Wasył Zeroff, "The Sailor" Ordered Deported, Formerly Was Active Russian Mutineer

Visited Prince Rupert in Course of Travels and went South From Here as Stowaway on Vessel. Was on Russian Battleship Polomptkin.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, August 14.—The immigration commission sitting in the case of aliens taken in the net when the Royal North-West Mounted Police closed on the men, whose actions they had been investigating for months, has handed down its first decision. As a result Wasył Zeroff, alias "The Sailor," is to be deported. His case is proceeding. Zeroff told the commission that he was a member of the Russian workmen's union and had been a member of the crew of the Russian battleship Polomptkin and took an active part in the mutiny of 1905. He then went to London and later visited different countries including South America, Mexico, United States and finally landed in Prince Rupert, coming south from that city as a stowaway.

AEROPLANE FLIGHT WILL ADVERTISE B. C. SPRUCE

CROWE-SWORDS TELLS OF PROPOSAL TO COVER THE DISTANCE FROM HALIFAX TO VANCOUVER IN FORTY HOURS—WAS HERE RECENTLY

Winnipeg, August 14.—"It is expected that the proposed aeroplane flight from Halifax to Vancouver will be accomplished in 40 hours of actual flying," was the statement of R. Crowe-Swords who is on his way from Vancouver to Ottawa. The main objects of the flight are to demonstrate the commercial possibilities of the aeroplane and to boost British Columbia as the only place where spruce of the right kind for aeroplane construction is produced.
R. Crowe-Swords recently visited Prince Rupert and other points along the line, but a lecture which was to have been delivered here did not materialize.

NEW GERMAN CONSTITUTION PROMULGATED

Officials in Fatherland Com- pelled to Take Oath of Allegiance.

SEVEN HUNDRED DOLLARS FROM HALF AN ACRE

Mrs. F. W. Bohler of Kitsumkalum Makes Record in Strawberry Production Near Terrace.

Terrace, August 13.—The crops here this year are excellent. The whole Kitsumkalum and Lakelse valley has shown up well this year.
As an instance of what can be done on a small piece of land Mrs. F. W. Bohler of Kitsumkalum sold 190 crates of strawberries all taken from a half acre patch, and the net returns to the producer has been close to \$700.
Naturally Mrs. Bohler is proud of her achievement. She also has a good deal of other fruit and some fine vegetables, some of which it is understood will be shown at the forthcoming Prince Rupert fair.

FISH LICENSES CRITICISED BY RETURNED MAN

Sergt.-Major Jimmy Robinson to Confer With Col. Peck Regarding Alleged Irregularities.

Claiming that a large number of fishing licences have been improperly issued to the prejudice of returned men wanting to make a living by fishing, Sergt.-Major Robinson arrived in the city this morning to confer with Colonel Cy. Peck, V.C., who is in Vancouver on his way from Ottawa to his home in the north, says the Vancouver World.

Sergt.-Major Robinson wants the authorities at Ottawa stirred up to an investigation of the lists of licencees who secured their licences this spring in British Columbia. He claims that the list contains the names of salaried officials of veterans' organizations, of officers still actively employed in the militia and drawing government pay, and of other salaried officers of the government. In the list which Mr. Robinson carries with him, there are also to be found the names of hotel keepers, ministers of the gospel and others whose claims to fishing licences could not have been advanced on the grounds that they were intending to make their livelihood fishing salmon.

"One hears a great deal of talk about putting the means of making a decent livelihood within the reach of the returned soldier," said Mr. Robinson, "but a great deal of this talk ends in the manner shown by this list. Fishing licencees that were reserved for the use of returned men, who would have made genuine fishers have been taken by men, some of them veterans, who did not want the licences as a means of making a living, but simply for farming out at a profit. I want to see the whole matter aired and an investigation ordered by the minister of marine, which I am certain would result in a wholesale revision of the list and the cancelling of many licences for which there are returned, genuine fishermen, waiting at present."

BOLSHEVIKI ARE DRIVING THE COSSACKS

Kolchak Forces in Ural Mountains Forced to Retreat to Prevent Separation.

London, August 14.—There has been a reverse of the All-Russian Government forces and as a result the Kolchak troops have been in retreat in the Ural Mountains. Despatches received here today say that the retreat is continuing. The Bolsheviki have driven the Cossack forces back sixty miles and are attempting to separate them from the Kolchak troops. That is the reason for the retreat of the latter.

WILLIE WENT TO SEE HIS WIFE AND FAMILY

Berlin, August 13.—With the permission of the Dutch government the former German Crown Prince spent several days with his wife and family at Soden, Prussia, and has returned to Holland.

PERMANENT MACHINE GUN FORCE FOR CANADA BEING ORGANIZED BY COL. WALKER

MOBILE FORCE FROM FAMOUS UNITS THAT DID SO MUCH TO HELP IN WINNING WAR AND BROUGHT ENCONIUMS FROM MARSHAL HAIG

Ottawa, August 14.—Col. W. K. Walker, D. S. O., M. C., is perfecting arrangements for the formation of a mobile machine gun unit of the permanent force. This is a new feature for the Canadian forces in peace times.

Marshal Haig recently paid a tremendous tribute to the Canadian armored cars and machine gun batteries and in his report declared: "They saved Amiens."

Col. Walker was at that time in command of the machine gun force which was made up of the Eaton, Borden, Sifton and Yukon batteries.

"TIDE" IS SOLD TO CONTRACTOR

Fishing Boat is to be Used in Building New Lighthouse At Lucy Island.

This morning J. H. Hilditch was loading up a scow with supplies and material at the government wharf for his new contract at Lucy Island. The work will occupy the rest of the summer and may run well into the fall for the lighthouse, built of concrete and steel, calls for considerable outlay and a lot of labor. Triple Island, which is about twenty miles from here, is situated between Dundas and Stephens islands. It is open to the ocean and will light the path of shipping from the Orient.

The boat Tide has been purchased from O. Besner and will be used in the work. There will be lots of towing in connection with the erection and the boat will be used for hauling sand and gravel. This morning Mr. Hilditch is starting with a small part of his outfit on a scow and the Tide is taking them out to the site of the lighthouse. The fishing craft just mentioned is very well known along the waterfront and has been fishing out of this port for a considerable time.

LEADER WILL SEEK ELECTION IN GLENGARRY

Mackenzie King Stated for Place Immortalized by Ralph Connor.

Ottawa, August 14.—W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, will seek election in the vacant constituency of Glengarry and Stormont, it is believed in authoritative circles.

It is also rumored that he might seek entry into the Commons through Quebec East, formerly represented by the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

JAPANESE BOY KILLED AT MILL

T. Teraska Crushed by Falling Load of Lumber From Monorail Carrier.

T. Teraska, a Japanese boy, was killed suddenly by the falling of a load of lumber from the monorail yesterday at the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills.

The lad was sorting lumber on the transfer chains beneath the monorail. As a load was passing one of the supports gave way and the load dropped, crushing him as it scattered and he lived only ten minutes after the accident.

An inquiry was held yesterday before Major McMullin and it was found that the accident was unavoidable and not due to carelessness or was anyone particularly to blame. Manager Ewart and his staff felt very badly at the loss of the boy who came here sixty days ago. He was 19 years of age and his father lives at Abbotsford.

ANDREW CARNEGIE IS BURIED TODAY

Everything Spells Increased Prosperity.

There are all sorts of rumors of possible developments afoot. What with the mines commencing to ship ore, in the neighboring towns of Stewart and Alice Arm, with the fisheries on the Skeena being the biggest in years, with the tourist business being larger than ever before, with the freight shipments from this port exceeding everything in the past and with the general air of prosperity and progress in and around the city and the confidence outsiders feel in the port, there is every reason to feel optimistic.

Never a visitor comes to the city now but that he is enthused with the prospects. Major Cowper Young expressed himself along these lines a day or two ago and as an earnest of his faith ordered machinery for his new mill here.

Building operations in the city have been rather brisk but there is much more to be done before the snow flies. As soon as the plans have been approved and everything is ready, there are thirty soldiers' houses to be erected, there is the Morse Creek bridge to be built, and there are many other houses and other improvements to be started and carried through without delay. Everything speaks of increased business.

New York Has Capped Climax.

The limit has been reached in the matter of strikes. It was bad enough for the people of New York to have their transportation interfered with, their food supplies curtailed and many of the other necessities of life stopped or the supply impeded. The people were willing to put up with that for a short time, but now there is more trouble fallen on the stricken community. The chorus girls have organized themselves into a union and gone on strike.

Salvation Army Worthy of Support.

The Salvation Army is making a drive for funds. This institution has done much to help the boys who went to France and Flanders and all who have come within the scope of its activities speak well of it. It is out to serve humanity. People who see and hear the speakers on the street corners and who listen to the music often do not realize the work that is done which is not seen. We take pleasure in commending the activities of the Salvation Army and suggesting that it receive such support as citizens feel they are able to give.

High Cost of Living Under Consideration.

For several years the high cost of living has been a subject of conversation, of newspaper articles and of political resolutions. It is alleged to have caused strikes and to have embittered the working people against those who are considered by them to be more fortunate. And yet the increases have gone on and are still going on. We look in vain for someone to help us. The American Eagle is beating its wings in expostulation and showing its talons occasionally, but with no visible result. The British lion roars and the prices still go up. Our beaver works and expostulates with a flap of its tail on the still waters of public opinion. It is a bold man who offers to prophesy when the limit will be reached. The only thing we know is that somewhere, perhaps far beyond the clouds, there is an apex, and we cannot climb forever. The dangerous descent must follow.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may acquire, for selected pre-emption, in joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before recording Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Without permanent residence may be issued, provided pre-emptor makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 1 acre cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grading and industrial purposes exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased on condition of construction of a road to them. Release of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 24, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for establishment of stock-owners may be given. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

The French girl seemed to have every stroke at her command. Her powers of placing were wonderful, almost masculine in effectiveness. She showed complete control of overhead work, and executed even the back-hand smash with certainty and elegance. She was the attraction at the tournament.

Harry Day pitched an excellent game of ball yesterday afternoon and the visitors only got five hits during the nine innings. He fanned 17 altogether. If he gets a doubtful decision he makes up for it in the next throw. He does not stop to talk the umpire into seeing a thing the right way but with a smile turns round and goes at it again. When he has finished he walks from the box to the bench without any fuss or show.

Clementson played his usual brilliant game yesterday afternoon, getting a three-bagger on a ball knocked over at the end of right field. He fielded one wonderful fly which was almost impossible to get under. He had to run a long distance, but he got there and when he did, held the ball. The crowd cheered lustily.

Burdon, the pitcher of the Ocean Falls baseball team, did fine work in the first innings of the game yesterday afternoon. He dropped away in the seventh and the Rupert batters all began to get hits. Burdon himself was batting very high and up to the ninth had got hits every time he came up to bat.

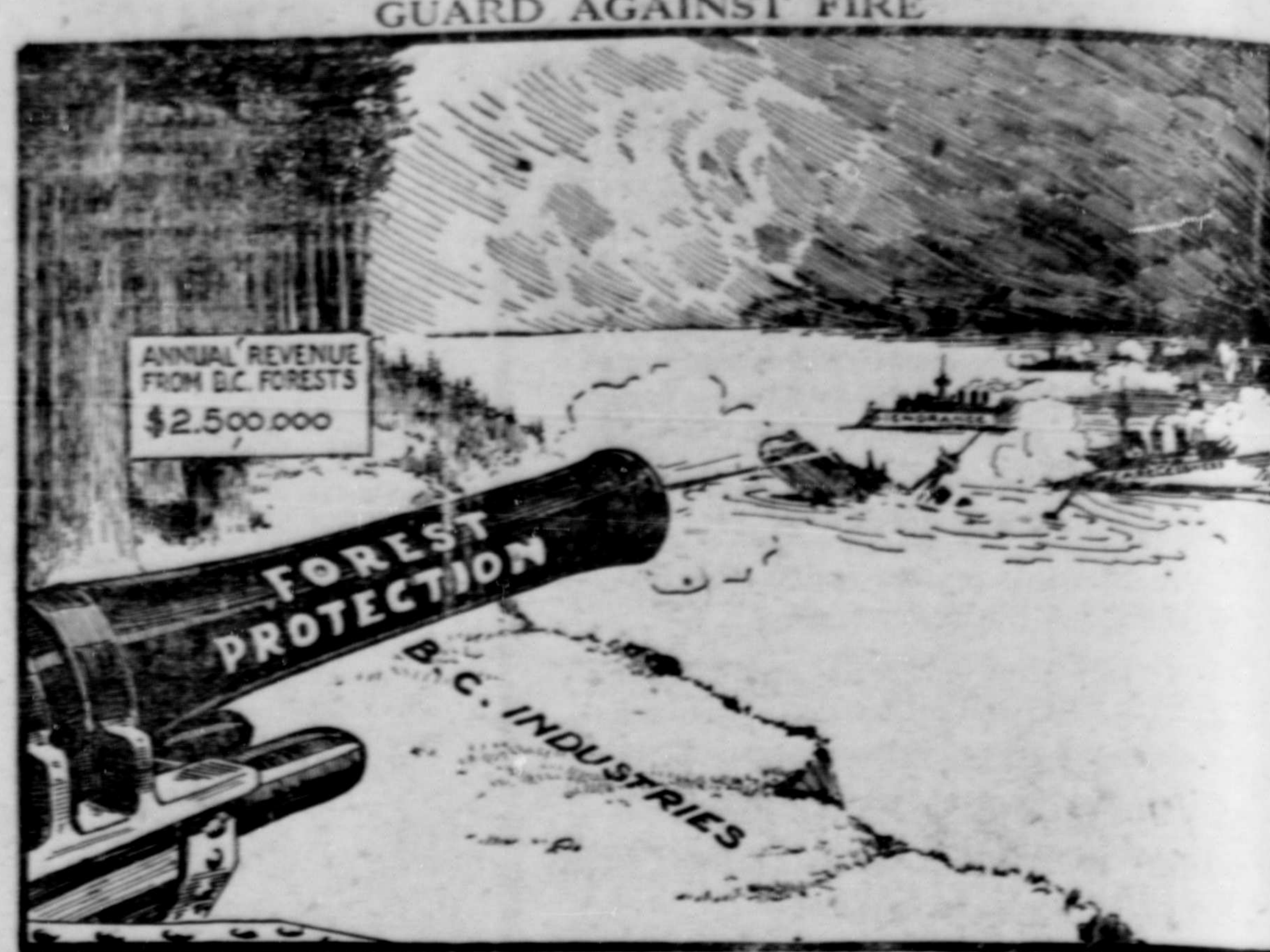
