

Would Debate Question on Public **Platform** in Victoria

VICTORIA, Aug. 3. — "There appears to be a great lack of understanding of the provisions of the sockeye salmon treaty," General A. D. McRae said here yesterday. "As I see matters the treaties have nothing to do with party politics. I am quite agree able to meet Hon. S. L. evening. Last year Mr. Johnson Howe on a platform in this city, preferably under the auspices of such a body as the Chamber of Commerce, so that his viewpoint and that of the federal Conservative party may be laid before the people."

"Unquestionably a treaty is wanted for the conserva- lace. tion of the sockeye," continued General McRae. "I do not think the treaty as now drawn is desirable."
