PATTULLO ATTACKS GOVERNMENT FORESTRY SHOWS INCREASED PRODUCTION IN SOME LINES

Doukhobors Make Charges Against Police in Connection With Recent Arrests of the Sons of Freedom

Declare They Do Not Recognize Canadian Barbaric Laws or Beastly Action of the Police, Charging Brutality and Intoxication

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7.—Making charges of brutality and intoxication against the police officers who arrested several of their sect in recent disturbances at Grand Forks, the Christian Community of Universal Brotherhood, Sons of Freedom, or "Doukhobors," have launched an appeal to the federal minister of justice and also addressed an open letter to Inspector Dunwoody of the provincial police and Inspector P. H. Sheffield of the provincial department of education.

In their appeal to the minister the Doukhobors state that their men were sentenced for their religious belief and ask their release or otherwise to take them all for "we stand on the path of Christ one for all and all for one."

The letter to Inspector Dunwoody and Inspector Sheffield says: "We do not recognize your barbaric laws, your beastly actions at Grand Forks," and goes on to say "One woman had her nose opened up in two. Another had her baby snatched out of her arms and thrown on the snow. One elderly woman was knocked from her standpoint and one man was dragged through a broken window by means of twisting his head from outside and beating with clubs from inside. By the force of the policemen, women were compelled to crawl through the windows and were met outside by the club's hot beats."

Production of Poles, Piles and Ties During 1928 Showed Increase

Log Output Dropped Off Owing to Pacific Mills Depleting Their Stock by About Fourteen Million Feet, States District Forester

The bright feature of the timber industry for northern British Columbia, according to the report of the district forester, just issued, is the cedar pole and piling and tie industry. With a drop in the amount of sawlogs for 1928 of 29 per cent, there is an increase of 37 per cent in the cedar pole and piling production, and for railway ties an increase of 16 per cent.

The report states that the decrease in the production of sawlogs was accounted for by the depletion of the stock of the Pacific Mills amounting to 14,000,000 board feet. Had there not been this depletion the production for the year would have equalled that for 1927. That company logged only 56,000,000 feet as compared with the usual production of 70,000,000 feet.

It is expected that sub-contracts will be let in the Swanson Bay district for 15,000,000 feet to be divided among eight power contractors and numerous hand loggers. It is expected that the J. R. Morgan Logging Co. will deliver (continued on page 5)

THRONE SPEECH IN PARLIAMENT

Unprecedented Industrial and Commercial Expansion Referred To by Governor-General

LEGISLATION FORECAST

Reforms to Be Made in Fishery Regulations and Business of Canada Assisted

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—"Never in the history of Canada has there been such industrial and commercial expansion as that which has taken place during the past 12 months," the speech from the throne read at the opening of parliament today. A notable feature of the development was the continued advance and prosperity of the mining industry, the speech of the governor-general said.

It was noted that the fisheries branch of the department of marine and fisheries had been separated from the marine branch and a deputy minister appointed. Reorganization of the fisheries along the lines recommended by royal commission was being effected. Certain other matters covered in the report would be dealt with by legislation.

It was intended, the speech continued, to augment and extend the existing facilities for furnishing Canadian exporters with commercial information in regard to foreign markets and to establish additional trade commissioners at strategic points.

The speech says: "The rapid development of western and northern Canada imposes on the railways the necessity of providing increased transportation facilities in the immediate future. A further branch line program of the Canadian National management will be submitted and you will also be asked to authorize the acquisition of certain railways in both Eastern and Western Canada."

Legislation will be introduced, the Speech forecasted, to give effect to a general pension scheme for the benefit of the employees of the Canadian National Railways.

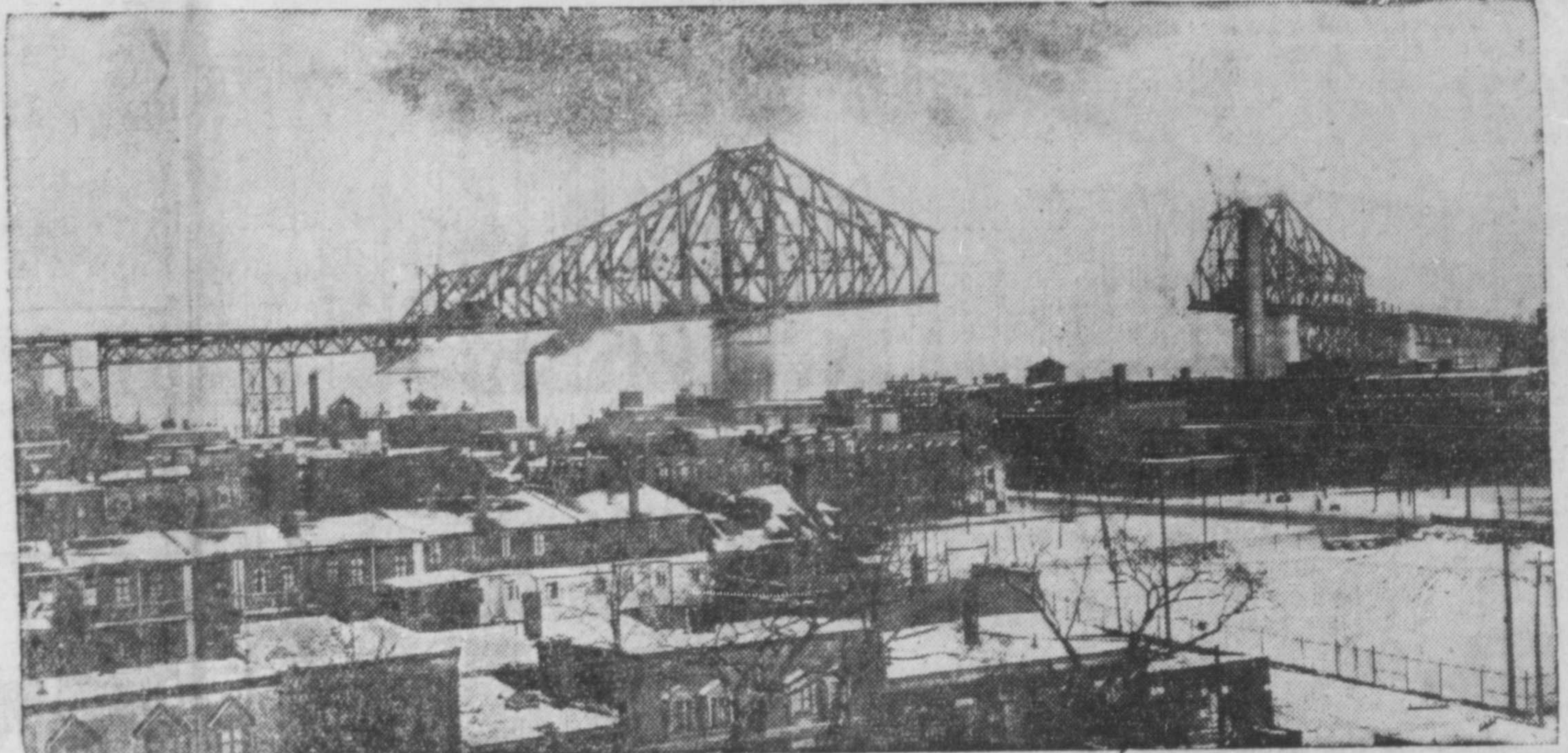
Negotiations had been resumed with British Columbia with regard to the restoration of lands of the railway belt and the Peace River block, the speech announced.

A treaty for the renunciation of war would be submitted to Parliament was another announcement of the Speech from the Throne.

GREAT CANADIAN BRIDGE NEARS COMPLETION



Above is a view of the new bridge which spans the broad St. Lawrence River at Montreal. It is completed except for the fixing in position of the central span and a few finishing touches here and there. This great bridge, more than a mile and a half long, has taken more than three years to construct, and when finished it will help to solve the traffic problem which has long troubled the Montreal officials in regard to traffic congestion over the Victoria Bridge the gateway between the Quebec Province and the United States.

PARLIAMENT AGAIN OPEN

Spectacular Scene During Snowstorm at Ottawa Today For Third Session

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—A heavy snow storm and grey skies were provided by the weather man as preparation for the opening ceremonies today of the third session of Canada's sixteenth Parliament. The opening was attended by the usual military movements, a travelling escort of cavalry for the Governor General, who drove to the Parliament Building in an open sleigh.

A guard of honor met Lord Willingdon at the Parliament Buildings and the boom of cannon was heard as His Excellency arrived to perform the usual sessional function.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—King George's removal to the south coast of England is expected shortly. An official bulletin today said: "Though a state of convalescence has not yet arrived, His Majesty's progress is such that the proposed change to the south coast is now desirable."

Treaty Will Be Signed On Sunday Between Pope and King Victor; Holy See Rejoices as Official Prerogatives Granted

ROME, Feb. 7.—Pope Pius has informed al nuncios, internuncios and apostolic delegates that complete agreement has been reached between the Roman Catholic Church and the Italian government. A treaty will be signed on Sunday by Cardinal Gasparri, representing His Holiness, and Premier Mussolini, representing King Victor Emmanuel. The terms provide for only a small rectification of the present boundaries of the apostolic palace.

made and in many instances with the force of the law itself, declared Mr. Pattullo, asserting, "we are going to find out whether the public business is to be conducted open and above board as pledged by the leader of the government, or whether it is to be carried on behind closed doors."

Mr. Uphill lent vigorous support to Mr. Pattullo, declaring the government's attitude savored of Klu Klux Klan methods.

Provincial Secretary Howe insisted that it was absurd to propose that the orders should be revealed to anyone who might wish to see them. He cited the Ottawa practice, where the orders remain the property of the cabinet and are disclosed only after consultation with the department concerned.

AUDIT MADE B. C. FINANCES

Anticipated That Final Report Will Make Recommendation for Changes

VICTORIA, Feb. 7.—An interim report of an audit conducted by a firm of chartered accountants for the government was tabled in the legislature yesterday.

The report, which was incomplete, is to be followed later by a main report which will make, it is anticipated, a number of changes in the accounting system in certain particulars, so as to avoid duplication, which it is stated, occurred. At the present time there is no statement regarding the public debt, but the recommendation made in regard to the preparation of a balance sheet is that the Dominion of Canada capital account should not be shown as an asset.

SAYS CHINESE OF VANCOUVER ARE DESTITUTE

W. W. B. McInnes Declares Gambling Joints Only Places They Have to Go

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7.—Hardship, cold and hunger stalked through Vancouver's Chinatown during the present wave of chilly weather it was revealed in the police court yesterday.

Eleven of the 23 Chinese charged with being inmates of a gaming house were allowed to go free by Magistrate Shaw yesterday when represented by their counsel, W. W. B. McInnes that they had sought shelter from the cold there. The others were fined. One witness declared that there were about 1000 Chinese almost destitute in the city.

BURNABY AMBITIOUS

Now that Moses Cotsworth is likely to become famous through the possible adoption of his reformed calendar, he is being recognized in his home district. South Burnaby Board of Trade wants a world's fair to be held there in 1933 to commemorate the putting into force of the calendar changes.

Burnaby people are optimists, apparently. They do not seem to have allowed for the natural inertia of the human race, usually called conservatism. Everybody practically is agreed that the new calendar would be better than the old. The ruling bodies in most civilized countries favor it and the Pope of Rome has endorsed it. The difficulty is to get action. Possibly in those countries blessed with a party system of government, even so beneficial a measure as it would seem to be might meet with harsh criticism from the opposition.

CENSORING PICTURE ADVERTISING

Legislation is proposed by Attorney-General Pooley to censor moving picture advertising. The local council of women at Vancouver noted that sometimes when the censor had done his work in taking out risque portions of a film by the use of a scissors, the picture managers still continued to refer to such portions in their advertising, with the result that people who went to see something "spicy" were greatly disappointed. In asking that a censor be appointed to prevent this sort of advertising, the attorney-general probably has gone the wrong way to work. He might easily instead insist the managers of moving pictures be responsible for their advertising. A censor, as pointed out by the Vancouver Province, would not be in a position to deal with these advertisements until after publication, when it would be too late to stop them.

MINING AT ALICE ARM

Review of Situation As It Is Today In Important Mining Centre

MANY PROPERTIES WORKED

New Strike at Esperanza Interests Miners and Others in the District

ALICE ARM, Feb. 7.—The Alice Arm mining camp is just at present receiving a great deal of favorable attention both at the hands of the mining journals and of the daily press. It is being pointed out as a field for the investor, and the engineer is being asked to give it closer study. To those who have hung on here for the past ten years—since the hectic exploitation days of the old Dolly Varden—this attention is welcomed.

While not a great deal of tonnage has been shipped or mined during the past ten years, yet in that time a large amount of serious development work has been done, mostly at the hands of individual prospectors. Mining still shows a healthy interest here. During the past year and season 184 mining licenses were issued and some 160 new claims were staked and recorded.

A brief resume of the mining field for the past year shows several happenings of more than ordinary interest. Perhaps the first in importance, and as affecting the welfare of the entire camp very nearly was the taking over of the Toric mines by a stronger company. The Toric mine had reached a development stage, where it seems a just criticism could be made that the cost of the overhead was too great relative to the amount of tonnage mined. Present mining practice proves that cost cutting is in direct proportion to large scale operations. The Toric mine has been under option to the Britannia Company for some time, who at this it would seem that the Toric shareholders have failed to ratify the option with the Britannia people, but have made a deal with another company. The name of the new company is not divulged, but it is likely that any company financially able to take over the Toric property at the reputed price, would have sufficient financial backing to carry out a mining policy on a large scale.

The probable advent of the Britannia company into the Alice Arm field was looked upon very favorably by the prospectors here. This having nothing to do with the personnel as between the Britannia or Toric, but from the viewpoint that what the camp must have and has needed since it has been a camp is a strong operating company. An operating mining company financially able to carry through is the greatest need of the camp.

Tiger Property
The Tiger group is a silver bearing property and immediately adjoins the Toric mine on the north. In the early part of the summer this property was bonded to the Utility Mining and Financing Co. of Vancouver, since which time development work has been carried out by that company. The bulk of mine development work has been done on tunnels Nos. 2 and 3. Number two tunnel has been completed, showing the lead as developed on the surface to be 14 feet in width with silver values of probably better than \$20.00 per ton. No. 3 tunnel has reached a distance of some 350 feet, at about 150 feet lower elevation. It should be noted that in the driving of number three tunnel two "blind" leads were cut, averaging around 3 and 9 feet of milling ore. Development work is being carried out through the winter, the intention being after the completion of number three tunnel to confine all work to the tunnel at the 800 foot level which has been started near the railway grade. All work is being done by hand steel, though a compressor has been shipped in, and is being freighted through to the property.

North Star Mine
The North Star property lies opposite the Toric and Tiger claims and on the west side of the Kitsault River. Development

has been carried out on this property for the past year and a half by a small crew of men. This work is being continued. The North Star has recently been incorporated into a stock company called the North Star Ore & Smelting Co. It is capitalized at 20,000 shares par value \$5.00. It is understood that new and enlarged development operations will be inaugurated shortly.

Home Guard Property

This property which is owned by Bruggy and McFarlane is located at mile 14 on the Dolly Varden railway. This is a copper property with assays showing high values in gold and silver. It was intended to stock this property, but it was later optioned to the Dalhousie Co. of Victoria, who have a crew of men carrying out development work through the winter period.

Kitsault-Eagle Co.

This company which has four properties in the camp is con-

fining its winter operations to the driving of the long tunnel on their Sunrise property on McGraw Mountain. A full crew is being used, with sufficient supplies on the ground to last out the winter.

Esperanza Mine

The encountering of a gold bearing body of arsenopyrite ore in their number seven tunnel was of much importance to the Esperanza mine. This is the first strike of gold bearing arsenopyrite ore in the camp at Alice Arm, and so far as can be learned there is only one instance of an isolated find in the Stewart camp.

A creditable amount of development work has been done by the Esperanza during the past season, and quite a lot of tonnage has been blocked out. It is not known what the future development plans of the Esperanza are, that is whether they will mine and ship the ore as

developed in the present levels, or whether machinery will be put in and a new and lower working tunnel put in at an elevated level near the railway level. The putting in of this tunnel would give them stopping ground of the entire hill.

Johnson, suitable remarks being made by both.

After the presentation Col. Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia, gave an inspiring address on the flag to some 30 members of the sea cadet corps, who were mustered for the occasion under Lieut. about 10,000,000 feet of logs to Pacific Mills and this year about the same quantity will be delivered from the neighborhood of Kitimaat and possibly 8,000,000 feet of spruce to their new mill at Porpoise Harbor, where the last year's output of spruce is now ready for cutting amounting to about 8,000,000 feet.

The Big Bay Lumber Company will require about 12,500,000 feet during the year.

Contracts for 960,000 ties have been let and in all probability this amount will be increased to at least a million.

In regard to poles and piles the report says:

"The cedar pole and piling industry shows a very remarkable increase over 1927, even more so than does the tie industry. A total of 3,558,803 lineal feet have been scaled during 1928 which is an increase of about 37 percent on last year's figures. There has been no appreciable

change in the prices obtained, so it may be considered that the revenue has increased by the same percentage.

"An important share, amounting to 19 percent of the cedar pole and piling industry in the Prince Rupert district for the last three years has been carried on at Masset Inlet, Q.C.I., by the H. Baxter Co. Up till September, 1928, the company's operation was confined to large areas of pole timber lying south of Ferguson Bay, most of which area was covered by timber sales. In their operation about 1,800,000 lineal feet of poles and piling have been removed, all of which were exported to California. The size and quality of Ferguson Bay poles have been exceptionally good, lengths up to 90 feet being obtainable. All small operators in the Massett Inlet locality have found a ready market at Ferguson Bay for any poles which they have been able to produce which complied with the Baxter Cedar Pole specifications.

"In September the camps were moved from Ferguson Bay to the Mayer Lake vicinity which is reached via Kumdis Slough.

The operation is now handled on contract basis. A four-mile road has been constructed from Mayer Lake to the south end of Kumdis Slough on which will be operated a tractor and trailer running on concave wheels on rails made of hemlock about 12 inches in diameter. It is expected that the Mayer Lake operation will be completed in two years during which time about two million lineal feet of poles and piling will be marketed. The road will then be available for operating on further cedar pole areas situated on the Nadu River."

**CURIOUS LIBEL
IN REGARD TO
PRINCE RUPERT**

**Vancouver Province London Cor-
respondent Comes to Rescue
of City in Setting Weekly
Right**

The following under a two-column headline appeared in the Vancouver Province of recent date:

The extraordinary belief that Canada is a land of icy desolation, where the scattered inhabitants are clad in skins, live in igloos, and trap a rabbit for breakfast every morning, still clings in the minds of some, and the idea dies hard. A deplorable canard, one very similar to the above, has recently been given publicity by the British journal Pearson's Weekly, from the pen of Miss Barbara Austen, an opera singer, and she selects our own fair Prince Rupert to besmirch.

But it remained for the correspondent of the Southam Press in London, Lukin Johnson, formerly a member of The Daily Province staff, and resident in British Columbia for two decades, to take up the cudgels for Prince Rupert. He sent the following letter to the editor of Pearson's Weekly, which will explain the whole matter.

Blocked by Ice Floes

Dear Sir,—On page 862 of your issue of January 19th, you published an article by one Barbara Austen, purporting to be a record of some of her experiences as an opera singer.

In the course of the article she writes that "During my ten years in the States, . . . the most embarrassing experience was on my first visit to Winnipeg." A traveller of such distinction ought surely to be aware that Winnipeg is the capital of Manitoba, Canada, and is not in "the States."

She proceeds to give an account of her "most exciting experience" . . . when off the port of Prince Rupert, B.C. . . .

"Due at Prince Rupert, in British Columbia, our company embarked on a boat about the size of a Channel steamer, which should have accomplished the twenty-five-mile journey in about an hour. But wind and tide had swept an immense barrier of ice floes up the mouth of the river, blocking it almost completely.

"Through the ice field we literally fought our way during two whole days and nights.

Ridiculous

"Excepting tinned pork and beans, there was no food aboard, and it was so bitterly cold that we dared not put our noses outside the cabins.

"Finally our ship became jammed in the ice within two miles of Prince Rupert, and to get out and walk seemed the only solution. So at half-past seven in the morning the entire company climbed down the ship's sides on rope ladders and trekked across the solid ice. In order to 'land' we had to clamber up a pier about thirty feet high, hauling up our baggage as best we could."

I have lived in British Columbia for twenty years and from an intimate knowledge of the country, feel constrained to point out to you that this story is utterly ridiculous in all its details.

Within living memory—and I have checked my own knowledge from official sources—there has never been any such an occurrence as the blocking of Prince Rupert harbor by ice floes. The harbor is open the year round. Over the last ten years the mean temperature for January—the coldest month—has been 32 degrees Fahrenheit. The harbor is always entirely free from ice, nor lies the mouth of the Skeena River ever been blocked so far as there are any records, or so far as memory of living persons serves.

Finest Harbor

There is no town or settlement where an opera company could conceivably be playing anywhere within twenty-five miles of Prince Rupert—or within 250 miles for that matter. As for the alleged lack of food on what was apparently a passenger vessel and the alleged walk over two miles of "solid ice," it may be said that the steamship services on the B. C. coast are, and have been for

many years, probably the finest and most luxurious in the world; the walk over the ice one can only regard as a figment of somebody's imagination.

It seems unfortunate that such utterly untrue trash as this should be given publicity, thereby given currency to a wildly absurd picture of one of the finest Canadian harbors on the North Pacific.

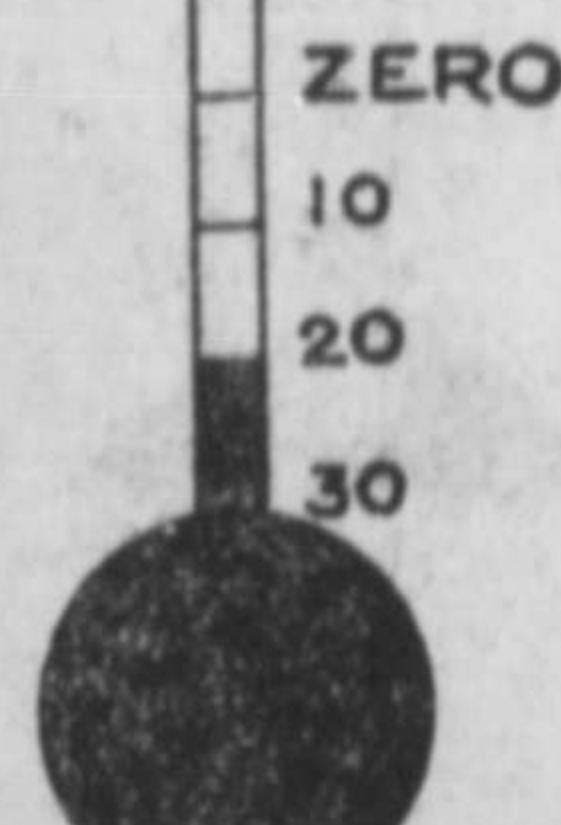
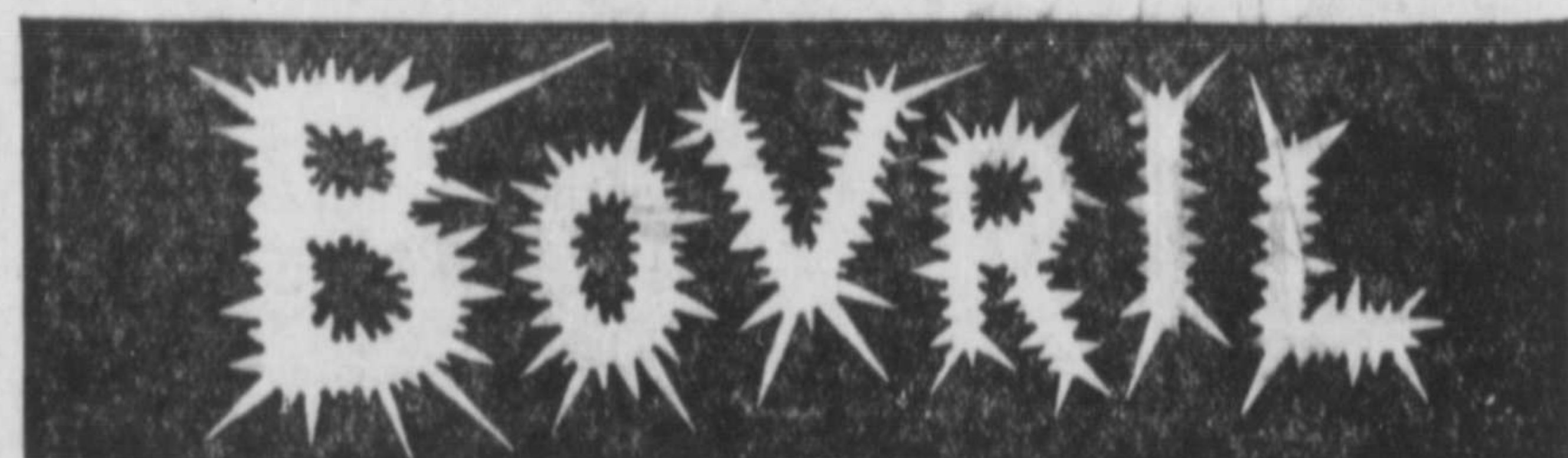

PACIFIC MILLS PLANT CLOSED

Water Shortage Causes Cessation of Operations Except For the Machine at Ocean Falls

Only milder weather with rain will start the plant in full operation again and, meantime, the company is formulating plans to ensure a better water supply in the future. During the shutdown, the most of the 1100 men employed at Ocean Falls are being given work overhauling equipment.

SPRING SERVICE STARTING SOON

Canadian National Coast Steamships will go on spring, double weekly service the last week in March. The steamers Prince George and Prince Rupert will arrive here from the south at 10:30 Wednesday and Saturday mornings respectively, and will sail at 4 p.m. the same days, both making the trip to Anyox and Stewart, returning here at 7:30 p.m. Thursdays and Sundays, and sailing for the south at 10 p.m. the same days.

This schedule will be effective until June 9 when the summer service will be inaugurated.

Next week, the steamer Prince Rupert, which has been carrying out the once-a-week service all winter, will be withdrawn at Vancouver for overhaul and will be replaced by the Prince George, which has been tied up at Vancouver since last fall. Capt. Harry Nedden and all the regular officers of the Prince George will come out with the vessel while the officers of the Prince Rupert remain with their ship at Vancouver.

The service to the Queen Charlotte Islands will remain as at present until June, it is understood.

Vary your dinners with fish and eggs
