: Official time-keeper, C. G. Minns; judge and starter, George Bushby; competing boats, Dr. J. P. Cade; chairman of the Government Wharf, confined to his home for a day or so toward the end of this week with light illness.

The cold storage scow which was wrecked some time ago in Hecate Straits and later acquired from the underwriters by the Nissen Packing Co. of Vancouver after having been reconditioned in the local dry dock is still tied up at the dock here, where she is being operated by her new owners. Dorothy After Walrus

Bound for the Siberian Arctic to search for species of giant walrus, the big halibut schooner Dorothy, Capt. Ole Hvatum, until recently under charter to the International Fisheries Commission, cleared recently from Seattle to Nome, where she will pick up scientists from the Field Museum of Natural History. The expedition hopes to return at the end of the summer with specimens suitable for mounting in a new natural life exhibit planned by the Field Museum.

The usual midseason lightness of halibut landings was felt at Prince Rupert during the past week when only 475,800 pounds was brought in, this being made up of 239,300 pounds American fish and 236,500 pounds Canadian. In regard to the lightness of American landings, it is heard that some of the United States boats have been going to Seattle because of low prices at Prince Rupert the week previous.

Despite the recent paucity of fish at Prince Rupert, the landings for the year to date totaling 13,791,450 pounds are still well ahead of last year's 13,138,400 pounds at a similar date. Canadian landings total 3,951,350 pounds as against 3,991,000 pounds last year while American landings are up to 9,840,100 pounds from 9,147,400 pounds. This year the landings are also well ahead of 13,235,500 pounds in the record year of 1927 so prospects are still bright that 1929 will be the banner year as far as volume of halibut is concerned.

The week was marked by higher prices than for some time past. American bids went as high as 18.3c and 8c paid the Rainier for 4,500 pounds, while the top Canadian price was 16.6c and 8c received by the D. S. T. for 7,700 pounds. The low American price of the week was 11.6c and 7c paid the Tahoma for 24,000 pounds while the Canadian low was 10c and 6c received by the Takla for 43,000 pounds.

After having spent ten days in port undergoing mid-season cleaning and painting up, the halibut boat Gibson, Capt. Chris Henriksen, left again for the high spots on Thursday afternoon.

A new Gardner compressor plant has just been installed for the diesel engine on Capt. Dan Larsen's new halibut boat Capella.

The Harla, with Skipper George Bryant, Charlie Balagno and party of boys on board, returned Wednesday afternoon after spending several days on a successful angling expedition to Lake Khtada. The party found the fishing just as good as ever at this popular resort.

Another angling party which met with fair success was that which went over the holiday week-end to Baker Inlet in Granville Channel with Capt. Alfred Swanson on the Myfanwy. Other members of the party were Don Crerar and A. Ivanson.

Having on board Joe Roerig, the power cruiser Myfanwy, Capt. Alfred Swanson, left yesterday for a trip to Warke Canal. It is the ambition of Mr. Roerig, a former resident of this city and now living in Chicago, to successfully troll for a big spring or coho salmon.

The seventh of the recent Olympia to Juneau racing yachts to call here on the way south, the power cruiser Maidie of Bellingham arrived on Wednesday afternoon from the north and left the next afternoon for Puget Sound. Having heard tales of big trout that were caught at Klew Nuetget in Grenville Channel, Skipper F. Powers decided to call in there on his way south to try his luck.

Salmon Fishing

The past week has seen a slight improvement in sockeye fishing on the Skeena and Naas Rivers, on both of which streams boats have been averaging about eighteen fish per day. The number of licenses on the Skeena River is getting close up to the number of 1100 on reaching which an additional 12 hours weekly close season will be imposed. On the Naas River, 250 licenses have been taken out, the limit before imposition of additional close season being 300. Rivers Inlet and Smith's Inlet have now gone over their quota and the weekly close season there has been extended 12 hours.

On the Skeena River, the pack up to the end of June, with little over a week's fishing, had reached 6,288 cases, including 3,014 cases of sockeye and 2200 cases of red springs. On the Naas River the pack was 2590 cases of which 2321 cases were sockeye.

Sockeye will be the principal fish caught until about the end of July when the pink run usually commences. The first seaplane to be used in fisheries patrol this season arrived at Swanson Bay this week. It is a machine of the Western Canada Airways Ltd., Vancouver, piloted by W. N. Cumming. On Thursday a Japanese fisherman, K. Sawaki, of Balmoral was fined \$100 by Stipendiary Magistrate H. F. McLeod at Prince Rupert for fishing a longer net than is allowed.

RESOLUTION ON OPENING UP OF PEACE COUNTRY

The grain committee of the Board of Trade which has had in hand the preparation of resolutions to submit to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce at its Alberta meeting in September reported on the result of their work at the meeting of the board last night. Included in it was a resolution which was telegraphed to the secretary at Montreal and which will come before the convention as follows:

"Whereas the Peace River district is rapidly becoming settled and settlers therein are at a great disadvantage on account of the long haulage on railways and consequent high freight costs and in most districts complete lack of railways, and

"Whereas, the Pacific coast is the natural railway outlet for the Peace River district, therefore "Be it resolved that the Canadian Chamber of Commerce request the federal government to immediately survey all feasible routes west out of the Peace River district and determine upon the one that will prove most advantageous to the Peace River district and at the same time traverse, open up and serve the most valuable new country and then proceed with construction of the railway with the least possible delay."

Board of Trade Will Send Five Delegates to Canadian Chamber of Commerce
