## Minister of Fisheries is Expected Here Next Week on a Departmental Visit

### Many Fisheries and Other Matters will be Discussed with Him; Question of Shipyard Work Continuing may be Taken Up, if Not Settled before His Arrival in City

The secretary of the Board of Trade has received word to effect that Hon. C. C. Ballantyne will visit Prince Rupert on about August 20. As he is Minister of Fisheries, his visit is of great importance to the greatest fishing port on the Pacific coast.

Arrangements will be made for the minister to meet the Board of Trade and discuss fisheries and other matters. As a member of the Dominion Government, other than fisheries matters may be taken up with him. Anyone having suggestions in regard to subjects which vitally affect the port or district will do well to communicate with the secretary of the Board of Trade in connection therewith.

Among the matters that will be discussed with the minister will be the cannery monopoly which at present exists, the restrictions against the use of gas boats in the salmon fisheries on the coast, and the restriction of trap and seine licenses to British subjects.

Mr. Ballantyne was intimately connected with the awarding of the contracts for shipbuilding at this port and should the work have commenced by the time he arrives that matter will be the most important one with which he will be asked to deal.

## CHINAMAN IS FINED \$50.50

### Chow Long Had Four Bottles Under His Clothes When Leaving Slip.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMordeie Chow Long, a Chinaman, was fined \$50.50 for having liquor in his possession. On Saturday afternoon P. C. Adams arrested the man as he was leaving the G. T. P. boat.

To Mr. Adams' eye the Chinaman looked decidedly too fat and he made investigations which led to the discovery of four bottles of G. & W. rye concealed next his skin just in the small of his back. The inside of the back of his coat was lined for the purpose of carrying bottles and it is quite certain that the man was no amateur at the game.

The police have been watching for this sort of thing and when one of the ship's crew came ashore and seemed to signal to someone on the boat that the coast was clear, P. C. Adams knew how to keep out of sight, but acted quickly when the Chinaman approached his hiding place.

There was also a case of drunkenness and the guilty one was fined the customary ten dollars.

## GOVERNMENT ACTION IS BADLY NEEDED REGARDING SHIPYARD

For several weeks the shipbuilding yard has been tied up tight as a result of a disagreement between the members of the shipbuilding company. The men who were employed there have been thrown out of their jobs without any fault of theirs and the whole works are at a standstill.

The contracts to build ships were let to the company by the Government and the Government has the right to step in at any time and take over the work. It seems as if this is the time for the Government to act. They might notify the principals in the concern that if work does not start within one week the contracts will be annulled and the work continued by the Government direct.

The citizens here have been very patient. They have taken no action toward drawing the attention of the Government to the condition which exists. There is a limit to their patience, however, and we suggest that the public bodies of the city should now interest themselves in the matter. The ships are being built for the people and surely the people have some say as to how the work shall proceed.

## LOCALS HAVE GREAT TIME ANYOX VISIT

### Large Party Accompanies the Ball Team to Smelter Town and Enjoy Visit.

Everyone who accompanied the baseball excursion to Anyox over the week end pronounced the outing to be the best ever held out of Prince Rupert. Particularly was this due to the large number of excursionists, the fine weather and the courtesy of the boat officials. The party landed shortly after eight and the whole morning was spent in sight seeing, with luncheon aboard the boat at noon. The smelter was visited by nearly all and a large number of the more energetic members climbed to the mine and to the crusher and watched operations.

The boys who were in the party were the real live enthusiasts and when in Anyox they kept the jitney driver running to and from the mine. They certainly enjoyed the thrill of travelling over the loose planks on the narrow roadway at break neck speed. A favorite resort with the youths was the ice cream counter in the hotel.

All the trip down Portland Canal was very pleasant and many of the pleasure seekers gathered on the top deck to watch a game of shuffle board. The most thrilling set played was between Mrs. Self and Dravis against Ben Self and Clementson. Interest ran high and the onlookers urged on both husband and wife who were pitted against each other at the same end. By this time Ben had quite got over the roasting which he had received at the ball game about being a fat man.

## CHILDREN ARE BADLY BURNED NEAR CLAXTON

### Girl Dies as Result of Injuries and Boy in Serious Condition.

On Saturday afternoon there was a very sad burning accident up the river when a little Indian girl was burnt to death and a little boy left with very little hope of recovery. The accident occurred near Claxton and the victims were rushed to the hospital at Port Essington.

A distillate stove exploded when the youngsters were standing near and the burning contents of the whole thing spread over the two children.

In the absence of Dr. Large of the hospital there the two nurses, Misses Fraser and Colwell did their utmost for the children, but in spite of all their efforts the little girl, after apparently having recovered somewhat when the dressings were applied, died at four o'clock on Sunday morning. Further news of the little boy, who was also terribly scorched, has not been received today.

## LABOR DEMANDS DIRECT ACTION

### Would Have no Further Advances in Price of Food—Nationalization of Railways in the States.

Washington, Aug. 10.—Leaders of the railway labor organizations duly desire to impress on the public by violence or threats their proposal for the nationalization of the railways. They declare that requests for either wages or the reduction of the cost of living is altogether aside from the disposition of railway problems.

## CONSUL GENERAL VISITING THE CITY

### Nathaniel B. Stewart is Making Short Visit to Whitehorse and Will Return.

For several days past Nathaniel B. Stewart, American Consul-General at large, has been visiting this city in connection with his official duties. He left this morning for Whitehorse and is expected back on Saturday, when he will remain for a few days longer.

Mr. Stewart is a Georgia man and has for a number of years been American consul at large for the middle east and Africa, but is temporarily assigned to Canada. He has travelled all over Europe and spent a good deal of time in Russia, where he was at the outbreak of war. He is one of the big men of the American consular service.

## ELECTIONS TO BE DELAYED

### New Leader of Liberals and Ministers of Crown Cannot Get Into Parliament Yet.

Ottawa, August 10.—Under the By-election Act there must be a registration of voters to elect a new member within a period of approximately 40 days of the election. It would appear that there is no possibility of Sir Henry Drayton, the new minister of finance; Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, Liberal leader, or Dr. Tolmie, new minister of agriculture, being able to appear in the House of Commons before the end of September, or the early part of October.

**Fish Hatcheries And Their Value.**

There is a discussion going on as to whether fish hatcheries are of any value. The Fraser River which has hatcheries has ceased to become an important factor in the salmon fisheries business. The Skeena on the other hand has produced as much fish this year as ever.

F. E. Burke, manager for the Wallace Fisheries, claims that since the hatchery at Stuart Lake went out of business the runs on the Skeena have increased. This is denied by Chief Inspector Cunningham of New Westminster, who says that the big run is the result of the work of the hatchery while it was in operation. He says that hatcheries are a decided benefit to the fishing interests.

**Alice Arm is Coming to Fore.**

Reports from Alice Arm published on Saturday show that the Alice Arm mining district promises to be among the rich mining camps of the north British Columbia coast. There are a number of valuable mines already getting out ore, and now comes news of a rich gold strike.

The Dolly Varden mine is commencing to ship ore and it should not take very long for the company to sell enough to pay for the mine and railway combined. The presence of a number of American capitalists in the district is giving a flip to the mining industry as a good many claims have been bonded for large sums.

**Prospector Has at Last Won Out.**

Prospectors who have gone in to the Portland Canal mountains and have staked good prospects have had to wait a long time for their returns, but they have now come. Anything that carries good ore can be sold if it is anywhere near transportation.

The richness of that district would never have been known had it not been for the persistent work of the prospectors. They are a hardy lot of men who invest their time and strength on futures. They take many a gamble and sometimes they win. Everyone will be glad to know that the prospectors who have hung on to their claims are now able to cash in on them.

**Dictatorship Again Established in Hungary.**

There has been a dictatorship in Hungary for several months past. Bela Kun was a Bolshevik dictator. He professed liberal principles but conditions made it impossible for him to practise them. He ruled just like other rulers. His will was practically absolute law.

Now Bela Kun has gone into exile and Archduke Joseph has taken his place. He will have to be a dictator for some time to come, else he will never bring order out of the present chaos. Rule by the people is impossible unless the people are capable of ruling intelligently. They do not seem to be able to do it intelligently in Hungary and the result is anarchy, or dictatorship.

Capacity for government is not a thing that a nation can fall into suddenly. It has to be learned. We have had a large measure of self government for many years yet we make many mistakes as everybody knows. We have a lot to learn yet before we can evolve anything like a real democracy.

If we find self government difficult who have had a good deal of training along those lines, how must those who have not had such training blunder and stumble and bring about confusion when they are suddenly given the right which we have slowly won and not yet learned to use.

**Synopsis of Land Act Amendments**

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.  
 Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
 Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but more than four may now be made.  
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.  
 Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.  
 Records without permanent residence may be made.  
 Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown grant land.  
 Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
 Mill factory or industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.  
 Timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.  
 Meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.  
**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS**  
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.  
 No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.  
 Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.  
 Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.  
**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**  
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser does not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.  
**GRAZING.**  
 Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permit issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Association for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

### In the Letter Box

**THE BUILDING BY-LAWS**  
Sir:—The members of council should be congratulated on the progressive step they have taken when appointing a building inspector to act under the city engineer.

For the protection of the public the city by-laws require amending to obtain good materials and modern construction in the erection of dwelling houses. The amendments required are too numerous to be described in the pages of a newspaper.

Prince Rupert has a few good builders who supply good materials and good workmanship, but there are others I may call curiosities, to avoid a stronger term; and their materials and workmanship is a disgrace to any city, as the piles they supply are like walking sticks, the posts like pencils, the joists and boarding cheap rubbish, too worthless to grade and if any attempt was made to grade it, it would be classed as No. 7 or 8 British grades. Owing to knots, holes, shakes and such like defects you can see the distant hills through some of their buildings.

They do not care for the comforts of families who are unfortunate enough to rent such hovels and burn extra tons of coal every year in a vain endeavor to keep the so-called buildings warm. They do not know how to construct a warm roof, therefore they leave it open. Some of them do not even know how to lay a floor board to obtain the best service out of the material, but they pose and talk as enlightened experts on building construction. It is to put a stop to such work that the by-laws should be amended at once.

As Alderman Perry is chairman of the Exhibition Board, he may obtain a piece of one of those buildings now under construction, fix it in a position where it can be seen, with a large notice of warning to the public not to waste their money in such erections.

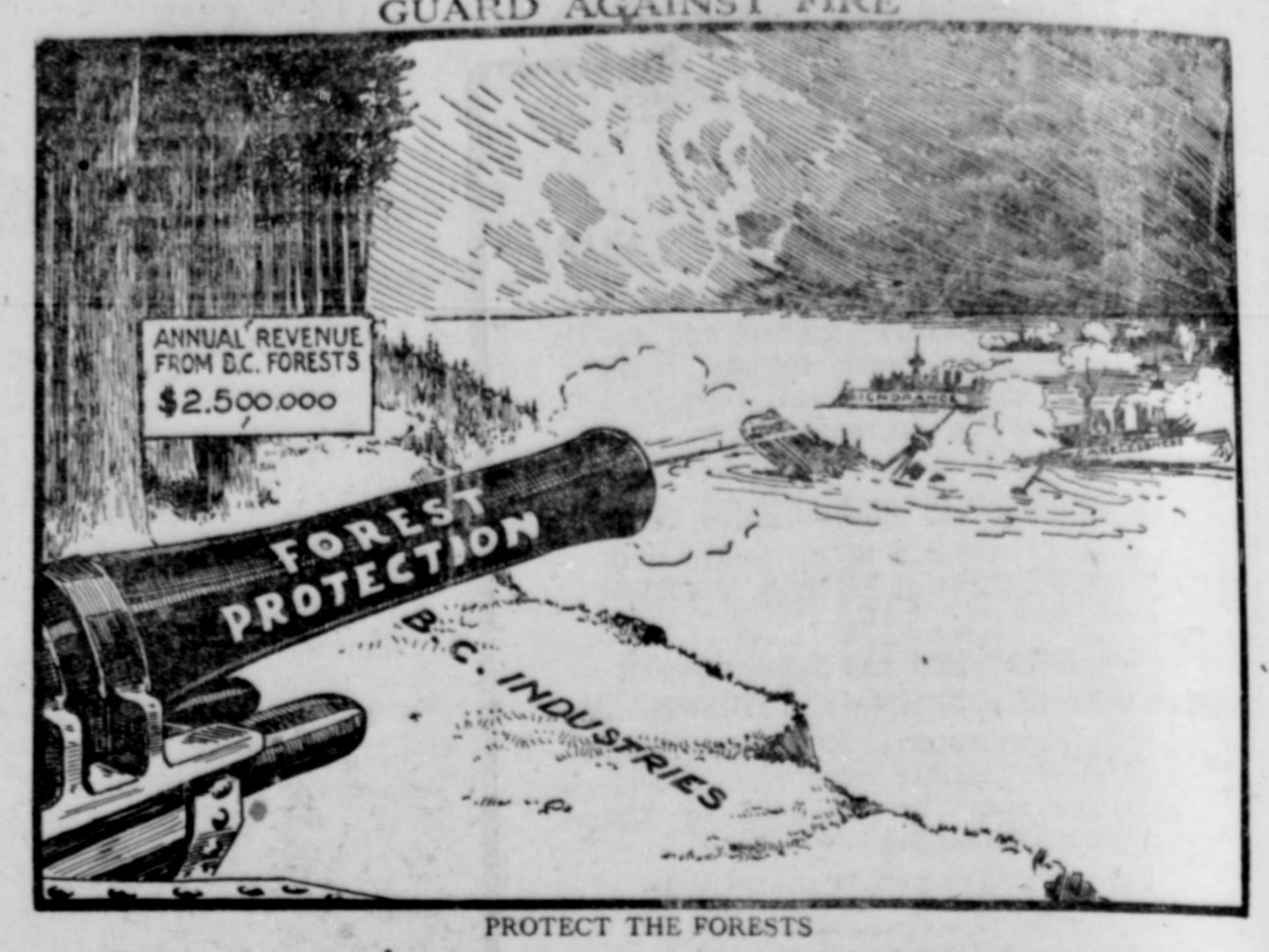

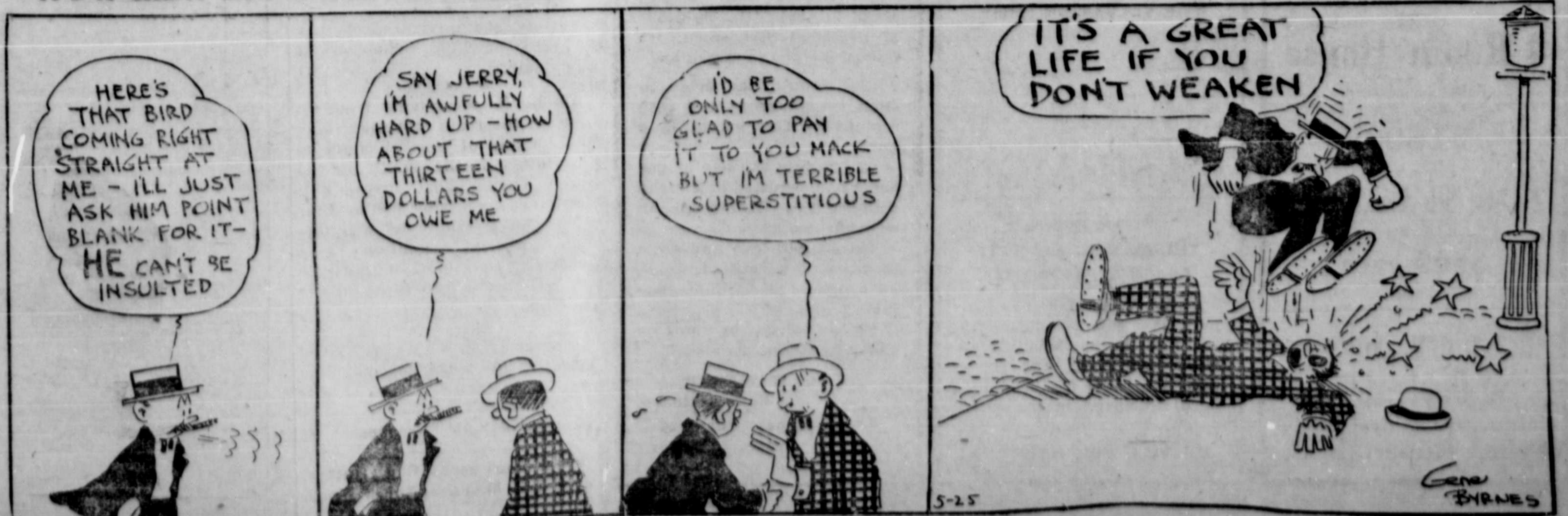

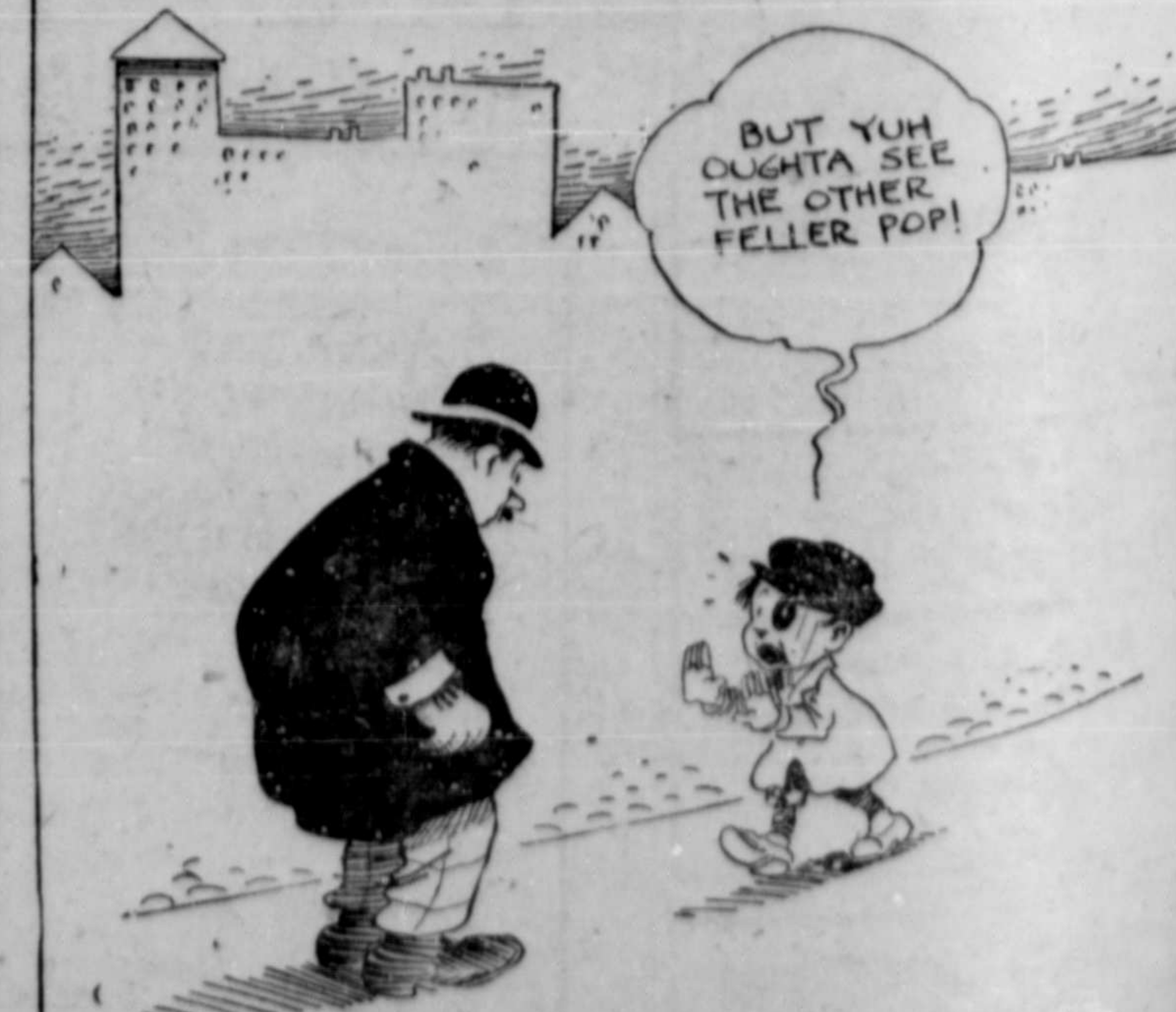
