## Empire Trade Agreement is Planned by Canadian Government Says London, Eng., Newspaper

LONDON, June 25.—Reports that the Canadian Government is contemplating a new Empire trade agreement as a step toward the desired goal of increasing inter-Empire trade was published in London papers yesterday without official confirmation.

Commenting on the reports the Evening Standard said such a proposal would be welcomed by commercial men in London, especially those having Canadian interests.

A conference between Great Britain and the Dominions on the matter had been discussed for some time, the Standard said, and views had been exchanged between London and Ottawa. During his recent visit to Britain Hon. Frank Carroll of Quebec City, newspaper publisher and member of the Quebec Legislative Council, interviewed most of the leaders in British finance and commerce on the idea and met with encouragement, receiving promises of support.

## DELEGATES OF TRADE BOARD

Five Men Will Be Official Representatives of Local Board at Convention This Week

Mayor S. P. McMordie, Ald. C. H. Orme, M. P. McCaffery, G. W. Nickerson and Ald. F. G. Dawson have been appointed as delegates of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade to the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Central British Columbia here this week.

While there are the official delegates, it is pointed out by Board of Trade officers that as many members as possible are expected to attend the business sessions of the convention and also the entertainment features.

## PREMIER CALLS FIELDING HOME

OTTAWA, June 25.—Premier Mackenzie King, who had been out of town over the week-end, returned yesterday afternoon and went directly to the residence of Hon. W. S. Fielding to express sympathy in the death of the Canadian statesman. Scores of messages from all parts of the Dominion poured into the home of the veteran statesman today.

## SHOT AND DIED NEAR PETERSBURG, ALASKA

JUNEAU, June 25.—Ole Bludseth, an employee of Port Waller Herring Co. at Suginaw Bay, was shot last night and died on the way to Petersburg. An investigation is being made.

## New British Parliament Was Opened Today, Speaker Chosen Adjournment Taken to July 1

LONDON, June 25.—The new British Parliament held its first session under the Labor Government today and re-elected Captain E. A. Fitzroy, Conservative, as speaker. Not a vote was cast against the popular presiding officer, who was lauded in the nominating speeches for his impartiality. His appointment was moved by Premier Ramsay Macdonald and seconded by former Premier Baldwin.

The House adjourned shortly afterwards and will get down to business next week with the reading of the speech from the throne.

## AUSTRALIAN AGAIN FLIES

Capt. Kingsford Smith Planning to Break Record to England in Southern Cross

SYDNEY, N.S.W., June 25.—Captain Charles Kingsford Smith took off in the Southern Cross today in a new attempt to break the speed record for a flight between here and England. He planned a non-stop flight across Australia to Derby, where he would begin his overseas flight.

## CHAINS OF LAKES ON BERANOFF ISLAND

JUNEAU, June 25.—R. H. Sargeant, typographer for the geological survey, accompanying the naval expedition, today announced the discovery of two chains of lakes in the central part of Beranoff Island. They average from one to three miles long. The first chain consists of four lakes and the second of two lakes.

## THREE WOMEN DROWN IN EAST

STE. ANNE DE BELLEVUE, Quebec, June 25.—Miss Mabel Price, 35 years of age, lecturer in history at Macdonald College here, her sister, Gertrude, and Miss Madeline Foy were drowned here yesterday when a motor launch overturned during a violent storm which swept over Montreal and vicinity. The three women were trapped under the boat.

## RUM RUNNING CARRIED ON IN LEGAL MANNER

WINDSOR, Ont., June 25.—A clean bill of health was given Essex county border operators by Alfred E. Cuddy, deputy commissioner of the Ontario provincial police. "Short circuiting of liquor in this district has been reduced to an appreciable minimum," he said. "There is probably very little of it, but certainly not much. After another check of the export docks in the immediate Windsor area, the deputy commissioner reiterated his belief that there was no gun-toting in or around the Canadian docks by United States rum runners or their henchmen."

## MUSEUM BOARD HELD MEETING

Matters Connected With Increasing Collection Were Dealt With Yesterday

The Prince Rupert Museum Board at its regular meeting in the Bank of Commerce yesterday afternoon dealt chiefly with routine matters. The question of getting several important Indian relics for the institution was discussed and left for the chairman, Rev. Canon Rushbrook, to investigate further and if necessary take action.

A number of new members were reported and membership tickets were ordered printed.

Among questions discussed was whether the name of the organization should be changed and it should become a more active scientific and historic investigation society or should remain simply a museum collecting organization. The matter was left open for the present and in the meantime work of collecting specimens will continue as at present. Those interested will be asked to donate historic articles or natural history specimens.

Mr. Rushbrook showed interesting photographs of native work, including rock carvings. Those present were Rev. Canon Rushbrook, Mrs. J. G. Gibson, secretary, B. J. Mellish, Rev. W. E. Collison, Miss Ruth Stewart and H. F. Pullen.

## BORDER RAIDS ON CAN. STOCK

SWIFT CURRENT, Sask., June 25.—Organized gangs who cross the border in trucks, steal and slaughter cattle belonging to Canadian ranchers and rush the carcasses across the line before they are missed are causing heavy losses, according to a resolution which urged the government to put a stop to the modern rustling system passed by the Saskatchewan stock growers convention here.

## British Empire May Join World Court at Macdonald's Request

LONDON, June 25.—Important negotiations affecting Empire affairs are reported to have been indicated by the Labor Government of Great Britain. It has communicated with the Dominions in an effort to gain an agreement on the signing of an optional clause of world court statutes under which questions of international law would be submitted to a permanent court of international justice at the Hague.

The Labor newspaper, the Daily Herald, today said the Government had also informed the Dominion Governments it proposes to resume diplomatic relations with Russia.

Australia hitherto was the only Dominion reluctant to sign the optional clause of the world court statutes and it is understood this reluctance has now been removed to a great extent. In any event, Premier Macdonald is hopeful of being able to show complete Empire agreement on joining the world court when he visits the League of Nations assembly in September.

## FINEST CROPS PEACE RIVER

MONTREAL, June 25.—Crop conditions throughout western Canada, although excellent in certain districts, are not generally as promising as at this time last year, stated Dr. W. J. Black, director of colonization and agriculture for the Canadian National railways, who has returned from an official tour of the west. Notwithstanding this, however, conditions generally are more prosperous than for some years in western cities, said Dr. Black.

"Some of the finest crops we saw in all the west," he continued, "were in the Peace River country. There is a tremendous area under cultivation this year throughout the entire Peace River country and land settlement has been going forward there at an enormous rate. Settlers have gone in large numbers even as far northwest as the Fort St. John district."

## COVENTRY TO GO TO LONDON

Son of Earl Will Be Market Commissioner for British Columbia

VICTORIA, June 25.—Hon. T. G. Coventry, former member of the Legislature for Saanich and son of the Earl of Coventry, has been made market commissioner in London for the British Columbia Government. It is understood his main business will be to build up a demand for Okanagan fruit.

## PROTECTION OF TEACHERS

Rev. Canon Hon. J. Hinchcliffe, minister of education, has sent a circular letter to lady teachers in rural schools stating that they should under no consideration remain in the school buildings after school hours without the presence of one or more children or friends and requesting school boards to so arrange. He also urges that proper arrangements be made to keep the schools clean.

ENGINEER OF  
CITY RESIGNS

H. A. McLean Severs His Connection  
With City to Be Effective  
August 1  
THINKS HIMSELF GOAT

Claiming that he had been subject to persecution particularly at the hands of Ald. Prudhomme, H. A. McLean tendered his resignation as city engineer, effective August 1, to the council last night the resignation being accepted on motion of Ald. Dibb and Ald. Orme.

L. W. Patmore, appearing on behalf of Mr. McLean, was granted permission to address the council. Mr. Patmore stated that Mr. McLean had had a petition largely signed by ratepayers who thought that he (Mr. McLean) had been made the goat because of the recent defeat of many bylaws. If that was the case, the general impression was that the city council should give the public its reasons for dissatisfaction with the engineer. Mr. McLean felt that Ald. Prudhomme had long been after his scalp and the rest of the council, owing to the defeat of the bylaws, had been forced into the position of backing up Ald. Prudhomme. Mr. Patmore said that he himself had discussed the situation with a number of people who had voted against the bylaws and they had said they had done so not to get at the city engineer but as a protest to the council to watch its step in the matter of expenditures which they felt had been running too high. The most of people felt that the city engineer had had a great deal of work to do and that the city had been getting from him good value for its money. Mr. Patmore thought it would be well for the city council to let the people know what really was at the bottom of things. A great many people would be dissatisfied if this action was being taken just because the bylaws had been defeated.

The petition Mr. Patmore explained, requested the council to take some action with a view to having the activities of Ald. Prudhomme looked into. Mayor McMerdie inquired if he was right in understanding that the engineer was putting in his resignation. He (the mayor) had been talking to Mr. McLean at 10 minutes to six and he had said then that he was not resigning.

Nothing Else to Do  
Mr. Patmore replied that Mr. McLean had since decided to tender his resignation, feeling that there was nothing else for him to do.

Mr. McLean's resignation was then handed to the city solicitor who read it to the council. "I hereby give notice," said the resignation, "that, owing to persecution I have at last de-

clined to resign, effective August 1, 1929."  
In order to bring the matter up for discussion, Ald. Dibb moved that the resignation be accepted. Ald. Orme seconded.

The mayor explained that, at a special meeting last week, with all members but Ald. Dawson present, there had been a two hour discussion with regard to the public works department and it had been unanimously concluded that it would be in the best interests of the city that the engineer be changed. The mayor stated that he was glad Mr. McLean had thought fit to resign. He was pleased to say that he had been a hard working servant of the city though it was not altogether clear that he had been a most efficient one. It was to the interests of Mr. McLean as well as to the city that the engineer should be changed, the mayor felt.

Ald. Prudhomme wished to say that as far as he was concerned, he held nothing personally against the engineer and never had. All criticisms that he had offered were lodged at the whole department including the Board of Works of which he had been a member last year.  
The motion accepting Mr. McLean's resignation was then unanimously carried.

TO RECONSIDER GARBAGE BID

City Council Decides, After Hearing Ex-Ald. Casey, to Go Into Matter Again

Ex-Ald. G. B. Casey appeared before the city council last night to ask that recent tenders for garbage and nightsoil collection, which the council had seen fit not to accept on the grounds that the saving effected thereby would not warrant making a change in a service which was quite satisfactory, be reconsidered. Whereas, the council had decided that only \$765 would be saved in six months by accepting his tender which had been the lowest, Mr. Casey contended that the saving would be actually \$5276 in the period of a year. He gave many figures to support his contention and explained that the tenders had been offered in good faith with the understanding that the council would deal seriously with the question. Mr. Casey referred to the fact that the council had said it had no money this year to build a road down the east side of Hays Creek to the new fishmen's floats. If that was the case, he felt the council should be favorably disposed to saving money where such an opportunity as this presented itself.

Ald. Brown stated that the question had been given full and serious consideration with the result that the Board of Works recommended that no change seemed advisable. He did not object, however, to the council dealing with Mr. Casey's statements.

After further discussion it was decided to reconsider the matter in committee of the whole after next council meeting when Mr. Casey will be invited to be present.

COW BAY TO FORE AGAIN

Finance Committee Recommends Giving Permission to Railway Company to Fill in Cameron Cove

That hardy perennial—the Cow Bay question—was once again under discussion at last night's meeting of the city council, when a report was presented by the finance committee recommending that the city give its written assent to the application of the railway company to the Board of Railway Commissioners and the governor-in-council for authority to fill in that portion of Cameron Cove which is to be conveyed by the province to the railway company under agreement of March 16, 1918, including authority to fill with a permanent fill the railway company's ridge across the said cove. After some discussion it was decided to table the recommendation for two weeks, so that the aldermen may obtain further information from the city solicitor on the matter.

City Solicitor Jones explained that the proposal was that the railway company should transfer waterfront outside of Cow Bay to the provincial government, which would, in turn, transfer the land inside Cow Bay to the railway company. The city was to receive 200 feet of waterfront just west of Cow Bay and approximately where the fishermen's floats were now located from the provincial government. The transfer, while ratified by the ratepayers, had never as yet been finally passed upon by the council. The city formerly had riparian rights in Cow Bay through owning lots there which had subsequently been transferred to the Power Corporation. As matters now stand, the city actually had no rights and endorsement of the filling in of Cow Bay was but a mere formality.

Ald. Rudderham said he would have no objection if the whole of Cow Bay was filled in. He did not approve, however, of merely the present disgraceful cesspool inside. He felt that the council should move cautiously in the matter as Cow Bay was now considerable of a convenience to the fishing fleet. It should be assured that suitable accommodation would be provided elsewhere.

Ald. Collart thought the intention was to fill in all of Cow Bay. Ald. Dawson agreed that this was the intention.

Ald. Macdonald suggested that the matter be laid over for two weeks. Personally, he was not fully acquainted with the situation.

After further discussion the recommendation was tabled for the two weeks on motion of Ald. Rudderham and Ald. Macdonald.

IMPROVEMENTS ON ELEVENTH AVENUE

And Development of Violet Park Playground Asked by Rupert East Ratepayers

The Rupert East Ratepayers Association had a letter before the city council last night asking that repairs be made to Eleventh Avenue, which was in a deplorable condition just now, being unsafe for traffic and a considerable inconvenience to the residents of that part.

The request was also made that a few loads of cinders be dumped in Violet Park, where a playground is contemplated, and that a few trees be planted there.

The requests were referred to the Boards of Works for report.

NO PROVISION YET MADE FOR PAYMENT OF GOVT. SIDEWALK

The city council was in receipt of a letter last night from the provincial department of finance stating that the public works department had as yet made no provision in the estimate to cover payments for concrete sidewalks which were built around the old court house square here last year and that nothing could be done until next session of the legislature when the item would be provided for.

Mayor McMeekin felt that it was unfortunate that the government was just now learning about work which it had authorized a year ago. The item amounted to less than \$6000, which he thought the government should be able to find without having to wait a year.

The government will again be communicated with along the lines suggested by the mayor. Ald. Collart stated that the money would come in handy at this time.
