Mackenzie King New Leader of Liberal Party in Canada Was Chosen by Convention

Had Close Run For Position with Fielding Second Secured Support From every Province, But Especially from Quebec and Manitoba; Is Only 45 Years of Age.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, August 8.—William Lyon Mackenzie King, formerly minister of labor in the Laurier Government, was chosen leader of the Liberal party in Canada by the big convention of Liberals session here yesterday. Four names were nominated for the position, W. S. Fielding, George P. Graham, D. D. McKenzie and L. Mackenzie King.

Four votes were taken and Mr. King led the poll each time. The first ballot gave King 344 votes, Fielding 297, Graham 153, McKenzie 153. On the second ballot King increased his lead still did not get a majority. The vote stood, King 411, Fielding 344, Graham 124, and McKenzie 60. Before the third ballot King announced his retirement and after the third, McKenzie withdrew, making it a straight vote between King and Fielding. The result gave King 476 and Fielding 438.

Just as the nominations were made Lady Laurier entered the hall and was given an ovation. The whole convention rose en masse and cheered. The utmost enthusiasm was aroused. It is very difficult to analyze the vote secured by the candidates for the leadership. Whence each man derived his support cannot be known because the ballot papers were purposely mixed so the count was not taken by provinces. It is known, however, that King secured a good deal of support from practically all the provinces, but particularly heavy from Quebec and Manitoba. King secured a heavy vote from Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia and the maritime provinces.

W. L. Mackenzie King was born in Kitchener (Berlin) Ont., December 17, 1874 and is, therefore, 45 years of age. He was educated at Toronto University and also took post graduate courses at Chicago University and Harvard, securing his M. A. and Ph.D. degrees.

He was deputy minister of labor and editor of the Labor Gazette and later became minister of labor in the Laurier cabinet. Took part in many commissions and inquiries into disputes. In 1914 he was appointed director of the investigation of industrial relations instituted by the Rockefeller Foundation of New York and has held many important positions in clubs and societies. He is an author of repute and his latest book, "Industry and Humanity," has attracted a great deal of attention and has been widely read.

While the minister was away Mrs. and Miss Pattullo were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. David H. Hays.

NEW CAR FERRY SLIP HAS BEEN COMMENCED AND WILL BE FINISHED IN OCTOBER

COST OF DOCK WILL BE ABOUT \$50,000—WILL BE LOCATED AT SOUTHWEST END OF SECTION TWO NEAR FOG ALARM

Work has commenced on the new car ferry slips which are being built by the Grand Trunk Pacific for the handling of the products of the district in car load lots without trans-shipment. The new car ferry dock, it is estimated, will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000 and should be completed in about two months. It is to be located opposite the bell fog alarm opposite the southwest extremity of Section 2, and near the location for the ocean docks which it is proposed to build. It will be three cars wide and will therefore allow of the loading or unloading of three cars at one time, accommodating a car barge carrying nine loaded cars.

Not only will the new slip be useful in handling shingles, sulphite, paper and other products from Swanson Bay, Ocean Falls and other points, but it will be used in distributing machinery and other supplies without breaking cars to Stewart, Alice Arm, Granby and any points on tide water.

E. C. HOY FLIES OVER ROCKIES; HALL SMASHES HIS MACHINE

FIRST FLIGHT OVER MOUNTAINS SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED BY VANCOUVER AVIATOR LAST EVENING AT 8:55—LIEUT. HALL'S MACHINE OUT OF BUSINESS

BETTER PRICES FOR HALIBUT

Ten and a Half Cents Paid For Five Car Loads This Morning.

There was a slight stiffening of fish prices on the exchange this morning, the average for first-class being ten and a half cents. A large number of sales were made, each of the local buyers securing a share. The following were the catches: Tatoosh, 10,000 lbs.; Lumen, 12,000; Helena, 13,000; Brothers, 6,000; Yellowstone, 13,000; Bartolome, 10,000; Ranier, 8,000; White Star, 10,000; Alameda, 8,000; Reliance, 27,000; Director, 8,000; Venus, 14,000; Gilford, 14,000; Advance, 14,000; Pair of Jacks, 9,000; Dorreen, 10,000; Ringleader, 8,000; Bayview, 10,000; Rosepoint, 8,000; M. M. Christopher, 2,500; Notlad, 4,000; Verna, 5,000, and Mayflower, 6,000 pounds.

Of these enough boats were sold this morning to fill five car loads. The average price was 10.5 and 5 cents.

CURRIE KEPT IN ENGLAND, SHIP HELD UP

Labor Condition is Improving, But Still Serious—Bread Famine in Liverpool.

Liverpool, August 8.—General Currie, who was to have sailed for Canada on the Coronica has been delayed owing to labor troubles at Liverpool and will not sail until tomorrow.

The labor situation is improving, but many ships are still held up. The city is still without street cars and a real bread famine exists.

London, August 8.—The strike of bakers and Yorkshire miners is still unsettled, but the railway position in London is resuming a normal aspect.

LADY CHARGED WITH GETTING RUSSIAN GOLD

Sylvia Pankhurst, Feminine Agitator, Said to Have Been in Pay of Bela Kun.

London, Aug. 8.—Sylvia Pankhurst, the leading English feminine agitator, is again in the limelight. Scotland Yard officials charge her with receiving \$30,000 of Russian gold from Bela Kun, the Hungarian soviet leader to be used in promoting British strikes. Miss Pankhurst denies having received the money.

OBJECTION TAKEN TO PROFITEERING BILL

English Newspapers Take Exception to Sudden Decision of The Government.

London, August 8.—The Government's decision to introduce a profiteering bill into parliament met with many adverse comments. Many newspapers condemned the terms of the bill which provide for a system of "tradables." Others expressed dissatisfaction with the decision which interrupted the work of the parliamentary committees.

SIR DOUGLAS HAIG BECOMES AN EARL

London, Aug. 8.—Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig has been raised to the peerage by King George as a reward for his services to the country in the recent war. He will take the title of Earl Haig of Bendersyde.

NEW BUILDINGS FOR THIS CITY

Plans Drawn by Local Architect For Apartment Houses and Soldiers' Dwellings.

William Bruce is preparing drawings for a permanent and thoroughly modern apartment building on 3rd Avenue to contain 12 large suites on the upper floors and 12 store rooms in the basement with a laundry for the use of the tenants, all complete. The building will cost upwards of \$40,000. Also he has a large scheme for the corner of 4th Ave and Agnew Place, of 24 suites, six storeys high. At the present time this scheme is under the consideration of a capitalist in the south and the beginning of construction will depend upon the progress of the shipbuilding. The cost of land and buildings will be about \$100,000.

For the returned men eight sets of drawings have been prepared, six for section 2 and two for other parts of the city, and the construction of the eight buildings will begin as soon as the drawings are approved by the authorities.

FRUIT CASES BEFORE COURT

J. C. Gavigan and J. Killas Appear With L. W. Patmore Defending Them.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMordie, James Killas and J. C. Gavigan appeared charged with keeping their stores open after 6:30. Police Constable Bailey testified that he had bought fruit in both places between 8 and 9 o'clock on Tuesday evening. Chief Vickers stated that he had seen lots of people going in and buying fruit and taking it away with them on that same evening.

L. W. Patmore for the defense claimed that both places were refreshment houses and he said that he could see no difference in carrying away fruit from carrying away ice cream. The fruit was the minor part of their overturn. Both merchants testified that the fruit stock was only a percentage of their main line. It was only on the side for the convenience of the public who require such a place to go and get their fresh fruit.

In conclusion Mr. Patmore pointed out that the whole business had come to a head when J. C. Gavigan started up his business. Before that time no thought had been taken of Jim Killas selling his fruit and, as was stated, the Retail Merchants in 1916, at the time the petition for early closing was circulated, did not take him into account. Jim Killas had come along as the "goat in the tail end of a scrap among the grocers."

The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

New Leader Of Liberals.

Mackenzie King is chosen leader of the Liberal party in Canada, and it is probable that the choice was the best that could be made. He has undoubted ability and plenty of self-confidence. He comes of a fighting stock, being a grandson of the rebel, Sir William Lyon McKenzie who fought the Family Compact in Upper Canada and came near being hanged as a reward. He is a student of labor affairs and has recently published a book dealing with his investigations along that line. He was the only young man whose name was before the convention.

A number of people had hoped that Fielding would have been the choice because he had been a unionist. The convention was almost evenly divided, showing that the unionist tendency among the Liberals was strong.

Will Probably Be The Future Premier.

People realize that when the leader of the Liberal party was being chosen it was the future premier of Canada that was being chosen. The convention was representative of the whole of the party in Canada. The British Columbia delegation was headed by the Premier of the province who took a prominent part in the proceedings.

King is young enough so that even if the Liberals should be defeated at the next election, he will still be in the running and will have a chance to lead them to victory at some future time.

Ignorance Regarding Position of This Port.

The report of the sub-committee of the Canadian Economic Commission in regard to trade with Siberia, is very discouraging. It is a somewhat delayed report but it says that there is no dependable currency in Siberia and there are no cargoes for export. The result is that no medium of exchange can be arranged with that country.

The same report suggests that as soon as stable conditions return a line of steamships with Vancouver should be established for freight and passengers. It does not mention Prince Rupert.

Since the commission does not know enough about Canada to realize that the best trade route with Canada is way of Prince Rupert, it is possible that it is equally ignorant of all the conditions in Siberia and that even now trade conditions are not so bad as represented.

There is a mental anastigmatism among many officials in the east in regard to routes of trade, and for that reason it is very desirable that when appointments are made men with open minds shall be chosen. Some time ago a proposal to appoint a representative from Prince Rupert on the trade commission was ruthlessly turned down. Officialdom at Ottawa does not wish to see any good here. Apparently we have to fight for recognition for every inch of the ground is contested.

States Can do It, Why Not Canada?

In spite of the fact that the Canadian Trade Commission says it is impossible to do business in Siberia, the United States is selling goods valued at four million dollars a month to that country. A statement of the exports from the United States to Siberia shows that for the year ending May 31, 1919, the amount sold to that country was \$31,000,000 and the imports from that country for the same time was \$2,000,000. For May the exports to Siberia was four millions.

If the United States can do business, surely the commissioners would not say that for Canadians it is impossible. We have to look to the future. If we wait until the United States gets established it will be useless to try to get the business. Had a Prince Rupert man gone to Siberia on the commission we venture to believe he would have seen opportunities there that he would have been able to draw to the attention of the Government.

Back to Old Time Trade and Barter.

It might be necessary for the Government to place a business man in Vladivostok who would sell Canadian goods that are delivered to him there, getting in exchange Siberian money. With this he could purchase Siberian goods to fill the return cargoes. He would have to be a man who would be able to meet the Oriental system of bargaining. All Orientals do that. They always ask more than they expect to get and they offer less than they expect to pay. It is their habit and those doing business with them must play their own game. With the right man in charge in Vladivostok cargoes could be secured and shipped to Canada in exchange for Canadian goods and Prince Rupert would be the port through which to ship.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before recording a Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual record, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown grant land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The rights which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, less or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 21, 1926.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for granting districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for establishment. Stock-owners may permit. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

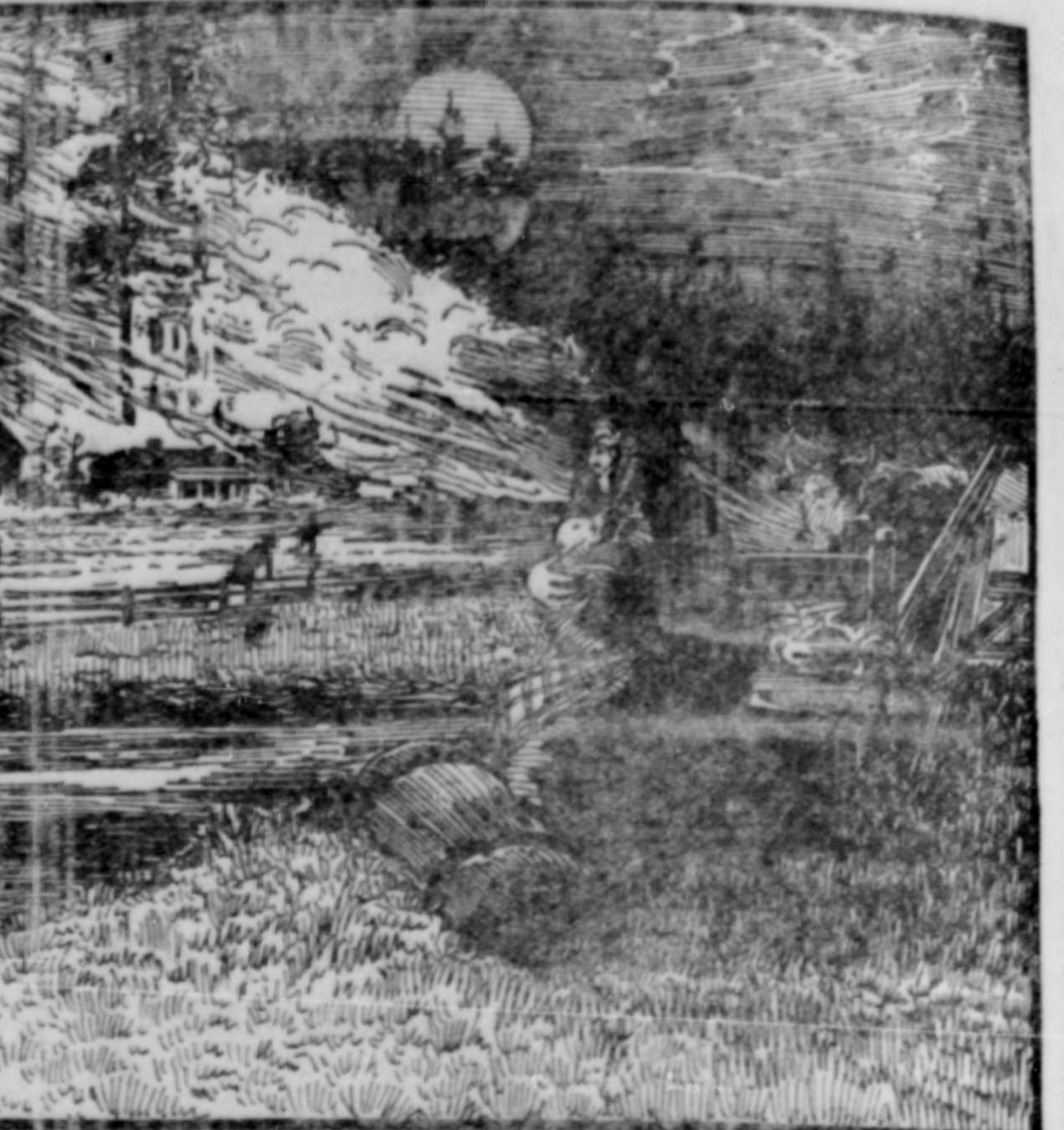

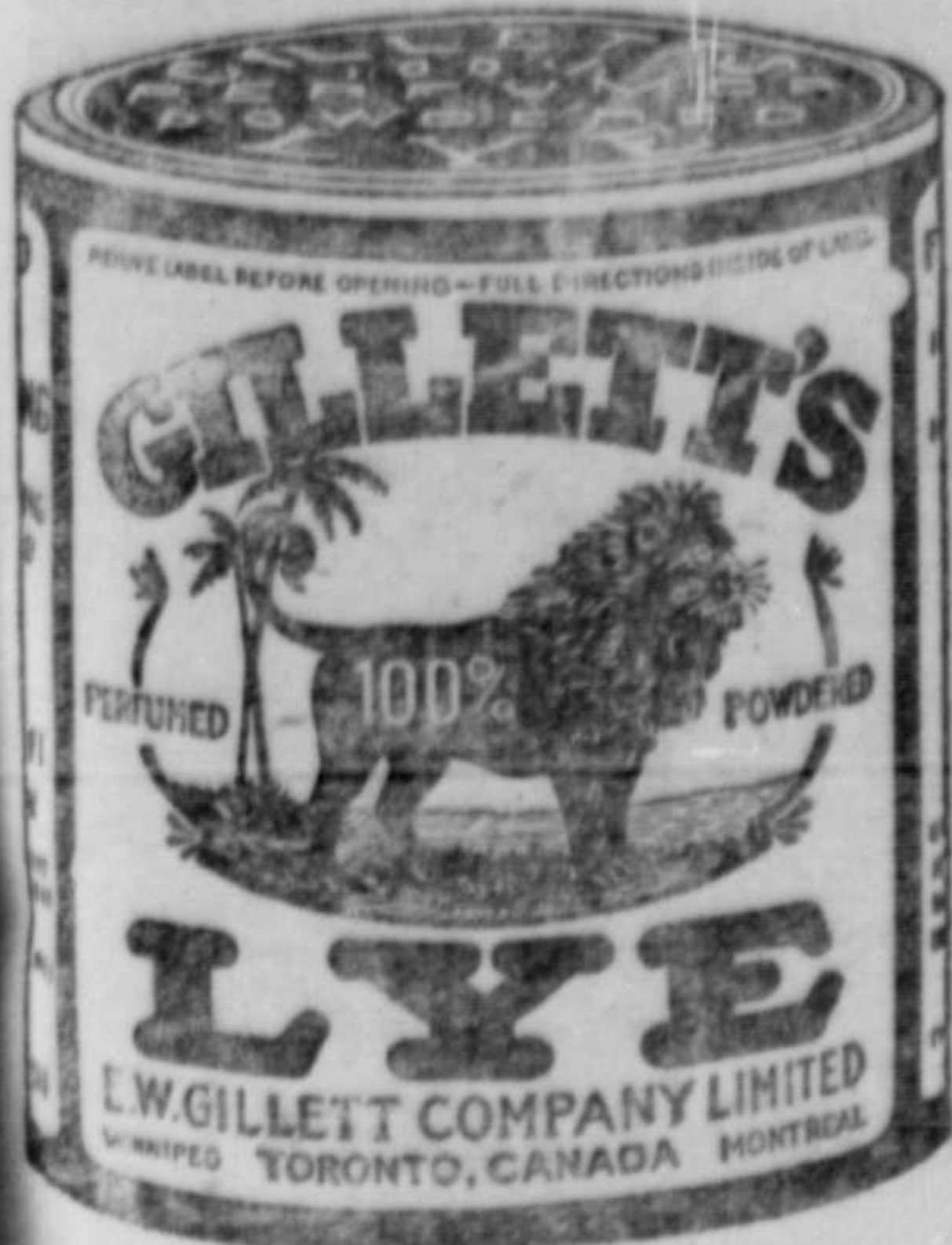

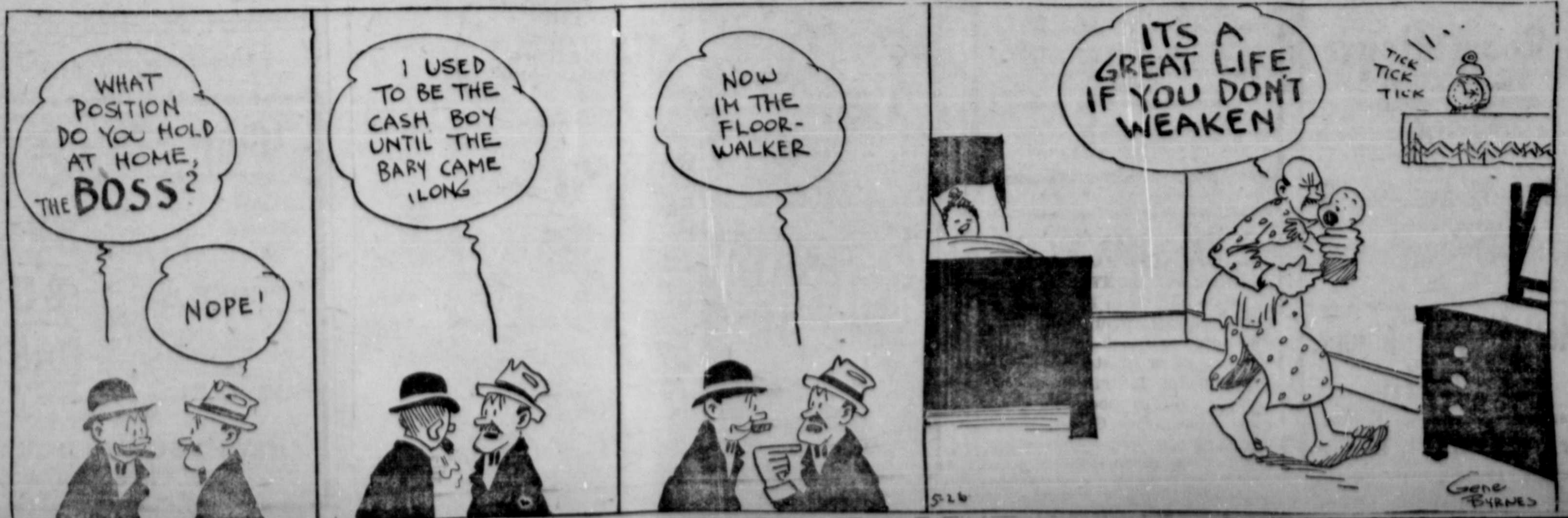

FOOD CONTROL IN BRITAIN TO CONTINUE THROUGHOUT WINTER

Drop in Value of Pound Sterling Affects Trade With the United States.

London, August 7.—The American Chamber of Commerce Review for July says that British import restrictions are likely to be continued after September 1, when the government promised they would be revised. The government's trade policy is expected to be announced before parliament meets August 15. Premier Lloyd George says the policy cannot be made legislative until parliament reconvenes late in October and he considers the present import restrictions should be continued until then.

The American chamber anticipates that restrictions affecting many lines of American goods will be modified.

The drop in sterling exchange, it is asserted, is causing British importers to hold back American orders, and, wherever possible, to buy in countries where the value of the pound is higher than in the United States.

Meanwhile, the government, in consultation with banking and trade interests, is preparing to re-establish British export trade by providing sterling credits for the countries not in a position to pay at present for export of essential imports, says the Review.

The official shipping reports show that there are two and a half million tons of shipping under construction, practically every yard being packed with orders, with favorable labor conditions.

This tonnage should take the water within twelve months, but this prospect is unlikely. Virtually all the new tonnage is cargo tonnage.

The government has subscribed for 1,700,000 shares of the five million and appointed two directors for the British Dyestuffs corporation, formed by arrangement with the board of trade to promote the manufacture of synthetic dyestuffs and colors.

The compulsory scheme of standard clothing will be revived, the Review goes on, to check high prices following the removal of the wool control. Food control will be continued throughout the winter. More plentiful supplies than last winter are expected, but prices will be just as high.
