United States' Senate Authorizes Building of Fifteen Cruisers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The senate yesterday passed a bill authorizing the construction of 15 cruisers and an airplane carrier. The vote was 68 to 12.

President Coolidge had asked that decision regarding the time for beginning the construction be left with the president, but the bill provides only that the president may suspend operations in whole or part any time international agreement for arms limitation is reached.

Under the bill the ships shall be laid down before July 1, 1931. The cost will be \$274,000.000. The senate wrote into the bill water Powers





LOBSTERS AND CRABS THROW OFF LEGS AND GROM THEM AGAIN

Dr. Wood Declares This No Sea Tale, for He Has Seen It Done

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.-It is no nere sea tale that crabs, lobsters and crawfihs can throw off a leg and crawfish can throw off a leg unconcernedly as if the deserted limb were a piece of seaweed.

This fact not only has been verified scientifically, but Dr. Florence Dowden Wood and Dr. Horace Elmer Wood II. of New York University, have found out how the lobster and his kin do the trick. The method has long been in dispute, as it is one of those moves in which the leg that does it is quicker than the eye. At one moment the fisherman holds his lobster, and then without a visible move on the lobster's part the captor suddenly is holding only an unattached leg.

The Woods found that the crustacean flips off his leg at will by flexing one muscle near the joint which parts company. Even if no one has hold of the leg, this; muscle flexing is capable of casting it loose. Nor has an inhibitory barbeen found that would prevent a careless lobster, who might be taking his morning exercise while still sleepy, from flexing too much and losing all his legs at once.

Even this does not much matter to lobsters and crabs, for they are able to grow new legs at the next moult. At the joint where the leg severs there is only the tiniest opening sufficient for one blood vessel and a nerve to extend through to the extremity, and consequently there is no risk of


