Semi-Annual Report of Minister + ing last night on motion of + Shows Notable Advance in Production

VICTORIA, Aug. 9 .- Mineral production in British Columbia this year will total \$70,000,000 and break all previous records if it continues during the second half of the year as it did in the first half, the semi-annual report of the minister of mines shows. The mineral output for the first six months of the ear was \$35,256,-063, an advance of 7.8 per cent over figures for last year.

The tonnage output was 3,300,-000 tons, also higher than 1928. Dividends of over \$12,000,000 from well established firms are posted. Gold, silver, lead and coal products decreased in production.


Commanding General Says Bugs Will be Wiped Out By Fall

"Our FLY-TOX sprayers are the greatest menace to the insect army ever devised by science," declared General "Tox" in a recent interview while resting after the big spring offensive against the insect army.
